PROPOSED ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS RESUMED.

No. 1446.

By Councilman Hyland—

Whereas, It appears that some person or persons, without having a grant or franchise therefor, have laid and maintained a double street railroad track, with switches, turnouts and electric connections and wires, upon One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, between Third and Lincoln avenues, in the Borough of The Bronx; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Railroad Committee be and it hereby is authorized and directed to inquire and ascertain by what right or authority the said railroad track and connection were laid in and upon the said street; and be it further

Resolved, That in making such inquiry the Railroad Committee be and it hereby is authorized to send for persons and papers.

Which was referred to the Committee on Railroads.

The President laid before the Council the following communication from the Commissioner of Jurors, County of Kings:

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER OF JURORS, 1898.

OFFICE OF COMMISSIONER OF JURORS,
ROOM 5, COURT HOUSE,
BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, December 5, 1898.

To the Honorable Municipal Assembly:

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with the requirements of the Laws of the State of New York (Article 2, Title 4, chapter 10, chapter 48, I have the honor to submit the following report of the business of this Department from the date of my last report to August 30, 1898:

The Board of Assessors of the City of Brooklyn, whose duty it is to furnish me with the names of those persons who are liable to jury duty and residing within the city limits, have selected and returned to me for such duty a list of 12,581 names, which list was transmitted to this Department July 1, 1897. The Commissioner of Jurors selected 11,676 persons who are liable to jury duty from the jury lists 1896, who qualified and served during that jury year, according to chapter 1135, Laws 1891, of the State of New York, making a total of 24,257 persons liable to jury duty for the years 1897 and 1898.

From this list the Honorable Body the Common Council has selected and returned to me the names of 969 persons as being suitable for service as Grand Jurors:

During the year covered by this report, August 30, 1897, to August 30, 1898, there has been drawn from these lists 22,825 Trial Jurors and 580 Grand Jurors, all of whom have been duly summoned to attend the several courts held in this county during the interval referred to above.

The number drawn and the courts to which they were summoned, the number who served, the number of persons fined, etc., is shown in the following statements:

For the Supreme Court of the State of New York there were drawn 12,225 trial jurors.

For the Kings County Court 10,600 trial jurors and 580 grand jurors.

Grand total drawn, 23,405.

By referring to the returns made to this department, by the clerks of the various courts, it will be seen that out of a total 22,825 persons drawn and summoned as trial jurors, 9,797 served, 5,332 were excused by the judges of the various courts, 2,765 were legally exempt from jury duty, 598 were returned as having been fined for non-attendance, 4,333 were returned by the officers serving the jury notices, as "not to be found," after diligent search and inquiry on the part of said jury notice servers.

Of the 580 grand jurors drawn, 238 served, 174 were excused by the court, 62 were exempt, 18 were fined and 88 were returned by the officers serving the jury notices as not to be found.

I will also state that by the official returns of the several courts, as will be seen upon examination, I have received the names of 676 delinquents who were fined, of which the Honorable Board of Judges has examined 270 cases, of which 254 were remitted, 2 paid and 65 persons could not be found; 346 cases awaiting the action of the Board and in course of delivery.

At the date of my last report there were remaining in my hands awaiting final action of the Board of Judges 650 cases, which have been disposed of as follows: 100 have been remitted, 4 confirmed, 176 could not be found, and 379 cases are still awaiting final action of the Board of Judges.
