The report of the Chief of Police as above referred to, is ordered to be entered in the minutes, as follows:

POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, OFFICE OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE, No. 200 MULBERRY STREET, NEW YORK, March 28, 1898.

To the Honorable Board of Police.

SIR:—I would respectfully recommend that the numbers of the various precincts in the Borough of Manhattan, the Borough of The Bronx, the Borough of Brooklyn, the Borough of Queens and the Borough of Richmond be changed or established in accordance with the details herewith given, so that they may run consecutively from 1 to 80.

The need of this change is apparent, as it would tend to simplify the designation and the description of the different precincts of this Department, and would prevent the confusion that would naturally arise from the combination of the same precinct number in different boroughs, where it even three times. As you will observe, the scheme of manning precincts with the precincts in the Borough of Manhattan including the New York and Brooklyn Bridge force and Central Park, and the precincts in regular order in the Borough of The Bronx, of Brooklyn (including Prospect Park, the Bronx and of Richmond).

I would also suggest the renaming of the various city precincts and inspection districts, as per schedule which will be herewith given, there being in all fifteen inspection districts—four in the Borough of Manhattan (including the Borough of Richmond), one in the Borough of The Bronx, four in the Borough of Brooklyn and one in the Borough of Queens.

This reorganizing would seem to be advisable for the reasons that, as herein laid out, it would secure the uniformity of attendance in the distribution of authority, the regard being had to the size of population, the economic aspect, and the geographical distribution of the various parts of the city.

The consolidation of the Park Police Force with the Police Force of the municipality has added to the Police Department a number of officers, who, under the conditions that exist prior to consolidation, were necessarily distributed in such a manner in patrolling the numerous smaller parks as to combine a waste of material with an inefficient service. Under the present system of patrolling the parks in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (exclusive of Central Park and Bronx Park), a force is required of 4 Sergeants, 10 Roundsmen, 20 Patrolmen and 3 Inspectors. It is now possible, by a system of patrolling the smaller parks with Patrolmen on regular tours and attached to the precincts in which the parks lie, to cover these parks with 66 Patrolmen, and without the necessity of additional Sergeants in Roundsmen, a number of Sergeants, 10 Roundsmen, 24 Patrolmen and 3 Inspectors. This system would obviate the necessity of several sub-precincts of the Park Force scattered about the city. In the Borough of Brooklyn, by a similar measure, a saving can be effected of 4 Sergeants and 20 Roundsmen; it having required to patrol the small parks in the former City of Brooklyn 4 Sergeants and 20 Patrolmen, whereas, under the proposed system, no additional Sergeants will be required to the number already in the precinct, and 20 Patrolmen will be sufficient for the proper patrolling of these small parks.

The number of men in excess of those needed for the work of patrolling the smaller parks can be made available for the proper protection of some of the larger parks, while at the same time all the parks will receive much better protection than they have heretofore been afforded. Bronx Park and Pelham Bay Park, in particular, have suffered from lack of protection, which has resulted in the destruction of a great deal of valuable city property. By patrolling the smaller parks with Patrolmen from the precincts in which they lie, a sufficient number of officers can be secured for the proper patrolling of these two important parks, and at the same time the quota of the various precincts can be increased so as to assign some of these men to the small parks, and have them covered precisely as they have heretofore been covered. In addition to the men thus specially assigned to the individual parks, the regular posts of the respective precincts in which they are located will be extended to cover the parks, giving them that much added protection. For instance, Union Square Park is at present patrolled by three policemen, each doing an eight-hour tour, which places one man constantly on duty in the park. The regular posts of the Nineteenth Precinct adjoining this park, have likewise stopped at the boundaries of the park. They will now be extended, so that the post on Fourteenth street, instead of stopping at the park, will go to Fourth avenue thus covering the southern end of the park; similarly, the post on Fourth avenue and on Seventeenth street will be extended to cover the east and north sides of the park, and the posts on Fifteenth and Sixteenth streets will be extended to cross the park, making five men covering its boundaries and patrolling through it; in addition to the one man whose sole duty is to patrol the park, as under the old system, the one man patrolling the park without assistance, as under the present system. The detailed arrangements for patrolling the smaller parks and extending the adjoining posts are herewith explained.

The Station-house at the Seventeenth Precinct is in the Grand Central Station. It has no sleeping accommodations for men, and consequently no reserves. The officers assigned thereto do duty by a system of three platoons, a virtually a system of details, of no particular benefit to the Department, and necessitating a greater number of men than is necessary with the two-platoon system. I would recommend, in order to secure a more efficient service, that the boundaries of the Seventeenth Precinct be changed to correspond with the boundaries of the Grand Central Station, the remainder of what is now the Seventeenth Precinct to be divided among the present Nineteenth, Twenty-first and Twenty-third Precincts. The territory thus added to these three precincts can be covered by Patrolmen on regular tours, and by an extension of certain posts it can be patrolled with the addition of only one night post in the Twenty-third Precinct. By this change a gain of 24 Patrolmen will be made, to be available for service elsewhere, and the change will add greatly to the efficiency of the service. Adding these to the number gained by the proposed rearrangement of the park service, a grand total of 5 Sergeants, 10 Roundsmen, 88 Patrolmen and 3 Inspectors is gained, who will be available for service elsewhere.

I would also recommend the establishing of an additional precinct, to be composed of Bronx Park and portions of the present Thirty-fourth, Thirty-fifth and Thirty-eighth Precincts. These precincts are so large that portions of them lying remote from the station-houses are not adequately protected. By taking portions of each of these precincts and adding them to Bronx Park, housing the men at the Larchmont mansion, a great improvement will be made in the patrol system in the northern part of the city, which will add considerably to the efficiency of the service. The

proposed change in the system of patrolling the small parks will supply enough men to police the four precincts.

The Ocean parkway, in the Borough of Brooklyn, from Prospect Park to Coney Island, has heretofore been covered by the Park Police. These men will be transferred to the precincts through which the Ocean parkway passes. The Eastern parkway, extending from Prospect Park to Ralph Avenue, has been similarly covered, and the men thereon will also be transferred to the precincts through which the Eastern parkway passes, while the parkway will be brought within the boundary lines of the precincts.

The Borough of Queens I have decided to divide into six precincts, forming one Inspection District, and the boundary lines of the Seventeenth and Twentieth Precincts of the Borough of Brooklyn will be changed to extend into the Borough of Queens, taking in that portion formerly known as East Williamsburg, for the reason that there is ample accommodation for men in the Seventeenth and Twentieth Precincts, and the accommodations for men in the Newtown Precinct are limited.

With further reference to the Borough of Queens, I beg to call your attention to a report which I made to you on January 20, 1898, in which I recommended that three hundred and ten Patrolmen be assigned to duty there. I am still of the opinion that that number is needed.

The Borough of Richmond will constitute one precinct, with three sub-precincts and stations, and will be included with the precincts comprising the Second Inspection District.

**BOUNDARIES OF VARIOUS PRECINCTS DESCRIBED, WITH DETAILED EXPLANATION OF PROPOSED SYSTEM OF POLICING THE SMALLER PARKS.**

The First Precinct will be what is now known as the First Precinct (Old Slip). Boundaries: Beginning at the south side of Staten Island Ferry to the centre line of State street (including Bowling Green Park), to centre line of Broadway, to centre line of Fulton street, to East river, along shores of East river and New York Bay, to south side of Staten Island Ferry, place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Old Slip.

Contains two parks, Jeannette Park and Bowling Green. Jeannette Park (.87 of an acre, patrolled by one Park Policeman), can be covered without the need of additional posts by extending Night Post 31 to take in southern half of park, and Night Post 28 to take in northern half of park. Bowling Green (.517 of an acre, not patrolled by Park Policemen) can be covered without the need of additional posts by extending Night Post 4, which already covers outside of park, to the inside of same.

The addition of these two parks will not change precinct boundaries.  
 The Second Precinct will be what is now known as the Second Precinct (Church street). Boundaries: Beginning at Battery place and North river, along the shores of North river, to the centre line of Warren street, to the centre line of Broadway, to the centre line of Battery place to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Church and Liberty streets.

Contains one park, Battery Park (21.19 acres, patrolled by eight Park Policemen), cannot be covered by extending posts. Would need two night posts, with one man at the Aquarium in the daytime. Night Posts 1 and 24 would be extended to cover north and east sides of park.

The addition of this park will make the boundaries of the precinct as follows: Beginning at Battery place and North river, along the shores of the North river to the centre line of Warren street, to the centre line of Broadway, to the centre line of State street, to the centre line of Whitehall street, to the south side of Staten Island Ferry, along the shores of New York Bay, and along the shores of the North river to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The Third Precinct will be what is now known as the Third Precinct (City Hall). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Chambers street and Broadway, along the centre line of Chambers street, to the centre line of Centre street, to the centre line of Park Row, to the centre line of Broadway, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, City Hall.

