On motion the following preamble and resolution were adopted:  
Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon Lot No. 94 Lexington avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, has become dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing and draining thereof, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises which is likely to cause sickness among its occupants:

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on Lot No. 94 Lexington avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, be required to vacate said building on or before July 29, 1902, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the plumbing and drainage thereof, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises likely to cause sickness among its occupants.

And further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of and in said building, and be served as the law requires, under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent.

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the buildings situated upon Lots Nos. 236-238 West Tenth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, have become dangerous to life and are unfit for human habitation because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises which is likely to cause sickness among its occupants:

Ordered, That all persons in said buildings situated on Lots Nos. 236-238 West Tenth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, be required to vacate said buildings on or before July 29, 1902, for the reason that said buildings are dangerous to life and are unfit for human habitation because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises likely to cause sickness among its occupants.

And further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of and in said buildings and be served as the law requires, under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent.

Whereas, The Sanitary Superintendent has certified to this Board that the building situated upon Lot No. 207 West Nineteenth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, has become dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the draining thereof, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises which is likely to cause sickness among its occupants:

Ordered, That all persons in said building situated on Lot No. 207 West Nineteenth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, be required to vacate said building on or before July 29, 1902, for the reason that said building is dangerous to life and is unfit for human habitation because of defects in the drainage thereof, and because of the existence of a nuisance on the premises likely to cause sickness among its occupants.

And further, that this order be affixed conspicuously on the front of and in said building and be served as the law requires, under the direction of the Sanitary Superintendent.

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the receptacles used for holding manure be cleaned and disinfected, and all manure removed therefrom; that hereafter all manure be kept inside the stable, and removed from the premises daily, unless pressed in bales, barrels, or boxes, so as to reduce it to not more than one-third the original bulk; that all offensive earth be removed from beneath the stable floor, and the ground space cleaned, disinfected, cemented and so graded and drained as to discharge all surface water and liquid matter into the street sewer by and through a properly trapped, extra heavy iron drain; that the floors of the horse stalls be provided with a valley drain, properly trapped, and connected with the sewer-connected drain.

Whereas, The premises No. 355 Fourteenth avenue, Astoria, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom, the manure be removed from the premises at once; that a properly covered, water-tight manure box be built, and the stable be whitewashed and cleaned.

Whereas, The premises, No. 83 Fifteenth avenue, Astoria, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board, in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance; the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable, in its present condition, be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom, the stable be cleaned and whitewashed; that the manure be removed at once and the cesspool be disinfected, emptied and cleaned by a licensed scavenger.

Whereas, The premises Cooper avenue, between Fresh Pond road and Cypress avenue, Evergreen, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board, in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom. A properly constructed water-tight cesspool, properly connected with the cow stable, be provided thereat; that a manure box with tight-fitting cover be constructed; that the filthy drain in rear of cow stable and the ground space thereat be disinfected and filled with fresh earth.

Whereas, The premises Cooper avenue, between Fresh Pond road and Cypress avenue, Evergreen, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board, in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom. The cesspool connected with the cow stable be disinfected, emptied and cleaned by a licensed scavenger, and that all obstructions be removed from the drain leading thereto; that the open drain leading from the cow stable to the yard be disinfected and filled with fresh earth; that the filthy pig pens be disinfected and thoroughly cleaned, and that the keeping of pigs at said premises without a permit from this Department be discontinued.

Whereas, The premises No. 935 Crescent street, Astoria, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance; the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable, in its present condition, be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom, the stable be cleaned and whitewashed; that the manure be removed from the premises at once; that a properly covered, water-tight manure box be built.

Whereas, The premises, No. 41 Nassau avenue, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance; the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable, in its present condition, be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom, and the stable be cleaned and whitewashed; that a properly covered, water-tight manure box be built; that the drain be connected by a three-inch iron pipe with the cesspool, and the yard be filled up with dry sand and ashes.

Whereas, The premises No. 133 Newtown road, Astoria, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance; the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom. The stable be cleaned and whitewashed; that the manure be removed at once from the premises; that a water-tight, properly covered manure box be built, also a drain connected by a three-inch iron pipe with cesspool.

No person shall manufacture or bottle mineral, carbonated or table waters, in The City of New York, without a permit from the Department of Health.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, marked with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
