GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Made by the Park Board, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 453 of the Laws of 1902, for the planting and cultivation of trees and vegetation in the streets of The City of New York.

1. No shade or ornamental tree or shrub shall be planted in any of the streets, avenues or public thoroughfares of The City of New York until such tree or shrub shall have been first inspected and approved by a duly appointed employee or expert of the Department and a permit granted therefor.

2. No hole or excavation shall be prepared for planting any tree or shrub unless sufficient mould of satisfactory quality shall be used and a duly appointed employee or expert of the Department shall report that the conditions, such as the absence of poisonous gas and deleterious substances, have been made satisfactory and a permit granted therefor.

3. No stem, branch or leaf of any such tree or shrub shall be cut, broken or otherwise disturbed without having been first examined by a duly appointed expert or employee of the Department and a permit granted therefor.

4. No root of any such tree or shrub shall be disturbed or interfered with in any way by any individual or any officer or employee of a public or private corporation until the same shall have been examined and a permit issued therefor.

5. The surface of the ground within three feet of any tree or shrub growing on any street, avenue or other public thoroughfare shall not be cultivated, fertilized, paved, or given any treatment whatever, except under permit granted after an inspection by a duly appointed employee or expert of the Department.

6. It shall not be lawful to attach any guy rope, cable or other contrivance to any tree or shrub, or to use the same in connection with any banner, transparency, or any business purpose whatever, except under a permit from this Department.

7. It shall not be lawful to cut, deface, mutilate or in any way misuse any tree or shrub, nor shall any horse or other animal be permitted to stand in a manner or position where it may or shall cut, deface or mutilate any tree or shrub.

8. The foregoing rules and regulations are also adopted and declared as ordinances. Any person violating the same shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall on conviction thereof before a City Magistrate be punished by a fine not exceeding \$50, or in default of payment of such fine by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days.

BOARD OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS, HUDSON DISTRICT.

At a meeting of the Board of Local Improvements of the Hudson District, held May 27, 1902, the following members were present: Aldermen Twomey and Richter and President Cantor.

The President submitted for the Board's consideration a communication from the Secretary of the Fire Department, requesting the regulating and grading of Fifty-sixth street, between Eleventh avenue and Twelfth avenue.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That, pursuant to section 433, chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, the President of the Borough of Manhattan be authorized, with the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to regulate and grade, curb and flag, Fifty-sixth street, between Eleventh avenue and Twelfth avenue.

The President submitted for the Board's consideration a petition from the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, signed by August Belmont, its President, and John B. McDonald, to wit:

To the Honorable JACOB A. CANTOR, President of the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York:

"The petition of John B. McDonald and the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company shows as follows:

"Your petitioner, John B. McDonald, by a contract made with The City of New York, acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, has undertaken to construct the public improvement known as the Rapid Transit Railroad in The City of New York, and to equip and furnish motive power for the same.

"Your petitioner, the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, is a corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York, to construct or aid in the construction and equipment of rapid transit railroads in The City of New York, and is the owner of the property hereinafter mentioned.

"The work of constructing and equipping the said Rapid Transit Railroad is a public work and it has become necessary to begin the construction of a power house for the purpose of supplying motive power, heat and light for the equipment of said Rapid Transit Railroad, and for that purpose the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company has acquired title to property in this borough, situated between West Fifty-eighth street and West Fifty-ninth street, Eleventh avenue and the Hudson river. This situation for the proposed power house was chosen because of its location near the centre of the line of the Rapid Transit Railroad, and because it was necessary that the power house should be adjacent to the river in order to obtain the large quantities of coal necessary for its operation, without transporting the same along the streets of the City. About one thousand (1,000) tons of coal per day will be required for the operation of the said power house, and a supply of coal sufficient to operate the machinery therein for a number of days must be kept at the power house in order to avoid a stoppage of the Rapid Transit Railroad in case of delay in the transportation of coal. It was essential that the situation of the power house should be adjacent to the river for the additional reason that the said power house is to contain condensing engines of a capacity aggregating about ninety thousand (90,000) horse power, which will require the use of water amounting to about sixty thousand (60,000) gallons per minute, an amount so large as to render it extremely desirable that river water be used for the purpose mentioned, instead of water drawn from the City's public water supply.