Contains one park (City Hall Park, 8.219 acres, patrolled by six Park Policemen). Cannot be covered by extending posts. Would need two night posts and two day posts.

The addition of this park will not change the boundaries of the precinct.

The Fourth Precinct will be what is now known as the New York and Brooklyn Bridge. Boundaries: All of New York and Brooklyn Bridge, from Sands street, Borough of Brooklyn, to Park Row, Borough of Manhattan.

The Fifth Precinct will be what is now known as the Fourth Precinct (Oak Street). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of Catharine street, at Chatham Square, to East river, along the shores of East river to the centre line of Fulton street, to the centre line of Broadway, to City Hall Square, to centre line of Park Row, to Chatham Square, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 9 Oak street.

Contains no parks.  
 The Sixth Precinct will be what is now known as the Sixth Precinct, Elizabeth street. Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Broadway and Chambers street, along the centre line of Broadway to centre line of Howard street, to centre line of Hester street, to centre line of Bowery, to Chatham Square, to centre line of Park Row, to centre line of Centre street, to centre line of Chambers street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Nos. 17 and 19 Elizabeth street.

Contains two parks, Mulberry Bend and Paradise Parks. Acreage: Mulberry Bend Park, 2.75, patrolled by five Park Policemen; Paradise Park, .114 of an acre, not patrolled by Park Policemen. Mulberry Bend would need one additional day and one night post, and in addition Posts 36, 12, 10 and 9 can be extended to cover the sides of the park. Paradise Park will not require additional posts. Can be covered by extending Posts 30 and 9.

The addition of these parks will not change the boundaries of the precinct.  
 The Seventh Precinct will be what is now known as the Seventh Precinct, Madison street. Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Grand street and Scamuel street, to centre line of Water street, to north side of Gouverneur Slip, to East river, along the shores of East river to south side of Catharine Slip, to centre line of Catharine street, to Chatham Square, to centre line of Division street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 247 Madison street.

Contains portion of proposed park at Suffolk and Hester streets, the remainder of which lies in the Eleventh and Twelfth Precincts. It is proposed to extend the boundaries of the Seventh Precinct so as to include the whole of this proposed park, together with the small triangle of ground at Hester, Division and Suffolk streets. This park, when completed, will need to be made an additional post, and in addition to this can be covered by the extension of the posts on Division and Jefferson streets.

Also contains Rutgers Park (.45 of an acre, patrolled by one Park Policeman), which is closed at night, and which will not require to be made an additional night post.

Post 21 runs between the two parts of the park. Post 29 extends entirely around it, and Post 18 extends along the Cherry street side.  
 The addition of the portions of the proposed park now lying in the Eleventh and Twelfth Precincts to the Seventh Precinct, as well as the small triangle mentioned, and Rutgers Park, would change the boundaries of the Seventh Precinct so that they would be as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Grand street and Scamuel street, to centre line of Water street, to north side of Gouverneur Slip, to East river, along shores of East river to south side of Catharine Slip, to centre line of Catharine street, to Chatham Square, to centre line of Division street, to centre line of Essex street, to centre line of Hester street, to centre line of Division street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The Eighth Precinct will be what is now known as the Fifth Precinct, Leonard street. Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Broadway and Canal street, along the centre line of Broadway to the centre line of Warren street, to the North river, along the shores of the North river to the centre line of Canal street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Nos. 17 and 19 Leonard street.

Contains three parks, Duane Street Park, Canal Street Park and Beach Street Park. Acreage: Duane Street Park, .168 of an acre; Canal Street Park, .318 of an acre; Beach Street Park, .38 of an acre. Canal Street Park is patrolled by one Park Policeman, the others are not patrolled. Can all be covered by extending posts as follows: Duane Street Park, Night Post 42; Beach Street Park, Night Post 6; Canal Street Park, Night Post 16.

The addition of these parks will not change the boundaries of the precinct.  
 The Ninth Precinct will be what is now known as the Ninth Precinct (Charles street). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of Houston street and North river, along the centre line of Houston street to the centre line of Sixth avenue, to the centre line of Bleeker street, to centre line of Carmine street, to centre line of Sixth avenue, to centre line of Fourteenth street, to North river, along shores of North river, to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Nos. 135 and 137 Charles street.

Contains four parks, St. John's Park (1.7 acres, patrolled by one Park Policeman); Christopher Street Park (.129 of an acre, not patrolled by Park Policemen); Abington Square Park (.102 of an acre, not patrolled by Park Policemen); and Jackson Square Park (.227 of an acre, not patrolled by Park Policemen). St. John's Park is unfinished, but when finished will need to be made an additional post, day and night. Christopher street park can be covered by extending Night Post 29 to include interior of park; Abington Square Park, by extending Night Post 15, and Jackson Square Park, by extending Night Post 32.

The addition of these parks to the Ninth Precinct will not change the boundaries of that precinct.

The Tenth Precinct will be what is now known as the Eighth Precinct (Maddougal street). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of Canal street at the North river; thence along the centre line of Canal street to the centre line of Broadway, to the centre line of Houston street, to North river, along the shores of the North river to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Nos. 24 and 26 Maddougal street.

Contains no parks.  
 The Eleventh Precinct will be what is now known as the Tenth Precinct (Mulberry street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Broadway and Howard street, along the centre line of Howard street to the centre line of Hester street, to the centre line of Bowery, to centre line of Bleeker street, to centre line of Broadway, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 205 Mulberry street.

Contains no parks.  
 The Twelfth Precinct will be what is now known as the Eleventh Precinct (Elbridge street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Bowery and Houston street, along the centre line of Houston street to the centre line of Clinton street, to the centre line of Rivington street, to the centre line of Norfolk street, to the centre line of Division street, to Chatham Square, to centre line of Bowery, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Nos. 105 and 107 Elbridge street.

Contains portion of proposed park, description of which is given under Seventh Precinct.  
 The addition to the Seventh Precinct of the portion of this park which lies within the Eleventh Precinct will change the boundaries of the Eleventh Precinct so as to be as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Bowery and Houston street; thence along the centre line of Houston street to the centre line of Clinton street, to the centre line of Rivington street, to the centre line of Norfolk street, to the centre line of Hester street, to the centre line of Essex street, to the centre line of Division street, to the centre line of Bowery, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The Thirteenth Precinct will be what is now known as the Twelfth Precinct (Delancey street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Norfolk street and Division street; thence along the centre line of Division street, to centre line of Scamuel street, to centre line of Water street, to north side of Gouverneur Slip, to the East river; along the shores of the East river to the centre line of Rivington street, to the centre line of Norfolk street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Attorney and Delancey streets.

Contains Corlears Park (8.3 acres, patrolled by four Park Police), a portion of proposed park (for which see present Seventh Precinct) and a small park at Grand street and East Broadway. Corlears Park will need one additional night post. In addition to this, Posts 21, 23 and 25 can be extended to cover the sides of the park, and Post 22 can be extended to run through said park.

The small park at Grand street and East Broadway can be covered by extending Post 16.  
 The addition of neither of these parks would change the boundaries of the precinct. The addition of the portion of the proposed park that now lies in the Twelfth Precinct to the Seventh Precinct, as well as the addition of the small triangle adjoining, will make the boundaries of this Precinct as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Norfolk street and Rivington street, thence along the centre line of Rivington street to East river, along the shores of East river to the north side of Gouverneur slip; thence to the centre line of Water street, to the center line of Scamuel street, to the center line of Division street, to the center line of Hester street, to the center line of Norfolk street, to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The Fourteenth Precinct will be what is now known as the Thirteenth Precinct (Union Market). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Rivington street and Clinton street, thence running along the centre line of Clinton street to the centre line of Avenue B, to the centre line of Fourteenth street, to the East river, along the shores of the East river, to the centre line of Rivington street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Union Market, East Houston and Sheriff streets.

Contains no parks.  
 The Fifteenth Precinct will be what is now known as the Fourteenth Precinct (East Fifth street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Houston street and Bowery; thence along centre line of Bowery, to centre line of Fourth avenue, to centre line of

Fourteenth street, to centre line of Avenue B, to centre line of Houston street, to place of beginning, including all the streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, First avenue, corner of Fifth street.

Contains two parks, Tompkins Square and Cooper Union Park. Tompkins Square Park (10,908 acres, patrolled by seven Park Policemen) would require two additional night posts.

Cooper Union Park (.229 of an acre, not patrolled by Park Policemen) could be covered without the need of additional posts by extending Posts 26, 4 and 1.

The addition of these parks would not change the boundaries of the precinct.

The Sixteenth Precinct will be what is now known as the Fifteenth Precinct (Mercer street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Houston street and Broadway, along the centre line of Broadway to centre line of Bleeker, to centre line of Bowery, to centre line of Fourth avenue, to centre line of Fourteenth street, to centre line of Sixth avenue, to centre line of Carmine street, to centre line of Bleeker street, to centre line of Sixth avenue, to centre line of Houston street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 253 Mercer street.

