Whereas, Under and pursuant to the provisions of chapter 758 of the Laws of 1894, a public driveway and parkway with public places, borders and appurtenances was duly selected, determined upon and laid out and was designated as the Bay Ridge parkway; and

Whereas, It has been ascertained that a portion of said Bay Ridge parkway, distant north of the centre line of Bay Ridge avenue one thousand one hundred and ten (1,110) feet and at right angles to said centre line of Bay Ridge avenue; also a portion south of the centre line of Bay Ridge avenue distant five hundred and fifty (550) feet and at right angles to said line of Bay Ridge avenue, is exterior and outside of the bulkhead line approved by the Secretary of War in the year 1890; and

Whereas, In order to preserve the symmetry and contour of such parkway, it has been ascertained that no change of the lines thereof in the section above referred to, so as to conform to the said United States bulkhead line, can be made; and

Whereas, The City of New York, as the successor corporation of the former City of Brooklyn, is the owner of all the lands and lands under water and all riparian rights appurtenant thereto exterior to the inside line of said parkway and upon which the same is to be built; therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board, for and on behalf of, and in the name of The City of New York, make application to the Secretary of War for a modification of the United States bulkhead line approved in the year 1890 between the points above mentioned so as to make such bulkhead line coincident with and to conform with the exterior line or side of said Bay Ridge parkway, as per blue print attached hereto; and be it further

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, of The City of New York, be and he hereby is directed to furnish any and all information to the Secretary of War or to such army officers as he may designate in order to obtain such modification.

Whereas, The City of New York, by ordinance approved by the Mayor on August 2, 1904, granted to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company the right to cross certain streets and highways, and the privilege to construct and operate a four-track railroad upon certain routes particularly set forth in section 1 of said ordinance, and as shown on certain maps and profiles therein referred to and filed in the office of the County Clerk of the City and County of New York on the 23d day of June, 1904, or any lawful amendment thereof consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; and

Whereas, The Board did, on July 14, 1905, adopt a resolution, which was approved by the Mayor on July 21, 1905, consenting to a change in the route of the Westchester Company; and

Whereas, On the day of 1908, the Board, as the local authority of the City of New York, adopted a resolution granting to the Westchester Company the right to make such changes, alterations and amendments to the route of said railroad, and the right to cross certain streets, avenues, highways and public places, and to construct, maintain and operate a railroad in, upon and across the streets, avenues, highways and public places on such amended route of said railroad, and gave its consent to the other modifications in the ordinance approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, as amended by ordinance approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, and authorized the Mayor to execute and deliver a contract granting such rights in the name and on behalf of the City, which resolution was approved by the Mayor on the day of 1908;

Beginning at a point on the main line of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, between Westchester Avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, and running southerly and crossing One Hundred and Seventy-second street and Edgewater Road; thence to a connection with the proposed Broadway-Lexington Avenue subway at or near the intersection of

The Westchester Company covenants and agrees to abandon and relinquish and does hereby abandon and relinquish to the City all of its rights and franchises to construct, maintain and operate a railroad in, upon or across the streets on the portions of the route described in the said ordinance approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, as amended by the ordinance approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, and which are not covered by the description of the new and amended route as herein described, and which are not shown on the map of the amended route dated June 17, 1908, entitled "Survey Map and Profile of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company for New York County, New York, Section 1, Section 2 and Section 3," which map was filed in the office of the County Clerk of New York County on June 17, 1908.

Sec. 4. The Westchester Company promises, covenants and agrees, on its part and behalf, to conform to and abide by all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 220 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids as estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
