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BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

New York, July 22, 1902.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day at 11.30 a. m., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer, and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The minutes of the meeting held July 14 were presented to the members by the Secretary, and they were adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Vice-Chairman reported that owing to the short notice for this meeting, the Secretary had been unable to prepare the report as directed by the resolution at the meeting held on June 26, and offered the following:

Resolved, That the resolution directing a detailed statement of appropriations and expenditures be amended to read as follows:

Resolved, That the Secretary be, and he hereby is, directed to prepare and report monthly, at a meeting of the Armory Board, a detailed statement showing the amount appropriated for each organization of the National Guard, for repairs to, and furnishing of, armories, and utensils, materials and supplies, for the year 1902, and, further, that such report include an itemized statement of amounts thus far expended and charged against each organization, as well as amounts incurred respectively for the year 1902, together with the names of the contractors or persons employed to furnish such supplies, repairs, etc.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication was received from the advisory architects, Messrs. Post and Hardenburgh, presenting a plan of competition for an armory for the Sixty-ninth Regiment, and nominating fifteen architects from whom a selection of five should be made, as follows:

"PROGRAMME OF COMPETITION.

"For the selection of an architect for building an
"Armory for the Sixty-ninth Regiment, N. G., N. Y.,
"to be situated on a lot on the west side of Lexington
"avenue, Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets."

The Board of Armory Commissioners or a sub-committee of the same, together with its Consulting Architects, Messrs. George B. Post and Henry J. Hardenburgh, will form a Jury of Award to pass upon and judge as to the relative merits of designs submitted, and it shall be their duty to select the design which, in their opinion, is the most suitable and best, and to appoint its author architect for the building.

In considering the relative merits of the design due weight will be given to propriety and convenience of arrangement, to architectural merit, and to economy of construction.

The following architects have been invited to submit designs, in accordance with the following provisions:

In full compensation for the competition drawings each architect, other than the architect selected, shall receive the sum of \$500.

The architect to whom said commission is awarded will receive in compensation for his full professional services, including local supervision, but exclusive of actual traveling expenses, in case he has to visit quarries or works outside of the city limits, or salary of the Clerk of Works, should one be appointed, a fee to be computed at the rate of five per cent. upon all contracts awarded and work done by day labor in the construction of the building.

This fee shall be paid as the work progresses, in the following order:

\$2,500 as a retainer and payment on account of his services as Architect.

Two and one-half per cent. on the estimated cost of the work, less \$2,500 paid on account, when the general working drawings and specifications are entirely completed and ready to procure estimates for the entire structural work.

And the balance of the five per cent. on the actual cost of the work in monthly payments, based proportionately upon the vouchers issued in payment for the work performed under the contracts.

The architect to whom the commission is awarded shall revise his competitive drawings to meet any further requirements of the Board of Armory Commissioners. On the basis of such modifications, if any are made, he shall prepare full working drawings and specifications for the building, and from time to time thereafter he shall make such changes in the drawings and specifications as may be directed by the Board of Armory Commissioners, for which changes just compensation shall be allowed, but no changes in the drawings or specifications after their approval shall be made without the written authority of the Board of Armory Commissioners; and the architect chosen shall furthermore, at his own cost and expense, whenever required to do so by the Board of Armory Commissioners, make such revisions and alterations of drawings and specifications as may be necessary to secure proper economy in the construction of the building.

Upon the selection of an architect the designs of unsuccessful competitors will be returned to them, and no use will be made of the drawings not accepted.

Data are furnished herewith with regard to the general requirements of the building, which must be fireproof throughout.

Each design submitted shall consist of the following drawings only (no alternate designs will be considered), and shall be mounted on stretchers 3 feet by 4 feet, or stiff cardboard 3 feet by 4 feet, and shall be delivered to

There shall be the following drawings:

Plans for all stories, scale $\frac{1}{8}$ inch to 1 foot.

Longitudinal and transverse sections, $\frac{1}{4}$ inch to 1 foot.

Elevation on Lexington avenue, $\frac{1}{4}$ inch to 1 foot.

Elevation on one street, $\frac{1}{8}$ inch to 1 foot.

The Lexington avenue elevation must be rendered with accurately cast shadows at an angle of 45 degrees, in either monotone or color.

Other elevation and sections are to be without shadows or shading.

The walls of plans are to be black.

The walls of sections are to be black, or are to have a heavy black line on profiles of sections.

Each drawing shall be signed.

A brief description of the building, typewritten on plain legal cap must accompany each design, calling attention to any points of special interest, materials to be used, and any special details of construction, and describing clearly the provisions made to make the building so incombustible that the danger of spread of fire will be reduced to a minimum.

The relative artistic and practical merits of the several designs will be carefully considered, but plans elaborately rendered will have no advantage with the Jurors over drawings made as simple as they can be to comply with the requirements of this programme, to indicate in a general way the methods of construction employed and to illustrate the design.

