probable area of assessment, the estimated cost of said work being eighteen thousand dollars. The said assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment is one hundred and twenty thousand two hundred dollars.

And the said Board does hereby determine that no portion of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, but the whole of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

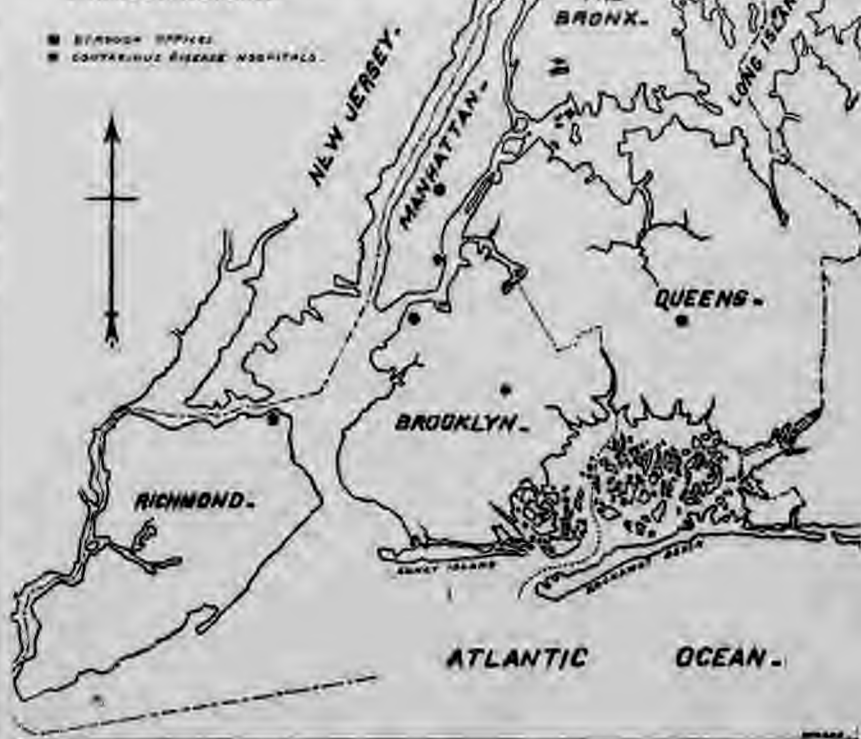
