THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The Chairman then directed the reading of the following call for the meeting:
No. 1026.

City of New York,
Office of the Mayor.

Pursuant to the authority vested in me by law, I, Seth Low, Mayor of The City of New York, do hereby call a special meeting of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, to be held in the Chamber of the Board of Aldermen, in the City Hall, in the Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, on Tuesday, August 12, 1902, at noon, for the purpose of receiving and acting upon a report of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen in relation to the tax and assessment rolls of real and personal estate in The City of New York for the year 1902, delivered to the Board of Aldermen by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments; and for the further purpose of preparing and adopting an ordinance relating to the levying and collection of taxes on real and personal estate in The City of New York for the year 1902; and for the performance of all other duties prescribed by law in relation to the City tax and assessment rolls, including the levying and collection of taxes and assessments therefrom.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal of office, this 4th day of August, A. D. 1902.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

President Cantor, of the Borough of Manhattan, moved that, in the absence of President Swansrom, of the Borough of Brooklyn, Commissioner Redfield, Commissioner of Public Works of that borough, be seated as his representative. Which was adopted.

The Vice-Chairman announced that the report of the Committee on Finance in relation to the tax levy for 1902 had been prepared, but lacked sufficient signatures to be presented.

Alderman Goodman moved that the Committee on Finance be discharged from further consideration of the matter, and that the Board proceed to dispose thereof. There being objection, Alderman Goodman withdrew his motion.

Alderman Goodman moved that when the Board adjourns it do adjourn to meet on September 4, 1902, at 12 m. Which was adopted.

President Cantor, of the Borough of Manhattan, moved that a recess be taken until Wednesday, August 20, 1902, at 12 m.

Alderman Stewart raised the point of order that the Board had already determined on a date for adjournment, viz., September 4.

Which point of order was declared well taken.

President Cantor, of the Borough of Manhattan, moved that the vote by which an adjournment was taken until September 4 be reconsidered.

Which was adopted.

The Vice-Chairman presented the following ordinance:

No. 670.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York, and the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for the payment of the quota of the State taxes due from said counties, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1902.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:
Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of eighty-two million eight hundred and fourteen thousand one hundred and ninety-three dollars and forty-one cents (\$82,814,193.41), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1902, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City Debt, and the quota of State taxes due from the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, which sum so imposed and levied by this section is that portion of the Budget for the year 1902, which is to be raised by taxation, amounting in the aggregate to ninety-seven million eight hundred and ninety-seven thousand six hundred and thirty-three dollars and thirty-three cents (\$97,897,633.33), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of three million six hundred and eighty-six thousand seven hundred and twenty-eight dollars and twenty-five cents (\$3,686,728.25), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of eleven million three hundred and ninety-six thousand seven hundred and eleven dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$11,396,711.67), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York, in a communication dated May 28, 1902, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the Budget for the year 1902, copies of which communication and certificate and of the said Budget are as follows:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE
May 28, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City as created by this act and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the sinking funds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, and of any of the municipal and public corporations, or parts of municipal and public corporations, by this act consolidated with the municipal corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus of revenues of any such sinking funds for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt of the municipal corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the municipal and public corporations by this act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which, by law, they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county; to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county for county, as distinguished from City purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your honorable body statements as follows:

First—The altered, modified and amended Budget, in detail for the year 1902.
Second—The amount of county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said Budget and to be raised, respectively, by levy upon taxable property within each of said counties, as provided by section 902 of the Charter.
Third—The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation. Concerning the receipts of the General Fund for the reduction of taxation, the following are the items of my estimate:

The attention of your honorable body is respectfully called to the provisions of section 248 of the amended Greater New York Charter, as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Board of Aldermen to include, in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them, imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes, as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your attention is also specially called to the provisions of section 909 of the same act, prescribing the method of preparing and disposing of the assessment rolls and also

to the provisions of section 931 of the same act, designating the fifteenth day of September as the date when the assessment rolls shall be finally completed, to be delivered to the Receiver of Taxes, with the proper warrant or warrants annexed thereto, directing him to collect the several sums mentioned in said rolls, and to pay the same, from time to time, when so collected, to the Chamberlain of said City.