"The entire usefulness of the Rapid Transit Railroad is dependent upon the efficiency of the power house plant for its operation, and in order to secure the greatest efficiency, your petitioners desire leave to construct and maintain under surface of Twelfth avenue, at its intersection with West Fifty-eighth street, and under a portion of West Fifty-eighth street, between Twelfth avenue and Eleventh avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, certain works hereinafter described, to be used for the purpose of supplying water and coal to the said power house.

"The said works, as proposed, will include an in-take conduit and a discharge conduit for conveying river water to and from the said power house for the sole purpose of condensing the exhaust steam from the engines contained in the power house, and all water so taken from the river will be returned to the river and will be used for no other purpose than the purposes aforesaid. Both conduits will enter Twelfth avenue from the marginal street or place at the foot of West Fifty-eighth street, and the in-take conduit will extend to a point situated about forty-five (45) feet west of the westerly building line of Eleventh avenue. The discharge conduit will extend to a point situated about eighty-one feet west of the westerly building line of Eleventh avenue. Both conduits will be constructed north of the centre line of Fifty-eighth street, the discharge conduit being directly superimposed upon the in-take conduit. Both conduits will be constructed of masonry and steel, supported upon bed rock. The opening of the in-take conduit will be about nine (9) feet six (6) inches in diameter, tapering as the conduit is extended eastward to a minimum diameter of about six (6) feet. The opening of the discharge conduit will be of oval section of similar area to the opening of the in-take conduit. The centre of the opening of the in-take conduit will be located fourteen (14) feet nine (9) inches below the city datum, and the top of the opening in the discharge conduit will be located about five (5) feet below the crown of the street at the westerly line of Twelfth avenue, and about twenty-three (23) feet below the crown of Fifty-eighth street at the easterly terminal of the said discharge conduit.

"At twelve points along the route of the conduit construction it is proposed to construct 'suction wells,' connecting with the in-take conduit, the same to be provided with pipes leading from the wells into the power house. These suction wells will be constructed of masonry with a vertical opening five (5) feet four (4) inches in diameter, at the top of which it is proposed to have a forty-two (42) inch manhole with a frame and iron cover placed flush with the sidewalk.

"The said works will also include, and we also ask permission to construct and maintain a coal conveyor runway underneath the surface of Fifty-eighth street for conveying coal from the pier at the foot of Fifty-eighth street to the power house. This proposed runway will be situated between the in-take conduit above described and the northerly building line on Fifty-eighth street, or the extension of same, and will extend from a point in Fifty-eighth street about five hundred and fifty (550) feet west of the westerly line of Eleventh avenue along Fifty-eighth street to the westerly line of Twelfth avenue, thence through the marginal street or place to the pier. The runway will be about twelve (12) feet four (4) inches in width, with a height of about seven (7) feet; the ceiling of the passage to be maintained at a uniform depth of about two (2) feet six (6) inches below the curb level. It will be constructed of masonry and steel supported from bed rock. The necessity for this coal conveyor runway arises

from the fact above stated, that about one thousand (1,000) tons of coal per day will be required for the operation of the machinery in the power house, and it will be observed that as the proposed situation of this coal conveyor runway is underground, the necessity for either an unsightly structure above the street, or the public inconvenience resulting from carting through the street the large quantities of coal necessary for the operation of the power house machinery will be avoided. Permission to construct so much of this coal conveyor runway as lies under the sidewalk in Fifty-eighth street has already been duly granted, so that, in so far as the proposed runway is concerned, this application relates only to so much thereof as is proposed to be constructed under and across Twelfth avenue.

