BRIDGES OVER THE EAST RIVER.

No. 1-Brooklyn Bridge.

During the quarter the through elevated train service over the bridge has been doubled. This improvement was obtained through the construction of new crossover tracks in the bridge yard, south of the Brooklyn station, whereby the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company are enabled to operate elevated railway trains across the bridge on each set of tracks comprising the bridge railway, in place of being limited to the northerly set as formerly. By the new arrangement it is possible for the railroad company to operate all its trains across the bridge to Park row from all the elevated railway lines in Brooklyn, daily, except during the morning and evening rush hours of each week day, thereby eliminating to a large extent the transfer system so long in use at the Brooklyn station. During the summer on Sundays and holidays the trains from the Lexington avenue line are run around the loop at the Brooklyn terminal, in order to provide room for extra Coney Island trains over the bridge.

run around the loop at the Brooklyn terminal, in order to provide room for extra Coney Island trains over the bridge.

Two platforms are used for loading purposes in the Manhattan station, but these are inadequate for the comfort and convenience of passengers. With increased platform area and additional switching facilities—for which plans have been prepared and submitted for the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—it is certain that the through train service across the bridge would be improved and temporary relief afforded until the new station is erected in Manhattan. By reason of the heavy traffic, continuous and extensive repairs are necessary to maintain the railway and surface car tracks, etc., in safe condition; and in order to accomplish this work the train and trolley car service are frequently suspended during the night and early morning hours, when such suspension is possible with a minimum amount of inconvenience to the public.

With this exception, the train and car service has been maintained free from serious

With this exception, the train and car service has been maintained free from serious or fatal accident, and with the customary regularity.

Reconstruction and Enlargement of the Westerly Terminal.

On May 6 the Corporation Counsel addressed a communication to the Board of On May 6 the Corporation Counsel addressed a communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, outlining a method of preliminary procedure in the matter of the reconstruction and enlargement of the westerly or Manhattan terminal of the Brooklyn Bridge, under chapter 712 of the Laws of 1901, and presented a resolution for adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, describing by metes and bounds the location of the proposed improvements and accompanied by a plan and general specifications. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the resolution thus prepared and presented, authorizing and directing the Corporation Counsel to acquire title to the real estate, etc., on receipt of technical description thereof from the Department. This technical description has been furnished and the Corporation Counsel has instituted proceedings to acquire the property required. has instituted proceedings to acquire the property required.
On May 25, 1904, I requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to ap-

On May 25, 1904, I requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve the plan and specifications, then presented to it for the temporary extension of the tracks of the Bridge over and across Park row and Centre street and for a short extension into City Hall Park, and for the extension of the existing platforms and the construction of additional platforms and stairways in the present station. This construction is in conformity with the general plan for the reconstruction and enlargement of the Manhattan terminal of the Brooklyn Bridge, and the extension over Centre street and into City Hall Park must be removed on the completion of the large Centre Street Station Building.

This temporary construction will, however, give almost immediate relief to the overcrowding at this terminal and I regard its completion as imperative to this end. Much objection has been raised to the extension into City Hall Park, and the Board of Estimate has deferred action pending report from the Park Commissioner, and further discussion of the plans.

No. 2-Williamsburgh Bridge.

No. 2—Williamsburgh Bridge.

Brooklyn Plaza—Work was resumed early in April, and paving on Broadway completed. The concrete base for the asphalt pavement on Havemeyer and South Fourth streets has been laid, and is ready for the asphalt. On Roebling street, and the remainder of the Plaza, to be paved with granite block, the paving is down, except where the trolley tracks for the Brooklyn Company are to be laid. On this part of the work paving has been suspended until these tracks are in place.

The block bounded by South Fourth street, Broadway, Roebling and Havemeyer streets has been brought, approximately, to grade, but left in such a condition that the track for all the loops which it is proposed to build in this block can be readily laid.