Any information which the Board of Armory Commissioners or its Consulting Architects may find proper to communicate to any of the competitors will be simultaneously communicated to all the rest.

It is distinctly understood that any competitor will forfeit any privilege under this competition who shall violate any of the provisions of this programme, or shall in any way directly or indirectly endeavor to gain advantage by trying to exert influence in his behalf upon any of the Board of Armory Commissioners or its Consulting Architects.

The total cost of the armory, exclusive of furniture and decorations, including Architect's commissions, must not exceed the sum of \$.....

Elevator—To be provided to connect all stories, with a capacity of 60 square feet. In the wing on the west of the south side of the plot may be arranged the squad drill rooms, veterans' room, memorial hall and small toilet room and band rooms.

The third floor of this wing may be assigned to the Surgeons and Hospital Corps.

Resolved, That the following architects, namely: Mr. R. W. Gibson, No. 76 William street; Mr. Grosvenor Atterbury, No. 18 West Thirty-fourth street; Messrs. Hunt & Hunt, No. 28 East Twenty-first street; Messrs. Howells & Stokes, No. 100 William street, and Messrs. Stoughton & Stoughton, No. 96 Fifth avenue, be invited to offer competitive designs for an armory building for the Sixty-ninth Regiment, N. G., N. Y., to be erected on the westerly side of Lexington avenue, extending from Twenty-fifth to Twenty-sixth street, in accordance with the scheme of the Advisory Architects.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The President of the Board of Aldermen offered the following:

Resolved, That one hundred thousand (\$100,000) dollars be appropriated, in addition to the four hundred and fifty thousand (\$450,000) dollars already appropriated and concurred in by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, making a total amount of five hundred and fifty thousand (\$550,000) dollars, to be used for the erection of an armory building for the Sixty-ninth Regiment, N. G., N. Y., on the site on the westerly side of Lexington avenue, extending from Twenty-fifth to Twenty-sixth street, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur herein, and authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds to that extent.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the plans and specifications for the proposed Armory Building of the Sixty-ninth Regiment, of the National Guard, of New York, heretofore submitted to this Board of Armory Commissioners by the Corporation of Horgan & Slattery, are rejected by this Board, and the employment of such corporation as the architects in relation to said armory building is terminated and all contracts with such corporation in relation to said armory building are rescinded.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

The Secretary reports that plans and specifications have been prepared for alterations and repairs to twelve separate armories in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, in accordance with the requisitions of the commanding officers, and the previous resolutions of this Board, said work to be paid for from the appropriations already made directly therefor by the Board, and concurred in by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, or made and appropriated by the Board of Estimate in the Budget, to the several armories.

These plans and specifications have been put in contract form to advertise for proposals, and have been submitted to, and approved by, the Corporation Counsel.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized and directed to advertise for bids and proposals for supplies, and for alterations and repairs to armories of the N. G., N. Y., in New York City, and to purchase such supplies, and order such repairs as are necessary in emergency, to properly protect and care for the several armory buildings, within the unexpended balances of the appropriations made by the Board of Estimate for such purposes.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer, and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

A communication was received from Captain Wilson, commanding the Second Battery, submitting a diagram of a plot of land in the Borough of The Bronx, 300.2 on Franklin avenue, 202.26 on One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, extending through to Boston road, by a strip 60 feet wide, as a suitable site for a permanent armory for that organization.

On motion of Brigadier-General McLeer, it was referred to the following committee: The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and Brigadier-General Smith, for consideration and report.

A communication was received from Clinton & Russell, of date July 21, accepting their appointment as architects for the new Seventy-first Regiment Armory. Ordered filed.

A communication was received from Assistant Corporation Counsel J. W. Coombs, transmitting two transcripts of Commissioners appointed in proceedings to condemn lands on Bedford avenue, Union and President streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, as a site for an armory for Troop C. Ordered filed in accordance with request.

A motion to adjourn was adopted by the following vote:

Ayes—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the President of the Board of Aldermen, Brigadier-General James McLeer, and Brigadier-General George Moore Smith.

"For regulating and grading, setting of curbstones and flagging of sidewalks a space eight feet wide, laying of crosswalks, building approaches and erecting guard rails where necessary, building retaining walls, laying drains with basins, etc., constructing masonry arch at One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, macadamizing the side driveways and paths, and work incidental thereto, on the Grand Boulevard and Concourse, from East One Hundred and Sixty-first street to Mosholu Parkway, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York."

