Resolved, By the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, that the Union Railway Company be and it is hereby requested to at once provide suitable indoor accommodation for passengers awaiting transfer over their lines at Southern Boulevard and Westchester avenue and at East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Southern Boulevard.

On motion of Alderman Dougherty, seconded by Alderman Harnischfeger, the following amendment to the above resolutions was adopted:

Resolved, By the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, that in view of the fact that the Union Railway Company has provided no means of accommodation for passengers waiting at various transfer points along its lines, to the great discomfort of such passengers, and in utter disregard of the obligations of said railway, be it therefore

Resolved, By the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, that the Union Railway Company be and it is hereby requested to at once provide suitable indoor accommodation for passengers awaiting transfer over their lines at such places where waiting rooms are not now located, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York.

Affirmative—Alderman Dougherty, Alderman Stumpf, Alderman Harnischfeger, Alderman Murphy and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Negative—None.

On motion, the Board then adjourned.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