Roadway Paving, etc., on the Approaches and Anchorages—Paving of the north roadway, suspended during the winter, was resumed on April 26, and on May 29 the roadway was opened for vehicular traffic. The asphalt work under this contract, with the exception of that on the north trolley tracks, was completed on the 27th instant, and work was suspended until the northerly trolley tracks shall be laid in place, when the remainder of the concrete and asphalt will be laid.

Kosmocrete Sidewalks, etc., and Asphalt Paving under Manhattan Approach—Work was resumed under this contract in April, and the work completely finished on May 26.

May 26.

Footwalk Flooring, etc.—Work on the south footwalk was completed on May 6, and on Saturday, May 7, at no o'clock, was opened for public travel. On May 13, the north footwalk was finished, thereby completing work under this contract.

Electric Wiring, etc., for Lighting the Bridge—All of the permanent lamp fixtures, including the poles and brackets, have been erected, the switch boxes put in place, and all work under this contract is practically completed.

Comfort Stations, etc.—Work was commenced on all four comfort stations during the second week of April, and has progressed slowly since. Both of the Brooklyn stations have reached the level of the footwalk, and the beams for the bridges crossing the roadways have been erected.

On the Manhattan side the masonry walls are built for about five courses. In

On the Manhattan side the masonry walls are built for about five courses. In all cases the brick interior walls have been carried up with the stone masonry.

Concreting Anchor Chain Tunnels—Work under this contract was finally completed on April 22 by the erection of the bronze castings, which close the opening around the cables at the river face of the anchorages.

Hoods Over Saddles on Towers, etc.—All of the structural steel, and nearly all of the copper for this work has been delivered on the site, and all of the structural steel and about one-half of the covering has been erected on the Brooklyn towers. Erection of the structural steel over the two south saddles on the Manhattan tower has been commenced. has been commenced.

Asphalting Pitt-Ridge Street Block—Work under this contract was started early in May, and the pavement and comfort stations were completed during the same

The Department of Street Cleaning has removed the Fish Market from the block between Ridge and Clinton streets to the block under the approach, between Willett and Pitt streets. The block between Pitt and Ridge streets is being used for a pushcart market, for the sale of vegetables and other food stuffs.

Electric Lighting—On the first of May a contract was entered into with the New York Edison Company and the Edison Electric Illuminating Company of Brooklyn to furnish lamps and current for the lighting of the Bridge, and they have, accordingly, hung the lamps and supplied the current since that time.

Elevated Railroad and Trolley Tracks—A large quantity of ties, rails, guard timbers, and other material for this work has been delivered, and the ties are in place on the south trolley track from the Manhattan anchorage to the centre of the river, and the work is being pushed vigorously. No attempt has yet been made to lay ties or rails on the elevated railroad.

Manhattan Terminal Station—Six foundations for columns for the Manhattan terminal station have been built at Bent 120, and four at Bent 119.

No. 3. Manhattan Bridge.

Office Work.

The general plans for a wire cable suspension bridge have been made and the drawings, including those of an architectural nature prepared by Messrs. Carrere & Hastings, were submitted to the Art Commission about the 23d of June.

The preparation of detail drawings of anchorages and general drawings of towers is well under way. The computations for the stiffening truss spans, etc., have progressed satisfactorily.

Construction.

Construction.

Brooklyn Tower Foundations—The cofferdam surrounding the pier has been removed and the river bottom has been dredged to the original depth of water at the time the sinking of foundations was begun. All the temporary piling has been drawn except a few piles broken off, which are to be removed by the service of a diver. The 3-inch diameter anchor bolt holes through the pedestal are yet to be drilled.

Manhattan Tower Foundations—The masonry of the "Manhattan tower foundations" was practically all laid at the beginning of this quarter. There was no delay in starting the "pedestal" and the last stone was laid May 13. Most of the temporary piles surrounding the pier have been removed and about 1,400 yards of material have been dredged from the river bottom. There still remains to be done on "foundation" and "pedestal" the following: Cleaning some spots on the pier, dredging, removing cofferdam and piles, drilling anchor bolt holes in pedestal and cleaning up the site.

