## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 1908.

Municipal Civil Service Commission,

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—We have the honor herewith to submit a report of the work performed by the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York for the year 1908.

On January 9, 1908, the Hon. William F. Baker, President of the Commission, resigned after more than two years of faithful and efficient service. His tact, knowledge of the details of this Department, and his understanding of the requirements of all other city departments made him peculiarly valuable in the position he had occupied with so much honor, and it was a matter of sincere regret, not only to this Department, but to all those interested in the enforcement of the Civil Service Law, when he announced his intention of resigning in order to accept the position of First Deputy Police Commissioner. The Hon. Arthur J. O’Keeffe was appointed to fill the vacancy in the Commission, and the Hon. Frank L. Polk was elected President.

It was to be expected that the work of this Commission for the year would increase, as it keeps pace with the growth of the City, but no one could foresee the tremendous increase that has taken place in every branch. The office was so overwhelmed with the rush of candidates in the first six months that several important examinations which should have been ordered were held over until 1909, as it was physically impossible to finish the work in hand. In the competitive class 28,018 persons filed applications, which is an increase of 8728 over the greatest number received in any one year. This increase can be ascribed in a measure to the great number of unemployed growing out of the financial depression, but in addition to that factor over 3,200 patrolmen took the examination for sergeant, and there were two large examinations held for the Board of Water Supply, namely, Patrolman on Aqueduct and Sergeant for that force.

Although the number of examinations was 68 less than last year, there were 6,954 more candidates examined.

There are 139 competitive eligible lists and 351 promotion lists.

Owing to the increase in the work and the creation of new bureaus, additional space was required and, in response to our request, the City authorities secured the necessary rooms in the same building in which the main office is situated at No. 299 Broadway. We believe that there is now a sufficient force of clerks to properly handle the administrative work of the Department, but more Examiners are needed and, in response to our request, the appropriation for Examiners was increased by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in making up the Budget for 1909; so this force will be increased in the near future.

It is to be noted with regret that the comprehensive report of the Commission on the revision of salaries and grades, to which reference was made in our last annual report has not as yet been adopted by the Board of Aldermen. Some general scheme covering all departments is an absolute necessity; in our opinion, in order to systematize the City service. This Commission has been able to make some progress, however, in this direction by a reorganization of the ferry service. The positions of Pilot and Mate were taken from the non-competitive class and placed in the competitive class, and the positions of Quartermaster, Assistant Superintendent of Ferries, Chief Marine Engineer, and Supervising Marine Engineer placed in the competitive class; so in this Department the foundation for an orderly system of promotion has been laid.

Another change made, which is practical and for the best interests of the City, was the creation of three grades of both Stationary and Marine Engineers, based on the horse power of a plant or the tonnage of a boat; and the substitution of the positions of Licensed Firemen and Coal Passer in place of the one position of Stoker.

Among other important steps taken were the reclassification of the Law Department, the transfer of Foreman and Assistant Foreman of all classes of laborers in all departments to the competitive class, and at the same time abolishing all eligible lists for Foremen. In regard to the latter, it was believed that better results could be obtained by promoting Laborers already in the City service to the position of Foreman, rather than by taking an untried man from a Foreman’s list who would probably be unfamiliar with the work and duties of the department requiring his services.

A serious menace to the efficient work of this Commission has been the disregard for truth on the part of applicants in the answers given to the questions contained on the application blanks as to age, place of birth and previous experience. Owing to the enormous number of applications filed and the limited force for investigation, it has been difficult to run down many of these offenders. This year unusual efforts were made to stamp out this evil, and we feel as if some progress had been made. By careful scrutiny and a system of checking over of applications, many cases of irregularity have been discovered and the guilty parties blacklisted. Further precautions will be shortly adopted so that the possibility of profiting by perjury will be in a great measure eliminated and the guilty will be dealt with in the criminal courts. In this connection it should be noted that the Police Department have been very active in looking up the records of applicants for Patrolman, and the moral effect of this activity is distinctly noticeable in the greater regard for truth shown in applications recently received. We hope to arrange with that Department to assist us in investigating the applications for all positions in the Civil Service. There have been some reckless statements made in the press as to the number of persons who obtained places on eligible lists by having some one take the examination for them. Those who have profited by this fraud are few, if any. The officials of this Department have been very watchful, and it is believed that all attempts have been detected and the guilty persons stricken from the lists, blacklisted, and, whenever possible, prosecuted.