"Submitted herewith as part of this application, is a plan showing the location of such parts of the proposed works as are east of the westerly line of Twelfth avenue and within your jurisdiction. The in-take conduit is indicated upon the plan by cross hatched lines of green; the discharge conduit by cross hatched lines of blue and the coal conveyor runway by cross hatched lines of red.

"Your petitioners, therefore, pray that you appoint a time for a meeting of the Local Board and submit this petition to the said Local Board in order that proceedings may be initiated to construct the works above described, for the uses and purposes of the public works now in course of construction under and in pursuance of chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891, and acts supplementary thereto and amendatory thereof.

Appeal No. 168 of 1902, Fireproof Shutter Case No. 13 of 1902, premises No. 56 Wall street, Henry Palmer, Esq., architect and appellant.

Referred to Chief Croker for examination and report on the 17th instant. On presentation of report, and on motion duly made and seconded, appeal was denied.

Appeal No. 177 of 1902, Fireproof Shutter Case No. 14 of 1902, premises Nos. 113 and 115 Bank street, Magnolia Metal Company, appellant.

On motion duly made and seconded, referred to Chief Croker for examination and report.

Appeal No. 178 of 1902, Alteration No. 250 of 1902, The Bronx, premises north side of One Hundred and Sixty-first street, about 150 feet from the northwest corner of Melrose avenue, Gustav Schwartz, Esq., architect and appellant.

Present building is 18 by 25 feet and known as a brick basement and one-story frame structure. Basement floor is about 9 feet below curb level. House must be removed on account of One Hundred and Sixty-first street widening.

The proposed structure as altered is within the limit of the law, except that front extension is 4 feet 6 inches wider than present building, for which part I ask for a modification of the law, that said 4 feet 6 inches could be taken to front extension in width, as they are very essential for proper size of rooms as shown on filed plans.

It is a one-family house, occupied by owner.

We respectfully request that Objection No. 2 be waived, the proposed extension being practically a bay window, for which the construction adopted would be legal.

Part II. of the appeal was withdrawn by the Superintendent of Buildings.

To allow the span of beams to exceed 26 feet where shown, in front and rear.

To permit the rear inclosing at third story of steel angle and Ts filled in between with 3-inch terra cotta blocks covered with galvanized sheet iron, said inclosing being non-supporting and a maximum of light being desired.

Appeal No. 182 of 1902, Alteration No. 894 of 1902, Commercial Cable Building, Nos. 18 and 20 New street; George B. Post, Esq., architect and appellant.

Application is made for a modification of the law so as to allow the outside wall of the toilet room to be constructed of angle and T-iron frame work, covered on the outside with No. 12 plate iron, all filled in with 4-inch fireproof blocks as specified under the original application; this form of wall for its position and object being as fireproof and as effective as that required by the Building Code. The object being to gain the greatest amount of space conditions possible in the toilet room, and to decrease the weight.

This appeal is practically a reconsideration of Appeal No. 127 of May 17, 1902, and is filed for the reason that the Superintendent of Buildings seems to have been misinformed as to the height of the building in question, including the proposed addition, also regarding the amount of roof space covered by my penthouse and the proposed addition. He was probably misled by the drawings filed, which from the exterior would indicate a continuous thirteenth story. The front walls with the terra cotta balustrade surmounting it is carried up to the same height all around the building on the avenue and street sides for architectural and ornamental effect. This gives the appearance to the eye of a complete additional story, whereas, as a matter of fact, a portion of the roof is on the twelfth story and another portion on the thirteenth story. Even should the present application be granted, a portion of my roof 16 feet in width will remain on the twelfth story, so that this addition does not constitute a complete additional story.

In regard to the height of the building, its actual height from the curb to the top of the roof beams of the proposed extension is exactly 148 feet 10 inches. I have personally checked up this distance with a steel tape, so that I can personally vouch for its accuracy. It is possible that the Superintendent of Buildings in giving you the height has included the terra cotta balustrade on top of the roof.