Settlement of Manhattan Pier—Since April 1, 1904, the pedestal has been placed on the "tower foundation," adding about 5,800 tons, or about one half ton per square foot on the foundation. During this time there has been a settlement at the north side of the pier of about one-quarter inch, while on the south side there has been none. The aver-

on the foundation. During this time there has been a settlement at the north side of the pier of about one-quarter inch, while on the south side there has been none. The average settlement since the caisson was sealed now amounts to one inch.

Wash Borings on Anchorage Sites—The wash borings in progress on the sites of the anchorages at the beginning of this quarter were completed the 18th of April. These tests which are graphically recorded in this office show about the same character of material above rock, also about the same elevation of surface of rock as did the test borings previously made on the anchorage sites.

Bridge Property—Cleared—The buildings on only one piece of property, acquired for bridge purposes, have been sold during the present quarter. Friday, the 24th day of June, the buildings, etc., on the property formerly occupied by Dodge & Olcott, Adams street, between Plymouth and Water streets, Borough of Brooklyn, were sold to Harris Levin for \$2,800. At this time the contract has not been executed.

No. 4. Blackwell's Island Bridge.

Three contracts are in force on this work, namely—

(a) With Ryan & Parker, for the six masonry piers, dated June 27, 1901.

(b) With the Pennsylvania Steel Company, for the steel superstructure, dated No-

(b) With the Pennsylvania Steel Company, for the steel superstructure, dated November 9, 1903.
(c) With the Williams Engineering and Contracting Company, for the elevator towers, attics, etc., dated December 31, 1903.
(a) At the beginning of the quarter a little more than I per cent. of the work remained to be done, as manifested by the monthly estimates, consisting chiefly of masonry work on west anchor pier, and pointing joints and dressing pedestals on the other piers. All of this work has been completed, together with the necessary grading and back filling; and most of the plant has been removed, except such as has been transferred to other contractors whose work will follow.

The final estimate on this contract is now being prepared.

(b) The work of this quarter has been devoted chiefly to revising stresses and sections for increased loads, checking detail sketches and preparing studies of the principal

details and connections.

This preliminary work is progressing slowly, and no working drawings have yet been offered by the contractors for approval.

A number of conferences have been held with the contractors, both at the shops and at the Department, which have resulted in a better understanding in regard to the

work to be done.

(c) The contractors have not yet been ordered to proceed with this work, but they are now preparing to erect plant at the site, and have purchased a part of the plant used by Ryan & Parker.

The course plans for a part of the work were submitted for approval June 29, 1904.

BRIDGES OVER THE HARLEM RIVER AND IN THE BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

During the quarter ending June 30, 1904, the Harlem River bridges have been maintained and operated as usual. Among the more important items of repairs and improvements may be mentioned: No. 1. Willis Avenue Bridge-

Painting the structure, which was much interrupted by bad weather during the winter, has been continued, and all the Bronx approach is completed except the railing,

and work has been begun on the draw span.

A stairway has been built from the deck of the draw span to the engine room platform, to take the place of the dangerous vertical ladders heretofore in use by the engine

The bed plates under the end lift rams have been planed down one-half inch, and the ends of the draw are now raised with a pressure of 1,500 pounds per square inch on the rams, instead of 2,200 pounds. This saves wear on the pumps, and saves some little time at each opening.

No. 3. Third Avenue Bridge—
The connection with the street water-main, which had got in bad condition through six years of service, has been replaced with more suitable forms of gates and

fittings.

Several bevel gears on the end locking shaft which had broken have been renewed, and all gears securely fastened in position with wrought iron collars. The bearing plates of roadway aprons, which are worn out, are being replaced with heavier plates of steel.

No. 4. Madison Avenue Bridge— Very little work has been done to Madison Avenue Bridge during the quarter beyond patching the plank roadway of draw span.

No. 6. Macomb's Dam Bridge-

The water pipe connecting with the street main which has been in use for nine years has been leaking and giving trouble. It has been replaced with a better quality of pipe and fittings. The draw has been operated successfully since last January with electricity instead of steam.