This Commission has exempted seventy-one positions during the year, and all of these exemptions have been approved by the State Commission, with the exception of a Stenographer to the Comptroller and the positions of Auditor of Receipts and Auditor of Disbursements in the Department of Finance. In view of the criticism of the number of exemptions, it should be stated that twenty granted for the Department of Finance were recommended by the Bureau of Municipal Research, and forty of these were for Assistant Court Clerk of the Municipal Court, being an increase of a class already existing, made necessary by the increase in the number of judges.

The Chief Examiner again complains of the number of persons who file applications and then never appear for examination. In addition to these there is a large class who appear for all examinations and hand in papers, although they must realize they have not the slightest chance of qualifying. Some remedy must be adopted for this abuse, as it is an expense to the City, a burden on the Examiners, and an injustice to other candidates. The Chief Examiner again strongly recommends that a fee should be collected when the application is filed, but the Commission hesitate to adopt such a radical measure.

During the year a Promotion Bureau was created to supervise all promotion examinations and to deal with all questions arising as to promotions. It seemed to the Commission that while care was taken in the administration of examinations held for entering the City employment, it was even more important to provide a thorough and practical system of examinations for the more lucrative and responsible positions. Mr. Murray was put in charge of this work and has devoted himself to finding out the actual needs of each department, so that the promotion examinations would supply them with men best qualified to do the work actually required in the higher grades. Already the advantages of this change are generally recognized, and we believe it is a distinct advance in the administration of the Civil Service Law. In our report last year we spoke of the reforms introduced in keeping the efficiency records for the Fire and Police Departments. This year, in connection with the work of the Promotion Bureau, a conference was called of all the appointment clerks of the City departments to consider and adopt a uniform system of keeping the efficiency records of the employees, other than the uniformed forces, on which records the ratings in the promotion examinations are in part based. A plan was adopted and the rules amended to make the plan effective, and it is now our belief that these hitherto worthless and misleading records may prove of some value in the future.

Practical examinations are given wherever it is possible, and the results have been most satisfactory, particularly in the examinations for Stationary Engineers and Engineers in the Fire Department. Candidates are taken to shops and required to demonstrate their ability in the actual management of an engine. A very interesting practical examination held during the year was the riding test given for Sergeant of the Aqueduct Police. The commanding officer of the First Battery, N. G., N. Y., very kindly allowed the use of the Battery's armory, and two officers of the United States Cavalry were selected to pass on the candidates' knowledge of horsemanship.

In the custody of examination papers many and elaborate changes have been introduced, and now it is believed every possible precaution is taken to safeguard them while being used. The Payroll Bureau continues in its efficient work and is a great protector against fraud in the payrolls.

A summary of the work of the Labor Bureau has been already given. It is interesting to note that those figures show an increase over last year of 6,137 applications filed, and nearly 2,000 persons examined. The practical examinations continue to give highly satisfactory results, and the complaints from the departments as to the character of the men supplied from lists are few.

The Commission are anxious and willing to co-operate with all departments in order to procure the most efficient class of public servants, and we readily accept any reasonable suggestion. We realize that the system may not be ideal, but at the same time we feel there is little ground for the attacks made by some heads of departments on the ability of men supplied by Civil Service lists. We note with astonishment the very general belief that the Civil Service Law protects the incompetent and lazy employee from removal. This belief is shared on the part of many, and we are taking steps to enlighten appointing officers, not only as to their rights, but their duty, so it is unfair to the City and to all efficient public servants that the unit should be regained through ignorance on the part of their superiors. We firmly believe that many of the grounds of complaint against the Civil Service Law would be removed by a better understanding of the provisions of the Civil Service Law and the Charter.

