BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

(PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.)

A meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was held on the 20th day of June, 1901, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, in the old Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall, Borough of Manhattan.

Present—The Mayor, Comptroller (Deputy Comptroller Stevenson), President of the Board of Aldermen, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Brooklyn (Commissioner of Public Works Redfield), President of the Borough of The Bronx, President of the Borough of Queens and President of the Borough of Richmond.

Commissioner Redfield presented the following authorization:

REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

The hearings in the matters of determining what proportion of the assessment for various street and park opening should be borne by The City of New York, were laid over for one week.

REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON PUBLIC PLACE AT ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-THIRD STREET AND MORRIS AVENUE, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT FOR OPENING EAST ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTY-SECOND STREET, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

OPENING PARK IN FOURTEENTH, FIFTEENTH AND SEVENTEENTH WARDS, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

LAND FOR BLACKWELL'S ISLAND BRIDGE.

REDUCTION OF ASSESSMENT ON ELM STREET, BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The above matters were laid over for one week.

OPENING PUBLIC PARK IN FOURTH WARD, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Alderman Bridges presented the following petition, and spoke in favor of acquiring the land for the proposed park in the Fourth Ward:

Whereas, The following ordinance has been adopted by the Council of The City of New York, on November 26, 1901, by the Board of Aldermen of said City, on December 17, 1901, and approved by the Mayor of said City on December 30, 1901:

AN ORDINANCE to lay out a new street and a public park in the Fourth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn.

Be it Ordained, by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

That, in pursuance of section 436 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 13th day of November, 1901, be and the same hereby is approved, viz.:

Resolved, That the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378, Laws of 1897, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by the laying out of a new street between Bridge street and Jay street, and of a public park, bounded by Bridge street, Tillary street, Jay street and the northerly line of the said new street, and the closing and discontinuing of all streets, places and courts within the boundaries of the said park, in the Fourth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to lay out said new street and park and close the aforesaid streets, as follows:

"A"—Locating and Laying Out "Street."

The northern side-line of street between Bridge street and Jay street is 130.54 feet southerly from and parallel to the southern side-line of Chapel street.

The southern side-line of street is 30 feet from and parallel to the northern side-line of street.

"B"—Locating and Laying Out "Park."

Beginning at a point in the western side-line of Bridge street distant 130.54 feet southerly from the southwestern side-line intersection of Chapel street and Bridge street;

1st. Thence southerly along the western side-line of Bridge street to the northern side-line of Tillary street;

2d. Thence westerly along the northern side-line of Tillary street to the eastern side-line of Jay street;

3d. Thence northerly along the eastern side-line of Jay street to a point distant 130.54 feet southerly from the southeastern side-line intersection of Chapel street and Jay street;

4th. Thence easterly along the northern side-line of street to the point of beginning.

"C"—Closing and Discontinuing.

Stryker's alley to be closed.

Hennesey place to be closed its entire length.

Harper's court to be closed its entire length.

Lawrence street to be closed from Hennesey place to the northern side-line of Tillary street.

Whereas, The said street to be closed from Hennesey place to the northern side-line of Tillary street.

Whereas, The said resolution only provides for the alteration of the map or plan of The City of New York, and approves of same so as to lay the said street in part and close the aforesaid streets, and does not authorize any appropriation for same

or the initiation of any condemnation proceedings to acquire title to the property covered by said ordinance.

Now, the undersigned, residents of the Fourth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, respectfully petition that the necessary funds be appropriated for the said improvement, and that the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York be directed to institute the necessary condemnation proceedings herein, on the ground that the said improvement is proper and needed in this locality, and on the further ground that the property involved by this improvement is in many respects rendered unproductive to the owners thereof by reason of the delay in acquiring title by the city.

On motion of the Mayor the matter was referred to the Chief Engineer to consult with the Engineer of the Bridge Department in regard to the approach to the Williamsburg Bridge, which touches the proposed park.

LAYING OUT WILLINK ENTRANCE TO PROSPECT PARK, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The Engineer reported that he had been told by the Corporation Counsel that the Board had the right to modify the proposed plan without further advertising.

