On motion, the following preamble and resolution were adopted: Whereas, it appears from the records of this Department that since the year 1872 vaccination has been performed by the officers of the Board of Health in the public schools of the former City of New York, with the consent and complete co-operation of the Board of Education, every facility being afforded to have such vaccination performed, and that from the year 1872 to the present time, of the hundreds of thousands of children attending the public schools not a single case of small-pox has occurred among them, even at the time when small-pox was prevalent in this city; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Education of the Borough of Brooklyn be and is hereby respectfully requested to cooperate with the Board of Health, in order that the scholars attending the public schools in said borough may not be liable to contract this disease.