The following proceedings were this day directed by the Police Commissioner:

Ordered, That the Board of Aldermen be and are hereby respectfully requested to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$35,000 for the maintenance of the new Headquarters Building, situated at Broome, Grand and Centre streets and Centre Market place, such amount to include the payment of salaries of employees, as follows:

Ordered, That whenever the Board of Aldermen shall have authorized the issue of such Revenue Bonds in the sum of \$35,000, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to concur therein.

Ordered, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$75,000 for the purpose of placing in the new Headquarters Building, situated at Broome, Grand and Centre streets and Centre Market place, the necessary furniture for the occupancy of such building, when completed.

Ordered, That whenever the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall have authorized the issue of Corporate Stock for such purpose in the sum of \$75,000, the Board of Aldermen be and is hereby respectfully requested to concur therein.

The First Deputy Commissioner.

1. Reports directly to the Police Commissioner.
2. In the absence or disability of the Police Commissioner, will succeed to the performance of all the duties of the Police Commissioner, except making appointments and transfers.
3. Will perform the duties imposed by law upon the Police Commissioner as a member of the Board of Health.
4. Will hold trials of delinquent members of the Force as may be directed by the Police Commissioner.
5. Will sign the bills and certify the payrolls of the Department.
6. Will have supervision of the following branches of the work of the Police Department throughout Greater New York:
  - (a) Bureau of Repairs and Supplies.
  - (b) Storehouses, stables, etc.
  - (c) Stationery Bureau.
  - (b) Training farm.

The Second Deputy Commissioner.

1. Reports directly to the Police Commissioner.
2. In the absence or disability of the Police Commissioner and the First Deputy will succeed to the performance of all the duties of the Police Commissioner and the First Deputy, except making appointments and transfers.
3. Will act as executive officer to the Police Commissioner.
4. Will have direct cognizance and control of the administration and discipline of the Police Department throughout Greater New York.
5. Is specially charged with the enforcement of the laws and ordinances throughout Greater New York.
6. Will hold trials of delinquent members of the Force as may be directed by the Police Commissioner.
7. Will have supervision of the following branches of the work of the Police Department:
  - (a) Chief Inspector's office and entire uniformed force.
  - (b) Police Surgeons.
  - (c) Bureau of Electrical Service.
  - (d) Bureau of Information.
  - (e) Regulation of Traffic.
  - (f) Pistol Permits.
  - (g) Parade Permits.
  - (h) Hack stands.
  - (i) Special Patrolmen and records, shields and funds of same.

The Third Deputy Commissioner.

1. Reports directly to the Police Commissioner.
2. In the absence or disability of the Police Commissioner and the First and Second Deputies, will succeed to the performance of all the duties of the Police Commissioner and the First and Second Deputies, except making appointments and transfers.
3. Will hold trials of delinquent members of the Force as may be directed by the Police Commissioner.
4. Will have supervision of the following branches of the work of the Police Department:
  - (a) Office of Property Clerk.
  - (b) Office of Boiler Inspection.
  - (c) Office of Complaint Clerk.
  - (d) Approval of charges (before trial) preferred against all members of the Police Force.
  - (e) The legality of all blanks and forms used in the Police Department.
  - (f) The legality of all contracts and other written papers involving the expenditure of money, except the payment of salaries of the Uniformed Force.
  - (g) Pension Bureau and investigation of pension claims.
  - (h) Licenses for masquerades, fancy dress balls, theatres, concert halls, steamboat and railroad runners, immigrant boarding houses.

The Fourth Deputy Commissioner.

1. Reports directly to the Police Commissioner.
2. In the absence or disability of the Police Commissioner and First, Second and Third Deputies he will succeed to the performance of all the duties of the Police Commissioner and the First, Second and Third Deputies, except making appointments and transfers.
3. Will have supervision of the following branches of the work of the Police Department:
  - (a) Detective Bureau.
  - (b) School of Instruction.
4. Will hold trials of delinquent members of the Force as may be directed by the Police Commissioner.
5. In the absence of the First Deputy Commissioner will certify the payrolls of the Police Department.