Contains one park, Washington Square. This will require one additional night post and one day post. Acreage, 8,115, now patrolled by six Park Policemen. In addition, Posts 39, 20, 36 and 13 can be extended to cover sides of park and Posts 15 and 17 can be extended to cross park.

The addition of this park will not change the boundary lines of this precinct.

The Seventeenth Precinct will be what is now known as the Sixteenth Precinct (West Twentieth street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Fourteenth street and Seventh avenue; thence along the centre line of Seventh avenue to centre line of Twenty-seventh street, to North river, along the shores of North river to centre line of Fourteenth street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 230 West Twentieth street.

Contains no parks.

The Eighteenth Precinct will be what is now known as the Eighteenth Precinct (East Twenty-second street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Fourteenth street and Fourth avenue; thence along the centre line of Fourth avenue to the centre line of Twenty-seventh street, to the centre line of First avenue, to centre line of Twenty-sixth street, to East river, along the shores of the East river to the centre line of Fourteenth street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 327 East Twenty-second street.

Contains two parks, Gramercy Park and Stuyvesant Park. Gramercy Park is a private park, and has never been patrolled by the Park Police. Stuyvesant Park (4,220 acres, patrolled by three Park Policemen) will require one additional day and night post. The park is now closed at 10 P. M. In addition to this, Post 35 runs along Second avenue, between the halves of the park, and Posts 3, 5, 6 and 5 can be extended to cover sides of park.

The addition of these parks will not change the boundary lines of this precinct.

The Nineteenth Precinct will be what is now known as the Nineteenth Precinct (West Thirtieth street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Fourteenth street and Fourth avenue; thence along centre line of Fourth avenue to Fortieth street, to centre line of Madison avenue, to centre line of Forty-second street, to centre line of Seventh avenue, to centre line of Fiftieth street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 137 West Thirtieth street.

Contains three parks: Union Square Park (7,485 acres, patrolled by three Park Policemen); Madison Square Park (0.84 acres, patrolled by four Park Policemen); and Bryant Square Park (4,775 acres, patrolled by three Park Policemen).

Each of these parks would need to be made a night post. In addition, Posts 1, 2, 3 and 4 can be extended to cover sides of Union Square and cross it, and Posts 12 and 13 can be extended to cross Madison Square. The portion of the Seventeenth Precinct, between Fourth and Madison avenues, and between Fortieth and Forty-second streets can, if added to the Nineteenth Precinct, be covered without the need of additional posts by the extension of Posts 54 and 58.

The addition of none of these parks would change the boundaries of the Nineteenth Precinct. The addition of portion of the Seventeenth Precinct, which is heretofore described, would change the boundaries as to make them as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Twentieth street and Seventh avenue, thence along centre line of Seventh avenue to centre line of Forty-second street, to Fourth avenue, to centre line of Fourteenth street, to place of beginning, including Fourth avenue to westerly side of tunnel; this to include all streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The Twentieth Precinct will be what is now known as the Twentieth Precinct (West Thirty-seventh street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Twenty-seventh street and Seventh avenue, thence along the centre line of Seventh avenue to centre line of Forty-second street, to North river, along the shores of North river to centre line of Twenty-seventh street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 454 West Thirty-seventh street.

Contains no parks.

The Twenty-first Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-first Precinct (East Thirty-fifth street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Twenty-seventh street and Fourth avenue, along the centre line of Fourth avenue to centre line of Fortieth street, to centre line of Lexington avenue, to centre line of Forty-second street, to East river, along the shores of East river to centre line of Twenty-sixth street, to centre line of First avenue, to centre line of Twenty-seventh street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 160 East Thirty-fifth street.

Contains no parks.

The addition of portion of Seventeenth Precinct lying between Lexington and Fourth avenues and between Fortieth and Forty-second streets to the Twenty-first Precinct would necessitate no additional posts, but could be covered by the extension of Posts 15, 16, 17, 37 and 35. The boundaries of the Twenty-first Precinct would then be: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Twenty-seventh street and Fourth avenue, along Fourth avenue to the centre line of Forty-second street, to East river, along shores of East river to centre line of Twenty-sixth street, to centre line of First avenue, to centre line of Twenty-seventh street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries (this includes Fourth avenue to westerly side of park, and includes the whole of the tunnel on Fourth avenue).

The Twenty-second Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-second Precinct (West Forty-seventh street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Forty-second street and Sixth avenue; thence along centre line of Sixth avenue to the north side of Fifty-ninth street, to Eighth avenue; thence the centre line of Fifty-ninth street, to North river, along the shores of the North river, to the centre line of Forty-second street, to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Nos. 345 and 347 West Forty-seventh street.

Contains no parks.

The Twenty-third Precinct will be what is now known as the Seventeenth Precinct, Grand Central Station. Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of centre lines of Fortieth street and Lexington avenue, along centre line of Lexington avenue to centre line of Forty-ninth street, to centre line of Madison avenue, to centre line of Fortieth street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Grand Central Station.

Contains no parks, but the addition of part of its territory to the Nineteenth, Twenty-first and Twenty-third Precincts will make the boundaries of the present Seventeenth Precinct as follows: Beginning at the intersection of centre lines of Forty-second street and Vanderbilt avenue; thence along the centre line of Vanderbilt avenue to centre line of Forty-fifth street, to centre line of Depew place, to centre line of Forty-second street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The Twenty-fourth Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-third Precinct (East Fifty-first street). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of Forty-second street and East river; thence along the centre line of Forty-second street to centre line of Lexington avenue, to centre line of Forty-ninth street, to centre line of Madison avenue, to centre line of Forty-second street, to centre line of Sixth avenue, to north side of Fifty-ninth street, to Fifth avenue; thence centre line of Fifty-ninth street, to East river, along shores of East river to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 165 East Fifty-first street.

Contains no parks.

The addition of portion of Seventeenth Precinct lying between Lexington and Madison avenues and bounded by Forty-ninth street on the north and by Forty-second street, Depew place, Forty-fifth street, Vanderbilt avenue and Forty-second street on the south, would necessitate one additional post and would make the boundaries of the precinct as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Forty-second street and Vanderbilt avenue, along the centre line of Vanderbilt avenue to centre line of Forty-fifth street, to centre line of Depew place, to centre line of Forty-second street, to East river, along the shores of East river to centre line of Fifty-ninth street, to centre line of Sixth avenue, to centre line of Forty-second street to place of beginning, including all the streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 165 East Fifty-first street.

The Twenty-fifth Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-fifth Precinct (East Sixty-seventh street). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of Fifty-ninth street and East river, along the shores of East river to the centre line of Seventy-ninth street, to west side of Fifth avenue, to centre line of Fifty-ninth street to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries, and also including the whole of Blackwell's Island. Station-house, No. 153 East Sixty-seventh street.

Contains no parks.

The Twenty-sixth Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-fourth Precinct (West Sixty-eighth street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Fifty-ninth street and Eighth avenue, along the east side of Eighth avenue to the centre line of Eighty-sixth street to North river, along shores of North river to the centre line of Fifty-ninth street, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 150 West Sixty-eighth street.

Contains portion of Riverside Drive, including Park, Manhattan Square and small park at Sixty-third street and Boulevard. This portion of Riverside Drive and Park, westward to the river, will need to be made two night and two day posts, one to cover the park from the west side of Riverside Drive to the Hudson river, from Seventy-second street to Eighty-sixth street, and the other to cover the drive from Seventy-second to Eighty-sixth street.

Riverside Drive and Park lies partly in the Twenty-fourth, partly in the Twenty-sixth and partly in the Thirtieth Precinct. Its entire acreage is 177.8, and it is patrolled by twenty-three Park Policemen.

Manhattan Square (19.51 acres, patrolled by five Park Policemen) is to be made an additional post, and Night Posts 38, 42 and 40 are to be extended to cover south, west and north sides of park.

The small park at Sixty-third street and Boulevard (patrolled by one Park Policeman) can be covered by extending Posts 3, 24 and 7 to cover sides.

The addition of none of these parks will change precinct boundaries.

The Twenty-seventh Precinct will be what is now known as Central Park. Boundaries: Beginning at the north side of Fifty-ninth street and west side of Fifth avenue; thence along Fifth avenue to the south side of One Hundred and Tenth street, to the east side of Eighth avenue, to the north side of Fifty-ninth street, to place of beginning, including all streets, avenues, drives, roads and paths within said boundaries. Station-house, Arsenal, with a sub-station at McGown's Pass.

The Twenty-eighth Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-seventh Precinct (East Eighty-eighth street). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of Seventy-ninth street and East river, along the shores of the East river to the centre line of Ninety-sixth street, to the west side of Fifth avenue, to centre line of Seventy-ninth street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 432 East Eighty-eighth street.

Contains East River Park (12,546 acres, patrolled by four Park Policemen), which will be made one additional night and day post. In addition Posts 48 and 6 can be extended to cover the sides of the park, and Posts 8, 9, 10 and 11 can be extended to pass through the park.

The addition of this park will not change the boundaries of this precinct.

