## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

*Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at their Office, No. 207 Stewart Building, on Tuesday, July 1, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m.*

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Power and Windolph.

The minutes of stated meeting of June 24, 1902, were read and approved.

The President verbally stated that he had transmitted to the Mayor a copy of the following communication of the Chief Engineer, relative to the progress of work at the New Croton Dam:

NEW YORK, June 26, 1902.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, June 20, I would report as follows:

Rock excavation for widening the spillway channel at its lower end was continued during the week.

The work of clearing away the blasted masonry at the core wall, running south, and on the wing wall was also in progress. The total amount of debris removed from both core wall and wing wall up to June 20 was in the neighborhood of 1,500 cubic yards, of which approximately 400 cubic yards were removed during the week.

Earth excavation in the side hill at the south end of the dam continued night and day with the steam shovel, a new cut having been started and partially completed above elevation 100 feet and running from above through the core wall to the down stream side. The total amount of material removed from the hillside by the steam shovel was about 12,500 cubic yards up to June 20, of which approximately 4,300 cubic yards were removed during the week.

Preparations were nearly completed to start excavation work at the top of the south end slope, near Gate House No. 1.

The masonry work continued with three gangs working on the north end of the main dam, which were distributed as follows:

One gang between Stations 5-1-90 and 6-1-30, and  
Two gangs working between Stations 8-1-50 and 9-1-40.

The average daily force employed on the dam proper and in the quarry was about 300 men.

NEW YORK, June 26, 1902.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—On June 23, 1902, a gauging of the water flowing in the New Croton Aqueduct was made at Shaft No. 18 $\frac{1}{4}$ , showing that the average depth of water was 9 58-100 feet, and the quantity flowing was 250,245,000 gallons per day. On the same day the reported depth of water in the aqueduct at Croton Lake gate house was 10 feet and 2 inches. On the following day, June 24, Division Engineer Watkins went to Croton Lake gate house and found the depth of water in the aqueduct to be 10 feet 6 inches.

SIR—My engagements are such that I can only occasionally be present at the meetings of the Aqueduct Commission. In the meanwhile, I am exceedingly interested in the progress of the work at the Croton Dam. I need not point out to you how important it is that this dam should be completed as early a day as possible, nor how great is the danger of delay involved in the changes of construction authorized not long ago. I shall be obliged, therefore, if you will give instructions to have sent to me weekly, a report of the work actually done, in two parts: (1) Towards the completion of the stone work of the dam already under way, and (2) as to the demolition of the core-wall and the work of replacing it. If these reports could be accompanied by dated photographs, I should be pleased. I want the contractors to

understand that I am personally interested in noting the progress of the work, from week to week.

GENTLEMEN—In accordance with the direction of the Aqueduct Commissioners to make a complete inspection and survey of the work at the Muscoot Dam at regular intervals, the Acting Chief Engineer in a communication (Report No. 382) dated June 16, 1902, reported that he had made a thorough inspection and survey of the work at said dam, and had found the work in about the same condition as previously reported, with a slight indication of improvement; that there was ample room for additional energy on your part, and that your plant was inadequate.

I desire to call your attention to these facts, and to request that you take immediate steps to provide a sufficient and adequate plant and the number of men necessary for the proper conduct of the work of building the Muscoot Dam, and that the progress of the work be facilitated by you in every way possible.

On presentation of report of Chief Croker, and on motion, duly made and seconded, denied.

Appeal No. 205 of 1902, New Building No. 380 of 1902, premises northeast corner of Spring and Sullivan streets, M. Bernstein, architect and appellant.

It is proposed to put up steel girders in front and rear portions of building where span exceeds 26 feet, and have 4-inch-thick hollow fire clay partitions underneath same and around bedrooms, where shown in red color on plans, ends of wooden beams will be inclosed in metal, doors in fireproof partitions will be made fireproof.

Mr. Bernstein appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 206 of 1902, New Building No. 159 of 1902, premises No. 14 East Sixtieth street, Raleigh C. Gildersleeve, Esq., architect and appellant.

First—To allow the construction of a pent house upon the roof of said structure without conforming to section 105 of the Building Code as to fireproofing of buildings over 150 feet or twelve stories in height.

2d. To permit the front (north) wall of said pent house to be constructed of 4-inch terra cotta blocks built in between angle iron uprights, and covered with galvanized iron, for the reason that said wall does not face upon any street, court or party line and is fully as good as a 12-inch brick wall, which would impose an unnecessary load upon the steel frame below.