Ordered, That requisition be and is hereby made upon the Municipal Civil Service Commission for an eligible list from which to enable the Police Commissioner to appoint two Hostlers, for duty in the Borough of Manhattan, with compensation at the rate of \$2.50 per diem, eligible list certified on December 28, 1908, for this purpose having expired.

A communication was received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated December 24, 1908 (1622), approving the appointment of Raymond LeFevre, Clerk, and Henry C. Page and Pat Osborn, Miners.

On recommendation of Commissioner Shaw, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That the compensation to be paid Sergeants on Aqueduct be fixed at the rate of \$100 per month.

On recommendation of Commissioner Shaw, the Secretary was directed to write the Municipal Civil Service Commission, requesting that fourteen names be certified from the list of Sergeant on Aqueduct.

On recommendation of Commissioner Shaw and pursuant to Chief Engineer's communication 2942, December 28, 1908 (1705), the resignation of Walter E. Spear, Division Engineer, was accepted with commendation of the Board for the work he has performed, said resignation to take effect at the close of the day's work December 31, 1908.

Leave of Absence.

Commissioner Shaw reported that he had approved leave of absence granted to Francis J. Ryan, Patrolman on Aqueduct, for a period of ten days on account of illness (1706).

Promotion.

The Secretary reported that on December 23, 1908, he had written the Municipal Civil Service Commission (1596), in reference to the increase of salary of William J.

Buhendorf, Statistician, from \$1,500 to \$2,400 per annum, certifying that there are less than three persons in the Engineering Bureau eligible for such increase.

**OTHER MATTERS.**

**Accounts.**

A copy of resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted December 18, 1908 (1707), was received, reading as follows:

"Resolved, That it is the sense of this Board that on and after January 1, 1909, all payrolls for mechanics and laborers who are employees of The City of New York or the counties therein paid on a per diem or weekly rate, and all payrolls for employees of The City of New York and the counties therein which are chargeable against more than one fund account, shall be based on a time record which shall be kept in the manner prescribed by the Comptroller and shall include:

"(a) Daily time report or time ticket showing the character, quantity or extent of work performed in sufficient detail to provide data for cost and expense records, and that these time reports and time tickets shall be signed and certified as to correctness by each engineer, clerk or other office employee or member of field force engaged in said work and not working in a gang, and verified and countersigned by the person in charge of said employees.

"(b) Daily time sheets of all persons working in gangs paid upon said payrolls, said time sheets to be signed and certified as to correctness by the foremen or persons in charge of the gangs.

"(c) Time records to be kept in the departmental accounting office, which shall be posted from said daily time sheets and from which payrolls shall be prepared.

"(d) Payrolls to be prepared by persons charged with keeping time records described in the preceding portion of this resolution, said payrolls to be certified by such person that the time thereon agrees with the time records, and that such records are fully supported by time sheets of time tickets duly signed and certified as to the correctness thereof; and be it further

"Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted by the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to the heads of the several departments of the City and County Governments."

On motion, the Chief Engineer was requested to certify as to the method of accounting at present; also as to what extent this resolution applies to the work being done by the Board, and whether in his opinion it would necessitate any change in the present method in order to carry out said resolution. Copies of said resolution and of this minute were ordered sent to the Auditor.

A communication was received from the Finance Department, dated December 19, 1908 (1579), in reference to voucher in favor of C. C. Norfolk, \$27.50, for carriage hire for conveying prisoners to Cold Spring Jail. The Secretary reported that this communication was sent to the Auditor December 23, 1908, together with the enclosure. On motion this matter was referred to Commissioner Shaw.

