### FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Transactions from January 1 to January 9, 1904, inclusive.

Headquarters Fire Department—City of New York,  
Nos. 157 and 159 East Sixty-seventh Street,  
Borough of Manhattan, January 1, 1904.

Hon. Nicholas J. Hayes appeared at the Headquarters of the Fire Department and was met by Fire Commissioner Thomas Sturgis, to whom he presented his warrant of appointment as Fire Commissioner, which read as follows:

City of New York—Office of the Mayor.

Know all men by these presents, that I, George B. McClellan, Mayor of The City of New York, under and by virtue of the authority of the statutes in such case made and provided, do hereby appoint Nicholas J. Hayes Fire Commissioner of The City of New York, to hold office until his successor shall be appointed and has qualified.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal of office this first day of January, A. D. one thousand nine hundred and four.

GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor.

The above appointment having been made in conformity with chapter 466 of the Session Laws of 1901, commonly known as the Greater New York Charter.

The Fire Commissioner assumed charge of the Department in the following circular, the promulgation of which he ordered:

Circular No. I.

Headquarters Fire Department—City of New York,  
New York, January 1, 1904.

The undersigned hereby announces his appointment this day by his Honor George B. McClellan, Mayor, and by virtue thereof assumes control of this Department. The rules and regulations of the Department, as now enforced, will continue until further orders.

Under and by virtue of the statute in such case made and provided, I do hereby appoint Alfred M. Downes Secretary of the Fire Department of The City of New York, to hold office at the pleasure of the Fire Commissioner of said City, in place of William Leary.

The appointment of William A. Doyle as Deputy Commissioner of the Fire Department for the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens is hereby announced. The business, duties and powers of the Fire Department in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens will be conducted, performed and exercised by the Deputy Commissioner as may be directed by the Fire Commissioner. The office of the Deputy Commissioner will be located at Nos. 365 and 367 Jay street, in the borough of Brooklyn.

NICHOLAS J. HAYES, Fire Commissioner.

The Commissioner this day directed the promulgation by the Acting Chief of Department, for the information and guidance of the uniformed force, of the following Special Order:

By direction of the Fire Commissioner, the attention of the uniformed force is hereby especially called to the provisions of sections 23, 24, 42, 43, 146 and 255 to 268, inclusive, Rules and Regulations, 1903, and the careful enforcement of the same ordered.

Officers and members of the Department performing duty in connection with the above sections will be held strictly responsible for any failure or neglect upon their part to fully carry out such provisions.

Competent Assistant Foremen, one in each battalion wherein a theatre is located, will be designated as Theatre Inspectors for their respective battalion districts, and will work in conjunction with and at all times be under the supervision of the General Theatre Inspector, Assistant Foreman Patrick T. Lenihan.

It will be their duty to make weekly inspections of all places of amusement in their districts which conduct their premises under a proper license, for the purpose of seeing that the stage, wings, traps, openings on stage, flies, shield over border lights, etc., etc., are in proper condition; examine all auxiliary fire appliances, such as hose, standpipes, water buckets, extinguishers, hooks, axes, etc., and see they are of the regulation Department standard, in perfect condition and ready for immediate use, and report in writing to the Supervising Theatre Inspector once in each month, stating whether or not such appliances are in perfect condition; also whether all exits, diagrams and lights indicating exits, are in compliance with the provisions of sections 108 and 109 of the Building Code and of the Greater New York Charter.

It will also be their duty to include in their reports such recommendations as they may deem proper for the better protection of life and property in case of fire, panic or other danger.

While it is desired that the members of this Department be courteous and not over-aggressive in performing their duties in connection with the above, they will bear in mind that the safety of the theatre-going public is dependent, during a performance, to a certain extent upon their vigilance, and they will promptly report any violation of law or neglect upon the part of the authorities having charge of such places of amusement to properly and effectively safeguard their premises at all times.

