The Hon. Robert A. Van Wyck, Mayor; Bird S. Coler, Comptroller, and John Whalen, Corporation Counsel, the officers designated by section 1526, chapter 378, Laws of 1897, met this day.

The minutes of the meetings of November 23, 1898, were approved as printed.

The Supervisor of the City Record presented a request from the Secretary of the Department of Education for authority to publish a notice in reference to the New York Training School for Teachers.

On motion of the Mayor and by the concurrent action of all the members of the Board, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the School Board be and hereby is authorized to advertise the said notice in reference to the New York Training School for Teachers in the following papers:

The Supervisor also presented a request from the Commissioner of Water Supply for authority to publish brief abstracts of advertisement now appearing in the CITY RECORD, calling for bids for contracts for coal for pumping-stations in the Borough of Queens.

On motion of the Corporation Counsel and by the concurrent action of all the members of the Board, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Water Supply be and he hereby is authorized to publish in the "Flushing Journal" of Flushing, Long Island, and in the "Long Island City Daily Star" brief notices calling attention to advertisement now appearing in the CITY RECORD, calling for bids for contracts for coal, etc., for the pumping-stations in the Borough of Queens.

On motion of the Mayor and by the concurrent action of all the members of the Board, the following was adopted:

Resolved, That this Board approve the Annual Requisitions received from the various departments, bureaus, courts and county officers of the several counties included in the city of Greater New York for the year 1899, as revised by the Supervisor of the City Record, and that the said Supervisor be directed to prepare and print, with the approval of the Corporation Counsel, estimates and contracts for furnishing supplies of stationery, blank books, printed, lithographed and stamped blank forms, and the indices of the Health Department, as called for during the ensuing year; and

Resolved, That the Supervisor of the City Record be directed to prepare the customary forms of advertisement of said contracts and estimates for insertion in the CITY RECORD.

On motion of the Mayor, and by the concurrent action of all the members of the Board, the list of Official Papers (pursuant to the provision of section 1526, chapter 378, Laws of 1897) was revised and the "Irish American" was eliminated and the "Harlem Local Reporter" substituted therefor.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Docks held Friday, October 28, 1898, at 2 o'clock P. M. Present—President Gram and Commissioner Meyer.

Absent—Commissioner Murphy.

The minutes of the meeting held October 21, 1898, were approved.

Messrs. Charles A. Schieren, Alexander R. Smith and Counsel Fairchild, of the Commerce Commission of the State of New York, appeared in relation to the decline of commerce of The City of New York. They were informed that the Board would be glad at any time to co-operate with their Commission in the consideration of matters looking toward an increase in the commerce of the city.

The communication from the Pennsylvania Railroad Company in relation to the establishment of a freight station in the Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, was taken from the table, placed on file, and on motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Board hereby agrees to lease, assign and to farm-let to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company all and singular the wharfrage which may arise, accrue or become due, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, for the use and occupation of the following described wharf property, to wit:

A pier to be built in the Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, being the second pier south of the entrance to Kent Avenue Basin and Wallabout place, together with one-half the bulkheads on either side of said pier, as shown on the "General Plan for the Improvement of the Wallabout Basin, as authorized by chapter 529 of the Laws of 1897," on file in the office of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department; the lease to be for a term of ten years from the date said pier and bulkhead are completed and ready for occupation, with privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years; the rental of the premises as above described for the first term of ten years, shall be at the rate of \$12,000 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department, and for the first renewal term, ten per cent. advance, namely, \$13,200 per annum, payable quarterly in advance as above.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to erect a shed on the above described pier; also to erect a shed on the above described bulkhead for a distance of fifty feet inshore from the bulkhead line; said sheds to be erected under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Board governing the Department of Docks and Ferries; said sheds to revert to and become the property of The City of New York, free from all encumbrances of every kind whatsoever, upon the expiration or sooner termination of such lease or renewal thereof.

The above resolutions shall be of no force or effect unless the Pennsylvania Railroad Company shall, within ten days after receipt hereof, accept, in writing, the terms and conditions thereof, and agree to execute a lease when called upon to do so, containing the usual covenants and conditions embodied in the leases of wharf property now used by this Department.

