## DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

### REPORT OF TRANSACTIONS, MARCH 15 TO 21, 1909.

#### Communications Received.

From Board of Aldermen—City Clerk transmits copy of a resolution setting aside one thousand dollars (\$1,000), chargeable to appropriation for Donations to Discharged Prisoners, Department of Correction, for 1909. Receipt acknowledged.

From Civil Service Commission—Secretary transmits circular of instructions regarding the keeping of efficiency records for employees, and asks for names of officials who will compose the Board of Promotions for the Department of Correction. Messrs. John B. Fitzgerald, Secretary; Joseph Liebertz, Private Secretary, and John P. Dreyer, General Bookkeeper and Auditor, recommended.

From Civil Service Commission—Approving designation of above named. Messrs. John B. Fitzgerald, Secretary of the Department; Joseph Liebertz, Private Secretary,

and John P. Dreyer, General Bookkeeper and Auditor, designated to act as members of the Board of Promotions, Department of Correction.

From Department of Public Charities—Secretary sends copy of time tables of steamboats of Departments of Public Charities and of Correction, stating that new tables are to be printed, and asking if any changes are to be made in time of Correction steamboats the "Massasoit" and "Minnahanonck."

Extra trip to be made by the "Minnahanonck," to Storehouse only, at 8 a. m., returning to Twenty-sixth street dock in time for regular trips at 10 a. m. and 2 p. m. "Massasoit" to leave Harts Island on return trip at 3 p. m. instead of 2 p. m., as at present.

From Corporation Counsel—Acknowledging receipt of a communication from the Department of Correction asking to be informed what course should be pursued to compel the sureties of Archibald Robertson, contractor, to build a "Twin Screw Passenger and Freight Steamer," to be completed within 175 working days, in accordance with his contract with the Department of Correction, the Corporation Counsel states: "I advise that a formal declaration of abandonment be served on contractor and sureties, etc."

Archibald Robertson, contractor, notified that contract for twin screw steel passenger and freight steamer, also contract for steel passenger steamboat (let at same time and conditions of contract identical), have been declared abandoned, as advised by the Corporation Counsel, in accordance with Section J of contracts.

Massachusetts Bonding and Insurance Company and Illinois Surety Company, sureties on these contracts, also notified.

Registered letters sent.

From Department of Street Cleaning—Commissioner asks that Warden of the Penitentiary will call and confer with him in regard to the refilling of Street Sweepers. The Commissioner is desirous of giving this work to the Department of Correction, etc.

Copy of letter sent to Warden of Penitentiary, who is instructed to call on Commissioner Edwards.

From Storehouse, Blackwells Island—In answer to inquiry as to why 200 army overcoats, on contract with A. L. Hirsch, "in 1907," have not yet been delivered. General Storekeeper reports in substance as follows: Estimates for 1908 had to be submitted in the fall of 1907, but supplies were for the winter of 1908-9. The mildness of the past winter has enabled the institutions to get along with stock on hand, so these overcoats have not been needed. General Storekeeper therefore asks that contract be cancelled.

Recommendation approved. Contractor, General Storekeeper and General Bookkeeper and Auditor notified that award has been cancelled.

From Penitentiary, Blackwells Island—List of prisoners received during week ending March 13, 1909: Men, 45; women, 2. On file.

From Penitentiary, Blackwells Island—Warden transmits report of Prison Physician in case of Frank S. Reynolds, a prisoner, who is supposed to be insane, and asks that proper steps be taken to have Examiners in Lunacy appointed to inquire into the mental condition of this prisoner.

Ask the Corporation Counsel to request a Judge of the Supreme Court to appoint Examiners in Lunacy to decide upon the mental state of said prisoner.

From Penitentiary, Blackwells Island—Death, on March 17, 1909, of Wilhelm Gerhard Lindenbein, aged 27 years. Friends and Coroner notified. On file.

From Penitentiary, Blackwells Island, Manufacturing Bureau—Requisition made by Superintendent of School Supplies for paint brushes, etc., for Brooklyn Truant School. Report of Warden that he is unable to furnish such supplies at present. Approved. Certificate transmitted.

From Workhouse, Blackwells Island—Reporting that fines paid at the workhouse during week ending March 13, 1909, amounted to \$52. On file.

From Workhouse, Blackwells Island—Death on March 15, 1909, of Sigmund Degelman, aged 63 years. Friends notified.

