The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on February 13, 1900 (Minutes, page 182), the annexed resolution in favor of authorizing an issue of Corporate Stock, \$2,250,000, for payment of expenses, finishing and equipping New Hall of Records, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed issue to be necessary.

They therefore recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolution on February 1, 1900:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 59 of the Laws of 1897, as amended by chapter 793 of the Laws of 1897, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the plans and specifications for finishing and equipping the New Hall of Records, as the same have this day been submitted to this Board, and that the form of contract therefor be and the same is hereby approved, subject to the approval as to form by the Corporation Council; and be it further

Resolved, That, subject to concurrence herewith by the Municipal Assembly, the Comptroller be authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of two million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$2,250,000), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the payment of expenses authorized to be incurred by chapter 59 of the Laws of 1897, as amended, and that proposals for said contract be advertised in the CITY RECORD and in the following public newspapers of The City of New York for a period of twenty consecutive days: "New York Daily News," "New York Journal" and "New Yorker Staats-Zeitung."

Resolved, That the Municipal Assembly hereby concurs in said resolution, and that the Comptroller be and hereby is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of two million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$2,250,000), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the payment of the expenses therein mentioned and authorized.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller, New York City:

DEAR SIR—I desire to call your attention to the urgent necessity of letting the contract for the finishing and equipping of the New Hall of Records. We are at a point in the progress of the

work where the walls can be rapidly constructed, and it is of the utmost importance that pipes of the complicated heating, plumbing and electric systems be placed in the walls as they are built. The work must soon be stopped unless this contract is let—the only alternative being to cut through the massive walls afterward at tremendous expense and to the detriment of the work.

Can you not do something to have the bond issue passed by the Board of Aldermen and the Council, so that this calamity shall be averted?

No. 2261.

Whereas, On December 31, at midnight, a century of superb accomplishments in science and the arts of civilization will come to an end, thus marking the completion of a cycle of time in which the human race has lifted itself to heights of strength and glory undreamed of in preceding ages; and

Whereas, At the moment when the nineteenth century will have terminated, a new century will be born whose possibilities will be greater than its magnificent inheritance; and

Whereas, The nations of the earth will then survey with retrospective pride the miracles of science which have beautified the cities of the world, which have drawn the nations of the earth into a closer union, which have leashed the elemental forces of nature, which have weighed the sun and analyzed the constituents of the most distant star, and which have decreased the sum of human suffering; and

Whereas, The nations of the earth, not forgetful of the fact that the century which will then have passed has seen the advent of the steamship, the railroad, the telegraph, the telephone, the Roentgen ray and wireless telegraphy, nevertheless turn their faces toward the dawn of the twentieth century with undiminished faith in the continued progress of mankind and with an unflinching belief that the wonders of the future will transcend in value all the treasures of past knowledge and attainment; and

Whereas, The people of The City of New York are confident that the twentieth century will bring to our beloved country pre-eminence in the generous arts of peace and triumph in any struggle which may be thrust upon us in defense of our national rights and honor; and

Whereas, The inventiveness of the human mind, displayed in the construction of death-dealing agencies, will, in the not distant future, make war impossible and hasten the coming of the day when international disputes will be adjusted by arbitration; and

Whereas, The history of the past, both in our city, State and nation, from the War of the Revolution up to the last month of the Nineteenth Century, fills us with faith for the future and reliance upon that Divine Providence which has blessed us thus far and will still bless us; now therefore be it

Resolved, That a joint committee of the Municipal Assembly, consisting of five members of the Council, to be nominated by the President of the Council, and seven members of the Board of Aldermen, to be nominated by the President of the Board of Aldermen, be and it is hereby appointed to make all necessary arrangements for the proper celebration of the commencement of the twentieth century.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Fred William McCullough to erect, place and keep a stand for the sale of newspapers and periodicals under the stairs of the elevated railroad at the northwest corner of One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue, Borough of The Bronx, provided said stand be erected in conformity with the provisions of chapter 718 of the Laws of 1896 and subject to the conditions of the ordinance regulating the placing of stands under the stairs of the elevated railroads, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Highways; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Municipal Assembly.

