Upon the payment into the City Treasury of the amount due by the persons whose bids are accepted respectively, certificates thereof shall be issued to them as authorized by law. The proposals, together with the security deposits, should be retained in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Proposals for Bonds of the Corporation of the City of New York," and then enclosed in a sealed envelope, addressed to the Comptroller of The City of New York.
