MINUTES LOCAL BOARD OF CHESTER, TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-fifth District, met on Thursday, July 24, 1902, at 4 p. m., at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, Crotona Park, One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third Avenue.

Present—Alderman Gass, Alderman Behrmann and the President of the Borough of The Bronx in the chair.

Minutes of the meeting held July 9, 1902, were approved as printed.

HEARINGS.

No. 204. Acquiring Title to the Lands Necessary for Pleasant Avenue, from the Present Terminus to Fifth Street.

Petition of John H. Behrmann, Robert McTurk and others was read, as was also the report of the Principal Assistant Topographical Engineer, approved by the Chief Engineer of the Borough, under date of July 23, 1902, in which it was recommended that proceedings be initiated for the opening of Pleasant Avenue, either for its whole length or perhaps for the block from Second street to Fifth street, in which the portion of Pleasant Avenue not yet existing on the ground is located.

With the exception of Alderman Behrmann, no one appeared in the matter. On motion, the matter was laid over.

No. 178. Regulating and Grading, etc., and Paving with Macadam White Plains Road, from Morris Park Avenue to the City Line.

Petition of William H. Keating and others was read. The Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx reported as to the detailed estimate of work under date of June 24, 1902, the total estimated cost being \$472,195, and the assessed value of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment \$1,180,000. The value of exempt property is \$114,020, and is not included in the foregoing valuation.

The Astor Estate, represented by J. C. Shaw, attorney, per Louis P. Thereson, appeared in opposition, and stated that the said estate was in favor of having this improvement extend only to Pelham parkway.

On motion, the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

For regulating and grading, setting curbstones, flagging sidewalks a space four feet wide, laying crosswalks, building approaches and erecting fences where necessary and laying macadam pavement on the roadway of White Plains road, from Morris Park Avenue to the City line, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York; and it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Adopted by the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, on the 24th of July, 1902.

Outlet Sewers and Appurtenances in Avenue E, Between the East River and Westchester Avenue, and in East One Hundred and Fifty-second Street, Etc.

The petition of M. Dannenfelsner and others, dated May 8, 1902, as well as the following reports were read. The Secretary was directed to prepare a new petition for the property owners, as recommended in the last paragraph of the report made by Engineer in Charge of Sewers Charles H. Graham:

REPORTS.

Hon. LOUIS F. HAFFEN, President:

Sir—In the matter of the petition for sewers, etc., for the Unionport and Westchester sections of the District of Chester, I beg to say that the Engineer in Charge of Sewers was instructed by me to make a study of that territory with a view of

determining whether it would not be more advantageous to build the outlet on some other street or streets so as to avoid the construction over salt marsh and, if possible, to save expense. This study has been completed and it shows that a very material saving can be made, amounting to about \$192,000.

This saving is gained in two ways, viz.: By change of lines so as to avoid the salt marsh and by doing away with the proposed outlet on Avenue B and Marginal street, south of the Eastern Boulevard, and on East One Hundred and Fifty-second street, from Marginal street to Avenue D.

It is proposed to locate the eastern outlet on Eastern Boulevard, from Avenue B to Avenue D, connecting there with the Protectors outlet and running on Avenue D to East One Hundred and Fifty-second street, and from there to East river by original route.

In order to carry out this scheme a new petition should be presented, as per suggestion of the Engineer of Sewers, and proceedings should be initiated for acquiring title to the Eastern Boulevard and Avenue D.

Copy of report of Engineer of Sewers is inclosed.

Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

Sir—In the matter of petition for the construction of outlet sewers and appurtenances in Avenue E, between the East river and Westchester avenue, and in East One Hundred and Fifty-second street, between Avenue E and Marginal street, and in Marginal street, between East One Hundred and Fifty-second street and Avenue B, and in Avenue B, between Marginal street and Eastern Boulevard, and in Eastern Boulevard, between Avenues B and A, and in Avenue A, between Eastern Boulevard and Westchester avenue, I desire to present for your consideration certain proposed changes in the lines of these trunk sewers which will effect a large saving in the cost of the work, as well as providing for a system of sewers which is also to be desired, for other reasons which will hereinafter appear.

I would suggest that the main sewer line north of East One Hundred and Fifty-second street to Tremont avenue be shifted from Avenue E to Avenue D, connection between said avenue to be provided through Tremont avenue; further, provide for connection between Avenues D and B through Eastern boulevard, and eliminate the proposed trunk sewers in East One Hundred and Fifty-second street, between Avenue D and Marginal street; and in Marginal street, between East One Hundred and Fifty-second street and Avenue B; and in Avenue B, between Marginal street and Eastern Boulevard.

The net length of trunk sewers saved by the foregoing amounts to 3,830 linear feet, which can be covered in the future by lateral sewers of small size and moderate cost.

The saving in cost to be effected by the proposed changes will approximate very closely to the sum of \$192,000, an amount sufficiently great to recommend the adoption of the plan hereby proposed, in the absence of any other reasons which might be adduced in its favor.

