The following communication was received from Justice Gerard B. Van Wart, relative to a lease of premises in Avon Hall, on Bedford avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the Second District Municipal Court:

June 17, 1902.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—As the lease of the room used for this court expires on the 1st of November next, I respectfully request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund not to rehire these premises for the use of this court for the following reasons:

The premises are badly located in the district, being on the extreme northerly end thereof, whereas the district extends in a southerly direction about four or five miles. The court room is also inconveniently located, because of the necessity for taking two lines of cars to get to the court room from some portions of the district. The rooms are in nowise fitted for court use. They are located on the second story of a tenement house, the partitions between two tenements being knocked out for the purpose of getting the room large enough for the use of the court. The ceilings are low, the hallways and stairways narrow and the room is ily ventilated. Surface cars and the elevated railroad pass the door, making a noise, so that at times it is impossible to hear witnesses and others in the court. The building has heretofore been condemned by the Building Department and had to be shored up by posts through the court room, being condemned by the Board of Health, as not affording sufficient air space for the number of people who frequent the court, and for very many other reasons is extremely undesirable for court purposes.

I would respectfully request that you hire in place thereof premises known as No. 1217 Bedford avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, which premises are centrally located in the court district, are surrounded by streets paved with asphalt pavement, are easy of access by direct lines of cars from all parts of the district. The room to be used as a court room there is a large, airy room, with high ceilings, heretofore used as a dance hall. The building is also heated with steam heat. The lower portion of the building is now hired by the City and used for the purposes of a public library. The premises referred to can be obtained for the small rental of \$1,800 per year, including heat.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—In addition to the letter heretofore addressed to the Sinking Fund Commissioners, requesting that premises at No. 1217 Bedford avenue, Brooklyn, be hired for the use of the Second District Municipal Court, Borough of Brooklyn, I submit herewith, in tabulated form, a summary of arguments in favor of hiring such premises.

I am informed that the Civil Service Commissioners have been negotiating for the use of the premises at No. 1275 Bedford avenue, on one day each week, at a rental of fifty dollars per day. If these premises be hired for the use of the court, the court business can be so regulated as to permit the Civil Service Commissioners to use the premises one day each week, and, if necessary, every evening, which joint use would, of course, result in a net saving to the City of about twelve hundred dollars.

I am informed also that the owner of these premises has been negotiating with other persons for rental of the premises, and that therefore it is very desirable that speedy action be taken on the part of the Sinking Fund Commissioners, if at all.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report:

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Referring to the communication of Hon. Gerard B. Van Wart, Justice of the Municipal Court of The City of New York, Second District, Borough of Brooklyn, requesting the lease of premises known as No. 1217 Bedford avenue for court purposes, in place of Nos. 794 and 796 Broadway, I would report as follows:

I have caused an examination to be made of the proposed premises and find them located on the second floor of the brick building known as Avon Hall, situated on the east side of Bedford avenue, near the corner of Halsey street. The lot on which the building stands is 60 feet by 82 feet, slightly irregular in shape. Assessed valuation, \$24,000.

The first floor is now leased by the City for the use of the Brooklyn Public Library, at \$1,800 per annum. On the second floor there is a large hall, 58 feet by 58 feet, with a 30-foot ceiling, and two small rooms, 12 feet by 24 feet and 12 feet by 12 feet, in all about 4,118 square feet of floor space. Above the smaller rooms there is a gallery, and again above this another floor containing three or four small rooms.

In an interview with the agent, Mr. William H. Wray, No. 1237 Bedford avenue, I learn that he would not be willing to consider a lease of these premises for \$1,800 per annum with steam heat, for so short a term as one year.

There appears to be no doubt that the present location of the Second District Municipal Court, at Nos. 794 and 796 Broadway, Brooklyn, is most undesirable, and the accommodations there are quite inadequate, but suitable quarters are to be provided on Gates avenue, near Tompkins avenue, on the site of the old Ninth Precinct Station House, as soon as the building thereon is remodeled and equipped.

The President of the Borough of Brooklyn has applied for an appropriation of \$38,000. On June 6, 1902, the plans and specifications were referred to, and are now

in the hands of the Municipal Art Commission. The work will be completed within six months after the contracts are awarded.

It does not appear, therefore, to be advisable or necessary to make any temporary change in the location of the court, when permanent quarters are so soon to be provided.

The lease of premises at Nos. 794 and 796 Broadway, Brooklyn, expired November 1, 1901, and has not been renewed. The owner, August Grill, has made demand in writing for the rent, now due, and I would advise that the same, therefore, be renewed for one year from November 1, 1901, on the same terms, viz., \$1,000 per annum.

It might be well to transmit a copy of Judge Van Wart's letter and of this report to the Municipal Art Commission, in order to show the necessity of early action upon the plans submitted, so that the work of reconstruction of this building may be proceeded with at the earliest possible time.

Lease of premises in Avon Hall approved.