The following resolutions were then adopted:

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board, held on the 9th day of May, 1902, resolutions were adopted proposing to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by locating and laying out an addition to Prospect Park, and closing and discontinuing certain streets, for the construction of an approach to the Willink Entrance to Prospect Park, in the Twenty-ninth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a meeting of this Board to be held in the old Council Chamber (Room 16), City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, on the 23d day of May, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m., at which meeting such proposed laying out and closing would be considered by this Board, and for a notice to all persons affected thereby, of the aforesaid time and place at which such proposed laying out and closing would be considered, to be published in the "City Record" and the Corporation newspapers for at least ten days continuously, exclusive of Sundays and legal holidays, prior to the 23d day of May, 1902; and

Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record, and of the publishers of the Corporation newspapers, that the aforesaid resolutions and notice have been published in the "City Record" and the Corporation newspapers for ten days continuously, Sundays and legal holidays excepted, prior to the 23d day of May, 1902; and

Whereas, At the aforesaid time and place a public hearing was given to all persons affected by such proposed laying out and closing who have appeared, and such laying out and closing was duly considered by this Board; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by locating and laying out an addition to Prospect Park, and closing and discontinuing certain streets, for the construction of an approach to the Willink Entrance to Prospect Park, in the Twenty-ninth Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to locate and lay out the said approach, as follows:

I.—Locating and laying out of addition to Prospect Park.

Beginning at the intersection of Flatbush avenue and Malbone street, as the same are laid down on the map of the City;

1. Thence northerly along the eastern line of Flatbush avenue for 477.28 feet, more or less, to the southern line of east side lands;

2. Thence easterly along the southeasterly line of east side lands for 763.55 feet, more or less, to the western line of Washington avenue;

3. Thence southerly for 1,050.79 feet, more or less, along the western line of Washington avenue to the northern line of Malbone street;

4. Thence westerly along the northern line of Malbone street for 341.82 feet to the point of beginning.

II.—Closing and discontinuing of Washington place, and a street north of Washington place, as the same are laid down between Washington avenue and Flatbush avenue.

Resolved, That the foregoing resolution, approving of the above-named proposed change in the map or plan of The City of New York by locating and laying out an approach to the Willink Entrance to Prospect Park, adopted by this Board, together with a statement of its reasons therefor, be transmitted to the Board of Aldermen for its action thereon.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—A resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, passed on May 8, 1902, provides for altering the map or plan of The City of New York by changing

the grade of Nostrand avenue, between Malbone street and Flatbush avenue. The proposed changes occur at two different places, one extending from Malbone street to Hawthorne street, a distance of eight short blocks, and the other from Ditmas avenue to Flatbush avenue, covering three blocks.

Both of these changes are proposed in order that the legal grades may be made to conform with the present surface as partially improved and built upon. The street is also occupied by a double track surface railroad.

I can see no objection to the proposed changes, but believe that if they are not made it will be necessary to compensate the present owners for damage when the surface improvement is carried out.

3. Thence southerly to the intersection of Lincoln road, the elevation to be 52.5 feet;
4. Thence southerly to the intersection of Maple street, the elevation to be 53.5 feet;
5. Thence southerly to the intersection of Midwood street, the elevation to be 54.45 feet;
6. Thence southerly to the intersection of Rutland road, the elevation to be 55.5 feet;
7. Thence southerly to a point distant 80 feet northerly from the north side line of Fennimore street, the elevation to be 56.2 feet;
8. Thence southerly to the intersection of Fennimore street, the elevation to be 55.7 feet;
9. Thence southerly to the intersection of Hawthorne street, the elevation to be 54.75 feet, as heretofore.

Beginning at the intersection of Nostrand avenue and Ditmas avenue, the elevation to be 21.6 feet, as heretofore;

1. Thence southerly to a point distant 282 feet from the southern side line of Ditmas avenue, the elevation to be 24.0 feet;
2. Thence southerly to the intersection of Avenue F, the elevation to be 21.5 feet.
3. Thence southerly to the intersection of Avenue G, the elevation to be 24.6 feet;
4. Thence southerly to the intersection of the centre line of Nostrand avenue with the northeastern curb line of Flatbush avenue, the elevation to be 22.8 feet.