The Twenty-ninth Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-eighth Precinct (East One Hundred and Fourth street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre line of Ninety-sixth street and west side of Fifth avenue; thence along Fifth avenue to south side of One Hundred and Tenth street, to centre line of Lenox avenue, to centre line of One Hundred and Sixteenth street, to East river, along shores of East river to centre line of Ninety-sixth street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries, and also including the whole of Ward's Island. Station-house, Nos. 177 and 179 East One Hundred and Fourth street.

Contains no parks.

The Thirtieth Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-sixth Precinct (West One Hundredth street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre line of Eighty-sixth street and the east side of Eighth avenue; thence along Eighth avenue to centre line of One Hundred and Tenth street, to North river, along shores of North river to centre line of Eighty-sixth street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 134 West One Hundredth street.

Contains portion of Riverside Drive, between Eighty-sixth street and One Hundred and Tenth street. Will be made two additional day and night posts, one post to include from the western side of Riverside Drive to the Hudson river, and from Eighty-sixth street to One Hundred and Tenth street, and the other to be on Riverside Drive, from Eighty-sixth street to One Hundred and Tenth street.

The addition of this portion of Riverside Drive will not change the boundaries of this precinct.

The Thirty-first Precinct will be what is now known as the Thirtieth Precinct (West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the south side of One Hundred and Tenth street and centre line of Lenox avenue; thence along the centre line of Lenox avenue to the centre line of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, to the North river, along the shores of the North river, to the centre line of One Hundred and Tenth street, to Eighth avenue, and thence along the south side of One Hundred and Tenth street to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, No. 438 West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street.

Contains Morningside Park and a portion of Riverside Drive, north of One Hundred and Tenth street.

Morningside Park (51,238 acres, patrolled by five Park Policemen) is to be made one additional post, and another additional post to be made of the drive along east side of Morningside Park, from One Hundred and Tenth to One Hundred and Twenty-second street. Night Posts 40 and 41 will be extended to cover west side of park.

Two additional posts to be made of portion of Riverside Drive and Park, in this precinct; one post to cover from the west side of Riverside Drive to the Hudson river, from One Hundred and Tenth street to the northern boundary of the park, and the other to cover Riverside Drive, from One Hundred and Tenth street to the northern boundary of the park.

The addition of these parks will not change precinct boundaries.

The Thirty-second Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-ninth Precinct (East One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of One Hundred and Sixteenth street and Lenox avenue; thence along the centre line of Lenox avenue to centre line of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, to Harlem river, along shores of Harlem river to centre line of One Hundred and Sixteenth street, including all the streets and avenues within said boundaries, and also including the whole of Randall's Island. Station-house, No. 148 East One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street.

Contains one park, Mount Morris Park. Will require two additional posts. Acreage, 20,174; patrolled by four Park Policemen.

The addition of this park will not change the boundaries of the precinct.

The Thirty-third Precinct will be what is now known as the Thirty-second Precinct (One Hundred and Fifty-second street). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and Harlem river, along the shores of Harlem river to Sherman's Creek, to Inwood street, to Hudson river, along the shores of Hudson river to the centre line of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, to the place of beginning, including all the streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, One Hundred and Fifty-second street and Amsterdam avenue.

Contains two parks, Fort Washington Park and Highbridge Park.

Fort Washington Park (acreage 40, now patrolled by one Park Policeman) will be made one additional day and one additional night post.

Highbridge Park (acreage 42.28, now patrolled by six Park Policemen) will be made one additional day and one additional night post.

The addition of these parks will not change the boundaries of the precinct.

The Thirty-fourth Precinct will be what is now known as the Thirty-first Precinct (Highbridge). Boundaries: Beginning at Cromwell's Creek and the Harlem river; thence along the centre line of said creek to the centre line of Jerome avenue, to centre line of Kingsbridge road, to Harlem river, along the shores of the Harlem river to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Highbridge.

The addition of a portion of the territory of this precinct to the present Thirty-fifth Precinct will make its boundaries as follows: Beginning at Cromwell's Creek and the Harlem river; thence along the shores of the Harlem river to the centre line of Fordham Landing road, to Jerome avenue, to Cromwell's Creek, to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Highbridge.

Contains no parks.

The Thirty-fifth Precinct will be what is now known as the Thirty-seventh Precinct (Alexander avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Long Island Sound; thence along the centre line of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to the New York Central and Hudson River Railway, to the centre line of Cromwell's Creek, to the Harlem river, along the shores of the Harlem river, Bronx Kills and Long Island Sound, to the place of beginning, including all streets, avenues and roads within said boundaries, and also Riker's and North and South Brother Islands. Station-house, Alexander avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street.

Contains St. Mary's Park (acreage 28.70, now patrolled by three Park Policemen). To be made one additional day and night post.

Its addition will not change the boundaries of the precinct.

The Thirty-sixth Precinct will be what is now known as the Thirty-third Precinct (One Hundred and Sixty-first street). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and Long Island Sound; thence along the centre line of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street to the New York Central and Hudson River Railway, to Cromwell's Creek, to the centre line of Jerome avenue, to centre line of East One Hundred and Seventieth street, to centre line of Franklin avenue, to centre line of Jefferson avenue, to centre line of Boston road, to centre line of Home street, to centre line of Bronx river, along centre line of Bronx river to Long Island Sound, along the shores of Long Island Sound to centre line of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries.

Contains Cedar Park (acreage 17,470, now patrolled by three Park Policemen). Is at present on Mounted Post 52. Two posts to be made of present Post 52, one taking in Cedar Park and all that portion of Post 52 south of One Hundred and Sixty-first street, and the other new post taking in the remainder of present Post 52.

The addition of this park will not change the boundaries of this precinct.

The Thirty-seventh Precinct will be what is now known as the Thirty-fourth Precinct (Tremont). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of One Hundred and Seventieth street and Jerome avenue; thence along Jerome avenue to the centre line of Van Cortlandt avenue, to Reservoir Oval East, both sides, to centre line of Gun Hill road, to centre line of Olin avenue, to centre line of the bridge across the Bronx river at Williamsbridge, to northern boundary of Bronx Park; thence to east side of Harlem railroad, to centre line of Pelham avenue, to centre line of Southern Boulevard, to centre line of Kingsbridge road, to centre line of the Bronx river, to centre line of bridge over Bronx river at Westchester avenue, to centre line of Westchester avenue, to centre line of Home street, to centre line of Boston road, to centre line of Jefferson street, to centre line of Franklin avenue, to centre line of One Hundred and Seventieth street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Tremont.

Contains Claremont and Crotona Parks. Claremont Park (acreage 38, now patrolled by three Park Policemen) will be made an additional night and day post. Crotona Park (acreage 154.60, now covered by four Park Policemen) will be made an additional day and night post.

The addition of part of this territory to the new precinct to be formed will make the boundaries of the present Thirty-fourth Precinct as follows: Beginning at the bridge over the Bronx river and Westchester avenue, along the west side of Westchester avenue to the north side of Home street, to west side of Boston road, to centre line of Jefferson street, to centre line of Franklin avenue, to centre line of One Hundred and Seventieth street, to centre line of Jerome avenue, to centre line of High Bridge road, to centre line of Kingsbridge road, to centre line of Pelham avenue, to centre line of Southern Boulevard, to centre line of Kingsbridge road, to centre line of Main street, to centre line of West Farms road and the line of the Bronx river to the bridge crossing same at Westchester avenue, place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The addition of these parks will not change the boundaries of the precinct.

The Thirty-eighth Precinct will be what is now known as the Thirty-eighth Precinct (West Chester). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of the Bronx river at the city line; thence along the centre line of the Bronx river to the northern boundary of Bronx Park, to the eastern boundary of Bronx Park, to the centre line of the Bronx river, to Long Island Sound, along shores of Long Island Sound to the southern boundary of the westernmost portion of Pelham Bay Park, to the western boundary of such portion, to the northern boundary of such portion, across the mouth of the Hutchinson river to the western boundary of the major portion of Pelham Bay Park, to the city line, to the place of beginning, including City Island, Hart's Island, High Island and all the small islands on the northern shore of Long Island Sound lying south of the city line, with the exception of such of them as are included within Pelham Bay Park, and including all the streets and avenues within said boundaries.

Contains Pelham Park (acreage 1,756, now patrolled by five Park Policemen).

The establishment of the new Thirty-ninth Precinct within these boundaries, the addition of a portion of this territory to the new Bronx Park Precinct, and the addition of Pelham Bay Park to the Thirty-eighth Precinct, will make the boundaries as follows: Beginning at West Farms Bridge over the Bronx river; thence along the line of the Bronx river to Long Island Sound at Clason's Point; thence northward along the shore line to the city line (including City Island, Hunter's Island, High Island, East and West Twin Islands, Hart's Island and all the small islands along the northern shore of Long Island Sound south of the city line); thence along the city line to the western line of Pelham Park; thence to centre line of Pelham Parkway; thence to the centre line of the Old Boston Post road, to the centre line of White Plains road, to the centre line of Unionport road, to the centre line of Morris Park avenue, to the centre line of West Farms road, to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues and roads within said boundaries.