Justice Van Wart appeared before the Board and was heard at length in regard thereto. He stated, among other things, that he was informed that the Municipal Civil Service Commission were negotiating for the temporary hiring of these premises, and that if the Board decided to authorize the lease, the court business can be so regulated as to permit the Civil Service Commissioners the use of the premises one day each week, and, if necessary, every evening.

With this understanding the Mayor offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City, from James Stanley Connor, of the second floor of the brick building known as Avon Hall, Nos. 1217, 1219 and 1221 Bedford avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the Second District Municipal Court, for a term of one year from November 1, 1902, at an annual rental of eighteen hundred dollars (\$1,800), payable quarterly, the rent to include steam heat; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter, and

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby assign the above-mentioned premises as the place where the Second District Municipal Court shall be held.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution to renew lease for one year from November 1, 1901, of premises occupied by the Second District Municipal Court, at Nos. 794 and 796 Broadway, Borough of Brooklyn:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City, from August Grill, of the entire second floor and space in the basement, as now occupied, of premises Nos. 794 and 796 Broadway, Borough of Brooklyn, occupied by the Second District Municipal Court, for a term of one year from November 1, 1901, at an annual rental of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), payable quarterly, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease—the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Board of Elections relative to a lease of premises at Nos. 112 and 114 West Forty-second street, Borough of Manhattan:

NEW YORK, JUNE 9, 1902.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of New York City:

SIRS—By direction of the Board of Elections of The City of New York I herewith transmit the following resolutions adopted by the Board at its session this day, with the request that favorable action may be taken thereon at an early date.

Resolved, That the Board of Elections of The City of New York lease from the James McCreery Realty Corporation of The City of New York, through the proper authorities, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of said City, for the uses and purposes of a general office for the Board of Elections and a branch office for said Board for the Borough of Manhattan, as provided for and authorized by section 11, subdivision 2, paragraph 1, chapter 95, Laws of 1901, for a term of four years and ten months from July 1, 1902, at an annual rental of seven thousand five hundred dollars, payable in quarterly installments on the first days of August, November, February and May, the entire second floor of the building in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, situate on the southerly side of Forty-second street between Sixth avenue and Broadway, extending through to Forty-first street and known as Nos. 112 and 114 West Forty-second street, and Nos. 107 to 117 West Forty-first street, being fifty feet wide on Forty-second street, seventy-five feet wide on Forty-first street and two hundred feet in depth from street to street, more or less, and containing about ten thousand square feet floor space. The lessor corporation to cause at its cost and expense the said floor to be divided, in accordance with the plans submitted, by partitions of wired glass and fire-proof material into twelve rooms and two halls, with the requisite glass-paneled doors and fanlights to same; also to provide the wash basins, water closets and urinals indicated on said plan and to furnish all necessary heat, light, water, elevator and janitor service, and keep the said premises and appurtenances at all times in a cleanly and tenable condition for the use and occupancy thereof by the lessee and its employees. The rent to commence when the premises are ready for occupancy.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York be and hereby are requested to approve of the leasing of said premises for the purposes and on the terms and conditions above stated.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report:

June 19, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Referring to the resolution of the Board of Elections of The City of New York, adopted June 9, 1902, requesting approval by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of a lease of premises on the south side of Forty-second street, in the Borough of Manhattan, I would report as follows:

The Board of Elections are at present occupying offices on the third floor of the Police Headquarters, No. 300 Mulberry street, and No. 301 Mott street, which

the Commissioners claim are very inadequate for the requirements of the business transacted by the Board.

The floor space there offered is but 6,688 square feet, which includes 2,112 square feet used in common with the Police Department, and 2,220 square feet in the basement of the building.

The Commissioners of Election desire that they may be given due notice of the consideration of this matter, by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in order that they may present in person, the reasons which, in their judgment, render this proposed change advisable and necessary.

I have caused an examination to be made of the premises described in said resolution, and find that they consist of the entire second floor of the new fire-proof structure known as the "Halter Building," on the south side of West Forty-second street, between Sixth avenue and Broadway, extending through to the north side of West Forty-first street, having a frontage of fifty feet on West Forty-second street and seventy-five feet on West Forty-first street.

The accompanying diagram shows the sub-division of the floor space, as planned by the Board of Elections, and which the lessor has agreed to have made, at an alleged estimated cost and expense of \$5,000.

