The Vice-Chairman laid before the Council the following Departmental Estimates from various Departments:

ESTIMATE FOR 1899.

#### To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Finance presents herewith the estimate of the Department of Education for the year 1899, amounting to twenty-four millions five hundred and thirty-five thousand three hundred and thirty-seven dollars and fifty-two cents (\$24,535,337.52).

The Charter provides that all moneys raised for educational purposes in The City of New York shall be raised in two funds, to be known as the Special School Fund and the General School Fund, respectively. The estimate of the Department of Education for the year 1899 is therefore divided as follows:

The figures submitted represent the amount appropriated by the State, and apportioned by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction to the entire City of New York for the year 1898, in order to take advantage of which the laws require that the City should appropriate in addition a similar sum. The apportionment by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction of State Library moneys applicable to the year 1899 will not be made for some time yet. It is therefore impossible to anticipate the exact sum which it is necessary to appropriate under the circumstances. The figures for 1898 are therefore submitted in the belief that they will nearly equal the probable apportionment by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. If such be the case, it will be necessary to request a small transfer in order that the City shall receive the full benefit of the State apportionment.

These items are practically new, and are inserted in order that the City may avail itself of the grants of money made by the Regents of the University of the State of New York. These grants are similar in character and principle to those made through the State Superintendent of Public Instruction for public school libraries, and may be said to have the same relation to the High Schools as the apportionment of State moneys does to the elementary schools. Manhattan and The Bronx has three High Schools, Brooklyn has four, Queens has eleven schools and classes, and Richmond has three schools and classes which are registered by the Regents.

SPECIAL SCHOOL FUND—GENERAL REPAIRS.

Table comparing appropriations and estimates for special school fund repairs in Manhattan and The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens, and Richmond for 1898 and 1899.

The repairs in Manhattan and The Bronx are about the same in amount as during the year 1898, with one exception of special nature. It is proposed to add three annexes to the High Schools already established, the cost of fitting-up and altering being estimated at \$17,000, which accounts for the increase in those boroughs.

The amount proposed to be expended in Brooklyn is \$50,996.75 in excess of the sum appropriated for 1898. While there is not any special item to which attention can be called, the buildings, generally speaking, require the expenditure of the amount requested.

In the Boroughs of Richmond and Queens, owing to the fact that practical examinations could not be made until after the first six months of the present year had elapsed, many necessary repairs remain in abeyance. A thorough inspection has since been made, and with the necessary funds in sight, specifications will be prepared so that contracts may be let as early in the ensuing year as circumstances will permit.

The decrease as noted above is only apparent, for the reason that it has been found necessary to request a transfer of \$5,000 to the insurance fund for 1898 of the Borough of Queens; the true increase would therefore be \$6,100. In view of the fact that the Comptroller and Corporation Counsel have considered it necessary that school property in these boroughs be insured, the risks have been covered. The Committee on Buildings is now considering the advisability of insuring on the "schedule" plan, which will probably effect a considerable saving in rates. The whole matter is in process of revision and re-arrangement.

These buildings will accommodate the school children for 1899, and do away with the annexes, which are unsuitable for school purposes, and without wasteful from every point of view. The Superintendent estimates that there are at least, with all the annexes, at present 3,000 children without school accommodation in Long Island City alone, and no buildings suitable for annexes; those now in use are very unsatisfactory.

The fact that the City's bonded indebtedness appears to have reached its limit at this time precludes the issue of any School-house Bonds heretofore authorized by special acts of the Legislature. The necessity for additional school-house accommodations is apparent to a greater or less extent throughout each of the boroughs contained within The City of New York; therefore it has been deemed expedient to include, as one of the items of the Special School Fund, the amount of \$9,473,640, as representing the immediate needs of the City.

Under the provisions of sections 1059 and 1060 of the Charter, it appears to be proper to present this item to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and Municipal Assembly, to be included in the tax levy of 1899. In connection with this matter, the Committee desires to call attention to the fact that the existing conditions in relation to the City's bonded indebtedness are similar to the conditions prevailing some fourteen or fifteen years ago. At that time the difficulty was overcome in the case of School-house Bonds by including in the tax budget an amount sufficient for the necessities for school accommodations existing at that time. Subsequently the matter of the City's bonded indebtedness was elucidated, and the City Treasury was reimbursed by the sale of School-house Bonds to the extent of what had been paid out on account of the tax levy.

In view of the fact that it is believed that the present difficulty in relation to the issuing of bonds will be settled or overcome by the middle of the year 1899, the Committee deems it proper to call attention to the precedent which occurred in the past, with the hope that it may be of some use and assistance in obtaining money for the purpose of providing school accommodations for the waiting masses.

In the schedule submitted in relation to the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx relative to accommodation for elementary schools, particular attention is called to the fact that the buildings and improvements contemplated therein are confined to sites and school premises at this time in possession of the Board of Education and awaiting development. In several instances bids have been invited and already accepted, and if provision be made, work could be commenced at the beginning of next year. Schedules are also submitted showing the actual requirements for additional school accommodations in the Borough of Queens. In the case of the Borough of Richmond an item of \$150,000 has been inserted tentatively, though actual locations and descriptions cannot be given at this time. In regard to the matter of High Schools in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, the Legislature, authorized by special act the issue of \$2,500,000 of bonds for the establishment of four High Schools. Sites have been chosen, condemnation proceedings instituted and plans and specifications prepared for the buildings, all of which matters are now in abeyance, while the demand for this form of education still increases.