—and there having been presented to said Board of Estimate and Apportionment an estimate in writing, in such detail as the Board has directed, that the cost of the proposed work or improvement will be the sum of one million and fifty-two thousand one hundred and fifty-three dollars; and a statement of the assessed value, according to the last preceding taxroll, of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment, to wit, the sum of one million three hundred and sixty-eight thousand dollars, having also been presented; it is

"Resolved, That the said resolution of the said Local Board be and the same hereby is approved, and the local improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized. And this Board does hereby determine that 75 per cent. of the cost and expense thereof shall be borne and paid by The City of New York, and that twenty-five per cent. of such cost and expense shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited by the said local improvement."

That so much of the lands as are bounded and described as follows, to wit: Parcel No. 1, bounded on the north by the southerly side of the approach to the Williamsburgh Bridge, on the east by the westerly side of Attorney street, on the south by the southerly clearance line of the Williamsburgh Bridge, and on the west by a line parallel with Attorney street, and distant 160 feet from the west side of Attorney street, said parcel being 160 feet in length by 31 feet 9 inches in width. Parcel No. 2, bounded on the north by the southerly side of the approach to the Williamsburgh Bridge, on the east by the westerly side of Ridge street, on the south by the southerly clearance line of the Williamsburgh Bridge property, and on the west by the easterly side of Attorney street; said parcel being about 200 feet in length by 31 feet 9 inches in width; is hereby declared to be a temporary market place for hucksters and peddlers using push-carts, pending the completion of the Bridge, the Commissioner of Bridges to determine the date of said completion.

Sec. 2. Said hucksters and peddlers are hereby authorized to stand in the said market place, as soon as the same shall be in proper condition, and there to exhibit their wares and to vend the same; subject to such rules and regulations concerning fees, the hours of doing business and the general management of said market as may be made by the Comptroller of The City of New York.

Every car owned, operated, managed or controlled by a street surface railroad company in the streets or highways of The City of New York, shall carry throughout its route on the outside, in front and on top of each and every car so operated, a signboard or placard upon which shall appear conspicuously the destination of the said car. Every such company must carry for a single fare upon such car, without change therefrom, each and every passenger to any regular stopping place desired by him, upon said car's route, in the direction of the destination so designated; and for every violation of the ordinance there shall be recoverable against the company so offending a penalty of one hundred dollars in an action to be brought in the name of The City of New York.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall not apply to a transfer made to a connecting line, going in a different direction from that in which such car may be going, nor where by reason of any accident compliance with the ordinance is rendered impossible.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at their Office, No. 207 Stewart Building, on Tuesday, July 8, 1902, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Power and Windolph.

Pursuant to action taken by the Aqueduct Commissioners at their meeting on June 24, 1902, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to fix a time and place for a joint public hearing with said Commissioners in relation to the question of applying the eight-hour law to the contract for the Jerome Park Reservoir, and in accordance with the action taken by said Board of Estimate and Apportionment at its meeting on June 27, 1902, that such joint public hearing should be

held in the Old Council Chamber, City Hall, on Tuesday, July 8, 1902, at 10.30 o'clock a. m., the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Aqueduct Commissioners convened at the time and place designated.

Messrs. John J. Pallas, Corresponding Secretary of the Central Federated Union; Samuel Prince, James R. Brown and Timothy D. Healy, also of said Union, presented a petition for the application of the Eight-Hour Law to the contract for the Jerome Park Reservoir, and addressed the meeting in favor thereof.

Mr. John B. McDonald, of the firm of McDonald & Onderdonk, Contractors for said reservoir, made an explanation of the statement submitted by said firm under date of May 26, 1902, concerning the application of said Eight-Hour Law to the contract for said reservoir.

Communications were presented signed by Chief Engineer Hill, of the Aqueduct Commission, being Report No. 385, dated June 23, 1902; Eugene E. McLean, Chief Engineer of the Department of Finance, dated July 7, 1902, and Nelson P. Lewis, Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated July 7, 1902, in relation to said matter, which were read.

Whereupon, the matter was referred to the Aqueduct Commissioners.

The minutes of stated meeting of July 1, 1902, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 14614 to 14623, inclusive, amounting to \$152,36, and of estimates contained in Vouchers Nos. 14624 and 14625, amounting to \$94,646.04.

Which were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment, by the following vote:
Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Power and Windolph—4.

The President verbally reported that on July 7, 1902, he transmitted to the Mayor the following communication of the Chief Engineer, relative to the progress of the work at the New Croton Dam:

NEW YORK, July 1, 1902.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, June 27, 1902, I would report as follows:

The removal of the wing-wall and core-wall at the south end of the dam continued, the core-wall being removed above elevation 110 and south of station 2 + 40. (See photos 1A and 4.) Excavation in the sidehill at the south end of the dam progressed with the steam shovel, both day and night (see photos 1A and 4), and an additional cut in the hard pan was made above the berm planned at elevation 100. Excavation also continued at elevation 80, on the upstream side of the south end of the dam south of stations 4 + 75 (see photo No. 2). Excavation was also begun near the top of the south slope at the south end of the dam at Gatehouse No. 1, to the left of station 1 + 00, with a shovel gang, derrick and cars.