Grout, Comptroller of The City of New York, in compliance with section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter, do hereby certify to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, that the aggregate amount of the Budget as altered, modified, amended, and duly adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the power vested in said Board by section 10 of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901, as amended by chapter 436 of the Laws of 1902, is ninety-eight million six hundred and nineteen thousand six hundred dollars and eighty-eight cents (\$98,619,600.88), and I do further certify that the amount to be raised by tax in said year is ninety-seven million eight hundred and ninety-seven thousand six hundred and thirty-three dollars and thirty-three cents (\$97,897,633.33), a copy of which Budget is hereto annexed.

I further certify that included in the aggregate amount of the Budget to be raised by taxation are the following amounts appropriated for county charges and expenses in each of the counties hereinafter named, viz:

I further certify that the estimated amount of the revenues of the General Fund for the year 1902 is eleven million three hundred and ninety-six thousand seven hundred and eleven dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$11,396,711.67), as stated in detail in the communication to your honorable body herewith submitted, setting forth the amounts by law authorized and required to be imposed and raised by tax in and for the said year 1902.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

- The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.
- Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."
- All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.
- Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.
- Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support, or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.
- All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as, from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.
- The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, the sum of one hundred and forty-four thousand four hundred and seventy-four dollars (\$144,474), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1902, and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county two per cent. of said sum or two thousand eight hundred and eighty-nine dollars and forty-eight cents (\$2,889.48), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, of one hundred and forty-seven thousand three hundred and sixty-three dollars and forty-eight cents (\$147,363.48).

Sec. 6. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, the sum of sixty-three thousand seven hundred and fifty-five dollars (\$63,755), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1902, and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county two per cent. of said sum or one thousand two hundred and seventy-five dollars and ten cents (\$1,275.10), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, of sixty-five thousand and thirty dollars and ten cents (\$65,030.10).

Sec. 7. The assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, for the year 1902, are hereby ratified, approved and confirmed and the aggregate amount of the assessed valuations of said estates for such year is hereby fixed at the sum of three thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven million and forty-seven thousand seven hundred and eighteen dollars (\$3,857,047,718), in accordance with the returns of the Commissioners of

Taxes and Assessments for said year submitted to the Board of Aldermen on the 7th day of July, 1902.

Sec. 8. The rates of tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, and the several counties and boroughs included within said city are, for the purpose of carrying out and making effective the foregoing sections of this ordinance, hereby fixed for the year 1902, as follows:

I. In the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (being also the County of New York), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 2.16539 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2.27344 per centum.

II. In the Borough of Brooklyn (being also the County of Kings), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 2.24548 per centum; on the estates not subject to local taxation, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 398 of the Laws of 1887, 10804 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2.35353 per centum.

III. In the Borough of Queens (being also the County of Queens), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes 2.21068 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2.31873 per centum.

IV. In the Borough of Richmond (being also the County of Richmond), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes 2.22848 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2.33653 per centum.

Sec. 9. In addition to the sums mentioned in the preceding sections of this ordinance, to be levied and imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-sixth Ward (late Town of New Lots) of the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward improved by flagging, guttering, curbing and paving under authority of chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purposes, the sum of twenty-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$26,892.22), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in the proportion of benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Commission charged with making said improvements; there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by the construction of sewers authorized by chapter 167 of the Laws of 1889 and the amendments thereto, the sum of thirty-two thousand six hundred and seventy-five dollars and eighty-three cents (\$32,675.83), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Board of Street and Sewer Commissioners of said town and its successors; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirty-first Ward (late Town of Gravesend) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by local improvements, for which the unpaid assessments heretofore levied in said town exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars are, under the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, and the amendments thereto, to be levied in forty annual installments, the sum of fifty-four thousand five hundred and fifty-seven dollars and fourteen cents (\$54,557.14), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirtieth Ward (late Town of New Utrecht) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward, improved by flagging, under authority of chapter 544 of the Laws of 1888, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purpose, the sum of eight thousand two hundred and thirty dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$8,230.67), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land situated in the flagging districts established by the Flagging Commissioners of said town; and there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, situated within the districts of assessment fixed and determined by the Board of Assessors of The City of New York, for the improvement of Flatbush avenue under authority of chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on the bonds issued for said improvement, the sum of forty-six thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven dollars and twenty-three cents (\$46,927.23), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by said Board of Assessors on each lot, piece or parcel of land lying within the boundary lines of said assessment districts.