The following communications were tabled for one week:

From the National Steamship Company—In relation to its application for a lease of the bulkheads adjoining Pier, new 39, North river.

From the Southern Pacific Company—Requesting a renewal lease of the bulkhead northerly of Pier, new 25, North river.

The communication from Hon. William B. Hurd, Jr., County Judge of Kings County—Advising that the license to the Jamaica Bay Ferry Company to run a ferry from Canarsie to Barren Island was granted under sections 170 and 174, chapter 508 of the Laws of 1890, was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to what action this Board should take in the matter.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief in relation to the improvement of the channel between Quarantine and Sandy Hook, by the United States Government, was referred to the President.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 18531, in relation to the application of Maurice Fitzgerald for permission to place a temporary dumping-board on the south end of the bulkhead at Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, was referred to the Treasurer.

The communications from the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, the Hudson River Line and the Mary Powell Steamboat Company, requesting that Pier, new 31, North river, be not extended beyond the pierhead line of 1890, were referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

The Women's Auxiliary of the Church Temperance Society, to maintain a portable lunch wagon on the new-made land foot of West Twenty-fourth street, westerly of Twelfth avenue.

John J. Dailey, to drive about 40 piles in front of the crib work at the southerly end of Riker's Island, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

The New York Steam Company, to dredge in the slips adjoining Pier, old 6, North river.

George H. Murphy, to repair water pipe at Pier, new 40, North river; all pavement to be relaid by the force of this Department, at the cost and expense of said permittee.

The Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York, to dredge under the ferry bridge at the foot of Broadway, Brooklyn.

The following permits were granted on the usual terms:

Pennsylvania Railroad Company, to make general repairs to the ferry premises foot of West Thirteenth and West Twenty-third streets, North river, and at the foot of Fulton street, Borough of Brooklyn; and to the piers foot of West Thirty-seventh and West Thirty-eighth streets, Borough of Manhattan, and foot of North Fourth and North Fifth streets, Borough of Brooklyn, during the ensuing six months.

The Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York, to make general repairs to the ferry premises

foot of Roosevelt, Grand and East Twenty-third streets, Borough of Manhattan, and at the foot of Grand and from South Sixth to South Ninth streets, Borough of Brooklyn, during the ensuing three months.

Merritt & Chapman Derrick and Wrecking Company, to land one reel of wire at the bulkhead foot of Twenty-eighth street, East river.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Board of Public Improvements—Requesting permission to make blue print copies of maps showing the improvements along the water front on the North and East rivers. Secretary directed to notify said Board that if one of its Engineers be sent to this office an opportunity will be afforded him to make copies of such maps.

From the Land Department—Stating that the hearing in the matter of the application of the Brooklyn and Rockaway Beach Railroad Company for a grant of land under water in Jamaica Bay has been postponed without date. Secretary directed to so notify the Corporation Counsel.

From the Bloomingdale Boat Club—Requesting permission to rebuild boat-house foot One Hundred and Second street, North river.

On motion, permission was granted to rebuild said boat-house, in so far as the jurisdiction of this Department extends thereat, the work to be done in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

From Doernberg & Goodman—Requesting permission to unload lumber at the pier foot of Eighth street, East river.

On motion, said application was denied, and all permits heretofore granted to use said pier were revoked, the premises being in a dangerous condition.

From the Consolidated Ice Company—Declining to consent to the use of the bulkhead Piers, new 24 and 25, North river, for the dumping of snow and ice therefrom during the ensuing winter. Secretary directed to so notify the Department of Street Cleaning.

From the Treasurer—

1st. Recommending that the compensation to be charged for the use of the new made land in the vicinity of Franklin street, North river, for the sale of Christmas trees during the coming season be fixed at the rate of \$45 for inside plots and \$50 for corner plots, payable in advance to the Dock Master. Recommendation adopted.

2d. Recommending that the claim against George C. Murphy for top wharfrage on sand stored on the Pier foot of West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street be settled for the sum of \$20, and that said Murphy be notified that hereafter the regular rate of wharfrage must be paid on all sand left on the pier. Recommendation adopted.
