BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

IN BOARD OF EXAMINERS, OCTOBER 11, 1898.

The Board of Examiners met this day at 2.15 P. M.

The roll was called, with the following result:

Present—Thomas J. Brady, Commissioner of Buildings for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, in the chair, and Messrs. Dobbs, Moore, Bonner, McMillan, Fryer, Conover and O'Reilly.

Absent—Mr. Post.

The minutes of October 4, 1898, were read and, on motion, approved.

Petitions were then submitted for approval, as follows:

Plan 772, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the erection of a shed, same to be constructed of frame supports to carry trussed roof, all three sides of shed independent of brick walls of adjoining property to be inclosed with 2-inch angle and T iron frame, same to be covered with corrugated iron; side on Twenty-eighth street to be left open, frame supports exposed on this open side to be covered with corrugated iron; height of shed to be 20 feet 6 inches, instead of 15 feet, as required, and to remove said shed, which is now at southwest corner of First avenue and Twenty-eighth street, to proposed location, in parts, all as shown on plan, and as stated in petition; northeast corner of First avenue and Twenty-eighth street. Petitioner, George Fred. Pelham. Approved, on recommendation of Mr. Bonner.

Plan 741, New Buildings, 1897—Petition to allow the Bailey system of fireproof floor-filling to be used between the steel beams on first story in place of brick arches, lower flanges of beams to be covered underneath with wire lath, as stated in petition; northwest corner Amsterdam avenue and One Hundred and Forty-second street. Petitioner, George F. Purrington. Approved, Mr. Fryer voting no.

Plan 237, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow an opening to be cut in the second-story corridor through the brick wall which runs through the building north and south, opening to be about 7 feet wide and about 7 feet high, protected by iron doors which will slide and close automatically, as shown on plan and as stated in petition; northeast corner Madison avenue and Forty-second street. Petitioners, Lamb & Rich. Approved, on condition that sliding doors are fireproof.

Plan 319A, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow Duffy's fireproof plaster board plastered on cellar ceilings to be used instead of metal lath, as stated in petition; north side of Gouverneur place, 99 feet 8 inches east of Vanderbilt avenue. Petitioner, John Hauser. Denied.

Plan 371 A, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow Duffy's fireproof plaster boards to be plastered on cellar ceilings, instead of metal lath, as stated in petition; northeast corner of Gouverneur place and Vanderbilt avenue, and east side of Vanderbilt avenue, 25 feet 1 inch north of Gouverneur place. Petitioner, John Hauser. Denied.

Plan 409, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the Bailey system of fireproof floor filling to be used between the steel beams on first story in place of brick arches, the lower flanges of beams to be covered underneath with wire lath, as stated in petition; south side of One Hundredth street, 525 feet west of Central Park, West. Petitioner, Henie Laebekind. Approved, Mr. Fryer voting no.

Plan 575, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the Bailey system of fireproof floor filling to be used between the steel beams on first stories in place of brick arches, lower flanges of beams to be covered underneath with wire lath, as stated in petition; east side of Columbus avenue, 50 feet 5 inches north of Sixth street. Petitioner, Samuel A. Friedline. Approved, Mr. Fryer voting no.

Plan 665, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the Bailey system of fireproof floor filling to be used between the steel beams on first story in place of brick arches, the lower flanges of beams to be covered underneath with wire lath, as stated in petition; north side of Thirty-sixth street, 275 feet east of Tenth avenue. Petitioner, James Clarke. Approved, Mr. Fryer voting no.

Mr. O'Reilly here entered.

Plan 679, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow roof to be fireproofed as shown on plan and as stated in petition; east side of Riverside Drive, 68 feet 6 inches south of One Hundred and Sixteenth street (Alpha Club Building). Petitioner, Wm. E. Pringle. Reconsidered and approved on condition that dining-room is constructed as shown on plans.

Plan 690, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the Bailey system of fireproof floor filling to be used between the steel beams in first story in place of brick arches; lower flanges of beams to be covered underneath with wire lath and plaster, as stated in petition; northwest corner of Eighty-third street and Lexington avenue. Petitioner, Charles Stegmayer. Approved, Mr. Fryer voting no.