All elevations refer to mean high water datum as established by the Department of Highways, Borough of Brooklyn.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—I return herewith the resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, passed on May 8, 1902, providing for altering the map or plan of The City of New

York by changing the grade of Rogers avenue, between Malbone street and Flatbush avenue.

The actual changes occur at two different places between the limits above named, and to avoid confusion, two different plans, profiles and technical descriptions have been prepared. One of these changes covers four blocks, between Maple and Hawthorne streets, while the other extends from Beverly road to Avenue F, a distance of five blocks.

Not only can I see no objection to making the changes, which simply legalize the present surface of the street as improved and built upon, but I believe that were these changes not made before the street is improved there would be claims for damage by the abutting property owners.

I submit herewith two separate plans and technical descriptions, with resolutions providing for a public hearing.

3. Thence southerly to a point distant 100 feet from the southern side line of Rutland road, the elevation to be 59.0 feet;
4. Thence southerly to the intersection of Fennimore street, the elevation to be 58.48 feet;
5. Thence southerly to the intersection of Hawthorne street, the elevation to be 57.72 feet, as heretofore.

Sir—The accompanying resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, passed on May 8, 1902, proposes to alter the map or plan of The City of New

This change is necessitated by the fact that a modification of the grades of both Rogers and Nostrand avenues at the crossing of Rutland road is proposed, and these changes make necessary the one proposed in this resolution.

SIR—The accompanying resolution of the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, initiates proceedings to open Brooklyn avenue, between Canarsie lane and Paerdegat Basin.

This opening is asked for in order that the sewer may be constructed for a portion of the distance, and I would recommend that the action of the Local Board be approved. The petition of Henry Lewis Morris respectfully shows to this honorable Board—

That East One Hundred and Fifty-third street, between Mott avenue and the yards of the New York and Harlem Railroad, is the only direct westerly approach to the bridge over the tracks of the said railroad;

That the westerly terminus of One Hundred and Fifty-third street, between Mott avenue and the yards of the New York and Harlem Railroad, abuts on the southerly end of Cedar Park, which park extends about 1,500 feet to the north and about 500

feet to the west, this street thus forming the only means of direct access to said park for the populous district lying to the east of Railroad Avenue East;

That this street forms the only southerly outlet to Sheridan Avenue;

That the grade of this street was fixed to meet the requirements of these several public improvements, to the great detriment of the property of your petitioner abutting thereon, which property is left from ten to twenty-five feet below the surface of said street;

That the property of your petitioner has been assessed for alleged benefit the sum of \$14,630.91;

That the opening of this street was made necessary by reason of the construction of said bridge over the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad, and this street so opened is in fact a bridge approach. The cost of acquiring title to land for bridge approach purpose should be borne by The City of New York;

That the retaining wall supporting said street is built up to the house line of the abutting property, by reason of which fact the said property is denied areaway privileges; that said retaining wall is constructed of cut stone, is firmly cemented and is surmounted with a coping rising about ten inches above the surface of the sidewalk; the entire structure is built on the plan of a bridge approach, and is in no respect erected in accordance with the usual plan of a retaining wall for street purposes;

That said street is a part of, and completes the general plan for a bridge and approaches over the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad, which was authorized by chapter 650 of the Laws of 1897, by virtue of which the Comptroller of The City of New York was authorized to issue bonds to meet the cost of the construction of said bridge;

That on June 25, 1897, the Board of Street Opening and Improvement adopted a resolution to open East One Hundred and Fifty-third street, from Mott avenue to the yards of the New York and Harlem Railroad, which resolution provided that the entire cost and expense of the proceedings to open said street be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

Your petitioner therefore earnestly prays that the said resolution of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement be rescinded, and that a resolution be adopted by your honorable Board that the entire cost of acquiring title to East One Hundred and Fifty-third street, from Mott avenue to the yards of the New York and Harlem Railroad, be borne and paid by The City of New York.

