## BOARD OF ELECTIONS.

Meeting of the Board of Elections, held Friday, January 4, 1907, at 12 o'clock m. Present—Commissioners Dooling, Page and Maguire.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board held on the 2d inst. were read and approved.

The following communications were received and disposed of as stated, viz.:

From the Chief Clerks of the Board and the Manhattan Borough office, reporting in relation to the telephone calls made from their respective offices during the month of December, 1906. Referred to the Chief Clerk of the Board.

From the Chief Clerk of the Richmond Borough office, dated the 3d inst., transmitting a schedule of the election records, appliances and appurtenances in the custody of the Board in said borough. Filed.

The following resolutions were adopted, viz.:

Resolved, in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Board of Councilmen, November 12, 1901, and by the Board of Aldermen, November 29, 1901, approved by the Mayor, December 4, 1901, That a statement (with the vouchers attached) of the disbursements of certain contingent expenses of the Board for the year 1906, paid out of the proceeds of the last previous requisition made therefor, be transmitted to the Comptroller of the City for approval; also that a requisition be and is hereby made by the Board of Elections of The City of New York on the Comptroller of The City of New York, for the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars, to meet contingent expenses for the year 1907, the same to be charged to the account of "Election Expenses."

Resolved, That the Chief Clerk of the Board of Elections of The City of New York be and is hereby authorized and directed to procure from the Chief Clerks of the branch offices of the Board in the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens, for the consideration of the Board, a schedule or inventory of all books, documents, papers, records and election appliances or appurtenances in the custody of the Board in each of said boroughs.

Resolved, That Tuesday of each week, at 12 o'clock m., and the headquarters office of the Board of Elections of The City of New York, at No. 107 West Forty-first street, Borough of Manhattan, be and are hereby designated as the time and place for the holding of the regular meetings of said Board.

The minutes of the meeting of the Board held on the 4th inst. were read and approved.

The following communications were received and disposed of as stated, viz.:

From John F. O'Brien, Secretary of State, dated December 17, 1906 (received January 5, 1907), requesting to be informed as to the number of election districts in each of the counties within The City of New York. Filed, having been answered.

From M. W. Burley, Secretary, Board of Election Commissioners, Boston, Mass., dated the 5th inst., transmitting copies of the reports of said Board for the years 1903, 1904 and 1905. Filed.

From James O'Neill, dated the 7th inst., submitting terms for furnishing the Board with copies of all bills and documents which may be introduced during the current session of the Legislature, and such information relating thereto as may be desired. Filed and the President authorized to make such arrangement in this connection with Mr. O'Neill as the President may deem proper.

From one Michael J. English, claiming compensation for serving as an Inspector of Election in the Twentieth Election District, Twenty-third Assembly District, New York County, during part of the day of registration October 9, 1906. Referred to the Chief Clerk of the Manhattan borough office.

From the Chief Clerks of the Board and the Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond borough offices, reporting in relation to the attendance of the clerical force in their respective offices during the week ending January 5, 1907.

The following papers were received, ordered on file, and the President directed to request the Corporation Counsel to take such action in reference thereto as may be deemed necessary or proper, viz.:

Copy of affidavit and order to show cause, returnable at Special Term, Supreme Court, Kings County, on the 10th inst., at 10.30 o'clock a. m., in a proceeding brought by one Robert L. Johnson for a reviewal of the determination of the Board in receiving and filing the certificate of nomination of Philip D. Meagher by the Democratic Party for the office of Justice of the Municipal Court of The City of New York, Third District, Borough of Brooklyn, overruling the objections of said Johnson thereto, and publishing said nomination and placing the name of said Meagher on the official ballot voted at the last general election.

