DEAR SIR—In accordance with the letter of President Grant of October 6, and after an inspection of the premises, I find that the vacant lot on the south side of Thirteenth street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, known as Lot No. 50, Block 151, Twenty-second Ward Map, is about five feet above the grade of the street, and should be dug down to grade. Estimated cost, \$230. Assessed value of lot, \$600.

Following opinion from the Corporation Counsel:

LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE CORPORATION COUNSEL, }
NEW YORK, October 27, 1898. }

Hon. EDWARD M. GRANT, President of the Borough of Brooklyn:

SIR—I have received your communication, which reads as follows: "Petitions have been received here to compel the flagging of sidewalks on Hamilton avenue, in this borough, opposite the property owned by the House of the Good Shepherd. Under title 22, section 32, page 353 of the Charter of the City of Brooklyn, 1895, the owner of this property claims exemption from assessments (chapter 583, Laws of 1888). I find that section 905 of the Charter of the present City of New York (chapter 378, Laws of 1897), continues existing and valid exemption from taxation.

"I shall be obliged if you will advise me whether or not the House of the Good Shepherd is now exempt from assessments for local improvements, such as the flagging of sidewalks opposite its property. The note 'D' to section 950 of the present Charter seems to indicate that it is not."

In reply thereto, I would say that on February 11 last I rendered an opinion to Hon. James Muffet, Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply, Borough of Brooklyn, in which I held that it was the general intent of the Charter to continue the immunity from taxation secured by the Charter of the City of Brooklyn to such institutions as were granted that immunity prior to consolidation. This opinion specifically applied to water rates. And I further held that such charges were taxes within the meaning of section 905 of the new Charter. This section reads as follows:

"905. Nothing in this chapter shall affect any existing and valid exemptions from taxation heretofore created by law respecting any property, real or personal, within the limits of The City of New York as constituted by this act."

Your inquiry relates to an assessment for flagging sidewalks. By section 32, title 22 of the Charter of the City of Brooklyn, it is provided that "The real property situate in the county of Kings, now owned or which may hereafter be owned by any hospital, orphan asylum, house of industry or other charitable corporation, society or institution, which has for its object the reformation of offenders, the care, support or education of the sick, the infirm, the destitute, the deaf, the dumb or the blind, shall be and hereby is declared discharged and exempt from all taxes and from all assessments laid or made for local improvements, and sales thereunder, and from all such assessments hereafter, so long as the same shall be owned by any such corporation, society or institution aforesaid." "The ratable amount of any assessment which shall be laid or made hereafter for any local improvement which would have affected any real property exempted under this section, if such exemption had not been made, shall be a charge upon the city of Brooklyn and be paid out of the assessment fund of said city." Under the opinion above cited it is clear that an assessment for local improvement is included under the word "taxation" as used in the new Charter. It is also clear that the House of the Good Shepherd is included in the class of institutions so exempted.

The note to which you refer (Note "D," section 950) would not seem to apply to this case, because assessments for local improvements are specifically mentioned in section 32 above cited.

I advise you, therefore, that the House of the Good Shepherd is now exempt from assessment for local improvements, and therefore from an assessment for flagging of sidewalks, which is a local improvement. The ratable amount of any such assessment which could lawfully be laid against the property of such institution if it were not for the exemption granted, should be ascertained and the amount thereof paid by The City of New York.

The Police Board received a communication from John McCullough, State Superintendent of Elections, bearing date October 20, 1898, in which, among other things, he states that there is reason to believe a horde of floaters and repeaters will be sent forth to the polling-places of this City to register as voters, and submits to the Board a list of houses from which he states there is reason to believe such repeaters and floaters will attempt to register; and in which said communication he further demands that this Board, and each member thereof, shall render to him and his deputies such aid and assistance in the performance of their duty as shall prevent and punish any violation of the Election Law or of the Penal Code relating to crimes against the elective franchise from the places submitted or from any other place which shall come to the knowledge of the Board.

In reply to such communication, the Police Board desires to state that through the Chief of Police general orders have been issued, calling the attention of commanding officers and members of the force to the necessity of exercising the utmost vigilance in preventing any illegal registration or any illegal voting, and requiring that they shall use their utmost endeavors to ascertain whether any coloration or illegal registration is attempted, or is intended to be attempted, in this City. The Police Board desires further to state that under the law it is their duty, through the commanding officers of the respective precincts, to verify the registry lists after the close of registration on the last day of registration, and that in the verification of such lists an investigation is necessarily included of every person who may be registered, and such investigation will necessarily include those registered from the houses specified or referred to in the communication of the said Superintendent of Elections; and the Police Board desires further to state that such provision of the law will be rigidly carried out, and that it is their purpose to see that there shall be no illegal registration nor illegal voting permitted within The City of New York at this election. The Police Board desire further to say that they are ready at any time to act with promptness and dispatch upon any complaint that may be submitted to them, showing the existence of any coloration or any attempt at illegal registration or illegal voting within this City, and that they will perform their full duty in seeing that the election law and the provisions of the Penal Code relating to crimes against the elective franchise are fully enforced.