Plan 721, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the first-story entrance hall to be inclosed by fireproof partitions constructed of 4-inch I beams and channels, set not more than 30 inches on centres and properly braced, and 4 inches of hard-burnt brickwork plastered on both sides; ceiling to be constructed of 2-inch T's laid 2 feet apart, and 2-inch hard-burnt clay blocks plastered on under side; also to allow the interior staircase walls to be built of brick 10 inches thick in cellar, 12 inches in first and second stories and 8 inches in third and upper stories; 8-inch portion to be only 44 feet high from third floor to top of roof; also to allow dumbwaiter walls to be built 12 inches thick in first and second stories, and the short walls at front and rear ends of interior light court in front of staircase to be built 12 inches, said light court and dumbwaiter walls being non-bearing, all as stated in petition; Nos. 9 and 11 Prince street. Petitioners, Horenburger & Straub. Approved.

Plan 743, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the main-entrance hall partitions to be constructed of 4-inch angles, T's or channels placed not more than 30 inches from centres and filled in with 4-inch brick or hollow burnt fireproof blocks 4 inches thick; ceilings to be of 2-inch T's or angles placed 2 feet from centres and filled in with 2-inch burnt clay blocks, as stated in petition; No. 240 Second street. Petitioners, Schneider & Herter. Approved.

Plan 762, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the first-story entrance hall partitions to be constructed of 4-inch T bars set 24 inches on centre and angle bar sills and heads filled in with 4-inch brickwork; ceilings to be constructed of 3-inch T bars filled in with 2-inch terra-cotta blocks, as stated in petition; Nos. 2011, 2013 and 2015 First avenue. Petitioner, Max Muller. Approved.

Plan 763A, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow end inclosures of main hall on each story and partitions inclosing water-closet apartments on each stair landing to be constructed of angle-iron and terra-cotta blocks, same to be plastered on either side with King's Windsor cement, as stated in petition; south side of One Hundred and Eleventh street, 125 feet west of Morris avenue. Petitioner, M. J. Garvin. Approved on condition that ceiling blocks are 2 inches thick and partition blocks are 4 inches thick of burnt clay.

Plan 767, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the first-story entrance halls to be inclosed by fireproof partitions constructed of 4-inch I beams, channels and angles, set not more than 30 inches on centres and properly braced, and 4 inches of hard-burnt brickwork plastered on both sides; ceilings to be constructed of 2-inch T's laid 2 feet apart and 2 inches of hard-burnt clay blocks, plastered on under side, as stated in petition; Nos. 440, 442 and 444 East Houston street. Petitioners, Horenburger & Straub. Approved.

Plan 770, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow cellar stairs to be inclosed by 8-inch brick walls and ceiling over said stairs to be of 2-inch T's or angles filled in with 2-inch burnt clay blocks; partitions on first floor inclosing cellar stairs to be of 3-inch angle iron filled in with terra-cotta blocks, and doors leading in same to be of wood covered with metal, as stated in petition; south side of One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, 25 feet west of Wadsworth avenue. Petitioner, P. H. Ohm. Denied.

Plan 780, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the first-story entrance-hall partitions up to staircases to be constructed of 4-inch T's, angles or channels, placed not more than 30 inches apart, well braced and filled in between, solid, with 4-inch thick brick, 4-inch porous terra-cotta blocks or 4-inch burnt-clay blocks, well set in cement and plastered both sides, to be used in place of 8-inch brick walls; ceilings of same to be constructed of 2-inch T's, angles or channels, placed not more than 24 inches from centres and filled in between, solid, with 2-inch-thick terra-cotta blocks, well set in cement and plastered underneath; also to allow brick walls marked "D," at stairs in first story, and brick walls marked "E," at stairs and water-closet apartments in second story, to be built 12 inches thick in place of 10 inches; cross-walls marked "F," inclosing main hall at second story, to be built 8 inches thick in place of 12 inches, all as shown on plans and as stated in petition; Nos. 165 and 167 Suffolk street. Petitioners, Koster & Kohl. Approved, as to hall partitions; denied, as to walls.