The average cost of coal for heat and power during the last six years has been

\$30 00

—which shows a saving of \$42 per month, or \$504 per year.

In addition there is a saving in wages of one Fireman, at \$912.50, or a total economy per year of over \$1,400.

There will also undoubtedly be a saving, through doing away with the hydraulic end lifts and other machinery which has been expensive to maintain.

A simple handbrake for checking the motion of the draw has been put in, to take the place of an unsatisfactory steam brake.

The Union Railway Company, having obtained permission to cross Macomb's Dam Bridge, has been strengthening the floor system and laying rails.

A pipe rail has been put up in the chord space on both sides of roadway to confine pedestrians to the sidewalks.

The Sedgwick avenue approach, which had been moved out of place by the filling of the surrounding swamp, has been moved back to practically its former position.

Construction.

Southern Boulevard Approach to Willis Avenue Bridge—
Bids for the construction of this approach were opened May 5, 1904. The lowest bid, not irregular, was made by the Snare & Triest Company, at \$118,403. As this offer was thought to be too high, bids were advertised for again and opened May 26. Joseph Gallo was the lowest bidder, at \$116,748, and the contract has been awarded

One Hundred and Forty-fifth Street Bridge-

Work has been resumed on the draw span and paving the approaches has been going on.

Fordham Heights Bridge— The contract for the construction of a pivot pier, dredging and fender will be

The contract for the construction of a pivot pier, dredging and tender will be completed shortly.

The caisson foundation of the pier was sunk to elevation minus 88.7, and rests on a practically level bed of marble ledge.

Negotiations for the purchase of the three spans of Ship Canal Bridge from the contractor for the Rapid Transit Railway have been brought to a conclusion. He has agreed to deliver the three spans complete in working order on the piers to be built at Fordham Heights for the sum of \$80,000.

The Commissioner of Bridges has requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to allow the purchase to be made.

BRIDGES IN THE BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Bridge No. 1. One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street and Mott Haven Canal— The top or wearing course of deck plank was renewed. No further repairs were

Bridge No. 2T. Westchester Avenue, Temporary—

The macadam roadways of the two approaches were patched and repaired. The cost of repairs was kept as low as possible because this bridge will be abandoned in a few months when the permanent bridge will be put in commission.

Bridge No. 2. Westchester Avenue, Permanent Bridge—

No repairs were made to this structure. It has been completed for several months, but cannot be opened for traffic until the bridge over the tracks of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad and that portion of Westchester avenue between the railroad and the river shall have been finished.

The temporary approach on the east bank consisting of embankment and a timber trestle will probably be removed before the bridge is opened to the public. This approach will be regulated and graded by the President of the Borough so that it will conform with the lines and grades of the Westchester avenue extension now under construction.

Bridge No. 3. At Unionport—

The deck of the trestle approach was renewed, the borough store house, oil house and bridge tenders' cabin were repaired and painted and part of the bridge was repainted.

Bridge No. 4T. Pelham Bridge—
A few small repairs were required. The structure will probably remain safe for traffic until the new bridge shall have been finished.

Bridge No. 5. City Island—
The macadam pavement on the approaches was patched and repaired, and painters from the Harlem river gang began painting the superstructure. The asphalt roadway on the bridge will probably need renewal before winter. Bridge No. 6. Eastchester-

A few small repairs were made. The bridge carries light traffic, but must soon be replaced. Bridge No. 11. Farmers Bridge-

The causeway approaches were graded and repaired, fallen retaining walls were rebuilt and the roadway was resurfaced. The bridge is now carrying considerable traffic.

Bridge No. 13. Kings Bridge-A new deck was laid.

Construction.

Bridge No. 4. New Pelham Bridge—
Practically no work was done on this job until the beginning of April. Operations progressed slowly at first, but the contractor is making a better showing now. Much time was spent on construction and repair of plant and on temporary structures, wharf, etc.; but the dredging is almost finished and piles have been driven for two piers and one abutment. Three cofferdams are partly finished.