There being about 10,000 square feet of floor space, and the rental asked being \$7,500, the rate per square foot per annum would be about 75 cents, which, considering the character of the building, its location and the accommodations furnished, I regard as fair and reasonable.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly consent to approve of a lease from the James McCreery Realty Corporation of the City of New York for the uses and purposes of a general office for the Board of Elections of the City of New York, and a branch office for said Board for the Borough of Manhattan, from the date of occupation and when alterations are completed, until May 1, 1907, at an annual rental of \$7,500, payable quarterly, on the 1st days of November, February, May and August in each year, of the entire second floor of the "Halter Building," Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, situate on the southerly side of West Forty-second street, between Sixth avenue and Broadway, extending through to Forty-first street, and known as Nos. 112 and 114 West Forty-second street and Nos. 107 to 111 West Forty-first street, being 50 feet wide on Forty-second street, 75 feet wide on Forty-first street, and 97 feet and 6 inches in depth from street to street, the lessor corporation to cause, at its own cost and expense, the said floor to be divided, in accordance with the plans submitted, by partitions of wired glass and fireproof material, into twelve rooms and two halls, with the requisite glass paneled doors and fanlights to same; also to provide the wash basins, water closets and urinals indicated on said plan, and to furnish all necessary heat, light, water, elevator and janitor service, and to keep said premises and appurtenances at all times in a cleanly and tenable condition for the use and occupancy thereof by the lessee and its employees, the rent to commence when the premises are ready for occupancy.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be, and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from the James McCreery Realty Corporation of the City of New York, of the entire second floor of the building, situated on the southerly side of West Forty-second street, between Sixth avenue and Broadway, extending through to Forty-first street, and known as Nos. 112 and 114 West Forty-second street, and Nos. 107 to 111 West Forty-first street, for the use of the Board of Elections, for a term from the date of occupation and when alterations are completed until May 1, 1907, at an annual rental of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500), payable quarterly, on the first days of August, November, February and May, in each year; the lessor to cause at its own cost and expense the said floor to be divided, in accordance with the plans submitted, by partitions of wired glass and fireproof material, into twelve rooms and two halls, with the requisite glass paneled doors and fanlights to same; also to provide the wash basins, water closets and urinals indicated on said plan, and to furnish all necessary heat, light, water, elevator and janitor service, and to keep said premises and appurtenances at all times in a cleanly and tenable condition, for the use and occupancy thereof by the lessee and its employees; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller moved that when the Board adjourns, it adjourns to meet at 11 o'clock a. m., on Tuesday, July 1, 1902.

The following communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to the lease of the franchise for a ferry from the foot of West One Hundred and Thirtieth street and Manhattan street to the foot of Dempsey avenue, in Edgewater Borough, Bergen County, New Jersey (see page 328):

New York, June 19, 1902.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—I transmit herewith, for the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, a lease of the franchise for a ferry from the foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street and Manhattan street, in The City of New York, over and across the waters of the Hudson or North river, to and from Dempsey avenue, in Edgewater Borough (formerly Ridgefield Township), Bergen County, in the State of New Jersey, together with the wharf property belonging to the City assigned to be used in connection with and for the purpose of said ferry, as shown on the plan accompanying the form of lease, for a term of twenty-five years. Said lease to commence as soon as practicable after the adoption of a resolution by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the execution and delivery of the lease, the rental for said franchise and wharf property to be \$5,500 per annum for the first ten years, payable quarterly in advance, and the rental for the balance of the term.

The facts in relation to this lease were made the subject of a communication to the Sinking Fund Commissioners on April 9, 1902, to which I respectfully beg to refer you.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance:

June 19, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir—Under date of April 9, 1902, the Commissioner of Docks submitted a proposition to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to lease to the Riverside and Fort Lee Ferry Company, without public letting, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of the amended Greater New York Charter, certain land at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirtieth street and Manhattan street, in The City of New York, and the franchise to operate a ferry between such point to the foot of Dempsey avenue, Edgewater Borough, N. J.

Under date of April 23, 1902, I reported upon the proposition, and made a recom-

mendation that the company should pay 5 per cent. of the gross receipts annually for the first 10 years, which, in no case, should be less than the sum of \$5,500, fixed as a minimum by the Commissioner of Docks, for the use of wharf property, and a reappraisal of the value of the wharf property and franchise to be made at the end of the first 10 years, and a second reappraisal at the end of the second 10 years; such reappraisal shall provide for a rental of not less than \$5,500 per annum.

The Commissioner of Docks, in a communication under date of June 19, 1902, now submits an amended form of lease, in which is incorporated the terms recommended, and the lease as presented now contains the following covenants:

1. Riverside and Fort Lee Ferry Company to surrender the existing lease, expiring June 1, 1905.

2. Wharf property now consists of 210 feet of bulkhead, being 105 feet northwardly and 105 feet southwardly from the centre line of One Hundred and Thirtieth street.

3. Right to run a ferry.

4. Term, 25 years; first term of 10 years, 5 per cent. of gross receipts, not less than \$5,500 per annum; second term of 10 years, and third term of 5 years, re-valuation to be made, but not less than \$5,500 per annum.

5. Payments quarter-yearly in advance; that when 5 per cent. of gross receipts shall exceed the sum paid as rent for that year, such excess shall be added to the sum due for rent on the next quarter.

6. Statement of receipts, duly verified, to be made to the Commissioner of Docks on the first day of February in each year.