Mr. R. Gildersleeve appeared in explanation.

On motion duly made and seconded, denied.

Appeal No. 207 of 1902, New Building No. 369 of 1902, premises No. 49 Beekman street, Horgan & Slattery, architects and appellants.

It is desired to build the walls of the building with thicknesses according to the requirements of section 31 of the Building Code, and not section 32, upon the ground that the building, being intended for a fire-engine house, is above the first story nothing more than a dormitory, and cannot properly be classed as a stable, as the upper floors are not intended for horses.

On motion duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 208 of 1902, New Building No. 359 of 1902, premises east side of Broadway, from Eighty-fifth to Eighty-sixth street, Harry B. Mulliken, architect and appellant.

It is desired to place a pent house on the roof of the building in question, covering about one-fifth of the area of the roof, without having this pent house considered as a complete extra story.

The construction of this pent house to be as follows: All walls surrounding the pent house will be carried up to their proper height; floor will be made of cement; wire glass will be used wherever glass is necessary; proper skylights will be provided; all work for the window frames, sash, doors, trim and base of the pent house will be thoroughly fireproof; the highest point of the roof will not exceed 150 feet from the curb level; all woodwork entering into the construction of the pent house will be fireproofed by the process which is fully accepted and approved by the Bureau of Buildings; the entire pent house will be constructed absolutely fireproof.

Inasmuch as the highest point of this building will be kept within the 150 foot limit, and the percentage of roof area covered by pent house is small, I respectfully ask that this case be considered by your honorable Board and the modification as above set forth be granted.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 209 of 1902, New Building No. 356 of 1902, premises Nos. 346-352 West Seventeenth street, Cyrus L. W. Eiditz, architect and appellant.

To omit additional line of stairs from first story to roof, for the following reasons:

A. That the building is designed for a telephone exchange, a couple of stories of which are to be used for the repairing of instruments, and should not come under the classification mentioned in section 75 of the Building Code.

B. The building is strictly fireproof. The stairs and elevators are inclosed in fireproof partitions, with metal covered doors and trim. Two fire lines, with hose and other auxiliary fire apparatus will be provided. An automatic sprinkler system is also included in the protection against fire.

C. That the building will not contain a large number of people, and as planned is adequately provided with stairs, and an additional flight would not be of any particular advantage.

D. An outside stairs or fire escape will be provided.

Mr. W. B. Bamford appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 210 of 1902, Alteration (no number), Brooklyn, premises northeast corner of Bushwick avenue and Himrod street, William A. P. Schmidt, architect and appellant.

Can the part of the proposed extension between the present building and the building line on Himrod street be built of frame construction, as per plans.

Mr. W. A. P. Schmidt appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved.

Appeal No. 211 of 1902, New Building No. 910 of 1902, premises southeast corner of Park avenue and Waverly avenue, Brooklyn, Henry C. Van Cleef, architect and appellant.

The non-bearing wall to be built 12 inches in thickness above second tier of girders. The piers on side and Waverly avenue front of building to be built 1 foot 8 inches thick on third story and 1 foot 4 inches thick on fourth story. Considering that building does not exceed 60 feet in height, that brick work will be laid in mortar, Rosendale cement one part, lime one part and sand three parts, and that Goetz box anchors, with covers, will be built in piers for girder bearings, the Board is hereby petitioned to approve the amendments.

Mr. Henry C. Van Cleef appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved, on condition that the walls be built in cement and sand mortar.

Appeal No. 212 of 1902, New Building No. 300 of 1902, premises northeast cor-



ner of Brown place and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, Borough of The Bronx, C. F. Kruse, architect and appellant.

In this building it is proposed to run two iron girders to carry floor beams; there will be a fireproof partition separating the apartments, not alone for the span 26 feet, but the entire length to the fireproof halls, making each apartment separate, and dividing it so that each is shut off by a fireproof partition. As this construction is fully as good as a brick wall, the beams being amply strong to carry the floor loads, and as this partition is absolutely fireproof, I respectfully petition the Board to be allowed to proceed with the same.

Mr. C. F. Kruse appeared in explanation.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved, on condition that the partitions separating the front and rear apartments, namely, three partitions on each of the several floors, be constructed of burnt clay blocks, the said partitions resting on rolled steel beams.

Appeal No. 213 of 1902, New Building No. 391 of 1902, premises Nos. 11 and 13 East Thirty-second street, Neville & Bagge, architects and appellants.