From Branch Workhouse, Harts Island—Head Keeper in charge of island, reports the total destruction by fire, on March 16, 1909, of Pavilion No. 3, used as a shoe shop, etc. Fire was discovered by Overseer Van De Carr, and could have been easily extinguished, had water pressure been adequate. Keepers, Orderlies, inmates of workhouse, and boys from the reformatory, all work well. Detailed report will be sent in later. On file.

From Branch Workhouse, Harts Island—Reporting that float landing at Harts Island and that at City Island, used only by boats of Department of Correction, were both badly damaged by recent storm. Landing at City Island is in a dangerous condition, while that on Harts Island needs redecking. Copy of report sent to the Department of Docks and Ferries, with request for speedy repairs.

From Branch Workhouse, Harts Island—Head Keeper suggests certain changes in order to relieve crowded condition of reformatory dormitories, which changes will require four more keepers, two for night and two for day duty. On file.

From Branch Workhouse, Harts Island—Death at branch workhouse on March 18, 1909, of Thomas Price, aged 49 years. Friends notified. On file.

From Branch Workhouse, Harts Island—Death on March 18, 1909, of Conrad Foster, aged three months, son of Ida Foster, a prisoner. On file.

From City Prison, Brooklyn—From John T. Brady & Co., contractors, asking that time on firm's contract for new Women's Prison, Raymond street, Brooklyn (for reasons given), be counted from March 8, 1909. Report of Department Inspector to the effect that temporary fence and quarters for women prisoners were only completed on March 6 (Saturday), and that contractors are justified in asking for this delay in beginning their work. Request granted.

#### Communications Transmitted.

To the Mayor—Reporting fire which occurred about 5:30 p. m., on March 16, 1909, on Harts Island. Factory building which was used for making shoes and clothing, for the storing of prisoners' clothing and valuables, and for storage of material, was entirely destroyed. No life was lost. Records of commitments to the Reformatory, Harts Island, were burned.

In accordance with section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, an issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to the amount of \$100,000 for the erection and completion of buildings on Harts Island, is requested. Manifold copies to Board of Estimate and Apportionment.



To Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Asking that, pursuant to the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will authorize the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of \$30,000, for a steambat to ply between East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street and Rikers Island. There is no boat at this point, and in view of the extensive building operations soon to be begun, it is absolutely necessary that a boat be provided at the earliest possible date.

To Heads of Institutions, Department of Correction—Transmitting copies of circular of instructions as to the keeping of efficiency records of all employees under Parts II, and V, of competitive class, Civil Service Rules (clerical and prison services). Strict attention must be given to all requirements, and report sent in every three months. First report to be transmitted on April 1, 1909. Manifold copies.

To Civil Service Commission—Requesting the approval of the Civil Service Commission for (1) the reinstatement of Captain Frederick W. Parkinson, as Pilot on Steamboats, Department of Correction, at \$1,620 per annum; Captain Parkinson was dropped from the roll, January 15, 1909, for lack of work. (2) The reinstatement of Archibald A. McAuslin, as Marine Engineer on Steamboats, at \$1,350 per annum. Mr. McAuslin was dropped from the roll, January 15, 1909, for lack of work.

To Commissioner, Department of Health—Stating that the Department of Correction is in great need of a boat to run between the islands, and as it is understood that the Health Department is now using the "Pelham," the loan of that boat would be a benefit to the City. Answer received from Dr. Bensen of the Health Department, by telephone, saying that the Department of Correction might have the use of that boat. Thanks extended to the Department of Health for use of the "Pelham" for the Harts Island ferry.

To the Comptroller—Transmitting the following proposals for action on the sureties: Jennings & Welsend for new roof sheathing, City Prison, Raymond street, Brooklyn; Arthur C. Jacobson & Sons, lumber, same being the lowest bids. Contractors notified.

To Commissioner, Department of Public Charities—Expressing thanks for services rendered by officers and crew of steamboat "The Bronx" at the time of the fire on Harts Island, on the evening of March 16, 1909.

To Messrs. D'Oench & Yost, Architects—Requesting that all changes in plans for electric installation be submitted to Bureau of Light and Power, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Brooklyn. Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity so informed.

To Messrs. D'Oench & Yost, Architects—Messrs. D'Oench & Yost notified that contractors must be informed that system of heating in new women's prison, Raymond street, Brooklyn, must be the same as required in contract; the substitution of any other system will not be permitted.