**Agreement 22.**

Chief Engineer's communication 2934, December 23, 1908 (1607), enclosed copy of letter from Department Engineer Ridgway, dated December 9, 1908, in reference to claim of Charles H. McCarthy for \$4,001. On motion the Secretary was directed to prepare a letter to the Comptroller in accordance with the facts.

**Agreement 72.**

The Secretary reported that this agreement, with J. S. Mundy, dated December 7, 1908, was executed by the Commissioners of the Board December 18, 1908, and by the contractor December 28, 1908.

**Agreement 73.**

Chief Engineer's communication 2939, December 28, 1908 (1647), recommended that a modification of the proposal of the Ingersoll-Rand Company contained in its letter of November 5, 1908, so as to increase the expense of the air compressor plant and equipment by \$360, in accordance with its letter of December 14, 1908, be approved. On motion, said recommendation and increase were approved, and the Chief Engineer was directed to prepare an agreement with the Ingersoll-Rand Company in accordance with its original offer as amended by its subsequent letter.

**Contract 1.**

Chief Engineer's communication 2857, November 23, 1908 (724), in reference to cessation of work, was read.

A letter was received from the Phoenix Construction Company, dated December 23, 1908, requesting extension of time to July 1, 1909 (1588). By direction of Commissioner Benschel this was referred to the Chief Engineer on December 24, 1908, for report. On motion, the Chief Engineer was directed to report to the Board, giving the final estimate on this contract as it now stands, and action was deferred in regard to any increase of work until such report is received.

**Contract 2.**

Chief Engineer's communication 2904, December 12, 1908 (1350), in reference to condition of the work, was referred to Commissioner Benschel.

A communication was received from Parker, Hatch and Sheehan, dated December 22, 1908 (1605), attorneys for the Trust Company of America, and J. P. Emy, receivers of the Thomas McNally Company, requesting that, pending investigation by the receivers, this Board refrain from any action affecting the contract, and, on motion, this communication was referred to Commissioner Benschel.

A communication was received from the Central Federated Union, dated December 21, 1908 (1554), urging that work be begun at once on this contract. On motion, the Secretary was directed to write the Central Federated Union, acknowledging receipt of its communication and stating that the matter is receiving the earnest attention of the Board at the present time.

**Contract 6.**

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That pursuant to the request of John J. McLean, contained in his communication of December 24, 1908 (1624), the time for the completion of work under Contract 6, dated June 2, 1908, was extended to January 28, 1909.

**Contract 9.**

A communication was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated December 22, 1908 (1524), transmitting communication from E. B. Jennings, suggesting a method for the construction of the Kensico Dam. On motion, said communication was referred to Consulting Engineers Freeman, Burr and Stearns.

**Contracts 17 and 18.**

Chief Engineer's communication 2813, December 23, 1908 (1580), transmitted printed pamphlets and advertisements and forms of combined proposal of these contracts. On motion, said printed pamphlets and advertisements and forms of combined proposal were ordered forwarded to the Corporation Counsel for approval as to form.

**Contract 38.**

Chief Engineer's communication 2926, December 22, 1908 (1592), transmitted detailed statement of deposits for plans and specifications, and showed a balance of \$20. On motion, said detailed statement was ordered to be filed with the Auditor.

**Contracts 45 and 46.**

On motion, it was ordered that Contracts 19 and 33 be consolidated into Contract 45, and that Contracts 26, 27 and 28 be consolidated into Contract 46; that orders for printing Contracts 19, 33 and 26, heretofore issued to Martin B. Brown Company, be canceled, and also the orders for printing Contract 28, heretofore issued to the Evening Post Job Printing Office; that estimates be procured for the printing of Contract 45, and that an order be issued to the Evening Post Job Printing Office for the printing of Contract 46 at the prices already agreed upon with said concern for the printing of Contract 27.

**Contracts.**

Opinion 459, dated December 21, 1908 (1542), was received from the Corporation Counsel, in reference to pauper bonds. On motion, the matter of pauper bonds was referred to the Secretary for report.