Sir—In the matter of the application of Henry Lewis Morris, of April 22, 1902, through Thos. S. Bassford, his attorney, for relief from the payment of any portion of the damages assessed against him by reason of the opening of East One Hundred and Fifty-third street, between Mott avenue and the yard of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad, I beg to report that East One Hundred and Fifty-third street has been both opened and improved by regulating, grading and paving and by the erection of a viaduct across the railroad yard. All of these improvements, excepting the street opening, have been paid for by the issue of City bonds, the property being entirely relieved from those charges which in ordinary cases would be levied directly upon it. It is true that adjoining property is left below the street grade, but this can in no sense be considered as exempting it from its proportionate charges for improvements.

In improving the street to secure an approach to the viaduct, a stone retaining wall was built, which does encroach upon the areaway, but this is entirely legal and in no way depreciates the value of the fronting property. The retaining wall can be removed to whatever depth may be necessary when the lots are brought to grade.

It seems to me that the property owners on East One Hundred and Fifty-third street have been treated most generously in having this street made for them at the public expense. I do not recommend any action in this case.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The accompanying resolution of the Local Board of the Williamsburg District provides for the construction of sewers in Quay street, from the East river to West street; in West street, from Quay street to North Fifteenth street; in North Fifteenth street, from West street to Engert avenue; in Engert avenue, from North Fifteenth street to Humboldt street; from Russell street to North Henry street, and in Wythe avenue, from Norman avenue to North Fifteenth street.

The proposed building of this sewer is the result of many complaints received, not only from citizens, but from the Department of Health and the Department of Street Cleaning. It will follow what was once Bushwick creek, the filling in of which has been under way for some years, but it cannot be completed until the proper surface drainage is provided. The Health Department predicts serious trouble during warm weather if this sewer cannot be built, and there is no question as to the present necessity for the improvement.

Concerning the legal status of the streets to be traversed, I would state that Quay street is open and paved; for West street, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn has submitted copies of easements signed by Frank Cunningham and Roswell Eldridge, as individuals and attorneys for all other owners. "A perpetual easement in, to and over said land, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and keeping in repair the said sewer, etc." A similar easement has been obtained, and a copy

is hereto attached, covering North Fifteenth street, between West street and Nassau avenue; the portion of North Fifteenth street, east of Nassau avenue, is within the limits of the new park, proceedings to acquire which are now under way, and the accompanying reports indicate that the plan of building a sewer within the lines of this park meets with the approval of the Sewer Bureau and the Commissioner of Parks.

Engert avenue is opened and improved and proceedings have already been instituted for the opening of Wythe avenue. It would appear, therefore, that the way is clear for proceeding with this improvement and I would recommend that a contract be authorized.

The estimated cost of the improvement is \$75,000, while the assessed value of the property within the probable area of assessment is \$3,510,805. The resolution recommends that the City at large pay one-half of the cost. This is unusual, and while it might be fair in this case, it might establish a dangerous precedent.

SIR—I return herewith the plan of Sewerage District No. 9, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Queens, known as the "Ingleside" District, a resolution to lay out which was adopted by the Local Board of the Jamaica District, of the Borough of Queens, on February 25, 1902, the resolution being accompanied by a letter from the President of the Borough giving the estimated cost of the construction of the sewer and the assessed value of the property within the probable area of assessment, together with the statement that the system will consist of about eight and one-half (8½) miles of pipe sewer and three (3) miles of brick sewer, while the number of acres to be drained by it is 1,200.

If I correctly understand the intent of the resolution it is simply to establish a drainage system, and not to authorize the construction of any portion of the sewers contained therein. The map which is presented shows the street lines on a large part of the area and the elevations of the present surface at most of the intersections. So far as I have been able to learn, these street lines have never been established by competent authority for any part of the proposed district, excepting only the Ingleside section, a street plan of which was approved by the Board of Public Improvements on May 29, 1901. The section so mapped is centrally located and at no point touches the proposed boundary line of the district, though its name is applied to the entire area; neither does there appear to be any record showing that the street grades have ever been adopted in any part thereof.

