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## BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

The Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York met at the office of the Board, No. 21 Park row, on Wednesday, May 29, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to notice.

The roll was called, and the following members were present and answered to their names: The Comptroller (Deputy Comptroller Lurvey), the Commissioner of Water Supply, the Commissioner of Highways, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning (Deputy Commissioner Gibson), the Commissioner of Sewers, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the President of the Borough of Queens and the President of the Borough of Richmond.

The President, Hon. Maurice F. Holahan, presided.

The minutes of the meetings of May 15 and May 22 were approved as printed.

### LAYING OUT ELM PLACE, BRONX.

In the matter of the proposed laying out of Elm place, from East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street to Kingsbridge road, in the Borough of The Bronx, the report of the Secretary was read, showing that the matter had been duly advertised for a hearing, as required by law.

Nobody appearing in opposition to the proposed laying out, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board held on the 8th day of May, 1901, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out Elm place, from East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street to Kingsbridge road, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the office of this Board on the 29th day of May, 1901, at 2 o'clock P. M., at which meeting such proposed laying out would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed laying out would be considered, to be published in the CITY RECORD for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 29th day of May, 1901; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the CITY RECORD for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 29th day of May, 1901; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed laying out, who have appeared, and such proposed laying out was duly considered by this Board; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out Elm place, from East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street to Kingsbridge road, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same so as to lay out the aforesaid place as follows:

Beginning at a point in the northern line of East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street distant 144.72 feet westerly of the western line of Marion avenue;

2. Thence northerly on a line which intersects the southern line of Kingsbridge road at a point 46.12 feet westerly of the first point of compound curve, westerly of Marion avenue for 506.39 feet;

3. Thence westerly along the southern line of Kingsbridge road for 40.29 feet;

4. Thence southerly on a line parallel to the first-described course and 40 feet therefrom for 513.37 feet to the northern line of East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street;

5. Thence easterly along the northern line of East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street for 40.41 feet to the point of beginning.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by laying out Elm place, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its action thereon.

3. Thence westerly along the southern line of Kingsbridge road for 40.29 feet;

4. Thence southerly on a line parallel to the first-described course and 40 feet therefrom for 513.37 feet to the northern line of East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street;

5. Thence easterly along the northern line of East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street for 40.41 feet to the point of beginning.

### CHANGE OF GRADE OF EAST TWENTY-FIRST STREET, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Chief Topographical Engineer was read:

TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU, NEW YORK, May 28, 1901.

DEAR SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, recommending that proceedings be initiated to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade of East Twenty-first street, between Avenue C and Avenue D, in the Borough of Brooklyn, by substituting for the present crown, which is 29.40 feet, a crown 355 feet south of the southerly line of Avenue C, with an elevation of 28.46 feet, I forward herewith for adoption and a public hearing a map entitled "Map or plan showing change of grade in East Twenty-first street, from Avenue D to Avenue C, in the Twenty-ninth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn."

SIR—In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements, referring for report a communication from the President of the Borough of Queens, recommending that prompt action be taken in relation to a petition of William Ziegler claiming ownership to the roadbed of avenues, streets and places which appear on a map entitled "Realty Trust Map No. 13, showing Ingleside and extension, Flushing, Third Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, 1899, as Map No. 990," I wish to state as follows:

CHANGE OF GRADE OF NINTH STREET, BROOKLYN.

The following report from the Commissioner of Highways was referred to the Chief Topographical Engineer and the Local Board:

DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS, May 21, 1901.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President, Board of Public Improvements:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of a letter, dated May 10, from the Secretary of the Board, with a copy of a report by the Chief Topographical Engineer, and plan showing the change of grades in Ninth street, from Court street to Third avenue, in the Twelfth and Twenty-second Wards, Borough of Brooklyn.