The following preamble and resolution were adopted, viz.:

Whereas, It appears that the boxes containing the ballots voted at the general election held in the Borough of Richmond on November 7, 1905, were placed, pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Board of Elections of The City of New York on March 27, 1906, in a vault of the Staten Island Savings Bank, Stapleton, S. I.; and

Whereas, It appears that in the early morning of January 8, 1907, the seals on the door of said vault were broken, the door opened, an entrance effected into the vault, and additional seals placed upon the ballot boxes therein, without the knowledge or authorization of the Board; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Chief Clerk of the branch office of the Board in the Borough of Richmond be and is hereby directed to report forthwith in writing in relation to the facts connected with said occurrence, attaching to said report a copy of any paper or other document, if any, purporting to direct or authorize the aforesaid acts.

Pursuant to the aforesaid resolution, the Chief Clerk of the branch office of the Board in the Borough of Richmond submitted a report in writing setting forth the facts in relation to the entering of the vault in the Staten Island Savings Bank and the sealing of the ballot boxes therein contained. Ordered on file.

The following preamble and resolution were thereupon adopted, viz.:

Whereas, It appears that persons purporting to represent the Attorney General of the State of New York, and purporting to be acting in conformity with the provisions of an order or orders made by a Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, have effected an entrance into certain of the sealed rooms or vaults in which the boxes containing the ballots voted at the general election held in The City of New York on November 7, 1905, were placed, pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Board of Elections of The City of New York on March 27, 1906, for the purpose of impounding the said boxes into the custody and control of said Attorney General, and without notice to or authorization by this Board; therefore be it

Resolved, That the President of this Board be and is hereby authorized and directed to take such action as may be deemed necessary or proper to protect and safeguard the Board in the performance of the duties imposed upon it by statute and the orders of the Supreme Court, to preserve said ballots inviolate.

The following resolution was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the assignment heretofore made of John S. Cohen, a Clerk in the service of the Board of Elections of The City of New York, to duty in the branch office of the Board in the Borough of Manhattan, be and is hereby reconsidered, and the said John S. Cohen be and is hereby assigned to duty in the branch office of the Board in the Borough of Brooklyn; and be it further

Resolved, That the assignment heretofore made of Joseph Oppenheimer, a Clerk in the service of the Board, to duty in the branch office of the Board in the Borough of Brooklyn, be and is hereby reconsidered, and the said Joseph Oppenheimer be and is hereby assigned to duty in the branch office of the Board in the Borough of Manhattan.

LOCAL BOARDS OF MORRISANIA AND CHESTER, TWENTY-FOURTH AND TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICTS.

Quarterly Report of the Secretary for the Quarter Ending March 31, in the Year 1906.

The first meeting of the newly elected Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, was held January 18, 1906, with all the members in attendance:

Alderman Harnischfeger, Alderman Murphy, Alderman Morris, Alderman Kuntze, Alderman O'Neill, and the President of the Borough of the Bronx, Louis F. Haffen, Chairman.

Mr. JOSIAH A. BRIGGS, Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge during the months of January, February and March, 1906:

The Topographical Bureau of the President of the Borough of The Bronx is charged with the following duties:

1. To make the topographical surveys, computations, maps or plans and profiles and reports in connection with the following three (3) divisions of work:

(a) The preparation of a design for the street system in those parts of the borough where a design is not adopted as yet, and the making of surveys, maps, etc., showing changes of adopted street systems and grades; also the preparation of three copies for filing of all matters which have been adopted by the Local Boards or approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

(b) The actual demarcation on the ground by monument stones and copper bolts of the lines of adopted avenues, streets, public squares, places, etc., and the protection of the same when improvements are being made.

(c) The making of surveys, searches, maps, technical descriptions, profiles, etc., for the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of acquiring title by the City to avenues, streets and other public property.

2. To keep in custody the record and maps of all matters pertaining to work under the jurisdiction of the Topographical Bureau; also keeping in custody all maps filed in relation to the Borough of The Bronx under the Department of Public Parks, the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

3. To make examinations, maps and reports on miscellaneous matters referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

1 (a)—Preparation of the Design of a Street System, Maps Showing Changes of Adopted Street Systems, etc.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903, approved a tentative plan of the street system, east of the Bronx river, which amended previously filed plans and laid out streets over such areas which had not been taken up.