The Thirty-ninth Precinct will be what is now known as the Thirty-eighth Sub-Precinct (Wakefield). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Jerome avenue and the Gun Hill road, thence along the centre line of Jerome avenue to centre line of Mount Vernon avenue, to Yonkers city line, to centre line of Bronx river, to city line, along said line to Pelham Park, to north side of Pelham Parkway, to centre line of Old Boston Post road, to centre line of Williamsbridge road, to centre line of White Plains road, to centre line of Olin avenue, to centre line of Gun Hill road, to centre line of Jerome avenue, to place of beginning, including all streets, roads and avenues within said boundaries, and including Woodlawn Cemetery. Station-house at Wakefield.

The Fortieth Precinct will be what is now known as the Thirty-fifth Precinct (Kingsbridge). Boundaries: Beginning at Tully Hook and the Hudson river; thence along the centre line of Inwood street to the centre line of Dykman street, to centre line of Sherman's Creek, to Harlem river, along shores of Harlem river to centre line of Kingsbridge road, to centre line of Jerome avenue, to centre line of Van Cortlandt avenue, to Reservoir Oval, West, both sides, to centre line of Gun Hill road, to centre line of Olin avenue, to centre line of bridge across the Bronx river at Williamsbridge, along the centre line of the Bronx river to the city line, to the eastern boundary of Van Cortlandt Park, to southern boundary of Van Cortlandt Park, to western boundary of Van Cortlandt Park, to city line, to Hudson river, to Tully Hook, place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries.

Contains Van Cortlandt Park (acreage 1,132.35, now covered by eight Park Policemen).

The addition to this precinct of a portion of the territory in the present Thirty-first Precinct, the adding of some of its territory to the new Bronx Park Precinct, and the addition of Van Cortlandt Park, will make the boundaries of this precinct as follows: Beginning at the corner of Fordham Landing road and Jerome avenue; thence along the centre line of Jerome avenue to the easterly line of Van Cortlandt Park; thence along said line to the city line; thence westerly along said city line to the Hudson river, along the shores of the Hudson river to Inwood street, to Sherman Creek, to Harlem river, along the west shore of the Harlem river to Kingsbridge, along the east shore of the Harlem river to the Fordham Landing road, and along said road to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The Forty-first Precinct will be the new precinct (Bronx Park). Its boundaries will be: Beginning at Fordham Square, along the centre line of Kingsbridge road, to the centre line of Highbridge road, to the centre line of Jerome avenue, to the centre line of Gun Hill road, to the centre line of Olin avenue, to the centre line of White Plains road, to the centre line of Williamsbridge road, to the centre line of Old Boston Post road, to the centre of White Plains road, to the centre line of Unionport road, to the centre line of Morris Park avenue, to the centre line of West Farms road, to the centre line of Main street, to centre line of Kingsbridge road, to centre line of Southern Boulevard, to centre line of Pelham avenue, to Fordham Square, place of beginning, and all streets, roads and avenues within said boundaries, including Bronx Park Zoological and Botanical Gardens.

The Forty-second Precinct will be what is now known as the Thirty-sixth Precinct (Steamer Patrol). Its jurisdiction will extend to all the water-courses immediately adjacent to New York City, excepting those that are specifically described as belonging to a precinct. Station-house, Pier A, North river.

The Forty-third Precinct will be what is now known as the Eighteenth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Fourth avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of centre lines of Twenty-third street and Sixth avenue; thence along the centre line of Twenty-third street to the New York Bay; thence along the shores of New York Bay to centre line of Sixty-fifth street (Manhattan Beach Railroad), to centre line of New Utrecht avenue, to centre line of Fort Hamilton avenue to Thirty-seventh street, both sides, to Seventh avenue, both sides, to Thirty-sixth street, both sides, to Fifth avenue, both sides, to south side of Twenty-fourth street, to Sixth avenue, both sides, to centre line of Twenty-third street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, southwest corner of Fourth avenue and Forty-third street.

Contains Sunset Park (two square blocks in extent, not patrolled by Park Policemen), is not yet laid out, and does not need additional posts; it is now a part of Post 18.

The addition of this park will make no change in the boundary line of this precinct.

With Greenwood Cemetery added to this precinct the boundary lines will be as follows: Beginning at the centre line of New Utrecht avenue and Sixty-second street to the north side of Fort Hamilton avenue, to west side of Gravesend avenue, to south side of Twentieth street, to east side of Seventh avenue, to centre line of Twenty-third street, to Gowanus Bay, along the shores of said bay to Sixty-fifth street (line of Manhattan Beach Railroad), to centre line of New Utrecht avenue, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The Forty-fourth Precinct will be what is now known as the Eighth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Fifth avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the east side of Ninth avenue and centre line of Third street, along Ninth avenue, both sides, to Fifteenth street, then along centre line of Ninth avenue to Twentieth street, both sides, to Seventh avenue, both sides, to centre line of Twenty-third street, both sides, to Sixth avenue, then centre line of Twenty-third street to New York Bay, along shores of New York Bay to centre of Gowanus Canal, to centre line of Third street, to centre line of Ninth avenue, the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, northeast corner Fifth avenue and Sixteenth street.

Contains no parks.

The Forty-fifth Precinct will be what is now known as the Eleventh Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Hamilton avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of Gowanus Canal, opposite the centre line of Fifth street, to centre line of Smith street, to the centre line of Fourth place and Coles street, to the centre of Hamilton avenue, to the centre line of Hicks street, to the centre line of Sackett street, to the East river, along the shores of the East river to Gowanus Bay, along the shores of Gowanus Bay to the centre line of Gowanus Canal, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, southeast corner of Richards avenue and Kapelyen street.

Contains Red Hook Park (about six acres, not patrolled by park police), not yet laid out. Will not require any additional posts. It is now a part of Post 13.

The addition of this park will not change the boundaries of this precinct.

The Forty-sixth Precinct will be what is now known as the Tenth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Bergen street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Fulton street and Nevins street; thence along the centre of Fulton street to the centre line of Vanderbilt avenue, to centre line of Circle road, to intersection of Union street and Ninth avenue; thence along Ninth avenue, both sides, to centre line of Third street, to centre line of Gowanus Canal, to a point that would intersect a line drawn through the centre of the canal to Butler street, to centre line of Nevins street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, northeast corner of Sixth avenue and Bergen street.

Contains no parks.

The Forty-seventh Precinct will be what is now known as the Third Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Butler street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Atlantic avenue and Nevins street; thence along the centre line of Nevins street, to the centre line of Butler street, to a point where a line drawn through the centre line of Gowanus Canal would intersect the same; thence along such line to the centre line of Fifth street, to the centre line of Smith street, to the centre line of Fourth place, to the centre line of Coles street, to the centre line of Hamilton avenue, to the centre line of Hicks street, to the centre line of Sackett street, to the centre line of Henry street, to the centre line of Atlantic street, to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Nos. 17 and 19 Butler street.

Contains Carroll Park (about two acres, patrolled by three Park Policemen), to be made an additional night post. The addition of this park will not change the boundaries of this precinct.

The Forty-eighth Precinct will be what is now known as the Fifteenth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Amity street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Henry and Sackett streets, along centre line of Henry street to centre line of State street, to centre line of Hicks street, to Jerusalem street; both sides of Jerusalem street to Furman street, both sides, to the north side of Montague Street Bridge, to northerly side of Ferry Slip, along shores of New York Bay to the centre line of Sackett street, to the place of beginning, including all the streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Emmet street, corner of Amity street.

Contains no parks.

The Forty-ninth Precinct will be what is now known as the First Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Adams street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Atlantic avenue and Henry street; thence along the centre line of Henry street to the centre line of State street, to the centre line of Hicks street, both sides, from Jerusalem street to Grace Court, both sides, to Columbia Heights, to Montague Street Bridge, Columbia Heights, to centre line of Orange street, to the centre line of Nassau street, to the centre line of Hudson avenue, to the centre line of Fulton avenue, to centre line of Nevins street, to centre line of Atlantic avenue, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Nos. 318 to 322 Adams street.

Contains City Hall Park and Municipal Park, which can be covered without the necessity of additional posts.

The addition of these parks will not change the boundaries of the precinct.

The Fiftieth Precinct will be what is now known as the Second Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Fulton street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Flushing avenue and Nassau street; thence running by the wall or inclosure of the Navy Yard to the East river, along the shores of the East river to the centre line of Montague street, to Furman street, along both sides of Furman street to a point opposite the centre of Orange street, along the centre lines of Orange and Nassau streets to the easterly side of Navy street, the place of beginning, including all the streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Nos. 49 and 51 Fulton street.

Contains three small parks, which are always locked at night and need no additional posts, and the addition of which will not change the boundary lines of the precinct.

