QUARTERLY REPORT ENDING JUNE 30, 1901.

To the Board of Docks:—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my supervision and charge for the quarter ending June 30, 1901.

SOUTH RIVER.

Breakwater at Pier "A," N. R.

Under a resolution of the Board of January 16, 1900, the work of constructing a permanent breakwater south of Pier "A" has been in progress. The work is now temporarily suspended, but will shortly be resumed.

Pier, old 25, N. R.

Alterations were made in the shed and a crane erected by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company under permit of the Board.

Pier, new 25, N. R.

A resolution of the Board of June 27, 1900, authorized the extension of this pier, and the work has been completed.

Delmonico Street Section, N. R.

The wall at this section is being built by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company under permit from the Board of Docks. The north ferry slip was completed some time ago. Work on the remaining portion of the wall is in progress, substantial advancement being made. The old ferry structure has been removed and new ferry bulwarks placed in accordance with the terms of the agreement with the Pennsylvania Railroad Company. The work of setting concrete blocks in the wall has been done by the Department force for and at the expense of the contractor for the Pennsylvania Railroad Company. Filling in rear of the wall has been placed and the work is rapidly approaching completion.

Pier, new 27, N. R.

Under resolution of the Board of June 27, 1900, the outer end of this pier is being extended.

Pier, new 40, N. R.

Under resolution of the Board, December 7, 1900, the outer end of this pier is being extended.

Pier, new 45, N. R.

Repairs were made to the pier by William P. Clyde & Co. under permit from the Board.

Pier, new 47, N. R.

The shed on the outer end of the pier was extended by the Tugboat Steamship Company under permit from the Board.

Improvement in the Water-front between Pier, new 47 and Gansevoort Street.

The bulkhead at this section was practically completed for the full length of the section during a previous quarter, and during the present quarter some slight work of maintenance was done, including the removal of a ship and the erection of a fence.

Chelsea Section, N. R.

On December 28, 1899, the Board authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead-wall between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets. The work of dredging various locations has been in progress during the quarter. Piers, old 58 1/2, 59 and the Pier at the foot of Sixteenth street are being removed.

West Forty-seventh Street, N. R.

Earthfilling is being placed in this locality under orders of the Board.

Pier, West Fifty-second Street, N. R.

An extension is being built on the inner end of the pier under resolution of the Board February 8, 1901.

Pier, West Fifty-seventh Street, N. R.

An extension to the outer end of this pier has been in progress under resolution of the Board June 27, 1900.

West Fifty-ninth Street Section.

The Board, by resolution passed on the 27th of June, 1900, authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead or river wall in the vicinity of Fifty-ninth street on the North river, and the construction of a new pier at the foot of the street. Work on the wall has been in progress during the quarter. An approach is being built to the pier at the foot of Fifty-ninth street, North river.

Pier, Fifty-ninth Street, N. R.

Contract No. 592 having been awarded during the previous quarter for preparing for and building a new pier, the work was completed during the present quarter and a contract, No. 697, entered into for the construction of a freight shed on this pier. Work on the freight shed has been in progress and is approaching completion.

Claremont Section, N. R.

The Board, by unanimous resolution passed on the 16th of November, 1900, authorized the construction of a bulkhead-wall in the vicinity of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, North river. The work on this section has been begun and is well under way.

Pier at One Hundred and Thirty-first Street, N. R.

A contract, No. 704, was let for the building of a new pier at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-first street, and the work is well under way. Curb and rip-rap were deposited over the site of the pier prior to the construction of the same.

EAST RIVER.

Broad Street Section.

The Board, at a meeting held on the 22d of December, 1899, authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead-wall between Whitehall street and Pier, new 7, on the East river, and the construction of two new piers. Substantial work has been done on this section, and the bulkhead-wall is completed for a large distance of the way. Filling has been placed behind the wall, and the same will shortly be paved. The freight shed upon Pier, new 4, was completed during the quarter under Contract No. 688.

Pier, new 12, E. R.

Pier, old 15, is being removed to make way for proposed pier to be built at the foot of Wall street, and to be known as Pier 12. The contract has been prepared and will shortly be let for doing this work.

Fulton Section, E. R.

