BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

The Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, held a public meeting at the Borough Hall, First Ward, late Long Island City, May 27, 1898, at which were present Councilmen David Van Nostrand, Joseph Cassidy, and Aldermen William F. James and Joseph Geiser, with President of the Borough Frederick Bowley.

On motion the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting were dispensed with.

The following was read:

BOROUGH OF QUEENS, May 12, 1898.

Hon. FREDERICK BOWLEY, President of the Borough of Queens, City of New York.

DEAR SIR—We respectfully invite your attention to the present condition of First street, between West and East avenue.

First—The manhole covers having been removed and sewers stopped up by the Long Island Railroad Company, necessarily renders such sewer useless, the waste water running from our buildings emptying on the street and some of our neighbors property, and we have been threatened with a suit for damages by reason of same.

Second—Between Vernon and West avenue (the Long Island Railroad Company, having erected a fence in said street (which they have no right to maintain) and there being two or three feet of earth in the centre of street above grade, thereby compelling trucks to use the sidewalks, we as property-owners on said street, having paid the city several hundred dollars for grading, curbing and sewerage same, deem it only right that the above street be put in proper condition for the use of the public and property-owners.

As hundreds of people use the street daily, we hope you will give this matter your earliest attention; we are,

I understand that it is beyond our power to open any street crossing at this point, and that any grade crossing can be established only through application to the Board of Railroad Com-

Commissioners of Albany. I think therefore that the petition should be presented to the Board of Railroad Commissioners and not to the Railroad Company.

We should be very glad indeed to act promptly on the recommendation of the Board of Railroad Commissioners.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of the City of New York as follows: First—No street railways operating within the limits of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, whose cars are or shall be propelled by any power other than horse or animal, shall run at a greater speed than eight miles an hour...

Second—All ordinances and resolutions relating to the foregoing subject heretofore existing in any or all parts of what is now the Borough of Queens are hereby repealed.

The foregoing was duly adopted by Ayes—Councilman Van Nostrand, Aldermen James and Geiser and President Bowley. Nays—Councilman Joseph Cassidy.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to transmit duly certified copy of above said to each branch of the Municipal Assembly.

Communication, dated May 27, 1898, from Burnell & Young, also from Mirabeau L. Town, and another from same, the first two relating to property or lands in Elmhurst, and the latter to lands in Maspeth Heights, were read.

Thereof was submitted maps of said lands showing proposed streets they desired to open and have established through same.

Representation having been made to the Board that the owners would refer title to said streets to the City without cost, the Board thereupon, upon motion unanimously voted its approval thereof to the Board of Public Improvement of The City of New York.