BRIDGES OVER NEWTOWN CREEK AND IN THE BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

No. I. Vernon Avenue Bridge—
North approach masonry completed. Earth filling between walls completed and
"kosmocrete" curbs and walks completed as far as practicable at present.

On Vernon avenue, between Borden avenue and Fourth street, "kosmocrete" curb and walks (east side) have been laid. Changes in water-mains on Queens side have been completed and all the new re-

ceiving basins on this side have been built.

The street paving at the intersection of Borden and Vernon avenues has been relaid and flagging and curbing on east side of Vernon avenue, south of First street, has been

Column foundations, Piers 13 to 16, have been completed. All foundations on north side finished except Pier 12. About three-quarters of piles required in north and south sea walls have been driven

and cut off to grade.
Piers 11, east and west, have been completed, as also have the retaining walls of the

Piers 11, east and west, have been completed, as also have the retaining walls of the south approach.

Pier 9—The cofferdam has been built, the concrete laid to elevation minus 7; anchors for movable span set and the limestone masonry commenced. On the completion of this pier there remains but Pier 7 to be built on the south side of creek.

No steel has been erected during the quarter; the only work done by the American Bridge Company was the painting of the north viaduct, the upper surface having received two coats from spans 20 to 38, and the under side one coat from spans 28 to 38. Pier 12—The guide piles and waling are in place and are waiting the timber for sheeting, which has been delayed in transit.

The Commissioners to acquire the property at the southeast corner of Manhattan

The Commissioners to acquire the property at the southeast corner of Manhattan avenue and Ash street have been appointed (June 14) and will be sworn in on July 19.

This property at the earliest will not be in the City's possession until October 1.

From the present condition of this work it may be predicted that January next will

see its completion.

No. 1T. Temporary Bridge at East Avenue— This structure is still receiving its usual amount of damage by passing vessels, and the greater part of the work done at this bridge was the repairing of the damaged parts, which included the railing of both the Brooklyn and Queens approaches, the fender at the Brooklyn rest pier and the water supply service.

Broken piles were removed from protection cluster at Queens rest pier and new piles driven in their place.

No. 2. Greenpoint Avenue Bridge—
The roadway planking has been renewed by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, whose cars use this bridge. New pinion has been placed on motor shaft in place of

badly worn one removed.

The entire shelter, including shelter house, has been painted.

Bridge is in good condition and working satisfactorily.

No. 3. Meeker Avenue Bridge—
The anchor bolts in rack loosened by draw being operated by electric power in place of former hand power have been replaced by new bolts.

A water supply service (2-inch) pipe has been placed on Brooklyn approach and

The thorough overhauling of this structure has placed this bridge in good shape and there is no trouble with the operating of the draw span.

No. 4. Grand Street Bridge—
The aprons at ends of draw span caused quite some trouble in their operation and it was thought wise to remove them. Since their removal the traffic has been cared for without any trouble or delay.

Bridge and shelter house have been painted. This structure is in good condition and

the draw span is working fairly well.

The half hour at noon in which the draw is closed to navigation has not interfered with the water traffic at this point.

No. 5. Metropolitan Avenue Bridge—
This is a fixed timber bridge on piles over Newtown creek connecting boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.
No work done during quarter.

No. 6. Borden Avenue Bridge-

During the past quarter but few vessels have passed through the creek at this bridge, and owing to this fact no repairs were necessary.

The roadway traffic over this bridge is quite heavy, and this old, badly worn and inadequate structure should be removed and be replaced by the retractile draw

which has been proposed.

No. 7. Flushing Bridge—
Roadway planking renewed in places by the New York and Queens County Rail-

modern bridge at this point.

Roadway planking renewed in places by the New York and Queens County Railway Company.

Bridge is working satisfactorily.

Flushing Bridge Construction—

Bids for the construction of this bridge were opened on April 7 and the contract awarded to the Snare & Triest Company, the lowest bidder of six, at an estimated cost of \$257,844.50.