In reply, I beg to say that the Engineer of this Department, Borough of Brooklyn, has given this matter attention and reports thereon as follows:

"I have carefully examined the accompanying profile submitted by the Topographical Bureau for change of grade in Ninth street, between Court street and Third avenue. This change of grade simply legalizes the present street surfaces at Court and Smith streets, which appear never to agree with the grade chart. The only other change is to raise the grade at the bridge three feet. This, as I understand it, is done at the request of the Bridge Department. The grade from the new bridge will fall quite rapidly to the east, reaching an elevation of 4.3 feet at a point 265 feet from the canal, which will be at the rate of about three per cent.

This seems an unfortunately steep grade for an approach to the bridge, but it would be very expensive to avoid it by raising the grade of Ninth street, as the incidental damage to the abutting property would be considerable, and if it is necessary to raise the bridge three feet, I do not see what can be done except to make the change suggested by the Topographical Bureau."

While the elevations shown on the plan of the Topographical Bureau vary slightly from those recommended by this Department, no effort was made to show that the elevations on the plan of the Topographical Bureau were not as good as those suggested by this Department. In fact, the proposed changes of grade meet with the approval of this Department, and I know of no reason why they should not be adopted.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CORPORATION COUNSEL.

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel was read and placed on file:

LAW DEPARTMENT, May 29, 1901.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President, Board of Public Improvements:

DEAR SIR—I am in receipt of your communication of April 29, 1901, stating that "on February 5 last the Comptroller of the City presented at a meeting of the Board of Public Improvements a preamble and resolution explaining the necessity of obtaining at the earliest possible moment information concerning the various sources of water supply; obtaining systematic measurements of various streams, etc., with a view of making provisions for a larger supply of water for Greater New York"; that "to carry out this plan, it was suggested to open correspondence with the Secretary of the Interior at Washington, with a view of inducing the Hydrographical Branch of United States Geological Survey to extend its labors to certain sections of the State containing watersheds which might be made tributary to the water-supply system of this City"; that "subsequently, a representative from the Geographical Office had a conference with the Chief Engineer of Water Supply Department and expressed willingness to co-operate both with the City and State authorities on this matter"; that "on March 13 last a communication was received from Hon. Edward A. Bond, State Engineer and Surveyor, in which he favored a plan to co-operate with The City of New York in making topographical surveys, providing a part of the water supply appropriation could be used to meet the expenses incurred by the State Engineer, whose total appropriation for the year was very small"; that this communication was forwarded by you to Hon. William Dalton, Commissioner of Water Supply Department, on April 16, and that under date of April 24, Deputy and Acting Commissioner Haslin sent to you the following reply:

"Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President, Board of Public Improvements:

DEAR SIR—On the 16th ultimo this office received a letter of 15th ultimo from your Secretary, enclosing copy of a letter from Hon. Edward A. Bond, State Engineer and Surveyor, on the subject of surveys of watersheds in this State, which might be made tributary to the City's water supply.

Mr. Bond states that he would be glad to extend the survey to cover the area indicated by you, if it were possible, but that the small appropriation annually made by the State for this work does not admit it, and he asks for an allotment of \$5,000 to \$10,000 from the appropriations of this Department to enable him to expedite the survey.

In this matter I desire to say that I have a report from the Chief Engineer of the Department, expressing doubt as to the right of the Department or any City authority to advance money to the State Department for surveys, and he suggests that this question be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for advice:

"First—As to the authority to make such transfer; and  
"Second—If the transfer can be made, to advise what Board or authority can make it, and under what conditions.

As all the correspondence on this matter has been conducted by your office, I join the suggestion of the Chief Engineer by asking to submit the matter to the Corporation Counsel.

You also inclose copies of the correspondence between the Honorable Secretary of the Interior, the State Engineer and others, and conclude by saying as soon as a reply is received from me "as to the right of the City to make the necessary transfer this matter can be properly disposed of."

To my mind, there is no question of a transfer involved. Under the provision of the Charter (section 472 as amended by chapter 93 of the Laws of 1901) the Commissioner of Water Supply is authorized, with the approval of the Board of Public Improvements, "to select and to determine all sources of water supply that may be needed for the supply of public water works of the said city, and for the supply and distribution of water in said city."