Plan 783, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the first-story entrance hall and the staircase and landing in all stories to be inclosed by fireproof partitions constructed of 4-inch I beams, channels and angles, set not more than 30 inches on centres, properly braced and supported in each story by steel beams, and built in with 4 inches of hard-burnt brickwork laid in cement mortar and plastered on both sides; ceiling in first-story entrance hall to be constructed of 2-inch hard-burnt blocks, supported by 2-inch T's laid 2 feet apart and plastered on under side; also to allow floors of main halls and water-closets to be constructed of brick arches supported by steel beams, all as shown on plans and as stated in petition; No. 122 Stanton street. Petitioners, Horenburger & Straub. Denied.

Plan 784, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow first-story entrance hall, staircase and landing in all stories to be inclosed by fireproof partitions constructed of 4-inch I beams, channels and angles, set not more than 30 inches on centres, properly braced and supported in each story by steel beams, built in with 4 inches of hard-burnt brickwork, laid in cement mortar and plastered on both sides; ceiling in first-story entrance hall to be constructed of 2-inch hard-burnt blocks, supported by 2-inch T's laid 2 feet apart and plastered on under side; also to allow floors of main halls and water-closets to be constructed of brick arches supported by steel beams, all as shown on plan and as stated in petition; No. 105 Rivington street. Petitioners, Horenburger & Straub. Denied.

Plan 787, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the main-hall partitions to be constructed of 4-inch I beams placed 30 inches on centres, filled in with 4-inch-thick hollow clay blocks, and wire-lathed and plastered on both sides; ceiling of said hall to be constructed of 2-inch by 2-inch angle irons filled in with 2-inch-thick hollow clay blocks, said angles to be 24 inches on centres and wire-lathed and plastered; also to allow the northerly staircase wall to be constructed of brick 12 inches thick on second story, 10 inches on first story and 20 inches thick in cellar, all as shown on drawings and as stated in petition; No. 145 Pitt street. Petitioner, Michael Bernstein. Approved.

Plan 791, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow first-story entrance hall to be inclosed by fireproof partitions constructed of 4-inch I beams, channels and angles, set not more than 30 inches on centres, properly braced, and 4 inches of hard-burnt brickwork plastered on both sides, ceilings to be constructed of 2-inch T's laid 2 feet apart and 2-inch hard-burnt clay blocks, plastered on under side, as stated in petition; No. 28 Gouverneur street. Petitioners, Horenburger & Straub. Approved.

Plan 791A, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow building to be erected 40 feet in height, instead of 35 feet, as stated in petition; east side of Jackson avenue, 100 feet north of One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street. Petitioner, W. C. Dickerson. Approved.

Plan 1120, Alterations to Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the cellar stairs to be placed directly under the main stairs, stairs to be inclosed in brick walls and the first floor and hall ceiling to be made fireproof, hall ceiling to be made fireproof with Weatherpon's fireproof plaster plates, as shown on plans and as stated in petition; Nos. 601 and 603 Third avenue. Petitioner, Peter Roberts. Denied.

Plan 1155, Alterations to Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the building of triangular portions of brick wall, 6 feet 4 inches wide by 8 feet high and 12 inches thick, laid in cement and lime mortar, at ends of west gable party wall from fourth story to roof, so that fourth story will be a full story, having flat roof, peak of wall to be removed to point of new fire wall, as shown on plan and as stated in petition; Nos. 296 and 298 Monroe street. Petitioners, Small & Schumann. Approved.

Plan 1161, Alterations to Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow coal bins to be erected on top of boiler house, same to be covered with galvanized corrugated iron fastened to steel pulvins with steel frame, as shown on plans and as stated in petition; Nos. 170, 172 and 174 Greenwich street. Petitioners, The New York Steam Company. Denied.

Plan 1185, Alterations to Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the addition of a fifth story, with 12-inch brick walls, thus making height of 12-inch brick walls about 58 feet instead of 50 feet allowed by law, as stated in petition; No. 54 Park avenue. Petitioners, Scelling & Potter. Approved.

Mr. Moore and Mr. Bonner here retired.

Plans 1190 and 1191, Alterations to Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the connection of two buildings so that connecting restaurants may be constructed on first floor, as stated in petition; north side of West Thirty-ninth street, 100 feet east of Broadway (The Parker), with No. 1418 Broadway. Petitioner, Clarence S. Luce. Approved, on recommendation of Messrs. McMillan and Conover.

