Scully, City Clerk, enclosing copy of preamble and resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen and approved by the Mayor, in regard to the closing of the offices of the several departments of the government of The City of New York on Saturday, December 26, 1903, and on Saturday, January 2, 1904. On motion, the following resolution was adopted, viz.: "Resolved, In compliance with the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted December 1, and approved by the Mayor December 9, 1903, the general office and borough branch offices of the Board of Elections be closed for the transaction of public business on Saturday, December 26, 1903, and Saturday, January 2, 1904.

"Resolved, That the Secretary of the Board transmit the foregoing resolution to the Chief Clerk, with instructions that a copy thereof be transmitted to the Chief Clerks of the several borough branch offices." From the American Steel House Company, F. K. Plumbly, President, dated December 17, 1903, transmitting bill for repairs to voting booths. On motion, the President was authorized to reply thereto. At this stage of the proceedings Commissioner Fuller appeared and took part

in the meeting. From W. L. Bishop, dated the 15th instant, in reference to his service as an In-spector of Elections in the Tenth Election District, Seventeenth Assembly District, Kings County, and from the Chief Clerk of the Brooklyn Borough office, dated the 18th instant, reporting the facts in relation thereto. Communication of Bishop having been answered by the President, both com-

munications ordered to be filed.

From George Hocha, dated the 17th instant, stating terms for the storage of election booths for the year 1904 in the Fifth Ward, Borough of Richmond. Filed.

The President reported that the following papers had been served upon him in the proceeding entitled "In the Matter of the Application of Thomas E. Rush," viz.:

A copy of an order, signed by Mr. Justice Clarke, at Special Term. Part I., Su-preme Court, New York County, on December 8, 1903, denving application for a writ of mandamus, denying motion for a recount of certain ballots, and vacating stay contained in the order to show cause in said proceeding.
