LAYING OUT PUBLIC PARK AT BENSONIA CEMETERY.

In the matter of the proposed laying out as a public park the land known as Bensonia Cemetery, in the Borough of The Bronx, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing, as required by law.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the proposed laying out, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 3d day of April, 1901, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out as a public park the land known as Bensonia Cemetery, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 24th day of April, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting such proposed laying out would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed laying out would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 24th day of April, 1901; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 24th day of April, 1901; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed laying out, who have appeared, and such proposed laying out was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out as a public park the land known as Bensonia Cemetery, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to lay out as a public park the aforesaid land as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of the northerly line of Rae street with the easterly line of German place; thence running northerly along the easterly line of German place for 401.15 feet to the southerly line of Carr street; thence easterly along the southerly line of Carr street 234.57 feet to the westerly line of St. Ann's avenue; thence southerly along the westerly line of St. Ann's avenue 403 feet to the northerly line of Rae street; thence westerly along the northerly line of Rae street 195.98 feet to the point of beginning.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out Bensonia Cemetery as a park, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 3d day of April, 1901, resolutions were adopted, proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades of Seventy-fifth street, from Sixth avenue to Eleventh avenue, in the Thirtieth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 24th day of April, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting such proposed change of grades would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed change of grades would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD and the corporation newspapers for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 24th day of April, 1901; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed change of grades, who have appeared, and such proposed change of grades was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grades of Seventy-fifth street, from Sixth avenue to Eleventh avenue, in the Thirtieth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to change the grades of the aforesaid street, as follows:

1st. The elevation at the intersection of Seventy-fifth street and Sixth avenue to be 67 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore;

2d. The elevation at the intersection of centre lines of Seventy-fifth street and Seventh avenue to be 82.5 feet above mean high-water datum;

3d. The elevation at the northeastern curb intersection of Seventy-fifth street and Seventh avenue to be 82.4 feet above mean high-water datum;

4th. The elevation at the southeastern curb intersection of Seventy-fifth street and Seventh avenue to be 83.54 feet above mean high-water datum;

5th. The elevation at the intersection of centre lines of Seventy-fifth street and Fort Hamilton avenue to be 92.3 feet above mean high-water datum;

6th. The elevation at the southeastern curb intersection of Seventy-fifth street and Fort Hamilton avenue to be 92.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

7th. The elevation at the northeastern curb intersection of Seventy-fifth street and Fort Hamilton avenue to be 91.84 feet above mean high-water datum;

8th. The elevation at a point distant 200 feet easterly from the intersection of the northern side line of Seventy-fifth street with the eastern side line of Fort Hamilton avenue to be 95.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

9th. The elevation at the intersection of Seventy-fifth street and Tenth avenue to be 85.0 feet above mean high-water datum;

10th. The elevation at a point distant 350 feet easterly from the eastern side line of Tenth avenue to be 86.5 feet above mean high-water datum;

11th. The elevation at the intersection of Seventy-fifth street and Eleventh avenue to be 85.0 feet above mean high-water datum, as heretofore.

STREET SYSTEM FOR TWELFTH WARD, MANHATTAN.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read:

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, April 17, 1901.

Mr. JOHN H. MOONEY, Secretary, Board of Public Improvements:

SIR—I beg to submit herewith for approval by the Board of Public Improvements a plan for the street system in that part of the Borough of Manhattan lying northerly of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, and bounded by the Hudson river, Spuyten Duyvil creek and Harlem river.

It will not be essential to give the complete history of the laying out of the district north of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, and I shall commence therefore with a statement that chapter 565 of the Laws of 1865 gave the Commissioners of Central Park exclusive power to lay out streets, establish grades, etc., north of the southerly line of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street; the Central Park Commissioners filed a map on May 25, 1866, showing avenues and streets within the area bounded by West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, Hudson river, Inwood street and the Dyckman street and the Harlem river.

In 1870 the Department of Public Parks was created, and received jurisdiction over this district, and the map showing the laying out of the street system north of Dyckman street and Inwood street and the Spuyten Duyvil creek was filed April 16, 1884; prior to this map a number of alterations has been filed by the Department of Public Parks in the district south of Inwood and Dyckman streets.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement on July 6, 1888, passed a resolution by which the laying out of the district north of Inwood street and Dyckman street was referred to the Department of Public Parks, and a number of alterations and additions were made; no work was done afterwards by the Department of Public Parks in relation to the Twelfth Ward.

On January 1, 1898, when chapter 378, of the Laws of 1897 took effect, the work of making the map of the city was placed under the jurisdiction of the President of the Board of Public Improvements. The plan of the streets north of West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, as it is legal at the present time, cannot be considered as finished, since large tracts were left open for future consideration, and the time has arrived when the Board should complete the map and lay out the street system which commensurates to the demands and the probable development of the district.

The Topographical Bureau has this work in hand for some time, and a plan entitled "Map or Plan showing the street system of the Twelfth Ward of the Borough of Manhattan as modified and proposed by the Board of Public Improvements, under authority of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897," is herewith submitted to the consideration of the Board, which plan I believe will be to the best interest of the City as well as to the interest of the property-holders.

The submitted map or plan shows by yellow color other avenues and streets which were found in the records as having been legally laid out; the proposed additional avenues and streets and partial alterations of the same are tinted red.

There are 47½ miles of the former and 13 miles of the latter shown on this map; there are 125 acres of public parks in the district, and 47½ acres additional parks are proposed.