The Fifty-first Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-second Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Grand avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Fulton street and Vanderbilt avenue, along the centre line of Vanderbilt avenue to east side of Circle road to Flatbush avenue, both sides, to centre line of Malbone street, to centre line of Nostrand avenue, to centre line of Fulton street to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Grand avenue and Park place.

Contains within its boundaries, but not a part of the precinct, a portion of Prospect Park, known as East Side Lands and Institute. With boundaries changed to exclude this they will be as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Fulton street and Vanderbilt avenue, along the centre line of Vanderbilt avenue to centre line of Circle road, to south side of Eastern Parkway, to west side of Washington avenue, to north side of Washington place, to west side of Flatbush avenue, to centre line of Malbone street, to centre line of Nostrand avenue, to centre line of Fulton street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Grand avenue and Park place.

The Fifty-second Precinct will be what is now known as the Twelfth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Atlantic avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of centre lines of Fulton street and Nostrand avenue, along centre line of Fulton street to centre line of Ralph avenue, to centre line of Eastern Parkway, to centre line of East New York avenue, to centre line of Malbone street, to centre line of Nostrand avenue, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Atlantic and Selenectely avenues.

Contains Bedford Park (about four acres, patrolled by three Park Policemen) and Lincoln Park (about two blocks square, not patrolled by Park Policemen). Bedford Park will need to be made an additional night post, but Lincoln Park is not yet finished, and will not be for some months yet. Does not need an additional night post.

The addition of this park does not change the boundary lines of the precinct.

The Fifty-third Precinct will be what is now known as the Seventeenth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Liberty avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of centre lines of Fulton street and Vesta avenue; thence along the centre line of Vesta avenue to the centre line of Fresh Creek, along the centre line of Fresh Creek to Jamaica Bay, along the shores of Jamaica Bay to Spring Creek, to the boundary line between the former Town of Woodhaven and the former City of Brooklyn, to the boundary line between the former Town of Newtown and the former City of Brooklyn, to the centre line of Highland Boulevard, to the intersection of the centre lines of Bushwick avenue and Gillen place, to centre line of Jamaica avenue, to centre line of Fulton street, to point of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, corner of Miller and Liberty avenues.

Contains Linton Park (about three acres, not patrolled by Park Policemen). Linton Park is now part of Night Post No. 8 and is fully covered by it.

The addition of this park will not change the boundary line of this precinct.

The addition to the present Seventeenth Precinct of a portion of former Town of Newtown will make the boundaries of the Seventeenth Precinct as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Fulton street and Vesta avenue, along the centre line of Vesta avenue to the centre line of Fresh Creek, along the centre line of Fresh Creek to Jamaica Bay, along the shores of Jamaica Bay to the boundary line between the former Town of Woodhaven and the former City of Brooklyn, to eastern boundary of Cypress Hills Cemetery, to centre line of Myrtle avenue, to centre line of Fresh Pond road, to centre line of Cypress avenue, to centre line of Vermont street, to centre line of Highland Boulevard, to the intersection of the centre lines of Bushwick avenue and Gillen place, to the centre line of Jamaica avenue, to the centre line of Fulton street, to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundary.

The Fifty-fourth Precinct will be what is now known as the Fourteenth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Ralph avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of centre lines of DeKalb and Stuyvesant avenues, along the centre line of Stuyvesant avenue to centre line of Fulton street, to centre line of Gillen place, to Evergreen Cemetery, to Evergreen avenue, to centre line of DeKalb avenue, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Ralph avenue and Quincey street.

Contains Saratoga Square (one square block, patrolled by three Park Policemen). Will require one additional night post.

The addition of this park will not change the boundaries of this precinct.

The addition of Evergreen Cemetery to the present Twentieth Precinct will make the boundaries of the present Fourteenth Precinct as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Fulton street and Stuyvesant avenue; thence along centre line of Stuyvesant avenue to centre line of De Kalb avenue, to centre line of Evergreen avenue, to Manhattan Beach railroad, to centre line of Furman avenue, to centre line of Bushwick avenue, to centre line of Gillen place, to centre line of Jamaica avenue, to centre line of Fulton street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The Fifty-fifth Precinct will be what is now known as the Ninth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Gates avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of centre line of De Kalb avenue and Bedford avenue, thence along centre line of Bedford avenue to centre line of Fulton street, to centre line of Stuyvesant avenue, to centre line of De Kalb avenue, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Gates and Throop avenues.

Contains Tompkins Park (about seven and one-quarter acres, patrolled by three Park Policemen). Will be made an additional night post. The addition of this park will not change the boundaries of this precinct.

The Fifty-sixth Precinct will be what is now known as the Fourth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Classon avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of centre lines of Hudson avenue and Myrtle avenue, thence along centre line of Myrtle avenue, to centre line of Bedford avenue, to centre line of Fulton street, to centre line of Hudson avenue, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, De Kalb and Classon avenues.

Contains Washington (Fort Greene) Park (about thirty acres, patrolled by six Park Policemen). Will be made two additional night posts, and Night Posts 1, 2, 12 and 13 will be extended to cover sides of park.

The addition of this park will not change the boundaries of this precinct.

The Fifty-seventh Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-first Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Flushing avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre line of Myrtle avenue and Hudson avenue, thence along the centre line of Myrtle avenue to the centre line of Bedford avenue, to the centre line of Flushing avenue, to the centre line of Classon avenue, to the centre line of Hewes street, to a point opposite the centre line of the Wallabout Canal, along the shores of the Wallabout Canal and Basin to Navy Yard wall, along Navy Yard wall to centre line of Flushing avenue, to centre line of Nassau street, to centre line of Hudson avenue, to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundary. Station-house, Clermont and Flushing avenues.

Precinct also includes the public piers lying south of Wallabout Canal.

Contains City Park (about seven and one-half acres, patrolled by two Park Police). Would require one additional night post.

The addition of this park will not change the boundaries of this precinct.

The Fifty-eighth Precinct will be what is now known as the Thirtieth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Vermon avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of centre lines of Broadway and Flushing avenue, thence along the centre line of Broadway to centre line of De Kalb avenue, to centre line of Bedford avenue, to centre line of Flushing avenue, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, corner of Tompkins and Vermon avenues.

Contains no parks.

The Fifty-ninth Precinct will be what is now known as the Sixtieth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Lee avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of centre lines of Flushing avenue and Broadway, thence along centre line of Flushing avenue to centre line of Classon avenue, to centre line of Hewes street, to centre line of Wallabout Canal, to the East river, along the shores of the East river to a point opposite the centre line of South Eighth street, along the centre line of South Eighth street, to the centre line of Kent avenue, to the centre line of Broadway, to the place of beginning, including all the streets and avenues within the said boundaries. Station-house, Lee avenue and Clymer street.

Contains no parks.

The addition of a portion of the territory of the present Fifth Precinct to this precinct will make the boundary lines as follows: Beginning at the intersection of centre lines of Flushing avenue and Broadway, thence along centre line of Flushing avenue to centre line of Classon avenue, to centre line of Hewes street, to centre line of Wallabout Canal, to the East river, along the shores of the East river to a point opposite the centre line of Broadway, to place of beginning, including all the streets and avenues within the said boundaries. Station-house, Lee avenue and Clymer street.

The Sixtieth Precinct will be what is now known as the Fifth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Bedford avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of centre lines of Union avenue and Broadway, along the centre line of Union avenue to centre line of Bushwick Creek, to East river, along the shores of East river to a point opposite the centre line of South Eighth street, along the centre line of South Eighth street, to the centre line of Kent avenue, to the centre line of Broadway, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Bedford avenue and North First street.

Contains no parks.

The addition of part of this territory to the present Sixteenth Precinct will make the boundaries of this precinct as follows: Beginning at the intersection of centre lines of Union avenue and Broadway, along the centre line of Union avenue to Bushwick Creek, to East river, along shores of East river to a point opposite the centre line of Broadway to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Bedford avenue and North First street.

The Sixty-first Precinct will be what is now known as the Seventh Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Greenpoint). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of Newtown Creek at Ferry Bridge, to the centre line of Meeker avenue, to the centre line of Driggs avenue, to Bushwick Creek, to the intersection of Driggs avenue and North Thirteenth street, centre of said creek to East river, along shores of East river to Newtown Creek, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within and boundaries. Station-house, Manhattan and Greenpoint avenues.

Contains Wastrop Park (about seven acres, patrolled by three Park Policemen). To be made an additional night post.

The addition of this park will not change the boundaries of the precinct.

The Sixty-second Precinct will be what is now known as the Nineteenth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Herbert street). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of Newtown Creek at Ferry Bridge, opposite the centre line of Meeker avenue, to the centre line of Driggs avenue, to the centre line of Union avenue, to the centre line of Grand street, to the centre line of Newtown Canal, along the same to the centre line of Newtown Creek, to the centre line of Ferry Bridge, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Humboldt and Herbert streets.