It is proposed to make this addition perfectly fireproof.

This addition is intended to be used exclusively for a sun parlor and sitting room, and not for any other purpose. It is too far removed from the service elevator to be used for dining purposes; in fact, I would give a bond that it would not be used for dining purposes.

Mr. Maitland E. Graves appeared before the Board.

On motion, duly made and seconded, denied.

Appeal No. 187 of 1902, New Building No. 1336 of 1901, premises Broadway, Fifth avenue, Twenty-second street and Twenty-third street, George A. Fuller Company, appellants.

We wish to lay before the Board a plan we desire to adopt for show windows on the first story of the Flatiron Building. Objection 11 by the Bureau of Buildings has been made on account of extension on the north end of building not being constructed of masonry of the lawful thickness.

We would respectfully ask your consideration of the fact that this extension is nothing more than a show case, and is the only means we can see to utilize our property at the extreme point.

This projection is only about 13 feet 6 inches high and is to be constructed entirely of fireproof material, iron, plaster, tile and metal roof.

We understand that the Superintendent of Buildings does not find anything in the Building Code covering just this proposition, and does not wish to assume the responsibility of establishing a precedent.

From our point of view we cannot see anything objectionable to the construction we desire to make, and we hope you will see your way clear to allow us to carry out the plan as submitted.

Mr. W. R. Ellington appeared before the Board.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 188 of 1902, New Building No. 368 of 1902, premises southwest corner of Stanton street and Suffolk street, George Fred. Pelham, Esq., architect and appellant.

To omit the portions of the interior brick partition walls at front and rear section, where span between bearing walls exceeds 26 feet, and to substitute a 9-inch, 21-pound steel girder at these sections spanning one room.

To build and continue the wall on at these sections would interfere and encroach on the area space of the rooms as required by the Tenement House Act; the plan of rooms as arranged are so figured that each room contains the lawful amount of floor area. It would be a hardship to be compelled to build a wall, as same would necessitate a complete rearrangement of rooms.

It is proposed to provide a fire stop at the centre of the building (front and rear), running fore and aft as follows: Partitions of 3-inch burnt clay blocks, also an additional fire stop of 3-inch burnt clay partition between the bathrooms of the two inside apartments (at light court).

Further, the above mentioned girders are provided with angles bolted on each side of same for the support of the wood floor beams, and the ends of the wood beams where the same butt up against the girders to be incased with tin.

Mr. George Kaiser appeared before the Board.

On motion, duly made and seconded, denied.

Appeal No. 189 of 1902, Alteration (no number, Brooklyn) 1902, premises Nos. 9 and 11 Elm place, Brooklyn, Francis H. Kimball, Esq., architect and appellant.

To allow the six story building to be carried to a height of 82 feet 6 inches from the average curb height to the highest point of roof beams, for the following reasons:

This building is an extension to the main building, and is to be carried to substantially the same height as the main building.

The new extension building is separated from the main building by a heavy brick wall, and the openings in same, being generally only two in number on each floor, are each provided with fireproof automatic sliding doors.

In many respects this building is built better than the Code provided for a six story building, which would be under ordinary circumstances within the height of 75 feet.

The central line of columns is tied at each floor level by steel beams extending from each column to each of the side walls.

The more than usual height of stories, the three lower being 15 feet each, the fourth being more than 14 feet, and the fifth being more than 13 feet, and the top story being 11 feet, makes this a safer building in the event of fire than would be the case if six stories were kept within the limit of 75 feet.

As it is necessary to build this extension building to the height proposed to make it available as regards the floor levels with the main building, and as the general construction is superior to the Code requirements for a six-story building, it kept within a total height of 75 feet, I respectfully ask for the favorable action of your Honorable Board to this petition.

Mr. Francis H. Kimball appeared before the Board. On motion, duly made and seconded, laid over. Adjourned.