7. Build and maintain all ferry structures, fixtures, etc., at cost of lessee.

8. The lessee to keep wharf property dredged, leaving ten feet of water at mean low water.

9. The lessee to maintain wharf property in good repair, and, in case of damage, to restore same.

10. The lessee to be responsible for all damage to any person or persons on the property.

11. The right of the City to enter on the property for the purpose of improvement, and all structures erected by lessee to be removed within sixty days.

12. The lessee to maintain a ferry house and steam ferry boats for the transportation of passengers, carriages, wagons, goods, merchandise, etc., and make so many trips as the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries shall require, but in no case less than two trips daily in any season of the year.

13. Boats to be provided with fire pumps and hose, and to attend at fires when required; the City to pay the sum of \$20 for each and every hour the boat is so engaged.

14. To comply with all laws and ordinances now in force or hereafter to be made.

15. Rates not to exceed those now in force on the present ferry from One Hundred and Thirtieth street, New York City, to Edgewater, N. J., the schedule of which is annexed to the lease.

16. To remove from the premises at the end of the lease.

17. Not to assign or sublet without consent.

18. The lease not to interfere with any previous grants or right to grant future ferries.

19. For non-payment of rent, the City may re-enter, and lease cease.

In this form, I am of the opinion that the lease may be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The Commissioner of Docks was present and participated in the discussion which followed.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution:

Whereas, Section 826 of the Greater New York Charter provides that the Commissioner of Docks shall have power and is authorized to lease in the name of and for the benefit of The City of New York, in the manner provided by law, the franchise of any ferry or ferries belonging to said City for the highest marketable price or rental, at public auction or by sealed bids, and always after public advertisement and appraisal under the direction of said Commissioner, but not for a term longer than twenty-five years, nor for a renewal for a longer term than ten years; and

Whereas, It is further provided in said section that whenever it may be determined by the unanimous vote of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks, that the interests of the City will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of a ferry in the manner in said section thereinbefore directed, it shall be lawful for said Commissioner of Docks and said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by resolutions adopted by such unanimous votes, to lease such franchises by private agreement for terms not exceeding twenty-five years and under such conditions as, in their judgment, will best protect and further the interests of the City and the traveling public; and

Whereas, Under date of May 16, 1902, the Commissioner of Docks has recommended that the interests of the City will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of the ferry from and to the foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street and Manhattan street, in The City of New York, over and across the waters of the Hudson or North river, to and from Dempsey avenue, in Edgewater Borough (formerly Ridgefield Township), Bergen County, in the State of New Jersey, together with the wharf property belonging to The City of New York assigned to be used in connection with and for the purposes of said ferry, at public auction or by sealed bids, and after public advertisement and appraisal, under the direction of said Commissioner of Docks; now therefore be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by unanimous vote, determine that the interests of The City of New York will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of the hereinbefore mentioned ferry at public auction, as provided in section 826 of the Greater New York Charter; and it is further

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by unanimous vote, hereby approve of and authorize a lease to the Riverside and Fort Lee Ferry Company of a franchise to operate a ferry from and to the foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street and Manhattan street, in The City of New York, over and across the waters of the Hudson or North River, to and from Dempsey avenue, in Edgewater Borough (formerly Ridgefield Township), Bergen County, in the State of New Jersey, together with the wharf property belonging to The City of New York assigned to be used in connection with and for the purposes of said ferry, namely: The wharf property at the foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, and extending 105 feet northwardly, and also 105 feet southwardly from the centre line of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, both measurements being made at right angles to said centre line, upon the following terms and conditions:

1. Riverside and Fort Lee Ferry Company to surrender the existing lease, expiring June 1, 1905.

2. Wharf property now consists of 210 feet of bulkhead, being 105 feet northwardly and 105 feet southwardly from the centre line of One Hundred and Thirtieth street.

3. Right to run a ferry.

4. Term, twenty-five years; first term of ten years, 5 per cent. of gross receipts, not less than \$5,500 per annum; second term of ten years, and third term of five years, revaluation to be made, but not less than \$5,500 per annum.

5. Payments quarter yearly in advance; that when 5 per cent. of gross receipts

shall exceed the sum paid as rent for that year, such excess shall be added to the sum due for rent on the next quarter.

6. Statement of receipts, duly verified, to be made to the Commissioner of Docks on the first day of February in each year.

7. Build and maintain all ferry structures, fixtures, etc., at cost of lessee.

8. The lessee to keep wharf property dredged, leaving ten feet of water at mean low water.

9. The lessee to maintain wharf property in good repair, and in case of damage, to restore same.

10. The lessee to be responsible for all damage to any person or persons on the property.

11. The right of the City to enter on the property for the purpose of improvement, and all structures erected by lessee to be removed within sixty days.

12. The lessee to maintain a ferry house and steam ferry boats for the transportation of passengers, carriages, wagons, goods, merchandise, etc., and make so many trips as the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries shall require, but in no case less than two trips daily in any season of the year.

13. Boats to be provided with fire pumps and hose, and to attend at fires when required; the City to pay the sum of \$20 for each and every hour the boat is so engaged.