Contains Cooper Park and two small unnamed parks—Choper Park (about ten acres, patrolled by one Park Policeman) is on Post 13, and is sufficiently well covered. One of the small parks is also on Post 13, and the other on Post 10. Neither of them requires to be made an additional post.

The addition of these parks will not change the boundaries of this precinct.

The Sixty-third Precinct will be what is now known as the Sixth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Stagg street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of centre lines of Union avenue and Grand street, along the centre line of Grand street to the centre line of Newtown Bridge, and both sides of Grand street beyond Newtown Bridge, to the centre line of Newtown Canal, to the boundary line between the former Town of Newtown and the former City of Brooklyn, to the centre line of Flushing avenue, to the centre line of Broadway, to the centre line of Union avenue, to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Stagg street and Bushwick avenue.

Contains no parks.

The Sixty-fourth Precinct will be what is now known as the Twentieth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Hamburg avenue). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Flushing avenue and Broadway, along the centre line of Broadway to centre line of DeKalb avenue, to the centre line of Evergreen avenue, to the boundary line between the former Town of Newtown and the former City of Brooklyn, to the centre line of Flushing avenue, to place of beginning, including all the streets and avenues within said boundary. Station-house, DeKalb and Hamburg avenues.

Contains Bushwick Park (about six acres, patrolled by three Park Policemen) and Irving Park (about six acres, patrolled by two Park Policemen), each to be made an additional night post.

The addition of these parks will not change the boundaries of this precinct.

The addition to this precinct of a portion of the former Town of Newtown and of a portion of the present Fourteenth Precinct will change the boundaries so that they will be as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the centre line of Flushing avenue and Broadway; thence along the centre line of Flushing avenue to the centre line of Metropolitan avenue, to the centre line of Fresh Pond road, to centre line of Cypress avenue, to centre line of Vermont street, to centre line of Highland Boulevard, to intersection of centre line of Bushwick avenue and Gillen place, along centre line of Bushwick avenue, to centre line of Furman avenue, to Manhattan Beach Railroad, to centre line of Evergreen avenue, to centre line of De Kalb avenue, to centre line of Broadway, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, De Kalb and Hamburg avenues.

The Sixty-fifth Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-seventh Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Eastern Parkway). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Fulton street and Ralph avenue, along centre line of Fulton street to centre line of Vesta avenue, to centre line of New Lots road, to centre line of Flatlands road, to centre line of Hunterly road, to centre line of Parkway, to centre line of Ralph avenue, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Eastern Parkway, near Osborne street.

Contains small park not yet completed. Is now a part of Post 15, and does not need to be made an additional post. Is not patrolled by Park Policemen.

The addition of this park will not change the boundaries of this precinct.

The Sixty-sixth Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-sixth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Canarsie). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of centre lines of Vesta avenue and New Lots road, to centre line of East One Hundred and Ninth street, to Fresh Creek, to Jamaica Bay, along the shores of Jamaica Bay to Bedford Creek, along the centre line of Bedford Creek to Flatlands road, to centre line of New Lots road, to place of beginning, including Kullfle Bar, Barren Island, and all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Canarsie Village.

Contains no parks.

The Sixty-seventh Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-third Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Grant street). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Flatbush avenue and Malbone street, along the centre line of Malbone street to the centre line of East New York avenue, to the centre line of Hunterly road, to the centre line of Flatlands road, to the centre line of Bedford Creek, to Jamaica Bay, along the shores of Jamaica Bay to the centre line of Flatbush avenue, to the centre line of Magaw's lane, to centre line of Ocean avenue to Ocean parkway; then both sides of Ocean avenue to centre line of Flatbush avenue, to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house at Grant street, near Flatbush avenue.

Contains no parks.

The Sixty-eighth Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-eighth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Sheepshead Bay). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Magaw's lane and Ocean avenue, along the centre line of Ocean avenue to centre line of Bay

avenue, to centre line of Elm avenue, to centre line of Ryder avenue, to centre line of Avenue N, to east side of Ocean parkway, to Atlantic ocean, along shores of Atlantic ocean and Jamaica Bay to Garrison's Creek, to Flatbush avenue, to the centre line of Magaw's lane, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Voorhees avenue and Shore road, Sheepshead Bay.

Contains no parks.

The Sixty-ninth Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-fourth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Coney Island). Boundaries: Beginning at the east side of Ocean parkway at the Atlantic ocean; thence along east side of Ocean parkway to the centre line of Avenue N, to the centre line of Sixtieth street, to the centre line of Twenty-second avenue, to the centre line of Stillwell avenue, to the centre line of Coney Island Creek; along said creek to Gravesend Bay and Atlantic Ocean to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, West Eighth street and Surf avenue.

Contains Woodlawn Park, private, and Seabreeze Park, which has never been used for park purposes. Seabreeze Park is on Post 1, and is covered by that. It is not patrolled by the Park Police.

The addition of this park will not change the boundaries of this precinct.

The Seventieth Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-ninth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Bath Beach). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre line of Thirteenth avenue with the shore of Gravesend Bay; thence along the shores of said bay; to centre line of Coney Island Creek at Gravesend Bay, to the centre line of Stillwell avenue, to the centre line of Twenty-second avenue, to the centre line of Sixtieth street, to the centre line of New Utrecht avenue, to Manhattan Beach Railroad, to centre line of Thirtieth avenue, to Gravesend Bay, the place of beginning, including all the streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, Nineteenth avenue, between Bath and Benson avenues.

Contains part of Dyker Meadow Park and Bensonhurst Park. Neither has been patrolled by Park Police. Bensonhurst Park is now included within the boundaries of Night Post 5, and is not to be made an additional post. Its addition to the precinct will not change the boundary of the precinct.

With the portion of Dyker Meadow Park that is now within the present Twenty-ninth Precinct added to the present Twenty-fifth Precinct, the boundaries of the present Twenty-ninth Precinct will be as follows: Beginning at the centre line of Coney Island Creek at Gravesend Bay to the centre line of Stillwell avenue, to the centre line of Twenty-second avenue, to the centre line of Sixtieth street, to the centre line of New Utrecht avenue, to Manhattan Beach Railroad, to centre line of Thirteenth avenue, to centre line of Eighty-sixth street, to centre line of Fourteenth avenue, to Gravesend Bay, along shores of said bay to place of beginning, including all the streets and avenues within said boundary.

The Seventy-first Precinct will be what is now known as the Twenty-fifth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Fort Hamilton). Boundaries: To consist of all the territory of the Thirtieth Ward of the former City of Brooklyn (Town of New Utrecht) lying south of the line of the New York and Sea Beach Railroad and west of the centre line of Thirtieth avenue, and Dyker Beach and Gravesend Bay, including all the streets and avenues within said boundary. Station-house, Eighty-sixth street and Fort Hamilton avenue.

Contains portion of Dyker Meadow Park, not patrolled by Park Police. Is now included in Night Post 7 and does not require additional post. With the addition to the present Twenty-fifth Precinct of that portion of Dyker Meadow Park now lying within the present Twenty-ninth Precinct, the boundaries of the present Twenty-fifth Precinct will be as follows: To consist of all the territory of the Thirtieth Ward of the former City of Brooklyn (Town of New Utrecht) lying south of the line of the New York and Sea Beach Railroad and west of the centre line of Thirtieth avenue, Eighty-sixth street and Fourteenth avenue, and bounded on the west and southeast by Gravesend Bay, including all the streets and avenues within said boundary.

The entire park can be covered without the need for additional post by the extension of Night Post 7.

The Seventy-second Precinct will be what is now known as the Thirtieth Precinct, Borough of Brooklyn (Parkville). Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Ocean and Fort Hamilton avenues; thence along the centre line of Fort Hamilton avenue to the centre line of Coney Island avenue, to the centre line of Fifteenth street, to the centre line of Ninth avenue, to the centre line of Twentieth street, to the centre line of Gravesend avenue, to the centre line of Fort Hamilton avenue, to centre line of New Utrecht avenue, to centre line of Sixtieth street, to centre line of Avenue N, to centre line of Ryder avenue, to centre line of Elk avenue, to centre line of Bay avenue, to centre line of Ocean avenue, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, premises with the dwelling and stable thereon erected lying in the Twenty-ninth Ward of the former City of Brooklyn, on Coney Island avenue, near Foster avenue.

Contains within its boundaries the Prospect Park Parade Grounds. With this added to the Prospect Park proper and taken from within the present Thirtieth Precinct, the boundary lines thereof will be as follows: Beginning at the intersection of the east side of Parade place and north side of Catin avenue, to Coney Island avenue, both sides, to Fifteenth street, both sides, to centre line of Ninth avenue, to Twentieth street, both sides, to Gravesend avenue, both sides, to Fort Hamilton avenue, both sides, to Thirtieth seventh street and centre line, thence to centre line of New Utrecht avenue, to centre line of Sixtieth street, to centre line of Avenue N, to centre line of Ryder avenue and Elm avenue, to the centre line of Bay avenue, to the centre line of Ocean avenue, Fort Hamilton avenue, both sides, to east side of Parade place, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The Seventy-third Precinct will be what is known as Prospect Park, Borough of Brooklyn. Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the north side of Fifteenth street and east side of Coney Island avenue to north side of Catin avenue, to west side of Parade place, to north side of Fort Hamilton avenue, to west side of Ocean avenue, to west side of Flatbush avenue, to north side of Washington place, to west side of Washington avenue, to south side of Eastern Parkway, to centre line of Circle road, to intersection of Union street and Ninth avenue, east side of Ninth avenue to north side of Fifteenth street, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundary.

