The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 340 Broadway, on Wednesday, June 8, 1898, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice.

The minutes of the meeting of June 1, 1898, were read and approved. Mr. Cromwell submitted to the Board certified copy of the decision of the Court of Appeals in his election case, together with certified copy of the judgment of the Supreme Court made upon the remittitur, and certified copy of the mandamus of the Board of Canvassers.

The papers were referred to the Corporation Counsel. In the matter of changing the map of The City of New York by laying out Andrews avenue and Weigand place, the following report from the Secretary was read:

To the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York:

SIRS—I have to report that on the 25th day of May, 1898, I caused to be delivered to the Supervisor of the City Record, for publication in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 8th day of June, 1898, a copy of certain resolutions adopted by the Board of Public Improvements on the 25th day of May, 1898, proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out and extending Andrews avenue, from East One Hundred and Eightieth street to the south line of the New York University, and laying out Weigand place, from East One Hundred and Eightieth street to the south line of the New York University, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and for a meeting of the said Board to be held in the office of the said Board, at No. 340 Broadway, on the 8th day of June, 1898, at 2 o'clock P. M. of that day, at which such proposed laying out and extending would be considered by the said Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby, of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed laying out and extending would be considered, together with a notice that said laying out and extending would be considered by the said Board of Public Improvements, at a meeting to be held at the time and place aforesaid.

And I do further report that said resolutions and said notice, a copy of which is herewith annexed, have been published in the CITY RECORD, as required by law, for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 8th day of June, 1898, as will more fully appear by the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record, which is herewith submitted.

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice, a copy of which is herewith annexed, have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 8th day of June, 1898, and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place, a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed laying out and extending who have appeared, and such proposed laying out and extending was duly considered by this Board; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 375, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out and extending Andrews avenue, from East One Hundred and Eightieth street to the south line of the New York University, and laying out Weigand place, from East One Hundred and Eightieth street to the south line of the New York University, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to lay out and extend the aforesaid streets as follows:

Andrews Avenue.

Beginning at a point in the northern line of East One Hundred and Eightieth street, distant 400.29 feet westerly from the intersection of said line with the western line of Aqueduct avenue.

1st. Thence westerly along the northern line of East One Hundred and Eightieth street for 60.35 feet.

2d. Thence northerly deflecting 96 degrees 11 minutes to the right for 371.40 feet to the lands of the University of The City of New York.

3d. Thence easterly deflecting 82 degrees 25 minutes 38 seconds to the right for 60.53 feet along the southern line of the lands of the University of The City of New York.

4th. Thence southerly for 372.88 feet to the point of beginning. Andrews avenue is to be 60 feet wide.

Weigand Place.

Beginning at a point in the northern line of East One Hundred and Eightieth street, distant 177.48 feet westerly from the intersection of the northern line of East One Hundred and Eightieth street with the western line of Aqueduct avenue.

1st. Thence westerly along the northern line of East One Hundred and Eightieth street for 53.24 feet.

2d. Thence northeasterly deflecting 110 degrees 4 minutes 40 seconds to the right for 239.70 feet.

3d. Thence northerly deflecting 35 degrees 24 minutes 50 seconds to the left for 155.25 feet to the southern line of the lands of the University of The City of New York.

4th. Thence easterly deflecting 103 degrees 56 minutes 48 seconds to the right along said line for 51.52 feet.

5th. Thence southerly deflecting 76 degrees 3 minutes 12 seconds to the right for 158.78 feet.

6th. Thence southwesterly for 237.39 feet to the point of beginning.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out and extending the above-named streets, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

build an entirely separate structure in addition to the ordinary structure, at their own expense, thereby exempting the abutters from all payments of assessments. I report as follows:

The map or plan of the sewerage and drainage district of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards as legally filed show a contemplated sewer laid out in Two Hundred and Fourth street (Potter place) with a diameter of 2.5 feet at Jerome avenue and 3 feet at Moshulu Parkway, South. At Jerome avenue the flow line of the sewer is shown as 108 feet and the surface grade as 121 feet above high-water datum, or a difference of 13 feet between the street surface and the bottom of the sewer.

The Bedford Park Taxpayers' Association have petitioned the Local Board of the Borough of The Bronx for the construction of a sewer in Two Hundred and Fourth street, which petition was referred to the Board of Public Improvements, together with the action of the Local Board on this matter.

In 1897, as I am informed, the Chief Engineer of the Aqueduct Commissioners requested the permission of the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards to construct a sewer of four feet diameter from Jerome avenue through Two Hundred and Fourth street (Potter place) at the expense of the Aqueduct Commissioners and connect the same with the existing sewer in Moshulu Parkway, South. Acting on this application a plan was prepared by the Department of Street Improvements, which is herewith submitted, showing a sewer of four feet diameter in Two Hundred and Fourth street, from Jerome avenue to Moshulu Parkway. The flow line of this sewer at Jerome avenue was placed at 101 feet above high water or seven feet lower than is shown on the filed plans. The title on this plan reads: "To be constructed by the Aqueduct Commissioners under permit from the Department of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards."

The question at issue is, then, as follows: Shall the Sewer Department construct the sewer in that street as mentioned by the property-owners, and according to the plans and grades filed, and the expense levied by assessment; or shall the Aqueduct Commissioners construct a separate structure in accordance with the modified plan, and at their own expense, or should the two Departments unite and build a community sewer and the Aqueduct Commissioners incurring as much of the expenditure as is above the cost of the original plan?

I do not think it advisable to construct two separate structures in that street, when one common sewer will answer the purpose, and I do not believe that the cost of construction can legally be divided between the property-owners and the Aqueduct Commissioners for the following reasons:

- 1st. The sewer proposed is larger in size than is required for the purpose originally intended, and no benefit could accrue to adjacent owners.
- 2d. The flow line will be seven feet deeper at Jerome avenue than is necessary for ordinary drainage of cellars, thus entailing extra expenses for sewer connections, and
- 3d. Should two sewers be constructed, additional expenses would accrue to the property-owners on one side of the street by reason of the longer distance the original sewer would be placed for sewer connections.

Any one of these reasons, I believe, would be sufficient to create legal complications and might result in vacating the assessment for this work. I am of the opinion that the sewer should be constructed at the expense of the Aqueduct Commissioners, for whose benefit the modification of the original plan is made, and the work done under the supervision of the Sewer Department. While it is true that the abutters would be exempt from payment of assessments, they would still be under additional expenses for sewer connections by reason of the new depth of the proposed sewer, especially where used for man.

In connection with this matter, I suggest that the Aqueduct Commissioners petition the Board of Public Improvements for a change of the plan of drainage for the sewer district of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards as shown on sections 17 and 20 of the final maps and profiles of said wards by altering the size and grades of the sewer in Two Hundred and Fourth street (Potter place), from Jerome avenue to Moshulu Parkway, South.

The necessary maps, showing such changes, can then be prepared for the approval of the Board and the Commissioner of Sewers, as provided for by section 430 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

After the filing of the plans, should the Aqueduct Commissioners decide to construct the sewer as recommended, permission can be obtained, conditional upon allowing the abutters to connect and use this sewer.