Petition for exemption from fireproof shutters on the stair window of the seventh, eighth and ninth stories, for reasons as stated in petition; No. 153 Broadway. Petitioner, Ernest Flagg. The three windows—one in each story—seventh, eighth and ninth stories, must be protected by wire glass set in suitable metal frames, on recommendation of Mr. Dobbs.

BOARDS OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Meeting of the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, held at the office of the President of the Borough, September 23, 1898.

Present—Councilman Cassidy, with President Bowley in the chair. The request of the Secretary for the indulgence of the Board in not having the minutes of previous meeting included for the reason given that the peremptory order of the Board of Health in removal by O. A. M. of this day from this Borough Hall, formerly City Hall, Long Island City, as same has been considered as unsanitary, had disturbed office matters, was granted.

The President, as Chairman of Committee appointed at last meeting to view the plans for bridges across Newtown creek at Vernon avenue and to learn of the Commissioner of Bridges as to his intentions in respect thereto, reported progress.

The following was duly adopted: Resolved, That pending the further consideration of the petition for the sewerage, grading, curbing and flagging of Park place from Woolsey avenue to Porter avenue, First Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, the President is requested to issue requisition upon the Department of Highways, Sewers, and Receiver of Taxes for maps, estimates, and assessed valuation of properties to be benefited.

In response to communication received, the following was adopted: Whereas, The private property-owners on Bebevois avenue (or Second avenue), between Grand avenue and Jamaica avenue, First Ward, this Borough, have requested this Board to second its efforts in the contemplated construction of sewer at their own expense; said sewer to connect with and to discharge into sewer at Jamaica avenue and to be continued from there toward Grand avenue, fronting their property as aforesaid, and

Whereas, Said owners have laid before us the plans, specifications and contract relating thereto; and

Whereas, A majority of this Board is familiar with the location, surroundings and special needs for the sewer thus contemplated to be constructed; therefore

Resolved, That this Board does hereby recommend the subject matter in the prompt and favorable action of the Commissioner of Sewers and the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York.

Communication read from Arthur Van Dewater, Esq., No. 184 Madison avenue, Flushing, Long Island, setting forth therein that although one-third of the estimated cost for flagging the north side of Madison avenue, Parsons and Percy streets, was placed in the levy of 1897, collect-

ed in December of same year, the work has not as yet been commenced, and asking on behalf of the original petitioners the aid of this Board to progress same.

On motion, the matter was referred to the President to communicate with the Comptroller, as the subject relates to finance.

Certified copy of action taken by the School Board, this Borough, was read, followed by adoption of:

Whereas, The Public School Board in the Borough of Queens did, by resolution adopted by it, as certified to us under date of September 20, 1898, make request that this Board use its utmost endeavors toward this City acquiring title to the triangular plot of ground front of Public School No. 1 in the First Ward of this Borough, to be used for park purposes, and setting forth therein that such park would add to the general appearance of said public school building.

Now, in view of the foregoing and after hearing expressions of solicitude for the general welfare of said school, by reason of the architectural beauty of said building being made liable to be materially obscured by any unsightly structure that might be erected upon said triangular plot and undesirable business that might be carried on therein to the annoyance of the school kept in said school building, therefore

Resolved, That this the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, in meeting assembled this 23d day of September, 1898, do unanimously and most unreservedly recommend to the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York that it promptly exercise the power vested in it under section 415, chapter 378, Laws of 1897, in acquiring title for the use of the public of the lands fronting Public School No. 1 for use as a park.

The President laid before the Board complaint and petition received by him, and on file in his office for inspection, in relation to the smoke arising from the burning of soft coal on the locomotives of the Long Island Railroad Company, employed in moving its freight cars on its tracks situated in block bounded by Jackson and Vernon avenues, and Fifth and Sixth streets, First Ward, this Borough, and appointed Friday, October 7, 1898, at 10.30 A. M. as the time for a hearing thereon, as to it being a public nuisance, etc.

The same time for a public hearing as just afore appointed was set by the President for hearing upon complaint received by him against nuisance from Warren Island.
