BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 340 Broadway, on Wednesday, June 23, 1898, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called, and the following members were present and assented to their names: The Commissioner of Water Supply, the Commissioner of Highways, the Commissioner of Sewers, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, the Commissioner of Bridges, the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Borough of Queens.

The minutes of the meeting of June 15, 1898, were read and approved.

In the absence of the President the Commissioner of Bridges presided. A motion was made by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn that the name of Mr. George Conwell be added to the roll and added. The Commissioner of Water Supply offered an amendment that the motion be laid over for one week, and the amendment was carried by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners of Water Supply, Highways, Sewers, Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Bridges, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of The Bronx, President of Queens—8.

Negative—President, Borough of Brooklyn—1.

In the matter of the change of grade of Kingsbridge Avenue, Van Corlear Place and Jacobus Place, the report of the Secretary was read, stating that he had caused the matter to be advertised as required by law.

After hearing Mr. D. C. Overbaugh in favor of the grade as recommended by the Engineer, and Mr. C. F. O'Leary, Mr. G. E. Koch and Mr. Charles Meris in opposition, President Peters moved that a committee of three be appointed, to include the President of the Board, for the purpose of visiting Marble Hill and seeing the locality affected and making a report to the Board at the next meeting.

The motion was carried, and the Chairman appointed Presidents Peters and Hallen to serve on the committee.

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Local Board of the Twenty-fifth District, Borough of The Bronx, recommending that proceedings be initiated to acquire title to that part of Anderson Avenue to which the City has not yet acquired title, namely, from Jerome Avenue to a point on Anderson Avenue 86.72 feet north of East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth Street, I have to state as follows:

The petitioners, A. L. Lowenstein and others, requesting the opening of Anderson Avenue from Jerome Avenue to Marcher Avenue, which they are the owners of only that section lying between Jerome Avenue and about 86 feet north of One Hundred and Sixty-fourth Street. From East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth Street, northerly, almost all the land is in the possession of the Anderson family, who object to the opening of the whole distance, on the grounds that Jerome Avenue, Woolycroft Avenue, Nelson Avenue and Ogden Avenue, which are in use by the public, run in the same direction and afford all the necessary facilities for travel, and, also, that many

improvements have been made while the last few years in the neighborhood, thereby putting very heavy assessments on their property.

This seems to be true, and in order, however, to allow Mr. Lowenstein to develop his property, I recommend that Anderson Avenue be opened from Jerome Avenue to East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth Street, which street is actually in existence. The papers in this matter are herewith returned.

Resolved, That this Board directs that, upon a date to be hereafter more fully specified, not less than six months after the filing of the copies of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment who may be appointed by the Supreme Court in proceedings for the acquisition of title to such street or avenue, that the title to any piece or parcel of land lying within the lines of such Anderson Avenue, from Jerome Avenue to East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth Street, so required shall be vested in The City of New York.

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby requests the Corporation Counsel to make application to a Special Term of the Supreme Court in and for the First Department, for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, and to take the necessary proceedings in the name of The City of New York, to acquire title, whenever the same has not been heretofore acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands, (ements and hereditaments that shall or may be required for the purpose of opening and extending Anderson Avenue, from Jerome Avenue to East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth Street, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

Resolved, That the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

SIR: I have a report from the Chief Engineer of this Department that the consumption of water in the West End, known as Bay Ridge and Bayside, is now so large that the mains laid from the New Utrecht Pumping Station do not furnish an adequate supply, and that it becomes necessary to complete the laying of the 18-inch mains, partially laid in 1896 and 1897.

I, therefore, respectfully present and recommend the adoption by your Board of the annexed resolution, authorizing the laying of the 18-inch water mains, in Avenue U, from the New Utrecht Pumping Station to Twenty-fifth Avenue, and in Twenty-fifth Avenue and Fourth Avenue, where necessary, to connect with the present large mains, and with the necessary fire hydrants, sprinkler and connections.

The length of water mains required is 12,722 feet and the estimated cost is \$22,000.

I have to-day filed a resolution to be presented to the Municipal Assembly, authorizing the laying of mains and the cost of bonds to provide for the expense.