14. To comply with all laws and ordinances now in force or hereafter to be made.

15. Rates not to exceed those now in force on the present ferry from One Hundred and Thirtieth street, New York City, to Edgewater, New Jersey, the schedule of which is annexed to the lease.

16. To remove from the premises at the end of the lease.

17. Not to assign or sublet without consent.

18. The lease not to interfere with any previous grants or right to grant future ferries.

19. For nonpayment of rent the City may re-enter and lease cease.

And be it further

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Docks is hereby authorized and directed to execute this lease when approved by the Corporation Counsel.

mendation from the Committee on High Schools and Training Schools that four rooms be hired in McCaddin Hall, Berry street, near South Third street, Brooklyn, for use as an annex to the Eastern District High School, Borough of Brooklyn.

The matter has been investigated and the building in question found to be fire-proof, the rooms selected being in the front of the building, two on the first floor, one on the second and one on the third, also a room in the basement for pupils' closets. The rooms on the second and third floors can be divided to form two rooms each, and thus six good-sized class rooms will be afforded. The rental asked, \$2,000 per year, including light, heat and janitor's services, is considered reasonable.

In view of the necessity for school accommodations in this vicinity, your committee would recommend that the request of the Committee on High Schools and Training Schools be granted, and the following resolution is submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby requested to authorize a lease to be executed of four rooms in the front part of the building known as McCaddin Hall, Berry street, near South Third street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Eastern District High School (two on the first floor, one on the second and one on the third); also one room in the basement and the use of the auditorium one morning each week, for one year from date of occupancy, at an annual rental of \$2,000, including light, heat and janitor's services. Owners, Sts. Peter and Paul's Church, Brooklyn.

SIR—On June 18, 1902, the Board of Education adopted the following resolution: "Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby requested to authorize a lease to be executed of four rooms in the front part of the building known as McCaddin Hall, Berry street, near South Third street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Eastern District High School (two on the first floor, one on the second and one on the third); also one room in the basement and the use of the auditorium one morning each week, for one year from date of occupancy, at an annual rental of \$2,000, including light, heat and janitor's services. Owners, Sts. Peter and Paul's Church, Brooklyn."

The building known as McCaddin Memorial Hall, situated on the west side of Berry street, near South Third street, is a modern (erected 1897) fireproof structure, about 60 feet by 150 feet, used as a parochial school by Sts. Peter and Paul's Church. Father Belford, residence No. 69 South Third street.

It contains on the second and third floors an auditorium capable of seating 850 persons. On the first floor in the rear are the class rooms of the parochial school.

The four rooms selected by the Board of Education for the use of the Eastern District High School, Borough of Brooklyn, comprise the entire front portion of the building with the exception of the space occupied by the entrance thereto.

The rooms on the second and third floors are each 18 feet 6 inches by 54 feet, access thereto being obtained by a broad double stairway. The two on the first floor, being to the right and left of the entrance, are each 18 feet 6 inches by 20 feet 6 inches. These four rooms afford a total of about 2,772 square feet of floor space, giving a rate per annum of about 70 cents per square foot. The room in the basement is ample in size to accommodate closets for the pupils.

I am of the opinion that the terms proposed are reasonable and just, and that the proposed lease may properly receive the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—In a communication bearing date May 31, 1902, the Brooklyn Public Library, by its secretary, R. Ross Appleton, Esq., transmits to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Sinking Fund Commission be requested to make a lease with the owners of the building occupied by the Bay Ridge Branch of the Brooklyn Public Library at the rate of \$200 per annum, the same to date from November 1, 1900, and to continue two and one-half years."

The Bay Ridge Branch is located on the northeasterly corner of Second avenue and Seventy-third street, in the Thirtieth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, being known as lot 16 in block 966 on the assessment map of said ward, with an assessed valuation of \$4,000.

The premises consist of a two-story brick building about 35 feet by 60 feet on a lot 40 feet by 100 feet. The building was specially planned and designed for a library; is heated by steam and lighted by gas. The title to said premises is in the name of The Bay Ridge Free Library, a corporation, William H. Thomas, President; James W. Lane, Secretary.

This corporation on or about December 14, 1900, by resolution of the Board of Directors, formally transferred to The City of New York all its right, title and interest in said property, together with about 7,000 volumes, to become a part of the Brooklyn Public Library system, to be known as the Bay Ridge Branch.

The Brooklyn Public Library thereupon by resolution of its Board of Directors formally accepted the same on or about December 18, 1900. The transfer of the real estate, however, has not as yet been fully consummated, as the Corporation Counsel, in an examination of the title, disclosed a mortgage thereon for the sum of \$4,000, held by the South Brooklyn Savings Institution, and unpaid interest thereon from November 1, 1900.

The City of New York being unable to take title to the property with the incumbrance of this mortgage upon it, and there being no provision of law whereby the same could be paid and discharged, and the interest on the same being now in arrears, it has been deemed advisable to enter into a lease with the "Bay Ridge Free Library" at a nominal rent, sufficient to provide for the payment of the interest on said mortgage.