The increase requested is slight, and is mainly due to the fact that the contracts for fuel have been let in bulk, covering all boroughs, by which method considerable saving has been effected. The increase in Manhattan and The Bronx is for extra weights and moving scales, in view of the increased distances to be covered, owing to recent annexation of territory north of the Harlem. The increase of \$2,000 in Brooklyn is intended to cover the purchase of coal scales and the cost of moving them from place to place; also, repairs, etc. The system of weighing coal outside the school-house doors, in vogue in the former City of New York, is found to be beneficial, and is, therefore, extended to Brooklyn.

The increase over the appropriation for 1898 is \$79,720, and may be accounted for by stating that the sum allowed for 1898 was intended to cover the cost of administrative expenses for the last half of the year. Owing to the fact that the practical organization of the several bureaus of the Department did not occur until July 1, 1898, and also the fact of the inadequate facilities for conducting business, occasioned by the very limited available space at the Hall of the Board of Education, many appointments have remained in abeyance, through sheer lack of room in which to place the necessary employees.

The fact that three boroughs show a decrease indicates that progress has been made to house the school population in permanent structures, in place of hired accommodations. The ever increasing number of scholars renders it necessary to continue the majority of the rented buildings, and also to obtain further accommodations in districts where congested conditions prevail. It has therefore been deemed expedient to include the sum of \$10,000 for contingencies in Manhattan and The Bronx, and a similar sum in Brooklyn; also the sum of \$3,000 in the last-named borough for the building of temporary premises at Barren Island. The increase of \$1,913 in the estimate of the Board of Education is incidental to the fact that the appropriation for 1898 only covered a half year, and a small item of \$28 per month has been added for the office of a Deputy Superintendent of School Buildings. While the rented buildings in Richmond are now nearly all abandoned, some districts in other parts of the borough are congested, so that \$4,000 is asked to cover contingencies.

The following statement shows the totals of the estimates or items comprising the General School Fund, comparisons being made with the appropriations for the year 1898, and increases and decreases being noted. Under the provisions of the Greater New York Charter and the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, it appears that the Corporate Schools throughout the city are entitled to participate in the school moneys comprised within the General School Fund in like manner and degree as the Public Schools of the city. Under this construction of the law, the Corporate Schools of the former City of Brooklyn will be entitled to receive a larger share of school moneys than they have heretofore received. The School Board for the Borough of Brooklyn has tentatively submitted the sum of \$105,000, said amount being considered necessary to meet such share in the General School Fund as the Corporate Schools of the Borough of Brooklyn are entitled to receive under the Charter as construed by the Corporation Counsel.

Light Wanted in East One Hundred and Sixty-third Street.

Mr. Francis Keil stated that there was no light of any kind at night in East One Hundred and Sixty-third street, between Courtlandt avenue and Brook avenue.

On motion of Councilman Hottenroth, it was Resolved, To recommend to the Board of Public Improvements that lights be placed in One Hundred and Sixty-third street, between Courtlandt avenue and Brook avenue.

One Hundred and Fifty-third Street Bridge and Melrose Avenue Viaduct.

By Councilman Hottenroth—

Whereas, It is a matter of vital necessity to the Borough of The Bronx that the bridge and approaches over the New York and Harlem Railroad at East One Hundred and Fifty-third street, as authorized by chapter 650 of the Laws of 1897, and the Melrose avenue viaduct over the tracks of the New York and Harlem and the Port Morris branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad, connecting Melrose avenue from East One Hundred and Sixty-third street to the junction of Webster avenue and Brook avenue at East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, as authorized by chapter 680 of the Laws of 1897, be constructed at the earliest moment possible, and

Whereas, The contracts for both works have been let; therefore be it Resolved, That the Corporation Council be and he is hereby requested to take steps immediately to acquire any easement or right of way that may be necessary for the bridge and approaches over the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad at One Hundred and Fifty-third street, in the Borough of The Bronx; and, be it

Resolved, further, That the Corporation Council be and he is hereby requested to procure, as soon as possible, the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, so that the necessary lands or easements may be acquired for the construction of the Melrose Avenue viaduct.

Adopted. Councilman Hottenroth submitted the following, and a suitable ordinance therefor was recommended to the Municipal Assembly:

The petition of the undersigned respectfully represents: That they reside on and comprise all the owners of property on the west side of Anthony avenue, between Berry and Bush streets, in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York.

That the recent change of grade of Anthony avenue has left their property and said street in an unsightly condition, and that a retaining wall four feet in height and one foot in thickness, will greatly improve the appearance of said street and the grounds of petitioners.

That unless the wall is constructed as contemplated, the means of access to and from the street will remain extremely impaired by such change of grade of said avenue.

That unless such retaining wall is constructed as contemplated, the foundation walls of the buildings fronting on said street and to be secured by and to abut such contemplated improvement will remain exposed and unsightly, and made less secure, which, however, will be remedied by the erection of such contemplated wall.

That "Exhibit A" hereto annexed is a sketch or plan of a portion of the retaining wall and steps as contemplated to be erected in front of the places of residence of the petitioners on the west side of said avenue.

Your petitioners therefore pray that they may be granted the privilege of constructing a retaining wall four feet in height and one and one-half feet in thickness, at their individual expense, on the sidewalk in front of their residences, so that the outer side of the retaining wall fronting on said street shall be, not exceeding one foot, beyond the line designated in the Ordinances of the City of New York as the steep line of their respective residences.