 GENTLEMEN—I beg to call your attention to the notice just issued by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company that "on December 19 the trolley cars on the West End Railroad line will be replaced by the 'elevated trains' run by electricity."  
 Your special attention is hereby called to the fact that these trains are to be run at fast speed on an open and unprotected avenue over many important and main thoroughfares, and that no provision is to be made at these crossings for gates or flagmen.  
 Your special attention is also called to the fact that there is to be no stop made at the Sixtieth street crossing. This is directly contrary to the city ordinance which requires that railroad companies operating cars in the Greater City of New York shall stop cars before crossing any main thoroughfare of fire companies or ambulances. Sixtieth street, being the only street open in this neighborhood that is macadamized, is the only thoroughfare for driving and bicycling; and likewise is the main and only thoroughfare for Engine Company 147 and Truck Company 69, situated on Sixtieth street, a very short distance from this crossing. This fact alone calls for immediate action to compel the railroad company to comply with the ordinances. It is a matter of vital importance; cars have stopped here for years before crossing Sixtieth street, and this change will place the lives of citizens hereabouts in great danger.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK:

DEAR SIR—In February, 1900, I sent a communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, offering to sell the bath "Knickerbocker" to the City, and on February 19, on your motion, the matter was referred to the Department of Supplies for a report on the bath.

Deputy Commissioner Donovan, and also the Superintendent of Baths, examined the bath within a few days after the communication was received by them, and I have been expecting ever since that they would send their report to the Committee.

I called on Commissioner Kearny on March 15 and found that he had left the city and would not return for six weeks. I was informed that nothing could be done until the Commissioner returns.

Now, your Honor, we do not want to wait six weeks if we can help it, for the following reason: We have to sign a lease for a dock for the summer the first part of April, and the amount of rent under the lease will be about \$700 to \$750. If there is any prospect of the City buying the bath we do not want to sign the lease, but if there is no prospect we will have to sign the lease the first part of April or be without a dock for the summer.

With the exception of the Committee of Estimate and Apportionment, no one but your Honor can instruct the Department of Supplies to forward their report to the Board of Estimate, etc., and I did not care to address my communication to the Board, asking for information, as the same might be taken as a criticism of the Department of Supplies when none is intended. If I could see Commissioner Kearny there is no doubt in my mind that he would forward the report immediately.

Will your Honor kindly have the Department of Supplies forward the report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment so that we can have an answer one way or the other within a short time?

DEAR SIR—The writer is in receipt of a communication from your office of the 26th instant, inclosing a communication from Mr. Frank H. Reuman, attorney, relative to the purchase by the City of the bath "Knickerbocker," etc.

The writer has investigated the matter, and the following report was made to Commissioner Kearny by the Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies of this Department.

The dimensions of the bath are as follows: Length 101 feet 3 inches; width 72 feet; front of bath two stories high, upper story containing six rooms, all of which are adapted for living apartments, and two of which are so constructed that they can be used for bathing purposes. The bath is divided into two swimming compartments, one for males and one for females, so that both sexes can be accommodated at the same time. The dimensions of the males' swimming well are 47 by 63 feet, and contains 88 bathing houses; that of the females' compartment, 30 by 47 feet, and contains 73 bathing-houses. There are six water-tight compartments or pontoons. The bath has the necessary pipes and fixtures so that it may be lighted by gas, and has about 300 feet of chains and manila cables, power winch, blocks and necessary tackle, etc. The entire structure is in good condition, but there are, however, some alterations and repairs which I would recommend to be made in case the City should purchase the bath, which would cost about \$350. To construct a bath of similar dimensions and construction, in my opinion, would cost at the present time \$22,000. I consider that the bath in its present condition, with all the appurtenances belonging thereto and at present located on the bath, to be worth the sum of \$12,000, less the amount of \$350, which would be required to make the alterations and repairs which I would recommend.

The writer is advised that Commissioner Kearny looked favorably upon this matter, and I would respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment make the necessary provision for the City to purchase this bath.

Herewith I return the letter addressed to you by Mr. Reuman in reference to this matter, presuming that you would prefer that the same be replied to from your office, under the circumstances.