The selection and determination of such sources necessarily requires an acquaintanceship with the topography and the hydrography of the country. This information must be acquired, if it were obtained from maps of the State Engineer and Surveyor, there is no question in my

mind that the outlay for such maps would be a proper and legitimate expenditure. Conversely, if such maps do not exist, is it not a proper expenditure to have the necessary data collected, reports made and maps drawn? I see no escape from such a conclusion.

My advice is that the Commissioner of Water Supply, with the approval of your Board, has the authority to appropriate money to the State Engineer and Surveyor for topographic surveys and hydrographic measurements, so that the hydrographic and geological works of the United States Geological Survey, in co-operation with the State of New York, should be extended so as to include that portion containing the watersheds which might be made tributary to the water supply system of this City.

The permission should, however, be given with the proviso presented in the communication from the Corporation Counsel against liability for fire-hydrant service and enhancement of the franchise value on account of such water-main extension.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Highways is hereby authorized to issue a permit to the Crystal Water Company of Edgewater for opening the above street upon the presentation to him of the permit of the Commissioner of Water Supply for the above work.

The petition of the undersigned respectfully shows and alleges:

That your petitioners, severally, are the owners of the real estate shown on the diagram hereto annexed, and that, where indicated thereon, there are erected detached, private dwellings, occupied by the owners or their tenants.

On the 26th day of March, 1901, Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were duly appointed by the Supreme Court in a proceeding brought by The City of New York to acquire title to the lands lying in East Seventeenth street, from Alhermarle road (Avenue A) to Beverley road (Avenue B), in the Twenty-ninth Ward, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, upon which your petitioners' aforesaid real estate fronts, and that said Commissioners have duly filed their oaths of office.

That the aforesaid fence is old and rotten and in a falling and dilapidated condition and is extremely unsightly, and its maintenance prevents the use and improvement of that part of said East Seventeenth street, and that said street is almost impassible in inclement weather and is at all times unattractive, for which reasons your petitioners' property thereon is less valuable and desirable for sale and use.

Board of Public Improvements, Nos. 13 to 21 Park Row, City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—We, the undersigned owners or managers of the respective properties set opposite our names, respectfully request that the present Belgian-block pavement on a part of Park row and a part of Centre street, Borough of Manhattan, be replaced from curb to curb with a first-class asphalt pavement for the following reasons:

First—The present pavement is extremely noisy and a considerable detriment to business and comfort in the stores and to the lower office stories of buildings located on Park row.

Second—There is a very considerable foot travel across Park row between the office building and mercantile section east of Park row, and the General Post-office, City Hall, Register's office and other municipal buildings on the west side of Park row. Asphalt paving would be a decided relief and a benefit to all who cross and recross Park row daily.

Third—We call attention to the heavy traffic in passengers and vehicles utilizing the street outside the curb line to and from the Brooklyn Bridge, especially during the early hours of the day. We call particular attention to the direct and heavy traffic from the westerly side of Park row to the Bridge entrance.

Fourth—Owing to the width and exposed situation of Park row any wind of moderate velocity is at its worst in and around the Post-office and City Hall square, and the dust and dirt is a constant source of complaint to both passers-by and tenants on the street. Asphalt pavement would largely mitigate this complaint with the help of the present cleaning service.

Your petitioners beg to suggest that the street be repaved, beginning at the long crosswalk separating Broadway from Park row at the lower end of the Post-office and connecting opposite with the "St. Paul" Building; the asphalt paving running thence in a northeasterly direction the full width of Park row and including the plaza in front of the "Times" and "Tribune" buildings, where Franklin's statue stands; continuing along Park row and covering the entire street up to the curb line in front of the "Staats Zeitung" Building and stopping at a point on Park row either 50 feet northeast of the southeast corner of Park row and Tryon row or possibly continuing as far as Chambers street, on Park row. We beg to include also in our request the repaving of the lower end of Centre street, from its commencement at Park row to the juncture of Centre street with widened Elm street, which we understand is to be an asphalted street.