A resolution was passed as follows:

Resolved, That the President of the Borough of The Bronx cause to be prepared for submission to this Board in suitable sections and drawn to a larger scale, three similar copies of the adopted general plan of the street system for certification and filing in the manner required by law, showing as nearly as possible in a general way the nature and extent of the proposed changes and amendments, laying out and extending of streets, roads, avenues, squares or places.

Maps or plans showing dimension of blocks and grades of streets of section 31 and section 32 were filed as required by the Charter during this quarter.

Work on making map or plan of section 47 for adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is under way.

These maps give the side lines of blocks, grades and all necessary information required for the legal opening of such streets.

Computations and maps in relation to amendments and new sections were progressed, and will be shown on tabular statement.

Miscellaneous computations to establish the intersections of avenues and streets with the proposed New York, Westchester and Boston Railway and the New York and Port Chester Railroad, were made.

The fixture sheets, which show the relation between the new street system and existing street lines and property lines by dimensions and co-ordinates were progressed.

Computations were also made for all the changes or establishing of new street lines, grades, etc., which had been before the Local Boards and for which maps were forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for adoption and filing.

A number of studies for the street system in the territory east of the Eastern Boulevard (Throgg's Neck District) were made.

A topographical map of the territory bounded on the south by Inwood avenue, Manhattan, on the west by Hudson river, on the north by Riverdale, and on the east by Broadway, was prepared on a scale of 80 feet to the inch, and studies made for the change of the street system and approaches to the Henry Hudson Memorial Bridge at its northerly terminus.

A new map is under way for the establishing of the bulkhead and pier lines around City Island in accordance with the suggestions made by the Secretary of War.

- Grade studies and profiles for all sections of the final maps are in progress. This work is delayed on account of the applications of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway and the New York and Portchester Railroad Company.

1. East One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, from Morris avenue to East One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street.
2. East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, from Park avenue to Southern Boulevard.
3. East One Hundred and Eighty-first street, from Park avenue to Boston road.
4. Prospect avenue, from Crotona Park North to East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street.

Triangulation.

Chapter 406 of the Laws of 1903 gave authority to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to complete the triangulation of The City of New York and to obtain the co-operation of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey.

This work is under the superintendence of Mr. Nelson P. Lewis, the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and Mr. A. T. Mosman, who was assigned by the Superintendent of the Coast and Geodetic Survey, completed his work as far as the Borough of The Bronx is concerned.

Two field parties were engaged during the last quarter in connecting the triangulation stations with the traverse stations.

The triangulation towers at "Prospect Hill" and at "Crosby" (Eastern Boulevard and Fort Schuyler road) were removed, the removal having been requested by the owners of the land on which they were erected.

During the quarter a series of accurate comparisons were made in the Rifle Range of the Eighth Regiment Armory, Ninety-second street and Park avenue, to obtain data for the relative values of the standard used in the Borough of The Bronx and that of the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey, as established by them in their triangulation. It was found that a 50-foot standard of the Borough of The Bronx, as brought over from the Park Department, is equal to 50.00575 United States Coast and Geodetic Survey, and the 100-foot standard equal to 100.01150 United States Coast and Geodetic Survey.

3. To Make Examinations, Maps and Reports on Miscellaneous Matters Referred by the Chief Engineer of the Borough of The Bronx.

During the quarter 377 communications were referred for report to the Topographical Bureau by the Chief Engineer and the Secretary of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, and 212 reports and letters were written on these subjects.

## Numbering of Houses in the Borough.

The Board of Aldermen on April 26, 1904, resolved that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$5,000, in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 8, section 188, of the amended Greater New York Charter, the proceeds thereof to be applied to the cost and expense of renumbering and naming the streets and avenues in the Borough of The Bronx, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on April 7, 1905, approved and concurred in the above resolution of the Board of Aldermen.