The following additions and alterations were made:

25. Extension of Fairview avenue, from Broadway to new street west of Broadway.
26. West One Hundred and Ninety-first street, from Audubon avenue to Wadsworth avenue.
27. West One Hundred and Ninety-second street, from Tenth avenue to Wadsworth avenue.
28. West One Hundred and Ninety-third street, between Hillside and Fairview avenues, from Eleventh avenue to new street 200 feet west of Broadway.
29. New street, 200 feet south of Nagle avenue, between Ellwood avenue to Hillside avenue.

31. New street, south of Sherman avenue, from Ellwood street to Dyckman street.

1. West One Hundred and Eighty-first street, from 80 feet to 100 feet, from Tenth avenue to Boulevard Lafayette.
2. Broadway, from 80 feet to 100 feet, between bulkhead-lines at Harlem River Ship Canal.
3. Broadway at intersection of Hillside avenue and Nagle avenue.

Third—Proposed Parks.

1. New park, bounded on the east by present line of High Bridge Park, on the north by Dyckman street, on the west by Eleventh avenue and Tenth avenue, on the south by the proposed West One Hundred and Ninety-second street and by New avenue.
2. New park, between former bulkhead-lines of Spuyten Duyvil creek, from Harlem River Ship Canal to Kingsbridge avenue, with a 40-foot canal running in the center of said park and connecting Harlem River Ship Canal with new basin extending from Kingsbridge avenue to Harlem River Ship Canal between bulkhead-lines.
3. New park, bounded by Jumel terrace, West One Hundred and Sixty-second street, Edgecombe avenue and West One Hundred and Sixtieth street.
4. New Fort Charles Park, bounded by Wicker place, Fort Charles place (Van Corlear place), and property lines ± 100 feet east of Van Corlear place and ± 200 feet south of Wicker place.
5. Westerly extension of Fort Washington Park, from present shore-line to easterly line of New avenue along bulkhead-lines.

it is found that at the Concourse end of the street the lines and grades are so established that if constructed thereunder the street would be practically useless. He therefore recommends that action be taken by which the lines of One Hundred and Sixty-second street may be changed, so as to make the grades easy and give a proper connection at the Concourse end of the street.

A sketch is herewith transmitted, showing, in red, new lines for One Hundred and Sixty-second street, affording a proper connection, and, at the same time, giving easy grades.

It is understood that the proceedings for acquiring title to One Hundred and Sixty-second street have not yet been confirmed, although the date of vesting title has been fixed. It is, therefore, recommended that the proceedings for acquiring title to that part of One Hundred and Sixty-second street between River avenue and Gerard avenue be discontinued, and that such action be taken as may be necessary to acquire title to One Hundred and Sixty-second street, as shown in red on the sketch, and so much of the block bounded by Gerard avenue, the north side of the twenty-foot strip on the line of One Hundred and Sixty-second street, Walton avenue, and the approach to the Concourse as is not already acquired.

I attach hereto a copy of Engineer Briggs' report showing the necessity of the proposed change, and I recommend that immediate action be taken in the matter.

DEAR SIR—A resolution of the Local Board providing for the regulating, grading, etc., of East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, from Jerome avenue to the Concourse, was referred to me some time since for report. The surveys have been commenced, but we find that at the concourse end of the street the lines and grades are so fixed that if constructed thereunder the street would be practically useless. I therefore beg to recommend that some action be taken by which the line of One Hundred and Sixty-second street may be changed so as to make the grades easy and give a proper connection at the concourse end of said street, and in order to make clear my suggestion I submit herewith a sketch showing in red a new line for One Hundred and Sixty-second street, which will give a proper connection and at the same time easy grades. I understand the title proceeding for acquiring One Hundred and Sixty-second street has not yet been confirmed, although the date of vesting of title for the same has been fixed. I would therefore suggest that the proceedings for that part of One Hundred and Sixty-second street lying between River avenue and Gerard avenue be discontinued, and that such steps be taken as may be necessary to acquire title to One Hundred and Sixty-second street, as shown in red, and so much of the block bounded by Gerard avenue, the north side of the 30-foot strip on the line of One Hundred and Sixty-second street, Walton avenue, and the approach to the Concourse as is not already acquired. Unless some action is taken in this matter I do not see how anything practical can be done at the eastern end of One Hundred and Sixty-second street, and I therefore recommend that the matter be taken up as soon as possible so that the proper remedy may be found and applied.

Whereas, It is evident to all that the proper time to move in such a matter as this is the present, if any approach at all is to be provided for the great structure which is now nearing completion, and as any other approach cannot be thought of at the present time on account of the debt limit; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Boards of Local Improvements of the Eleventh and Twelfth Districts of the Borough of Manhattan urgently request the Board of Public Improvements to reconsider the action of Wednesday last and refer the matter to the Topographical Engineer with instructions to report within two weeks; and be it further

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of Manhattan be requested to use his utmost endeavors to bring about such action, and the Secretary be instructed to transmit a copy of this preamble and resolution to the Board of Public Improvements.

SIR—A communication from your Department, dated March 25, 1901, is received. It reads as follows:

"On June 16, 1900, you approved forms of contract specifications, proposal and bond for building the Muscote Dam, on Croton river, at Muscote Mountain, in the towns of Somers and Bedford, Westchester County, N. Y., and on June 26, 1900, the Aqueduct Commissioners approved and adopted said forms of contract, etc. In January, 1901, an advertisement inviting bids was published in accordance with law, and on January 29, 1901, bids were received and opened. On February 14, 1901, all the bids were rejected.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 20 of article VIII. of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be able to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of The City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1.