Your petitioners are unanimously of the opinion that such an improvement would give the maximum benefit at the minimum cost. The number of people to be served and benefited is approximately over 300,000 daily. There is no place in The City of New York where so many people can be benefited by such a short stretch of improvement as the one hereby recommended by your petitioners.

Park row will require repaving after the excavation of the Rapid Transit Tunnel, and your petitioners request that when the present paving is removed in part or as a whole for such excavation that it be replaced by asphalt.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO THE WEST TENTH STREET CONNECTING RAILWAY COMPANY THE RIGHT OR FRANCHISE TO CONSTRUCT AND OPERATE A STREET SURFACE RAILROAD IN, UPON AND ALONG CERTAIN STREETS, AVENUES, PARKWAYS AND HIGHWAYS IN THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

WHEREAS, THE WEST TENTH STREET Connecting Railway Company has duly presented to the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, by presenting and filing with each house thereof, its application, in writing, for a grant of the franchise or right to use the streets, avenues, parkways and highways in The City of New York hereinafter mentioned, for the construction, maintenance and operation of a single-track street surface railroad in or upon the surface of the same; and

Whereas, The said Municipal Assembly, by resolution adopted March 20, 1900, approved by his Honor the Mayor of said city, on March 28, 1900, gave public notice of such application, and that at the Councilmanic Chamber, in the City Hall, in The City of New York, on the 19th day of April, 1900, at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon, such application of said railway company would be first considered and a public hearing had thereon, which notice was published daily for at least fifteen (15) days successively prior to the hearing, in two daily papers published in The City of New York, viz., in the "New York Press" and in the "New York Journal and Advertiser," which papers were first designated, in writing, by his Honor the Mayor of said city, on March 28, 1900; and

Whereas, After public notice given as aforesaid and at a public hearing duly held in pursuance of such notice, whereat all persons so desiring were given an opportunity to be heard and were heard, such application was first considered by the Railroad Committee of both houses of said Municipal Assembly;

Section 1. The Municipal Assembly of The City of New York hereby grants to the West Tenth Street Connecting Railway Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and franchise to use the streets, avenues, parkways and highways of the said city, and to construct, maintain and operate a single-track street surface railroad in and upon the following streets, avenues, parkways and highways, viz.: Commencing at the intersection of Sixth Avenue and West Tenth Street, in The City of New York, running southwesterly with single track through, upon and along West Tenth Street to the intersection of said West Tenth Street with Greenwich Avenue, all in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

Sec. 2. The grant of said franchise or right to use said streets, avenues, parkways and highways is made subject to the following conditions:

First—That the said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate its said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years with the privilege of a renewal of said grant for the further period of twenty-five years upon a fair reevaluation of the right, such reevaluation to be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railroad by itself, and not to include any value derived from the

ownership, control or operation of any other railroad, line or tracks by the grantee, its successors or assigns; provided, however, that the consent of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded on each street, avenue, parkway and highway shall be first obtained, or in lieu thereof the favorable determination of three Commissioners, approved by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, that such railroad should be constructed and operated.

Second—Upon the termination of the said franchise or right, whether original or renewed, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee in the streets, avenues, parkways and highways aforesaid, with its appurtenances; and the said plant and property shall be and become the property of the City on the termination of the grant on paying the grantee such valuation. Such payment shall be at a fair valuation of the said plant and property as property, excluding any value derived from the franchise.

Third—The mode of determining the valuations and revaluations herein provided for shall be as follows: One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railroad company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the valuations and revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least thirty days prior to the expiration of the grant, or of the renewal thereof, and their reports shall be filed with the Comptroller of the City not more than thirty days thereafter. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators; they may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigation without the presence of either party; they shall have the right to examine the books of the railroad company. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties.