**Finances.**

A copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment December 18, 1908 (1707), was received, reading as follows:

"Whereas, The Comptroller has represented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that contracts are being sent to the Department of Finance for certification by the various city departments in such numbers that it will be impossible in a short time to certify them, owing to the constantly narrowing of the borrowing margin of the City under constitutional restrictions; therefore be it

"Resolved, That pending determination, either by the courts or legislative act, as to what charges shall be considered in estimating this margin, the heads of the various city departments and offices authorized to make contracts be requested not to advertise for or enter into any further obligations to be paid for by the issues of corporate stock, without first submitting the same to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for reapproval."

On motion, the following letter was ordered sent to the Mayor, as Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"The Board of Water Supply is in receipt of the communication of the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated December 22, 1908, which recites, briefly, that on account of representations made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that contracts are being sent to the Department of Finance for certification from various city departments, and, further, that it will be impossible in a short time to certify to them owing to the narrowing borrowing margin of the City under constitutional restrictions, and further resolved that, pending a determination by the courts or legislative act, the heads of the various city departments authorized to make contracts be requested not to advertise for or to enter into any further obligations to be paid for by the issue of corporate stock without first submitting the same to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for reapproval.

"Referring to the above, as the work to be paid by contracts issued under this Board have no reference to the constitutional restrictions of the borrowing capacity of the City, the Board of Water Supply respectfully requests information as to whether they are not, by the first part of the resolution referred to, put outside of the restriction in the last part of the resolution. In other words, there being no constitutional restriction on the amount of the money authorized for the new water supply or the corporate stock issued therefor, it would not seem to the Board necessary to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for permission to advertise the contracts necessary for the prosecution of the work.

"The Board would also respectfully call the attention of the Mayor, as Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to the fact that practically the City committed itself to the expenditure of one hundred and sixty-one million dollars for the new water supply by the fact of the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 27, 1905, in this expenditure, and that, even looking at it in that light, it would seem unnecessary for the Board of Water Supply to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for permission to advertise for the contracts, all of which will be within the sum, in total, which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has already passed upon."

**Highways.**

The Secretary reported that on December 22, 1908, he had written the Comptroller (1577) in reference to the bill of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, \$107.16, for expenses in connection with proposed changes of highways at Valhalla.

**Offices.**

Chief Engineer's communication 2912, December 18, 1908 (1502), recommended that a water meter be installed at the Pleasantville office, to cost \$18, installation extra. On motion, this matter was referred to Commissioner Shaw with power.

Commissioner Shaw submitted with his approval recommendation of the Chief of Patrolmen (1698), that the barracks, mess hall, stable and outhouse, formerly occupied by the Board of Water Supply Police at Brown Station, New York, be transferred to the Engineering Bureau. On motion, said transfer was ordered.

**Police.**

Commissioner Shaw submitted with his approval general order 9 (1710).

**Real Estate, Northern Aqueduct, Section 6.**

A report was received from Commissioner Chadwick, dated December 22, 1908 (1574), recommending that the Corporation Counsel be requested to take such steps as may be necessary to secure from the Commissioners of the Land Office of the State of New York a grant of Parcels 316, 317 and 318, being lands lying under the waters of the Hudson River. On motion, Commissioner Chadwick was requested to prepare the necessary papers.

**Real Estate, Ashokan Reservoir, Section 8.**

A communication was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated December 23, 1908 (1639), transmitting certified copy of the following resolution of said Board, adopted December 18, 1908, approving the purchase, for \$50, of Parcel 325:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 724, Laws of 1905, as amended, hereby approves of the action taken by the Board of Water Supply relative to the acquisition of Parcel 325, Section 8, Ashokan Reservoir, containing a little over a quarter of an acre of land, and authorizes the purchase thereof for the sum of fifty dollars (\$50).

**Real Estate, Buildings.**

A communication was received from the Comptroller, dated December 26, 1908 (1629), asking information as to the disposition of buildings at Valhalla and elsewhere. On motion, this matter was referred to Commissioner Shaw with power.