The contractor was ordered to begin work on April 25, and on May 10 four test s were driven on the line of the temporary bridge. On June 3 work actually piles were driven on the line of the temporary bridge. On June 3 work actually commenced by driving piles for east approach, and since this date the work has been prosecuted in good shape, as the following will show:

71 piles, centre pier, have been driven, cut off and staylathed.
102 piles, centre pier fender, have been driven, cut off and staylathed.
12 piles, east approach, have been driven, cut off, capped and staylathed.
21 piles, east rest pier, have been driven, cut off, capped and staylathed.
36 piles, west approach, have been driven, cut off, capped and staylathed.
21 piles, west rest pier, have been driven and staylathed.
20 piles in 12 protection clusters have been driven.

70 piles, in 13 protection clusters, have been driven,

-making a total of 333 piles and completing the water machine driving.

There remain 118 piles to be driven by land machine in the west approach. In addition to the above some 6-inch by 12-inch waling has been placed on the north

end of the centre pier fender.

The steel work for the temporary bridge draw span is in course of construction and it is expected that this bridge will be open for traffic about August 15.

No. 8. Strong's Causeway Bridge—

Bridge now being painted. This structure is in fair condition and is working

satisfactorily.

No. 9. Little Neck Bridge—
No repairs made during the past quarter. Bridge is in fair condition.
The steadily increasing traffic along the north side of Long Island which has been taken into account and cared for in the reconstruction of the Flushing Bridge, will necessitate the replacement of the present narrow and inadequate structure by a

BRIDGES IN THE BOROUGHS OF BROOKLYN AND RICHMOND.

BROOKLYN BOROUGH.

No. 1. Hamilton Avenue Bridge Over Gowanus Canal—

The temporary bridge at the foot of Thirteenth street, begun on February 9, which was built to carry the travel of Hamilton avenue while the old swing bridge was being replaced with a new bascule bridge, was finished on April 5.

The new bridge is about 50 per cent. completed. All bearing piles have been driven, except a few for the street retaining walls, the east platform piles have been capped, and the east pier sheet piles have been driven.

The Penn Bridge Company, who are doing the shop work, have received the full shipment of steel from the mills and have made considerable progress with their work. The contractor has delivered at the site about 90 per cent. of the machinery. chinery.

No. 2. Ninth Street Bridge Over Gowanus Canal—
Owing to difficulties in obtaining a right of way for a temporary bridge, it has been decided in place of building a temporary bridge here to defer the work on the new bridge until the new Hamilton Avenue Bridge is completed, and then use that structure for the Ninth street travel while the new Ninth Street Bridge is being constructed.

No. 3. Third Street Bridge Over Gowanus Canal—
The work on the new bridge is about 25 per cent. completed. Considerable time was taken in removing the old centre pier, whose solidity bore witness to the faithful work of its builders.

work of its builders. The pier bearing piles are in place, and all steel and machinery have been received.

No. 4. Carroll Street Bridge Over Gowanus Canal— The travel on this bridge has materially increased owing to there being no bridges at Union and Third streets.

No. 5. Union Street Bridge Over Gowanus Canal—
About 50 per cent. of the work for the new bridge is completed. All bearing piles have been driven, and all the steel and machinery have been received.

No. 6. Washington Avenue Bridge Over Wallabout Canal-A broken truck wheel was replaced in April.
7. Metropolitan Avenue Bridge Over Newtown Creek-

7. Metropolitan Avenue Bridge Over Newtown Creek— Centring latches have been placed on the centre pier, to which some slight repairs The Sewer Bureau dredged the channels on May 12.

8. Harway Avenue Bridge Over Coney Island Creek— No repairs have been required at this bridge during the last three months. o. Third Avenue Bridge (Fixed) Over Gowanus Canal—

No. 9. Third Avenue Bridge (Pixed) Over Repairs have been made to the asphalt pavement.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

No. 1. Lemon Creek Bridge at Princess Bay-

No repairs have been made at this bridge, although it is in a dilapidated condition, as the old Ninth Street Bridge is to be installed here.

No. 2. Fresh Kills Bridge— Patches have been placed on the roadway planking pending the arrival of lumber coming from the South by vessel.



Each bid or estimate shall contain the name

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact: also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
