SIR—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, the Board of Police of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and force for the three months ending June 30, 1898.

REPORT.

On the 30th day of June, 1898, the number of members of the force of all grades, including Surgeons, was 7,485. Number of Matrons, 38.

SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof will be found in schedule annexed marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 17,068½ days; sick time paid, 8,534½ days; sick time unpaid, 8,534½ days; total, 17,068½ days. Total days' time of the force was 679,250 days; percent. of sick to full time, 2.51; amount paid for sick time, \$27,087.61; amount paid for preceding quarter, \$34,848.61; decrease, \$7,761.

ARRESTS.

The total number of persons arrested by the Police force during the quarter was—Males, 30,432; females, 6,022; total, 36,454.

Number arrested for principal felonies, 2,284; number discharged without trial, 613; number acquitted, 416; number convicted, 457; number sent to other authorities, 44; number died, 11; number pending, 743; total, 2,284.

LOST CHILDREN (see Schedule "B").

Males, 1,080; females, 573; total, 1,653. Restored to parents or guardians, 884; brought to Central Office and other dispositions, 769; total, 1,653. Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in felony report and general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from the daily returns from the station-houses, and the felony report is made from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house at the time the arrest is made is liable to be, and frequently is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

HOUSE OF DETENTION.

The number of persons committed to and detained in the House of Detention for witnesses during the quarter was: Remaining in House April 1, 1898, 4; committed during April, 12; total, 16; discharged during April, 11. Remaining May 1, 5; committed during May, 11; total, 18; discharged during May, 9. Remaining June 1, 9; committed during June, 10; total, 19; discharged during June, 13. Remaining July 1, 6. The aggregate number of days' detention was 659½ days; number of meals, 1,979, at a cost of 25 cents each, \$494.75. For the names of persons detained and other details see schedule annexed marked "C."

SANITARY COMPANY.

The transactions of the Sanitary Company for the quarter, setting forth the number of steam boilers examined and their condition, and the number of applicants for examination as Engineers, will be found in schedule annexed marked "D."

PROPERTY CLERK'S OFFICE.

The value of lost and stolen property recovered and returned to owners, and other transactions of the Property Clerk's Office, will be found in the schedule annexed marked "E."

Of this number 2,044 passed a satisfactory examination and have been granted certificates, and 49 have been rejected.