The South Brooklyn Savings Institution has made several demands in writing on the Comptroller for the payment of the arrears of interest due on the mortgage, and has served notice that proceedings will be taken to foreclose the same unless the interest is paid.

In order, therefore, to avoid the occurrence of any such contingency, and to give time for such proceedings to be instituted as will enable The City of New York to take title to the property, I would recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize and approve of a lease of the premises on the northeast corner of Second avenue and Seventy-third street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the Brooklyn Public Library, from "The Bay Ridge Free Library," a corporation, for a term of two and one-half years from November 1, 1900, at the rate of

\$300 per annum, lessee to furnish light, heat and janitor service and make all repairs to the building.

Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Queens Borough Library, held May 4, 1902, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the offer of the Hollis Association of two rooms be accepted and that Sinking Fund Commission be requested to authorize a lease of premises at Hollis, L. I., at an annual rental of \$400 per annum, including heat and janitor service, rental to run from date of occupancy."

This resolution is transmitted in a communication, bearing date May 23, 1902, from Miss J. F. Hume, Librarian, who further states:

"1. The name of the owner and lessor is the Hollis Association (a corporation).
"2. The term of the lease is for three years, with the privilege of renewal, or for a shorter term, if the Sinking Fund Commission cannot make lease for long term; we (owner) prefer long terms, however, as the rooms have been arranged in the new building with special reference for library purposes.

"3. The lessor will put plumbing and heating in repair, all internal repairs, if any, to be made by lessee, no alterations to be made without written consent of lessor.

"4. Owner will pay water rent.

"5. Lease to begin June 1, 1902.

"6. Owner pays for and supplies heat and janitor service, light to be supplied by tenant from separate meter."

I have caused an examination to be made of the premises and find that they consist of two connecting rooms on the first floor of a two-story frame building now being erected, located on the southeast corner of Fulton street (Hempstead and Jamaica plank road) and Iroquois avenue, Hollis, Borough of Queens, and to be known, when completed, as "Hollis Association Hall."

The Hollis Association is a private corporation, of which B. J. Farner is President and F. W. Scutt, Secretary.

The building is about 47 feet by 65 feet, and the first floor is being arranged to accommodate the Hollis Branch of the Queens Borough Library, the office of the Association, the apparatus of the Volunteer Fire Department, and a meeting room.

On the second floor there is to be a large audience room and a suite of smaller connecting rooms, to be used for assembly purposes.

The two rooms on the first floor, which it is represented have been arranged with special reference for library purposes, appear to be most desirable, so far as location and accommodations are concerned. Their dimensions are 12 feet by 18 feet each, together affording 432 square feet of floor space, giving a rate of about 90 cents per square foot per annum.

These terms I consider as full, if not excessive, but upon a conference with the Hollis Association, it has agreed to accept \$360 per annum, instead of \$400.

Lease to be dated July 1, 1902, but the Queens Borough Library to have possession on completion of the rooms, which it is expected will be in about ten days.

I would therefore recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize and approve of a lease from "The Hollis Association" of two rooms in the building known as The Hollis Association Hall, situate on the southeast corner of Fulton street and Iroquois avenue, at Hollis, Borough of Queens, for the use of the Queens Borough Library, for a term of three years from July 1, 1902, with the privilege of renewal at the rate of three hundred and sixty dollars (\$360) per annum, payable quarterly; lessor to furnish heat and janitor service and to pay water rent; City to pay for light used as indicated by separate gas meter. All internal repairs, if any, to be made by lessee, no alterations to be made without written consent of lessor.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance and offered the following resolution relative to a renewal of the lease of premises occupied by the Fire Department, on Third avenue, near White Plains road, Williamsbridge, Borough of The Bronx:

June 9, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. Thomas Sturgis, Commissioner, Fire Department, in a communication bearing date May 24, 1902, received in this office May 28, 1902, requests the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize a renewal of the lease from Michael Brennan of premises occupied by that Department, situated on the northerly side of "Third street," Williamsbridge, Borough of The Bronx, for a period of one year from June 1, 1902, at annual rental of \$420, payable quarterly, otherwise on the same terms and conditions as are contained in the existing lease thereof.

The lease of these premises was made in 1895 by the Village of Williamsbridge for a term of three years. It has been renewed by The City of New York from year to year up to June 1, 1902, but no report thereon has heretofore been made by me.

I find upon examination that the premises are situated on the northerly side of Third avenue (called Third street in previous applications), about 200 feet east of White Plains road, in the former Village of Williamsbridge. They consist of a two-story frame building, 27 feet by 60 feet, on a lot 30 feet by 114 feet.

While the building was specially built to accommodate a volunteer fire company, with its apparatus, I am informed that it was never actually occupied or used for such purpose. When the Fire Department of The City of New York took possession, there being no water, gas or sewer connections in the building, the building was utilized as a storage place only, and has since continued to be so used.

