Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Board of Health of the Department of Health, the following additional amendment to the Sanitary Code for the purpose of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Sec. 20. Persons, boats or other vessels, used in transporting garbage to Berman Island, or the place of disposal, shall be permitted to remain moored or be at any dock, wharf or place within the limits of The City of New York for a longer period than twelve hours from the time garbage is first delivered to or placed thereon. Every boat, vessel or other means of transporting garbage to or from any place so constituted as to be capable of being tightly closed, and all its outlets covered by water seal, and all garbage placed on any such boat, vessel or receptacle for removal shall be designated in a manner to be approved by the Board of Health.