This work was assigned to the Topographical Bureau and a system was established for this purpose. It will enable the President of the Borough of The Bronx to give a resident or owner the number of his house wherever situated, even though there be no houses for a considerable distance.

Notwithstanding the peculiar shape of the borough and the numerous peculiarities of its layout, the numbering is remarkably consistent, commencing with number one on Willis avenue, at the Harlem river, and on Hunt's Point and Clason's Point, at the East river, increasing northwardly until the three main directions join at East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, all bearing the same number at that point; also, commencing with number one on Jerome avenue, increasing westward to the Harlem and North rivers, and increasing eastward to the East river.

The numbers of the houses on streets running north have been changed as little as possible consistent with the system. All houses on streets running east or west will have their present numbers changed. The numbering east of the Bronx river is in accordance with the present layout. During the summer several messengers will be necessary to prepare and deliver notices to all those whose house numbers are changed or whose houses are not numbered; also one competent man will have to be detailed to attend to all the details of this work.

## Miscellaneous.

During this quarter the correcting and bringing up to date the lithographed maps west of the Bronx river, in the office of the President of the Borough, Chief Engineer, Topographical Bureau, Bureau of Highways and Bureau of Sewers, was kept up.

The card index of street improvements in the Borough for the President of the Borough and the Chief Engineer was kept up.

Plotting and draughting of record maps, fixture sheets, maps for adoption, office sets and black prints of the sections east of the Bronx river was continued.

Studies and plans were made for the treatment of that part of Crotona Park surrounding the Municipal Building for the location of additional municipal buildings.

A special map of the Van Nest section, bounded by Bronx Park, Rhineland avenue, Bear Swamp road, West Farms road, Bronx river avenue, Tremont avenue and the Bronx river, was completed for future adoption.

A special map of the McGraw Estate, showing the new street system bounded by St. Lawrence avenue, Noble avenue, New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, Catholic Protectory, Pugsley avenue and Ludlow avenue, is also in preparation for the same purpose.

Sections 41 and 45 of the final maps were plotted on mounted paper. A number of maps were prepared showing the proposed street system in those sections where the Sewer Bureau was making sewerage plans in advance.

The topographical map of the Borough of The Bronx, on a scale of 300 feet to the inch, in ten sheets, was brought up to date for the purpose of reprinting.

Printed maps of the borough were continued showing the different districts of Foremen of open and paved streets, etc., for the use of the Commissioner of Public Works.

The following black prints were mounted and colored up as copies of filed maps, requested by the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Quarterly Report of Work Performed and Materials Used During the Months of January, February and March, 1906, in the Buildings and Offices in Care of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

All the buildings, courts and offices in charge of the Bureau have been kept clean and in repair, and necessary supplies furnished.

The Municipal Building.

During the Week Ending January 6.

Removed partition from Room No. 1 to Room No. 10, and set up the same; repaired the brickwork around the steam boiler; repaired and painted the roof of the building, and removed two chandeliers from Room No. 11; repaired iron gate, Room No. 19; overhauled two radiators, and repaired wash basin and pipes in Room No. 6 (Tax Department).

During Week Ending January 13.

Painted north side of the building, outside, the third coat; repaired partition in Room No. 26; made one drawer for draughting table in Room No. 23; made one shelf, 26 inches by 36 inches, Room No. 17 (Water Department); repaired plastering in Rooms Nos. 10 and 11 (Building Department); repaired boiler No. 2, fire doors and grate rest, and repacked the valves in engine room.

During the Week Ending January 20.

Made draughting table, with drawers and horses, and repaired desk in Building Department; altered door in Room No. 26; washed and repaired walls on top floor; removed lettering from doors of Rooms Nos. 10 and 11 and relettered same; removed lettering from two doors in Room No. 1 and relettered them.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made...

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose...

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 426 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