The Seventy-fourth Precinct will be what is now known as the First Precinct, Borough of Queens (Astoria, Long Island City). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of Webster avenue and East river, thence along the centre line of Webster avenue to the centre line of Jackson avenue, to the centre line of Bowers Bay road, to Flushing Bay, along the shores of Flushing Bay to the East river, along the shores of the East river to place of beginning, including Berrian's Island, and including all the streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The addition of a portion of the former Town of Newtown to this precinct will make its boundaries as follows: Beginning at the centre line of Webster avenue and East river; thence along the centre line of Webster avenue to the centre line of Jackson avenue, to the centre line of Woodside avenue, to the centre line of Middleburg avenue, to the centre line of Mott's road, to the centre line of Shell road, to the centre line of Train Meadow road, to the centre line of Jackson avenue, to Flushing Bay, along the shores of Flushing Bay, Bowers Bay and Long Island Sound and East river to centre line of Webster avenue, place of beginning, including Berrian's Island, and all the streets and roads and avenues within said boundaries. Station-house, corner Crescent and Grand avenues.

The Seventy-fifth Precinct will be what is now known as the Second Precinct, Borough of Queens (Hunter's Point, Long Island City). Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of Newtown Creek, to the East river, running northerly along the East river to the centre line of Webster avenue, to the centre line of Jackson avenue, to the boundary line between the former City of Long Island City and the former Town of Newtown; thence along the centre line of Old Calvary Cemetery road to the centre line of Newtown Creek, to place of beginning, including all streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The addition of a portion of the territory of the former Town of Newtown to this precinct will make its boundaries as follows: Beginning at East river and the centre line of Webster avenue, along centre line of Webster avenue to centre line of Jackson avenue, to the centre line of Woodside avenue, to the centre line of Middleburg avenue, to centre line of Mott's road, or Old Bowers road, to centre line of Shell road, to centre line of Coveri avenue, to centre line of Maurice avenue, to the centre line of Jay avenue, to centre line of Fresh Pond road, to centre line of Grand street, to Newtown Creek, along the shores of Newtown Creek and East river to centre line of Webster avenue, place of beginning, including all streets, avenues and roads within said boundaries. Station-house, Fourth street and Vermon avenue.

The Seventy-sixth Precinct will be what is now known as Flushing. Boundaries: Beginning at centre line of Broadway and Flushing Creek; thence along centre line of Flushing Creek to Long Island Sound, along the shores of Long Island Sound to city line, along city line to a point opposite centre of East Alley road, along centre of East Alley road to Little Neck Bay Creek, to centre of West Alley road, to centre of Rocky Hill road, to centre of Black Strump road, to centre of Fresh Meadow road, to centre of Union Turnpike, to centre of Flushing Creek, along centre line of Flushing Creek, to place of beginning, including all streets, avenues and roads within said boundaries. Station-house, Linden avenue and Broadway.

The First Sub-Precinct of the Seventy-sixth Precinct will be what was formerly known as the Village of College Point. Boundaries: Beginning at Flushing Bay and the centre line of Ninth avenue, along the shores of Flushing Bay and Long Island Sound to a point at Eighteenth street, First avenue and Powell's Cove, along centre of Eighteenth street to centre line of Whitestone avenue, to centre line of Ninth avenue, to Flushing Bay, the place of beginning, including all the streets, avenues and roads within said boundaries. Station-house, Second avenue, between Sixth and Seventh streets.

The Second Sub-Precinct of the Seventy-sixth Precinct will be what was formerly known as the Village of Whitestone. Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of Eighteenth street and First avenue and Powell's Cove, along the shores of Long Island Sound to the old village line and

Little Bay, to the centre line of Willet's Point road, to the centre line of Fourteenth avenue, to the centre line of Twelfth street, to the centre line of Fourth avenue (Whitestone), to the centre line of Eighteenth street, to the place of beginning, including all streets and avenues and roads within said boundaries.

The Seventy-seventh Precinct will be what is now known as Newtown. Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of Jackson avenue and Flushing Bay, to the centre line of Trautman road, to the centre line of Shell road, to the centre line of Covert road, to the centre line of Maurice avenue, to the centre line of Jay avenue, to the centre line of Fresh Pond road, to the centre line of Grand street, to Newtown Creek, along the banks of Newtown Creek to Metropolitan avenue (including Farman's Island), to centre line of Fresh Pond road, to centre line of Myrtle avenue, to centre line of Dry Harbor road, to centre line of Metropolitan avenue, to centre line of Union Turnpike, to Flushing Creek, to Flushing Bay, to place of beginning, including all the streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The Seventy-eighth Precinct will be what is now known as Jamaica. Boundaries: Beginning at the intersection of the centre lines of Jamaica avenue and Wyck avenue, along the centre line of Wyck avenue to Bergen road, to Grassy Bay, along the north shores of Jamaica Bay to Spring Creek, along the centre line of Spring Creek to the former boundary line between the former Town of Woodhaven and the former City of Brooklyn, to the west side of Dexter Park, to the north side of Dexter Park, to the east side of Cypress Hills Cemetery, to the centre line of Dry Harbor road, to the centre line of Metropolitan avenue, to the centre line of Union Turnpike, to the boundary line between the former Town of Newtown and the former town of Flushing and Jamaica, to the centre of the Newtown road, to the centre of Jamaica avenue, to the point of beginning, including all the streets, avenues and roads within said boundaries.

The Seventy-ninth Precinct will be what is now known as Rockaway. Boundaries: Beginning at the centre line of Mott's Creek and the city line; thence along city line to Atlantic Ocean, along the shore of Atlantic Ocean to Rockaway Point, along the shores of Rockaway Inlet, Beach Channel, Pumpkin Patch Channel, Grassy Bay, Jamaica Bay, the head of Bay, to centre line of Mott Creek, to city line, to place of beginning, including all the islands and marshes east of Pumpkin Patch Channel, and also including all the streets, roads and avenues within said boundaries.

The Sub-Precinct of the Seventy-ninth Precinct will be what is now known as Rockaway Beach. Boundaries: Beginning at the Atlantic Ocean at a point half a mile west of the Half-way House at Edgewater, along the shore of the Atlantic Ocean to Rockaway Point, along the shores of Rockaway Inlet and Beach Channel, to a point half a mile west of Half-way House, to place of beginning, including all streets, avenues and roads within said boundaries.

The Eightieth Precinct will be what is now known as the Borough of Richmond, and shall include the entire borough. It shall be in charge of a Captain, with headquarters at Neplison, and the police officers stationed thereat shall patrol that portion of the Eightieth Precinct bounded as follows: Beginning at the shores of the Lower New York Bay to the centre line of Seaview avenue, to centre line of Richmond road, to centre line of Clove road, to centre line of Richmond Turnpike, to centre line of Arietta street, to shores of New York Bay, along the shores of said bay to place of beginning, including all the streets, roads and avenues within said boundaries.

The remainder of the precinct shall be divided into three sub-precincts, which shall be respectively bounded as follows:

The First Sub-Precinct of the Eightieth Precinct: Commencing at the shores of New York Bay, at the centre line of Arietta street, to the centre line of Richmond Turnpike, to the centre line of Old Manor road, to the centre line of Bitchersville road, to the centre line of Lambert's lane, to Bloomfield road, to centre line of Chelsea road, to the shores of Arthur Kill, along the shores of Arthur Kill and Kill von Kull and the shores of New York Bay to the place of beginning, including all the streets and avenues within said boundaries.

The Second Sub-Precinct of the Eightieth Precinct: Commencing at the Lower Bay, at the centre line of the Eltingville road, to the centre line of Fresh Kill Creek, to Arthur Kill, to the Karitan Bay, along the shores of the Karitan Bay to the shores of the Lower New York Bay, to the place of beginning, including all streets, roads and avenues within said boundaries.

The Third Sub-precinct of the Eightieth Precinct: Commencing at the shores of the Lower New York Bay, at the centre line of Seaview avenue, to the centre line of Richmond road, to centre line of Clove road, to centre line of Richmond Turnpike, to centre line of Old Manor road, to centre line of Bitchersville road, to centre line of Lambert's lane, to Bloomfield road, to centre line of Chelsea road, to shores of Arthur Kill or Staten Island Sound; thence to Richmond Creek, to the centre line of Eltingville road, to the shore of the Karitan Bay, to the place of beginning, including all the streets, roads and avenues within said boundaries.