To allow the pent house on top of building originally shown on plans, inasmuch as top of said pent house is not more than 150 feet above the curb.

And also to allow the outside walls of said pent house to be constructed of angle and tee irons and fireproof blocks, 3 inches thick.

On motion, duly made and seconded, approved, on condition that floor is to be made of cement, wire glass to be used wherever glass is necessary, proper skylights to be provided, all wood-work for the window frames, sash, doors, trim and base of the pent house to be thoroughly fireproof; all wood-work entering into the construction of the pent house to be fireproofed; the entire pent house to be constructed absolutely fireproof.

Mr. Smith voting no.

Appeal No. 214 of 1902, New Building No. 191 of 1902, premises No. 804 Broadway, Messrs. Heins & La Farge, architects and appellants.

Objection has been made to the projection of two bay windows on Fourth avenue. The law provides that bays may be constructed of wood 1 foot beyond the building line. It is intended that these bays shall be constructed of fireproof materials and shall project 3 feet and 2 feet 5 inches beyond the building line, corresponding with the bays on the Day Nursery, already in existence and forming part of a group of buildings for Grace Church.

On motion, duly made and seconded, the application was approved as to construction.

Mr. D'Gench voting no.

## BOARD OF REVISION OF ASSESSMENTS.

An adjourned meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held at the Comptroller's office on Thursday, June 12, 1902, at 11.10 o'clock a. m.

Present—Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel.

On motion of the Comptroller the reading of the minutes of the meetings of December 23 and 30, 1901, and of June 10, 1902, was dispensed with.

### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks, etc., in Sheridan avenue, from One Hundred and Fifty-third to One Hundred and Sixty-first street, with objections of New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, by R. L. Luce, of counsel; W. J. Hughes and others, by Charles L. Guy, attorney; Alexander G. Black and others, by T. H. Baldwin, attorney; Eugene Ring, owner, Sheridan avenue, corner One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street; and reports of the Department of Highways of July 3 and October 15, 1901, and transcript of testimony taken in behalf of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, and for various objectors, Charles L. Guy, attorney, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 7, 1902.

Mr. Guy objected to the expenses of the work and also claimed that as the masonry had been laid solely to meet the necessities of the property immediately abutting thereon the cost should be assessed against said property.

Mr. Robert L. Luce objected to the assessment levied upon the lots of the railroad company for the reason, as alleged, that they are not benefited in any way or manner or to any extent by the improvement in question.

Mr. Baldwin, attorney, objected to the expenses connected with the work for Inspectors' and Surveyors' fees and for interest, and stated that the lands of the objectors represented by him are not benefited but damaged by the establishment of the present grade of the avenue.

The assessors reported that the cost of the retaining wall built along the east side of the avenue abutting the railroad company's yards had been charged to the railroad company.

On motion, the several objections filed were overruled and the said assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks, etc., in Prospect avenue, from Westchester avenue to Crotona Park South, together with a list of awards for damages caused by change of grade, with objections of Edward H. Van Ingen and others, by T. H. Baldwin, attorney; William Ebling and others, by T. S. Bassford, attorney; Michael Meehan and others, by John C. Shaw, attorney; Henry L. Phillips and others, by E. S. Kaufman, attorney; Robert C. Wood, owner; Anna Borgstede, owner, of No. 3273 Third avenue, and petitions for awards for damages of Augusta Liebertz, by A. C. Hottenroth, attorney; Anna Borgstede, owner; Anna S. McCormack and others, by T. S. Bassford, attorney, referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of December 23, 1901, with instructions to reduce the assessment \$3,000 and to re-apportion the same accordingly, were presented by the Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board, under date of January 18, 1902.

Mr. John C. Shaw, attorney, objected to the charge for Inspectors' fees, but upon being informed that a reduction of the original assessment had been made he withdrew his objections.

No others appearing in opposition to the assessment as reapportioned, after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for Sewer and Appurtenances in Sedgwick avenue, from Fordham road to East One Hundred and Eighty-third street, with branch in East One Hundred and Eighty-third street, from Sedgwick avenue to Loring place, with objections of R. L. Niles et al., by William D. Peck, attorney; Helen L. Willis, by John C. Shaw, attorney; William D. Peck, in person, and transcript of testimony introduced by him, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of January 18, 1902.