The change in question would obviate the necessity of the construction of a length of 3,000 linear feet of sewers of large section through salt marsh land, upon a pile and timber foundation, and of the construction of an embankment adequate for the protection of such sewers from varying weather conditions. In my judgment sewers should not be built through such ground as just indicated, in any reasonable way, suitable changes in line can be made; sewers constructed in marsh land are subject to probable displacement, and possible disruption by mud waves arising from the filling in of the adjacent marsh land, which is to be expected in the future improvement of the neighborhood. I would respectfully submit that, whenever practicable, streets laid out to cross salt ground (marsh land, etc.) should first be regulated and graded, and some little time allowed to elapse subsequent to such grading and prior to the construction of sewers therein.

The proposed sewers, if built upon the lines as hereinbefore suggested, will be of larger local benefit than those at present laid out, for the reason that the new lines will pass to a greater extent through the built-up portions of Unionport; for example, witness the proposed elimination of trunk sewer laid out to run through Avenue B to Marginal street, and in Marginal street to East One Hundred and Fifty-second street; and in East One Hundred and Fifty-second street to Avenue D, a distance of 6,000 linear feet, of which 4,700 linear feet south of (First street) East One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street would not be required for local benefit until some remote future period; for the 1,300 linear feet of Avenue B, between (First street) East One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street and Eastern Boulevard, lateral sewers discharging into the Eastern Boulevard line could be constructed at any time to meet existing needs.

In view of all the circumstances, I would respectfully recommend that the original petition for the construction of the outlet sewers in Unionport be amended to read as follows:

Outlet sewers and appurtenances in:
Avenue E, between the East river and East One Hundred and Fifty-second street.

East One Hundred and Fifty-second street, between Avenues B and D.
Avenue D, between East One Hundred and Fifty-second street and Tremont avenue.

Tremont avenue, between Avenues D and E.
Avenue E, between Tremont avenue and Westchester avenue.

Eastern Boulevard, between Avenues D and A.
Avenue A, between Eastern Boulevard and Westchester avenue.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVE COMMISSION.

Proceedings of the Municipal Explosives Commission at meeting held at Fire Department Headquarters, Nos. 157 and 159 East Sixty-seventh street, on Wednesday, July 2, 1902.

There were present Fire Commissioner Thomas Sturgis, presiding, and Commissioners Charlton and Eaton.

On motion the reading of minutes of meeting held June 30 was dispensed with. Commissioner Eaton reported that, in accordance with resolution adopted by Commission at meeting of June 30, he had seen the Corporation Counsel, and after conference with him, had prepared the following resolution:

Resolved, That until further ordered by this Commission, the regulations heretofore formulated, adopted or published by the Fire Department of the City of New York, and which were in force on the 13th day of May, 1902, shall be, and the same are hereby formulated and adopted as the regulations for the sale, use and transportation of explosives and combustibles in The City of New York, and that such regulations shall govern the manner, and provide the conditions under which any person may have, use, keep, sell or give away any of the articles designated in certain ordinances, each entitled "An Ordinance to regulate the sale, use and transportation of explosives in The City of New York," adopted by the Board of Aldermen, May 13, 1902, and approved by the Mayor, May 19, 1902.

Moved and seconded that the resolution be adopted as read, which was carried. The Fire Commissioner was requested to forward the resolution to his Honor the Mayor, for his approval, at once.

Upon motion, the Commission adjourned until Friday, July 11, at 12 o'clock noon.

Commissioner Charlton presented a paper on the subject of rules and regulations governing the manufacture and storage of fireworks at manufactories, which was read and returned to the Commissioner for additions.

Commissioner McKenna reported that he would require further time to complete his report on regulations affecting the manufacture, storage, use and sale of inflammable and combustible drugs, chemicals, etc.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held August 13, 1902, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Board of Health of the Department of Health, the following additional amendment to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code: Section 200. That every keeper or proprietor of a hotel or boarding-house, and every other person having for use a bathing-house upon any beach or shore of the ocean, for the accommodation of his guests, or of other persons for pay,

shall provide for the safety of such bathers two lines of sound, serviceable and strong Manila or hemp rope, not less than one inch in diameter, anchored at some point above high water, at the same distance apart as the line of bathing-houses or space fronting on such beach occupied by him is in width; and from the two points at which such life lines are so anchored, such line shall be made to extend as far into the surf as bathing is ordinarily safe and free from danger of drowning to persons not expert in swimming, and at such points of safety such lines shall be anchored and buoyed. From the two points of such lines so extended, anchored and buoyed, a third line shall be extended, connecting the two extremities, and buoyed at such points as to be principally above the surface of the water, thereby inclosing a space within such lines and the beach within which bathing is believed to be safe. Every such keeper or proprietor or other such person shall cause to be painted and put up in some prominent place upon the beach, near such bathing-houses, the following words: "Bathing beyond the lines dangerous." Such lines so placed, anchored and buoyed, and such notice so put up, shall continue and be so maintained by every such keeper, proprietor or other person during the entire season of surf bathing. The owner of a bathing-house shall not be subject to the provisions of this section where it is used, occupied or maintained by a lessee for hire, but such lessee shall be deemed the keeper or proprietor thereof. And no bathing establishment shall be maintained in The City of New York, or along the water front of said city without a permit from the Board of Health. City order of the Board of Health. ERNST J.