The total amount of this excavation of embankment and sidehill at the south end of the dam, including material removed from the core-wall and wing-wall, would approximate 6,900 cubic yards for the week.

The laying of masonry (see Photo No. 3) continued at the north end of the dam with three gangs of masons working, distributed as follows, viz.:

One gang between stations 6 + 30 and 6 + 70 on main dam.

One gang between stations 7 + 00 and 7 + 50 on main dam.

One gang at station 178R in overfall.

The total amount of masonry laid on the dam during the week approximated 460 cubic yards.

The force of men at work on the dam and at the quarries averaged 370.

The flow in the river was low during the week. Rock excavation for widening the spillway channel at the north end of the dam near its junction with the river channel was continued. (See Photo No. 1.)

I transmit herewith five photographs, showing the progress of the work.

No. 1A. Shows the steam shovel at work on the sidehill on the south end of the dam, down stream side.

No. 1. Shows the rock excavation for the widening of the spillway channel at its lower end near its junction with the river channel. Part of the masonry spillway appears at the right.

No. 2. Shows the work of excavation in the refilling on the upstream side of the main dam at its south end near its junction with the core-wall. The core-wall partly removed appears in the background.

No. 3. Gives a general view of the down stream side of the main dam. Eight arches are shown on the cornice, while the gatehouse and part of the spillway on the north end appears on the left of the picture.

No. 4. Shows the excavation at the south end of the dam, on the hillside, and for the removal of the core-wall and the wing-wall. The south end of the main dam and the partly removed core-wall and wing-wall are shown on the left. The removal of core-wall in the sidehill, at the south end, is shown on the right. A steam shovel at work is visible through the opening in the core-wall. In conclusion, I would say that the work is progressing satisfactorily.

NEW YORK, July 7, 1902.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President, Aqueduct Commission:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the work done on the New Croton Dam for the week ending Friday, July 4, 1902, I would report as follows:

Drilling and blasting for the removal of the core-wall at the south end of the dam, south of station 2 + 40, was continued, and additional excavation work on the wing-wall at the north end of the core-wall was done. (A view of the location of this work was shown in Photos Nos. 1A and 4, submitted with last week's report.)

The steam shovel continued the earth excavation both day and night in the material of the sidehill at the south end of the dam. (The location of this work is shown in Photos Nos. 1A and 4, submitted with last week's report.)

The work of excavation was also continued on the upstream side of the south end of the dam at elevation 80, south of station 4 + 75. (The site of this work is shown in Photo No. 2 of last report.) Some further excavation work was done at the top of the south slope at the south end of the dam, near Gatehouse No. 1, and an additional gang started earth excavation at the down stream side of the dam, near the wing-wall below elevation No. 100. (Photo No. 4 of last report shows the partly demolished wing-wall.)

The total amount of this excavation of the embankment and sidehill at the south end of the dam, including the material removed from the core-wall and wing-wall, would approximate 6,500 cubic yards for the week.

The laying of masonry continued on the main dam, towards the north end, with three gangs of masons working, distributed as follows, viz.:

One gang between stations 6 + 30 and 6 + 72.

One gang between stations 7 + 10 and 7 + 40.

One gang between stations 8 + 30 and 9 + 00.

The total amount of masonry laid on the dam during the week approximated 380 cubic yards.

The force of men at work on the dam and at the quarries averaged 365.

The flow in the river was low during the week.

Rock excavation for widening the spillway channel at the north end of the dam near its junction with the river channel was continued. (See Photo No. 1 of last report.)

NEW YORK, July 3, 1902.

Hon. WILLIAM H. TEN EYCK, President of the Aqueduct Commissioners:

DEAR SIR—In reply to your favor of the 1st inst., we beg leave to say that after a search of many months, we have secured the services of Mr. Peter F. Madden, as Superintendent of Construction of the Muscoot Dam, who is a thoroughly competent man, as no doubt your Engineers will admit. It was always our intention to increase our plant, but the conditions that prevailed were such that one-half of our plant was idle, including from 16 to 24 horses. Since Mr. Madden has taken charge we have considerably increased our plant, adding five additional derricks, one new pile driving machine, have 100,000 feet of sheath piling on the job, and have ordered three new hoisting engines. We are working all the men we can get, and are advertising weekly for more, and we beg leave here to say that it is a very difficult matter to get men, and it is equally as hard to retain them, as there is more work going on in the United States at the present time than was ever known before. With all this taken into consideration and the fact that we are paying 20 per cent. more wages than is usual in this locality, we trust that your Honorable Body will feel that we are doing as well as is possible under the circumstances.