The Commissioner states verbally that it is unsuitable for any other purpose, but that it will be urgently needed by the Department for storage until a new fire house, to be built on White Plains road, between Juliana street and Olin avenue, is ready for occupancy.

I am of the opinion that the rental asked, viz., \$420 per annum, is full, if not excessive, the building being without water, gas or sewer connections, but as the same is urgently required by the Fire Department, and as the City is now holding over, previous renewal having expired on June 1, 1902, I would recommend that the Commissioners of The Sinking Fund authorize and approve of a renewal of the lease for a period of one year from June 1, 1902, at an annual rental of \$420, payable quarterly, otherwise on the same terms and conditions as are contained in the existing lease.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City, from Michael Brennan, of premises occupied by the Fire Department situated on the northerly side of Third avenue, about 200 feet east of White Plains road, in the former Village of Williamsbridge, Borough of The Bronx, for a term of one year from June 1, 1902, at an annual rental of four hundred and twenty dollars (\$420), payable quarterly, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease—the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund

deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance relative to a request of the Armory Board for an amendment to resolution authorizing a lease of premises on Bathgate avenue, Borough of The Bronx, for the use of the Second Battery, N. G., N. Y.:

June 12, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Armory Board, at meeting held June 9, 1902, adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Armory Board hereby recommend the acceptance of the proposal of Rev. Peter Farrell, and requests the concurrence of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in an authorization of a lease to the City of the premises on the west side of Bathgate avenue, 76.93 feet south of Tremont avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, together with a two-story brick building, to be erected thereon, 108 feet front x 129 feet 8 inches deep, for the use of the Second Battery, N. G., N. Y., for a term of three years, with the privilege of one or more years' renewal at a reasonable increase, from year to year, commencing from the date of the completion of the proposed building, plans for which have been exhibited and approved by the Commanding Officer of the Battery, at an annual rental of three thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,750), payable quarterly."

On April 3, 1902, I reported on a resolution adopted by the Armory Board at meeting of March 20, 1902, to rent the above-described premises for a term of two years, with a two years' further privilege from year to year, commencing June 1, 1902, at an annual rental of \$3,750. In said report I stated that I considered the rental just and reasonable, and at meeting held April 7, 1902, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized a lease upon the terms and conditions stated in resolution of the Armory Board of March 20, 1902.

In communication of April 18, 1902, from Rev. Peter Farrell, he states that the terms of the lease must be four years. I advised this communication to be forwarded to the Armory Board, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on May 2, 1902, referred the matter to the Board, and I presume this resolution, adopted by the Armory Board at meeting held June 9, 1902, is the result of Rev. Peter Farrell's communication under date of April 18, 1902.

I would call your attention to a portion of said resolution—
"for a term of three years, with the privilege of one or more years' renewal, at a reasonable increase, from year to year."

In my opinion, this is entirely indefinite, for if the resolution was approved, and a lease authorized on the terms and conditions proposed, the question would naturally arise, if it is decided to renew the lease after the three years, what is a reasonable increase?

Therefore, I would suggest that the matter be returned to the Armory Board, with a request to state definitely the terms and conditions of the proposed lease.

"Resolved, That the bid of Capiello & Hazell, No. 11 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for materials and labor required in the erection and completion of the proposed sheet pile bulkhead, platform, excavating and filling for the Second Battalion Naval Militia, N. G., N. Y., to be erected on the Upper Bay, extending from Fifty-first to Fifty-second street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, amounting to fifteen thousand nine hundred dollars, be accepted as being the lowest bid for said work, and that the same be submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their concurrence, and to the Comptroller for his approval of the sureties thereon, and when so approved, the Chairman of this Board be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of this Board."

I have obtained, and inclose herewith, the five bids submitted, in compliance with the advertisement duly made in the "City Record," as follows:

By resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at its meeting April 25, 1902, the Comptroller was authorized to issue, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 212 of the Laws of 1898, Corporate Stock in the manner provided by section 160 of the amended Greater New York Charter, to the amount of \$16,000, the proceeds to be applied to the payment of the expenses aforesaid.

The law has been entirely complied with.

SIR—Hon. George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel, in a communication bearing date June 2, 1902, requests that some of the unoccupied rooms in the Park Row Building may be assigned for the use of the Law Department for the storage of records and old papers.

He states that the Record Room in his office, which is only 20 feet by 25 feet, is becoming seriously overcrowded, so much so, that it is almost impossible for the clerks to move about and to get at papers, as they are required. He suggests that rooms in the Park Row Building, which are leased by the City and not at present in use, might be spared for the purpose, they being convenient to the main office and in a fireproof building.