The Board, by a resolution passed on the 26th of April, 1901, authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead-wall in the vicinity of Fulton street, East river. Work on the bulkhead-wall has not yet been begun, but Pier, old 21, is being removed to make way for a proposed pier to be known as Pier 16.

Catharine Section, E. R.

The work on this section has been temporarily suspended and no work has been done during the quarter. The wall has been completed as far as practicable until further property has been required.

Market Section.

The Board, by a resolution of the 23d of February, 1900, authorized the construction of the bulkhead or river-wall in the neighborhood of Market street, and work has been in progress during the quarter. Granite has been set and about 65 linear feet of new wharfage room made.

Piers, new 29 and 30, E. R.

Piers, old 29, old 38 and old 39 were removed to make way for the construction of Piers, new 29 and 30. A contract, No. 698, for the construction of these two piers was let during the previous quarter, and work has been well under way. Pier, new 29, is rapidly approaching completion, and work on Pier, new 30, has made satisfactory progress.

Pier, new 31, E. R.

The work of constructing a new pier west of Pike slip, under Contract No. 686, was completed during the quarter.

Rogers Section.

Substantial progress has been made in the work at this section. About 155 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made during the quarter. Filling is being placed behind the bulkhead-wall.

Freight Shed on Pier, new 33, E. R.

A freight shed is being erected on Pier, new 33, East river, under Contract No. 699.

East Twenty-third Street Section.

By resolution of the Board work on this section has been divided into two parts, known as Section A and Section B. The work has been in progress in both of these divisions and about 230 linear feet of new wharfage was made during the quarter. Earth-filling has been placed behind the bulkhead-wall and is being graded. Sewer foundations are being placed at Eighteenth and Twenty-first streets, and the old ferry structures at the north side of East Twenty-third street and at the north side of East Twenty-fourth street have been removed. A portion of the marginal street has been paved. Foundation piles for a coal subway were driven and capped between the old and new bulkheads for the Consolidated Gas Company.

Recreation Ground between Seventeenth and Eighteenth Streets.

The Board, by resolution passed on the 31st of May, 1901, directed that the new-made land between these two streets be regulated and graded for use as a recreation ground. The work was begun and substantial progress has been made during the quarter.

East Thirty-eighth Street Section.

The Board, by a unanimous resolution passed on the 4th of May, 1900, authorized the construction of a new section of the bulkhead-wall in the vicinity of East Thirty-eighth street. Work has been in progress from time to time during the quarter. A pile foundation is being prepared for the tunnel outlet pipe of the General Tunnel Engineering Company at their cost and expense.

East Seventy-fourth Street Section.

The Board having authorized the construction of a section of the wall at this locality by resolution passed May 11, 1900, the work of construction has been in progress during the quarter. Concrete in mass and in bags has been placed and concrete blocks set. Granite has also been set in the wall and a total of 47 linear feet of new wharfage room made.

One Hundred and Thirty-second Street and Park Avenue, H. R.

Filling is being deposited along the water-front of these premises by Frank Buckley under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, West of Gerard Avenue, H. R.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by Jordan L. Mott under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Forty-fourth Street, East Side of Harlem River.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by John Cromwell under permit of the Board.

Third Avenue, H. R.

Extensive repairs were made to the docks and bulkheads on the North river side of Harlem river by DeBerest Bros. under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, H. R.

A pile platform has been erected south of the above street by Willson, Adams & Co. under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Fiftieth Street, H. R.

A brick structure has been erected in this locality by the Fireproofing Company under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street, H. R.

Filling is being deposited at the above premises north of Railroad avenue from time to time by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company under permit of the Board.

One Hundred and Forty-seventh to One Hundred and Fiftieth Street, H. R.

Filling is being deposited to grade between the above streets by the Metropolitan Street Railroad Company under permit of the Board.

Between Lincoln and Third Avenues, H. R.

Two coal pockets are in course of erection at the above premises by S. Trimmer & Sons by permit of the Board.

Morris Heights, H. R.

Filling is being deposited at the above premises and a retaining structure built to hold the same by the Gas Engine and Power Company and C. L. Seabury Company (Consolidated), under permit from the Board.

Broadway, Spuyten Duyvil Creek.

Filling was deposited at these premises and a retaining structure to hold the same erected by J. C. Rogers under permit from the Board.

Tibbet Street, Spuyten Duyvil Creek.