**Real Estate, Expense of Acquisition.**

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day the following proceedings were had:

Whereas, The East River Terminal Railroad has under date of January 15, 1908, made application to this Board for the grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate railroad tracks by locomotive steam power over Wyck avenue, Kent avenue and North Fourth street in the Borough of Brooklyn; and

Whereas, Section 93 of the Railroad Law and sections 77, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 639 of the Laws of 1905 provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws this Board adopted a resolution on June 26, 1908, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as September 18, 1908, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least fourteen (14) days in the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" and the "Brooklyn Daily Times" newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to the East River Terminal Railroad and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the East River Terminal Railroad containing the terms of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the East River

Terminal Railroad the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof...

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made this day of 1909, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City acting for and in the name of said City...

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate railroad tracks...

(a) Four tracks beginning at the westerly side of Wythe avenue; thence across Wythe avenue to the easterly side thereof, all of such tracks to be situated in the portion of Wythe avenue between the southerly side line of North Fourth street and a line parallel thereto crossing Wythe avenue about sixty (60) feet southerly therefrom.

(b) Six tracks beginning at the westerly side line of Kent avenue; thence across Kent avenue to the easterly side thereof, all of such tracks to be situated in the portion of Kent avenue between the southerly side line of North Fourth street and the line parallel thereto, and crossing Kent avenue about one hundred and twenty (120) feet southerly therefrom.

(c) One track beginning at the westerly side line of Kent avenue; thence crossing westerly and easterly across Kent avenue and North Fourth street to the southerly side line of North Fourth street at a point about one hundred and ten (110) feet easterly from the easterly side line of Kent avenue. Said tracks hereby authorized are shown upon a map entitled:

"Plan showing proposed tracks on North Fourth street, Kent avenue and Wythe avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, N. Y., to Accompany Application, dated January 15, 1908, of the East River Terminal Railroad to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

and signed by the East River Terminal Railroad Company, W. B. Duncan, Jr., President, and approved by H. O. Havemeyer, Jr., dated June, 1908, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, and is to be substantially followed. Provided that deviations therefrom which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract, may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this right or privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First.—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railroad shall be obtained by the Company within one month after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall within one month thereafter make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railroad ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second.—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railroad shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of ten (10) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time, not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year of this original contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board, one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If, in any case, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate therefore prevailing until

the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third.—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same is renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract, within the streets, avenues and highways shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this grant as above the City (by the Board) shall so order by resolution, the Company shall upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of the tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets, avenues and highways shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Fourth.—The Company shall pay to the City for this privilege the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(b) During the first ten (10) years of this contract, beginning on the date when this contract is signed by the Mayor, an annual sum of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450).

During the succeeding five (5) years of this contract an annual sum of nine hundred dollars (\$900).

Such sums as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or by any law of the State of New York.

Fifth.—The annual charges or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payments for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of the route mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions in this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth.—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh.—The Company shall commence construction of the railroad herein authorized, within two (2) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, or from the date upon which the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railroad ought to be constructed is rendered in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within six (6) months from the date of obtaining such consents or such decision, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided, that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six months each; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall in writing consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Eighth.—The work of construction of the tracks hereby authorized shall be done in such manner as shall not substantially interfere with the ordinary use of any street, avenue or highway as a public highway.

Ninth.—The street surface passenger railway now operated upon Kent avenue shall have the right of way over the cars or trains operated upon the tracks hereby authorized.

Tenth.—Cars may be operated upon said tracks by steam locomotives, which shall be housed or boxed so as to conform with the type commonly known as the dummy engine, or by any other motive power which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York, provided, however, that the Board, upon giving to the grantee one year's notice, may require the company to operate its railroad upon the whole or any portion of the tracks hereby authorized by such system of electric power as may be designated by the Board, and the company shall thereupon discontinue the use of steam locomotives from such tracks.