The Chief Clerk is directed to communicate a copy of this minute to the State Superintendent of Elections.

At a meeting of the Board of Police of the Police Department of The City of New York, held on the 25th day of October, 1898.

Present—Commissioners York (President), Sexton, Hess and Abell.

Proposals for printing in the several Districts were opened, and a part of position for such work made as follows:

In the matter of the protest filed by Louis A. Jaffer, of No. 257 Broome Street, New York City, against the validity of an independent certificate of nomination filed by the independent voters themselves "The Chicago Platform Democracy," in which they nominate Charles S. Adler for Member of Assembly in the Eighth Assembly District of the County of New York:

A hearing upon the said protest having been had before the Police Board on the 25th and 26th of October, 1898, and upon said hearing evidence having been taken as to the validity of said petition, and it appearing to the Board that a sufficient number of legal names is not attached to the said petition to enable it to be recognized as a valid petition, and the Board being satisfied from the evidence taken before it that names have been signed to the said petition by other than the legal persons, the Board, for the reasons aforesaid, determines that the said petition is invalid and therefore declines to recognize the same.

In the matter of the independent certificate of nomination filed by the Chicago Platform Democracy, to which they nominate Louis A. Jaffer for member of Assembly in the Eighth Assembly District of the County of New York:

A protest as to the validity of said petition having been filed by Mr. Louis A. Rosenholz and Otto A. Rosalaky, his attorney, and a hearing upon said protest having been had before the Police Board on the 25th and 26th days of October, 1898, and testimony having been taken with reference to the validity of said certificate, the Board does determine that upon the evidence so taken it appears that there are names upon said petition not signed by the proper persons sufficient to bring it below the number required by law, and for the further reason that one of the blank forms seeking to place in nomination the said Louis A. Jaffer, and which contains (39) thirty-nine names, and in which said blank form there is no name of candidate, no designation of an assembly district, no place of residence of the candidate, nor place of business; for the reasons stated, the Police Board determines that said certificate of nomination is not valid, and therefore it declines to file or recognize the same, and the Clerk of the Board is directed to forward a copy of this decision to the persons entitled thereto under the Election Laws of the State.

The Municipal Assembly having duly authorized the Board to award the contract without public bidding, as provided by the Charter, for the printing of ballots to be used at the coming election, it is, on motion of Commissioner Sexton,

Resolved, That the proposal of the Martin B. Brown Company for supplying official and sample ballots required by the Police Department for the General Election of 1898, in accordance with specifications submitted by the Superintendent of the Bureau of Elections, for the sum of nine dollars and fifty cents per thousand, be and is hereby accepted, and that the Chief Clerk be directed in pursuance of agreement with the Martin B. Brown Company for the performance of said work, for said agreement to be accompanied by a bond in the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars for the faithful performance thereof with two sureties. The President of the Police Board is hereby authorized to execute such contract for and in behalf of the Police Board. The specifications for such work is as follows:

1,575,000 official ballots (white) for candidates (22 1/2 by 16), one thousand to each election district.

375,250 sample ballots (pink) for the candidates (22 1/2 by 16), 225 to each election district, and 25 of each election district to be delivered to the Bureau of Elections in each borough in which said election districts are located, as more fully set forth below.

Also one official ballot of each election district (white) without number, arranged by election and assembly districts for wards in numerical order, bound in book form, with strong ordinary paste-board covers, to be used for public inspection, with title on back and cover in bold type, "Official Ballots, 1898," and delivered to the Bureau of Elections in each borough four days before election. The sample ballots to be delivered to the Bureau of Elections in each borough, must be put in separate boxes, by election district, marked distinctly upon the outside with number of election district and assembly district (or ward), and delivered five days before election. (Section 86, chapter 909, Laws of 1896, amended by chapter 379, Laws of 1897.)

Said official ballots must be of a "clear white hard paper, free from ground wood, 500 sheets of which, 25 by 38 inches by size, shall weigh 70 pounds, and which shall test for that size and weight at least 20 points on a Morrison Tester." (Section 81, chapter 909, Laws of 1896; amended by chapter 379, Laws of 1897.)

Sample ballots shall be printed on paper of a different color (pink) than the official ballot, but shall in all other respects be precisely similar to the official ballot, etc. (Section 38, chapter 909, Laws of 1896; amended by chapter 379, Laws of 1897.)

Said official and sample ballots must be printed (free from all marks and delinquencies, rendering ballots "void" or "marked for identification") for each election district, packed in separate boxes marked distinctly upon the outside, according to contents, "Official Ballots," or "Sample Ballots," together with the number of election district and assembly district (or ward) and the precinct station-house at which they are to be delivered, and in which said election district and assembly district (or ward) are located, and delivered to the various precinct station-houses, in accordance with sections 81, 82, 83, 84 and 87, chapter 909, Laws of 1896; amended by chapter 379, Laws of 1897, and as per further instructions from the General Bureau of Elections.

Receipts must be taken from the proper officer in charge of each station-house upon the delivery of said ballots, and said delivery must be made at least twenty-four hours before the day of election.