The attention of the uniformed force is also called to the provisions of section 61 of the Rules of the Municipal Explosives Commission, which read as follows:

"The use of what are technically known as fireworks showers, or the use of any mixture containing chlorate of potash and sulphur, in theatres or public halls of entertainment, is prohibited."

Borough of Manhattan, January 4, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Dear Sir—There is now going on in this Department, by my direction, issued as soon as I took office, a thorough investigation of the conditions existing in the various theatres of this City, to the end that every possible safeguard to life and property may be adopted. I find, however, that very much better and more effective results could be obtained if all City departments which have divided authority over theatre buildings would co-operate for the better enforcement of the present regulations and the recommendation of such measures as may be found necessary to throw the highest condition of security about the lives of the theatre-going public.

I therefore have the honor to request that you invite a conference of such heads of departments as share in the responsibility for the theatre buildings, and I venture to express the hope that the harmonious action which can then be secured will be a vast benefit to the public.

As a result of the investigations already partially made, I have directed that two firemen instead of one be placed on duty at certain theatres at every performance. I also suggest that you direct the Commissioner of Police to place two patrolmen, in uniform, in the galleries of the theatres in order to prevent panic arising from any cause whatsoever.

Requesting to be advised as to what action the Department proposes to take relative to the re-advertising of contract for dredging in Cromwell's creek, and calling attention to the fact that a suit has been instituted by Clifford L. Miller against the City for an injunction restraining the City from filling in the park premises on the north and west of Cromwell's creek, and for a mandatory injunction to compel the City to dredge in said creek. Notified Corporation Counsel that the Department is in no way responsible for the existing conditions, and that the contract for dredging will not be re-advertised, at least for the present.

Kaufman—Stating that he does not consider himself liable for the removal of the barge "Gardner" and cargo, capsized at the southerly side of the Pier at the foot of Twenty-ninth street, East river. Engineer-in-Chief recommends, after investigation, that no further action be taken, as the Department cannot prove that the material and cargo was deposited through carelessness. Ordered filed.

From James Shewan & Sons—Requesting dredging in the slip on the southerly side of Pier 62, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to order dredging to the extent of about 8,000 cubic yards, work to be done under Contract No. 768.

Recommending that an order be issued directing him to proceed with the construction of the bulkhead wall, by the force of the Department, extending from the southerly line of Forty-first street to the southerly line of Forty-second street, North river, the work of constructing so much of said bulkhead wall as is required for the Pier to be built at the foot of West Forty-first street, to be proceeded with at once, and the remaining portion to be held in abeyance until the City acquires the property between the northerly line of Forty-first street and the southerly line of Forty-second street, North river. Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending that C. Wallace be directed to appear before the Commissioner to show cause why his bond should not be forfeited for failure to remove the buildings purchased by him on the block between Fourteenth and Fifteenth streets, North river. Said Wallace directed to appear before the Commissioner of Docks on January 18, 1904, at 2 p. m., to show cause why the bond furnished by him for the removal of the buildings should not be forfeited.

9th. Recommending that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be requested to remove the hydrant on the "L" at the entrance to the Oyster Basin, between Bloomfield and Gansevoort streets, North river. Recommendation adopted.

10th. Reporting the sinking of the canalboat "R. E. Price," with cargo of coal, on the northerly side of the Pier foot of East Eighty-sixth street, and recommending that the Hughes Transportation Company, of No. 1 Broadway, owners of the canalboat, and Frederick C. Russell, same address, owner of the coal, be directed to immediately remove the obstructions. Recommendation adopted.

11th. Recommending that Howard Carroll, owner of the premises, be directed to repair the pavement at the entrance to Pier, old 7, North river. Recommendation adopted.

12th. Recommending that he be directed to proceed with the construction of the bulkhead-wall between Seventy-sixth and Seventy-eighth streets, East river, and submitting specifications and form of contract for the necessary blasting and for the removal of rock thereat. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
