BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

IN BOARD OF EXAMINERS, DECEMBER 15, 1898.

The Board of Examiners met this day at 3:10 P. M. Present—Thomas J. Brady, Commissioner of Buildings for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, in the chair, and Messrs. Dobbs, Post, Bommer, Freyer, McMillan, Moore, Conover, and O'Reilly.

The minutes of December 6, 1898, were read and, on motion, approved. Mr. McMillan was here excused.

Petitions were then submitted for approval, as follows:

Plan 758, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow a concrete arch to be used between the first-story steel beams instead of a brick arch, said concrete arch to consist of one part King's Windsor cement, two parts of plaster of Paris and nine parts of cinders, the bottom flanges of steel beams to be covered with wire lath and plaster, as shown on plans and as stated in petition; north side of One Hundred and Twelfth street, 320 feet west of Third avenue. Petitioners, Neville & Bager. Denied; Mr. O'Reilly voting in favor of approval.

Plan 780, New Buildings, 1897—Petition to allow corrugated and curved iron arches to be used, same to be filled with a cinder concrete composed of two parts of cinder and one part of cement; arches to be riveted in two places at equal distances on side lap of sheets, at equal distances between the beams, and the face of girder to be covered with metal lath and plaster, as shown on plans and as stated in petition; southeast corner of Manhattan avenue and One Hundred and Seventh street. Petitioner, Philip Brunner. Laid over for examination and report.

Plan 179A, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow Dally's plaster boards to be used for cellar ceilings, as stated in petition; west side of Washington avenue, 300 feet south of One Hundred and Eighth-second street. Petitioner, W. C. Dickerson. Approved.

Plan 947, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow walls checked "A" on first and second stories (at centre court where staircase is) to be built 12 inches thick in place of 16 inches, and crosswalks at main hall in second story (checked "C" on plans) to be built 8 inches thick of brick, in place of 12 inches, by building up said walls in best cement mortar in close full brick joints, as stated in petition; No. 318 East Ninth street. Petitioners, Kirtzer & Rohl. Denied; Mr. O'Reilly voting in favor of approval.

Plan 963, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow partitions enclosing the first-story entrance hallway to be constructed of 4-inch angle and tee irons spaced 30 inches apart, same to be filled in with 4-inch terra cotta blocks plastered on both sides; ceiling of above hallways to be constructed of 2-inch tee irons spaced 24 inches apart, and filled in with 2-inch terra cotta blocks, plastered on under side, as stated in petition; north side of West Houston street, 35 feet 10 3/4 inches west of Hancock street. Petitioner, Geo. Fred Peilham. Approved.

Plan 976, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the Columbian system of fireproof floor construction to be used in all floors, as stated in petition; southeast corner of Twenty-first street and Tenth avenue. (Hoffman Hall General Theological Seminary.) Petitioner, Charles C. Haight. Approved.

Plan 1517, Alterations in Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the outside walls of the bulkhead on roof to be constructed of steel beams and channels, same to be filled in with 4-inch fireproof blocks, and covered on the outside with corrugated-iron, as stated in petition; north side of Fifty-ninth street, 145 feet west of Third avenue. Petitioners, Buchman & Deisler. Approved.

Plan 1520, Alterations in Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the erection of a brick, glass and iron skylight on the roof of building, making building higher than allowed by law, skylight to be entirely independent of roof tier and supported by iron beams, as shown on plans and as stated in petition; No. 327 Pearl street. Petitioner, Marc Edlitz & Son. Approved.

Plan 1526, Alterations in Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the present party walls to be used without lining, as shown on plans and as stated in petition; No. 22 West Twenty-third street. Petitioner, R. Maynicke. Approved. Mr. Post was here excused.

Plan 883, New Buildings, 1897—Petition to allow a reconsideration of Board of meeting held September 13, 1898, so as to permit cellar stairs of each building to be placed within and under main flight; walls to be of fireproof construction and elevator enclosure in cellar to be filled in with fireproof blocks and self-closing iron doors as stated in petition; southwest corner of Boulevard and Smethurst street. Petitioner, Henry Anderson. Reconsidered and approved on condition that self-closing fireproof doors are provided at openings marked "A," "A," "A," on cellar plans, Mr. Moore and Mr. Bommer voting no.

Petition for exemption from fireproof shutters on the windows and openings of buildings, Nos. 343 and 345 West Thirty-seventh street, for reasons as stated in petition. Petitioner, George F. Kerk. Denied, on recommendation of Mr. McMillan.

Petition for exemption from fireproof shutters on the window openings of the several stories of building, for reasons as stated in petition; No. 339 West Twelfth street. Petitioner, R. H. Macy & Co. Fireproof shutters required on all windows, except the front windows, on recommendation of Mr. Conover.

Mr. McMillan here returned. Petition for exemption from fireproof shutters on the front and rear walls of the second and third stories, for reasons as stated in petition; Nos. 62 and 64 Columbia street (rear). Petitioner, M. Hamburger. Petition granted, on recommendation of Mr. O'Reilly.

Petition for exemption from fireproof shutters on the rear of front four-story buildings and on the rear three-story buildings, for reasons as stated in petition; Nos. 171 and 173 Suffolk street. Petitioner, Frederick S. Flower. Referred to Mr. O'Reilly for examination and report. On motion, the Board then adjourned, 5:25 P. M.

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

DECEMBER 29, 1898.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at eleven o'clock, A. M., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Brigadier-General McCoskey Butt and Brigadier-General James McLeer.

The minutes of meeting held November 4 were read, and a resolution approving the same was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Brigadier-General McCoskey Butt and Brigadier-General James McLeer.

The Secretary reported that Axel S. Hall had assumed his contract for the alteration and improvement to the east of the Twenty-second Regiment Armory Building and that the work was already well progressed.

A communication was received from Captain Clayton, Troop "C," asking for provision for lakens to use for the horses of that organization. The Secretary stated that he answered the communication by saying that the Armory Board has no jurisdiction over the appointment of such lakens and referred him to the Comptroller. Ordered filed.

A communication was received from Major Avery D. Andrews, commanding Squadron "A," stating that a fire had occurred in the armory of that organization on Monday, November 14, caused by the starting of paper smoke-balls upon lights recently placed in the armory. The Secretary stated that a copy of this letter had been forwarded to the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, and a reply was received stating that the company who placed these lights in the armory had been directed to remove them to their former positions. An application was presented by Commander W. H. Stuyven of the Second Naval Battalion, S. N. A communication was received from Commissioner Kearny, stating that his attention had been called to a serious defect in the armory of the Fourteenth Regiment, Borough of Brooklyn, transmitting a copy of the report made by the Deputy Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and

Supplies in reference thereto. This report estimated the cost of such necessary repairs to the defective floor at \$6,500.

The matter was referred back to Commissioner Kearny.