Mr. Peck was heard and objected to the assessment on the ground that the expenses for surveying, inspection and interest are excessive, and also for the reason that the owners of property along the avenue and East One Hundred and Eighty-third street south of the northerly lines of assessment Nos. 8 and 26 shown on the map, constructed at their expense, a sewer through the street and avenue to the Harlem River under plans, etc., approved by the City, with which their property is connected; also that some of the property cannot be connected with the new sewer, and therefore it should not be assessed for it.

On motion, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors for further consideration of the objections filed by Mr. Peck, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks, etc., in Kappock street, from Spuyten Duyvil parkway to Johnson avenue, with objections of Mrs. B. Courtney, owner, Spuyten Duyvil, N. Y.; Gustavus M. Roden, John G. Beck, James Mahoney, by Walter Cox, attorney; Samuel Caddick, by C. C. Ferris, attorney; Johnson estate, by McKelvey & Mattocks, attorneys, and application of Samuel Caddick, for an award for damages, filed by C. C. Ferris, attorney,

referred back to the Board of Assessors at meeting of November 29, 1901, with instructions to reduce the assessment \$2,500, and to reapportion the same accordingly, were presented by the Comptroller, having been returned by the said Board, under date of February 14, 1902. The Assessors stated that the reduction had been made and that the objections were renewed. Mr. Cox, attorney, and Mr. McKelvey, attorney, were heard in opposition to the assessment, on the ground that it is still excessive and inequitable and that the improvement is of no benefit to the property of their clients, it having been made principally for the benefit of the public school situated at the intersection of the street and Johnson avenue.

On motion of the Comptroller, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to make a reduction therein of one-third of the ratable cost of the improvement, such reduction to apply to the lots the assessments upon which have not already been reduced one-third, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

### BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing and flagging Wadsworth avenue, from One Hundred and Seventy-third street to Eleventh avenue, with objections of Alphonse Hogenauer and others, by W. B. Hopping, attorney; New York Juvenile Asylum and Gertie A. Gorman, by John C. Shaw, attorney; William J. Beard and others, by Charles H. Griffin, attorney; Monroe Howell, by Robert W. Cromley, attorney; Samuel Kohn and Isidor Grayhead, by Isidor Grayhead, attorney, and applications of William J. Beard and others for awards for damages by change of grade, by Charles H. Griffin, attorney, transcript of testimony submitted by Mr. Griffin and Douglas Mathewson, attorneys, and report of the Commissioner of Public Works, dated January 28, 1902, in regard to the claims for damages filed by Mr. Griffin, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors, under date of April 10, 1902.

Mr. Griffin was heard and objected to the action of the Board of Assessors in neglecting and refusing to award to the property represented by him any damages caused by the change of grade of Wadsworth avenue, from One Hundred and Eighty-seventh to One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street, and claimed that the change of the grade was made subsequent to the improvement of the property abutting the avenue between said streets.

Mr. Shaw objected to the assessment for the reason that it is excessive and beyond the benefit derived, and also to the charge for interest and the apportionment of the cost of the work, which places an unequal burden upon the property south of One Hundred and Ninetieth street.

Mr. John N. Butterly, attorney, representing Mr. Walter B. Hopping, attorney, objected to the apportionment of the cost of the improvement making certain lots bear a portion of the expense although no work had been performed in front of them.

Mr. Cromley, attorney, by representative, objected to the amount of the assessment charged against Lot No. 7 on the ground that it is excessive.

On motion of the Comptroller, the matter was laid over to afford Mr. Griffin an opportunity of submitting to the Board a map showing the grades of the avenue.

### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curbstones, flagging sidewalks, laying crosswalks in Broadway, now called Crotona avenue, from Boston road to Southern Boulevard, with objections of W. J. Ferguson and others, by Mulqueen & Mulqueen, attorneys; George Weir and others, by E. J. Martin and James Kearney, attorneys; George Maurer, by John J. Brady, attorney and as owner; John Halliday, by Henry H. Sherman, attorney; Charles H. Halley, owner; R. N. Breidenbach and others, by T. H. Baldwin, attorney, and petitions for award for damages of Mary A. Campbell, by Douglas Mathewson, attorney, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 23, 1902.

Mr. Baldwin, attorney, was heard, opposing the assessment on the ground that the expenses for surveying and interest are unreasonable and exorbitant.

Mr. Mulqueen, attorney, objected to the excessive cost of the work, and also alleged that the benefit received was not in proportion thereto.

On motion, the assessment list was laid over for further consideration.

At 1.20 o'clock p. m., on motion, the Board adjourned to meet on Monday, June 16, 1902, at 11 o'clock a. m.