It is impossible to intelligently consider a plan for a drainage district, unless the street grades shall have been determined in advance and shown upon the plan. The grades and the surface elevations should also be indicated a little beyond the proposed limits of the drainage district.

The plan before the Board shows sewers of specified size in most of the streets, and its adoption would mean not only the creation of a sewer district, but the approval of the detailed plans for draining that district. I would therefore recommend that the whole matter be referred back to the President of the Borough until such time as a street plan shall have been made and adopted and grades for the various streets shall have been fixed.

SIR—The accompanying resolution of the Local Board of the Newtown District, passed on January 29, 1902, provides for the grading, curbing and flagging of Second avenue, from Flushing avenue to a point 380 feet above Potter avenue; for the curbing and flagging of Park place, from Woolsey to Potter avenue; the grading, curbing and flagging of Woolsey avenue, from Second avenue to Park place, and the laying of crosswalks at Woolsey, Pleasure and Potter avenues.

I find that the streets that it is proposed to improve are laid down on the Map of Long Island City, filed in the office of the Clerk of the County of Queens, and that deeds of cession have been given and recorded for nearly all that part of Second avenue covered by the improvement, all of Park place and all of Woolsey avenue. The portion of Second avenue not covered by the deed of cession is included in the proceedings now under way to open Second avenue, or De Bevoise street, as it was formerly known, and is named in the proceedings, from Jackson avenue to Ditmas avenue. SIR—In the matter of constructing a sewer in Ninth avenue, between Woolsey and Potter avenues, in the First Ward, of the Borough of Queens, which was recommended by resolution of the Local Board of the Newtown District on March 25, 1902, I beg to report as follows:

There is no record of the street having been legally opened between the limits effected, which comprise only one block, but there are several marks of dedication to the public use, the street having been shaped and partially flagged and curbed, there are a large number of houses on the block, a water main is indicated by the presence of three fire hydrants, and a gas main by five lamp-posts, which have been capped, and one arc lamp is now maintained by the City. I am further informed by local officials that the street has probably been open to the public for at least fifteen years.

The Chief Engineer of Sewers states that the sewer now in use is a private one, but that there is an outlet with a public sewer on Woolsey avenue. The resolution calls for the construction of all house connections which are not already made to the private sewer now in use. As the assessment would undoubtedly be uniform throughout the block, this discrimination would appear to inflict an unnecessary expense upon owners of vacant property and upon improved property which has already been provided with sewer connections. I would, therefore, recommend that the resolution be returned to the President of the Borough of Queens, to be modified, by the omission of the work making house connections, or the form of the resolution changed so as to permit the assessment of each lot for any connection which may be made in front of it, and so that the opinion of the Corporation Counsel may be obtained concerning the legal status of the street.

DEAR SIR—I beg to call your attention to the fact that at a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held April 11, 1900, page 1310, said Board passed a resolution directing the certification of the maps and the filing of the same in the offices of the Register, the Corporation Counsel and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, showing the laying out on the map of the City of an approach to the Willis Avenue Bridge, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York. These maps were filed, as directed in the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on May 4, 1900.

Nothing as yet had been done to acquire title to the land necessary for said approach, and it appears that although on November 9, 1900, the Board of Public Improvements passed a resolution requesting that proceedings be instituted to acquire title to said real estate hereinbefore mentioned and described as authorized under chapter 284 of the Laws of 1900, no proceedings as yet have been instituted, and no application has yet been made by the Corporation Counsel for the purpose of carrying into effect this resolution of the Board of Public Improvements.

I would earnestly request that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment do now forthwith direct the Corporation Counsel to institute the necessary legal proceedings for the purpose of acquiring title to the land already laid out on the map for the approach to the Willis Avenue Bridge from the Southern Boulevard, and would request that said Board take immediate action thereon.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