All the rooms in the Park Row Building now under lease, and for which no application has been made, were on May 23, 1902, turned over to Mr. W. T. Goundie, Collector of City Revenue, to sublet for the benefit of the City. Two of these rooms on the sixteenth floor, known as Nos. 1618 and 1619, together containing about 355 square feet of floor space, and having a rental value of \$540.25, I am advised by Mr. Andrew T. 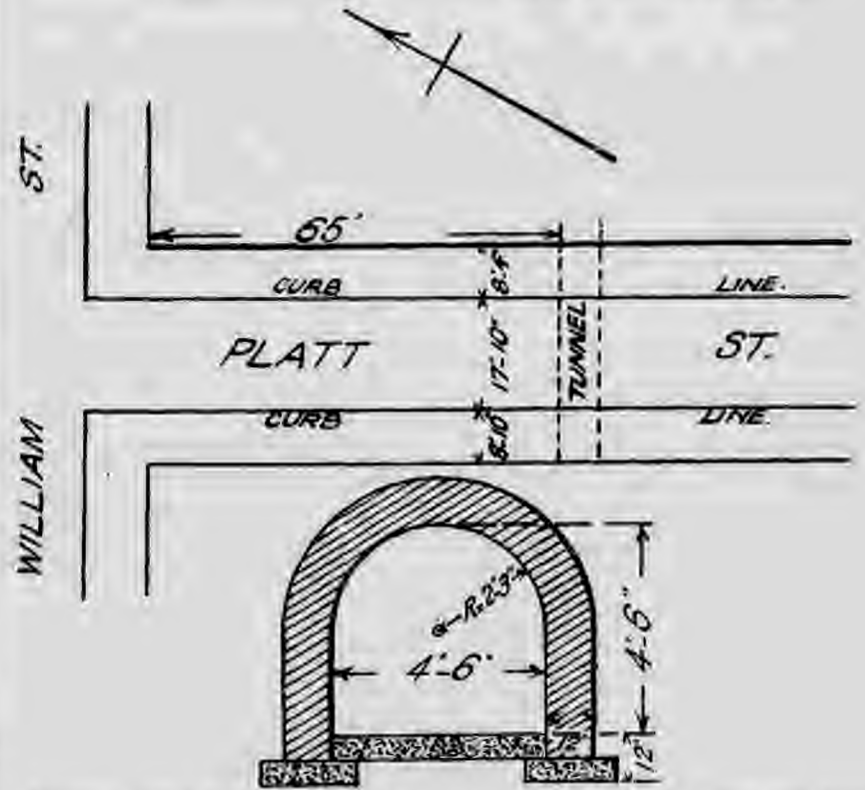
SIR—The Board of Aldermen by resolution adopted May 13, 1902, received from his Honor the Mayor, May 27, 1902, without his approval or disapproval thereof,

therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it, permission is given to the Woodbridge Company, a corporation of No. 100 William street, in the Borough of Manhattan, to construct and build a brick tunnel or passageway through and under Platt street, adjacent to and between the premises of said company at the southeast corner of Platt and William streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, and the building on the opposite side of Platt street, to wit, on the northeast corner of said Platt and William streets, as shown on the diagram on file with the President of the Borough of Manhattan, said tunnel to be constructed of brick and cement, to be of interior dimensions of four feet six inches in width by six feet in height and the top of same to be not less than four feet six inches below the surface of Platt street, as the same now stands, provided the company shall stipulate with the President of the Borough of Manhattan to save The City of New York harmless from any loss or damage to any sewer, gas or water pipe or from any other cause that may arise from the exercise of the privilege hereby conveyed, during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work of constructing said tunnel and subject to such compensation as may be determined by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

In reply I would report that it is proposed to locate the tunnel or passageway under the surface of Platt street, 65 feet southeasterly from William street (see accompanying diagram). The distance between curb lines at this point is 17 feet, 10 inches, and the outside width of the tunnel is 6 feet, 6 inches; therefore, the space occupied is (6 feet, 6 inches by 17 feet, 10 inches) or 115 9-10 square feet, and at \$1.25 per square foot, will make the annual rental \$144.87.

I would therefore advise a charge of \$144.87 per annum for the privilege and \$25 for opening the street.

They stated that they were not opposed to the regulating and grading as now contemplated, providing 75 per cent. of the cost and expense was borne by the City at large and 25 per cent. by the property deemed to be benefited.

After President Haffen had explained the matter, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of The Bronx; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board, not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the "City Record" that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where there would be a meeting of this Local Board, at which the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Board, which time was not less than ten days after the publication of this notice; and

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same and give a full hearing thereon; now therefore be it

Resolved, By the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, Borough of The Bronx, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter X of the Greater New York Charter, that the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

For regulating and grading, setting of curbstones and flagging of sidewalks a space eight feet wide, laying of crosswalks, building approaches and erecting guard rails where necessary, building retaining walls, laying drains with basins, etc., constructing masonry arch at One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, macadamizing the side driveways and paths, and work incidental thereto on the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, from East One Hundred and Sixty-first street to Mosholu parkway, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board hereby recommends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen that the said Boards shall determine that seventy-five per cent. of the cost and expense of said work shall be borne and paid by the City of New York, and twenty-five per cent. of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

Resolved, That copies of these resolutions be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval, and also to the Board of Aldermen for its approval.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