Eleventh.—Neither passengers nor vehicles shall be prevented from crossing the tracks hereby authorized by the occupation of such tracks by cars or trains operated thereon, for a greater period than five consecutive minutes at any time,

and the aggregate of such periods shall not exceed ten minutes in any hour between 7 o'clock a. m. and 6 o'clock p. m.

Twelfth.—Should the Company be allowed to operate at the grade of streets and avenues, it shall erect, maintain, and operate gates across Kent avenue at or near the northerly side line of North Fourth street, and at a point about one hundred and twenty (120) feet southerly from the said southerly side line of North Fourth street; also gates across Wythe avenue at or near the southerly side line of North Fourth street, and at a point about sixty (60) feet southerly from the said southerly side line of North Fourth street. Such gates shall be closed so as to exclude pedestrians and vehicles from the tracks hereby authorized, when cars or trains are operated thereon. In addition to such gates, the Company shall station flagmen at the intersection of Kent avenue and North Fourth street for the protection of persons and vehicles using North Fourth street. Should it seem necessary, in the opinion of the Board, that gates other than those herein required should be maintained for the protection of persons or property, the Company shall erect, maintain and operate such gates upon thirty (30) days' notice by the Board to the Company.

Thirteenth.—As long as the said tracks, or any portion thereof, shall remain in the streets, avenues or highways, the Company shall set the curbs and pave the roadway and sidewalk and keep the same in permanent repair upon that portion of the surface of Kent avenue, between the southerly side line of North Fourth street and a point one hundred and twenty (120) feet southerly therefrom; that portion of Wythe avenue between the southerly side line of North Fourth street and a point sixty (60) feet southerly therefrom, and that portion of North Fourth street between the rails of the tracks hereby authorized in that street, and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond such rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. The City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any such streets, avenues or highways, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewal or altered pavement.

Fourteenth.—The Company shall at all times keep that portion of the surface of Kent avenue, between the southerly side line of North Fourth street and a point one hundred and twenty (120) feet southerly therefrom; that portion of Wythe avenue between the southerly side line of North Fourth street and a point sixty (60) feet southerly therefrom, and that portion of North Fourth street between the rails of the tracks hereby authorized in that street, and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond such rails on either side thereof, free and clear from snow and ice, provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clear an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Fifteenth.—Should the grades or lines of any street, avenue or highway in which said tracks are hereby authorized be changed at any time during the term of this contract, the Company shall change its tracks to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of such public improvement upon such street, avenue or highway, the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Sixteenth.—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a railroad shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railroad in any way interfere with the construction of public work in the streets or avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly, or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall at its own expense protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in manner as directed by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Seventeenth.—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railroad, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eighteenth.—The said railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railroad construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railroad equipment, including rolling stock and railroad appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Nineteenth.—Said railroad shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City. Before any construction shall be commenced upon any portion of the route, written permits shall be obtained from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and the Company shall comply with any conditions which those officials may impose as a condition upon which such permit is granted, provided such conditions are imposed for the purpose of protecting the structures over which those officials have jurisdiction.

Twentieth.—The rates for carrying property upon the tracks hereby authorized shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, and shall be subject to the control of the Board, and be fixed by the Board after notice to the Company, and hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon the Company, and no rates in excess of those fixed shall be charged for such service.

Twenty-first.—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross earnings, total miles in operation and the miles of railroad constructed and operated under this contract and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-second.—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Council, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the rail-

road constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity.

Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-third.—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service or fail to maintain its structures in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains open to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures which may affect the surface of the streets, avenues or highways shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-fourth.—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railroad authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Twenty-fifth.—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in excess of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of the construction of the railroad; and in the case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to obstruction of traffic, the maintenance of gates and flagmen, the repair of pavements and removal of snow and ice, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of the City, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify the Company, through its President, to appear before him on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. Twenty-seventh.—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-eighth.—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law pertinent hereto, and further, all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be adopted affecting the surface railways operating in the City, not inconsistent with the said Railroad Law and the terms and conditions hereinbefore fixed, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the content, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bid required, as provided in section 424 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either included in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