Which was referred to the Committee on Finance, with instructions to report at the next session.

Alderman Marks moved that when the Board adjourns it do adjourn to meet on Wednesday, August 20, 1902, at 12 m.
Which was adopted.

Alderman Stewart asked to be excused from attendance on August 20, 1902.
Which was granted.
Aldermen Tebbetts, Walkley, Twomey, Behrman and Shea were also excused.

Alderman Marks moved that the Board do now adjourn.
The Vice-Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.
Which was decided in the affirmative.

And the Vice-Chairman declared that the Board stood adjourned until Wednesday, August 20, 1902, at 12 o'clock m.

At the close of the Special Meeting in relation to the tax levy, the Vice-Chairman convened the members of the Board in Special Session to take appropriate cognizance of the death of Alderman James J. Bridges.

Alderman Walkley presented the following preamble and resolution:

No. 1027.

The emblems of mourning that drape the Aldermanic Chamber to-day emphasize the solemn fact that James J. Bridges, our beloved colleague, is dead. To us this bereavement seems as untimely as unexpected. The echoes of his voice seem yet to resound through this chamber, and each of us, with saddened heart, recalls pleasant memories of this esteemed friend and co-laborer. His lifework is finished. The clock has struck the hour of his departure, and his vacant chair speaks to us as eloquently as the words he uttered in life. We mourn his death as a personal loss. We all loved him for that kindly spirit which seemed to dwell within, and for the pleasant words and pleasant manner with which he greeted each of us. He was a man of the people, greatly beloved by his neighbors and friends for those sterling qualities and virtues which mark true manhood everywhere. He was diligent in business, attentive to his public duties, thoroughly in earnest, and of uncompromising integrity. He served his constituency with unflagging energy and with single-minded devotion. He was punctual in his attendance at the meetings of this Board, and strenuous in furthering measures which he believed to be right. Earnestness is an essential of eloquence, and he was eloquent because he was earnest. He was friendly with all, therefore had no enemies. During his life he was a Deputy Revenue Collector, a Dock Master, and an Officer in the County Court, until his election as Alderman in 1897. He was kind and charitable to his neighbors and generous to his church, personally laboring for its welfare as well as contributing of his means. He was a good husband and father, and leaves a family of four sons and three daughters to lament their parent.

Nothing which can be said is so expressive of the virtues of the man as the sight of the thousands who gathered by his bier from all walks in life, and we who were privileged to stand by that bier know how he was beloved by the people with whom he lived and who met him in his daily life. True to those higher principles which honor life, he was greatly beloved by all who knew him, and the falling tears of those who wept by his grave were expressive of their love toward the departed. Each member of this Board of Aldermen will cherish his memory and each one feels that he has lost a friend. He sleeps in peace. Our sincere sympathies go out to his children who survive, and we would place upon the records of this Board our testimony to the virtues, the integrity, the honor of our brother Alderman, James J. Bridges; therefore, be it

Resolved, By this Body now in session, that these expressions of our sympathy be tendered to his surviving children, that the same be spread in full upon the minutes of this Board, and that a copy of this preamble and resolution, suitably engrossed, and duly authenticated by the City Clerk, be presented to the family of the deceased.

Alderman Walkley supplemented the presentation of the resolution by remarks eulogistic of the late Alderman James J. Bridges.

Alderman Doull in seconding the resolution pronounced another eulogy. The preamble and resolution were then unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

The Vice-Chairman thereupon declared the Special Session adjourned.