Fourth—The said West Tenth Street Connecting Railway Company shall, for and during the first five years after the commencement of the operation of any portion of its railroad, annually, on November 1, pay into the treasury of the City, to the credit of the Sinking Fund thereof, three per cent. of its gross receipts for and during the year ending September 30 next preceding; and after the expiration of such five years make a like annual payment into the treasury of the City, to the credit of the same fund, of five per cent. of its gross receipts, as required by section 95 of the Railroad Law, but such percentage of gross receipts shall not be less than one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) annually for the first five years and not less than three hundred dollars (\$300) annually thereafter.

That but one fare shall be exacted for passage over the railroad constructed under this grant and over the lines of any railroad or systems operated in connection therewith, and that the fares resulting from joint business shall be divided in the proportion that the length of said railroad operated hereunder shall bear to the entire length of the railroad system or systems which shall be operated in connection therewith, and of the railroad to be constructed hereunder.

Wherever and whenever this connecting railway shall make it possible for the cars of a non-percentage paying line to operate upon the tracks of a percentage paying line, the former line shall keep a separate and accurate account of all fares collected from passengers who enter said cars upon the routes of percentage lines, and account to the City for them the same as if they had been collected on the percentage line, and to pay the same percentages thereon as is now provided by law to be paid by the company upon whose route they operate.

Fifth—The said railroad may be operated by underground electrical power substantially similar to the system of underground electrical traction now in use on the railroads in Second, Sixth, Eighth, Lenox and Madison Avenues in this city, and by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners and consented to by the owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law.

Sixth—The said railroad shall be constructed and maintained subject to the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Highways and the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies of The City of New York, in all matters with respect to which said Commissioners are respectively invested with the power of regulation and control by the Charter of said city; and the consent of the City, as owner of property bounded on West Tenth Street and on Christopher Street, is hereby given to the operation of the railroads now or hereafter constructed on said streets by the forms of motive power provided in section fifth.

Sec. 3. The said grant is also upon the further conditions, namely:

First—The said railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction, and the railroad and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the full term of this grant.

Second—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railroad shall be five cents; and said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on its road, or any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control, to any point thereon or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of The City of New York. The cars on said railroad shall be run as often as the public convenience may require.

Third—The said railroad company shall apply to each car a proper fender and wheel-guard conformably to such laws and ordinances as may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Fourth—All cars of said railroad company shall be heated during cold weather conformably to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and such cars shall be well lighted either by the Flintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fifth—In case of any violation or breach of or failure to comply with any of the provisions of this section, this grant may be forfeited by suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railroad company.

Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and expressed condition that the provisions of article IV. of the Railroad Law applicable thereto be complied with.

Sec. 5. The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side thereof free and clear from ice and snow.

Sec. 6. The said railroad company, so long as it shall continue to use any of its tracks upon said streets, avenues or public places, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of such streets, avenues and public places between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

GENTLEMEN—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 2), under the provisions of section 217 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1890, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII, of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incuring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Coupon Stock of the City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 621 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to release from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,855,000), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of so much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be able to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of the City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, in the same way from time to time, as follows: Certificates of stock of bonds or notes shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately. Proposals will be received by the Comptroller at his office, No. 285 Broadway, New York City, from the holders of six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, for extending the maturity of all or any part of the respective amounts of such stock held by them to the following dates:

- JULY 1, 1917.
JULY 1, 1918.
JULY 1, 1919.
JULY 1, 1920, and
JULY 1, 1921.

Stock so extended will be payable in gold and will bear interest from July 1, 1900, at the rate of three and three-eighths (3 3/8) per cent. per annum, payable, also in gold, semi-annually, on the first day of January and of July in each year. The Comptroller proposes to appropriate the amount of stock thus extended so that, as nearly as practicable, one-fifth of the whole amount extended shall be redeemable at each of the five maturity dates above mentioned. Preference will, as far as possible, be given to the proposals received according to priority in the date of their receipt, the proposals first received being entitled to the privilege of the longest extension period, unless such proposal shall indicate a preference for the shorter terms.