From the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—  
1 (80548). Transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted March 5, 1909, recommending to the Board of Aldermen the establishment of the following grades of positions in this Department, in addition to those already existing: Quartermaster, \$1,200 per annum; Captain, \$1,920 per annum; Marine Engineer, \$1,650 per annum; Chief Marine Engineer, \$1,800 per annum; Supervising Marine Engineer, \$2,500 per annum, and the establishment of the following positions in this Department: Ticket Chopper, \$60 per month; Doorman, \$60 per month; Bridgeman, \$60 per month; Gate-man, \$80 per month; Mate, \$75 per month. Filed.

2 (80617). Transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted March 5, 1909, disallowing the request for the fixing of the salary of Deputy Commissioner at \$6,000 and of Timekeeper at \$1,500 per annum. Filed.

From the Corporation Counsel (80591)—Requesting information relative to injuries alleged to have been sustained by Paul Dolan on September 19, 1908, while a passenger on the ferryboat "Bay Ridge." Information furnished.

Privilege granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner, but not longer than April 30, 1909, rental to be at the rate of \$5 per day, payable at the end of each week to the Dockmaster.

From the Empire State Surety Company (80618)—Asking whether it has been relieved of liability under its bond on the lease of Joseph Gordon of bulkhead south-erly of Thirty-eighth street, East River. Answered that the company's bond runs for the full term of the lease, viz.: to August 1, 1909.

From the Franklin Baker Company (80603)—Requesting a credit account for wharfage. Granted.

From the United Fruit Company (80674)—Requesting permission to sublet to the Iron Steamboat Company of New Jersey the upper deck and outer end of Pier (new) 1, North River, for the full term of the lease passed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund March 1, 1909. Granted, upon condition that the company file an agreement that its obligations under the lease will not be affected or impaired by reason of said subletting.

From the Panama Railroad Company (80608)—Advising that the removal of life-rafts, etc., from in front of Pier 66, North River, is having its attention. Filed, the material having been removed.

From the Astoria Veneer Mills (80385)—Requesting permission to construct a pile storage basin on the easterly side of Steinway Creek, Bowery Bay, Borough of Queens. Agreement to the effect that the City waives no rights which it may have or claim to have in and to the area in question forwarded to the Corporation Counsel for approval.

From Warren & Wetmore (80120)—Requesting the preparation of a supplemental agreement providing for the payment of \$50,000 for additional services in connection with the preparation of plans for the structures between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets, North River. Referred to Corporation Counsel for advice.

From the Secretary (80564)—Advising that under the advertisement for bids for placing filling in rear of the new bulkhead wall to be built at the Gowanus Section, between Thirty-first and Thirty-second streets, Brooklyn, no bids were received. Filed.

From the Chief Engineer—  
1 (80615). Recommending the preparation of a contract for the placing of a new boiler and smoke stack on the tug "Brooklyn" and the placing of a new steam steering apparatus. Chief Engineer directed to prepare and submit plans, specifications and form of contract for the necessary installation.

2 (80611). Recommending that the Municipal Civil Service Commission be requested to authorize the elimination of the prefix "Stationary" and "Pile Driving," so that only the title "Engineer" will be employed. Commission requested to authorize the change.

3 (80610). Submitting print showing proposed improvement of the water-front and harbor in the westerly portion of Jamaica Bay, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, and recommending that same be forwarded to the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission, with the request that the fixtures which are to govern the lines of said improvement be noted thereon. Print forwarded to Commission.

Orders Issued by the Board of Health.

Orders of the Board for the abatement of nuisances are issued under the supervision of the Assistant Sanitary Superintendents in the various Boroughs, upon the facts and evidence contained in the written reports of the Sanitary Inspectors, the result of personal inspection of premises complained of. These orders call the attention of owners, lessees and agents to violations of the Sanitary Code and Health Laws in each case, and require the necessary alteration, repairs, cleaning and improvement of the premises named within three days from the receipt of the order. If, upon reinspection, it is found that the requirements of the order have not been complied with, a suit for penalty is commenced against the delinquents under sections 1172 and 1222, chapter 466, Laws of 1901.

Written orders are signed by the Assistant Chief Clerk in the various Boroughs and issued to the Assistant Registrar of Records, authorizing the search and issuance of a transcript of the record, which, in accordance with the regulations of the Board, is authenticated by affixing the seal of the Department of Health, and attested by the signature of the Assistant Chief Clerk of the Borough. When search is made and the record is not found to be on file, an official certificate is issued to that effect.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any collusion with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
