REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING JUNE 30, 1909.

His Honor the Mayor, City Hall, New York City:

Sir—As required by section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I have the honor to submit the following report for the quarter ending June 30, 1909:

On June 30, 1909, the total force was 9,932. In addition there were on probation 272 Patrolmen, besides 1 Surgeon and 2 Doormen.

Effective force, 8,126; with leave, 490; without leave, 1; sick, 247; suspended, 1; detailed by Police Commissioner, 848; detailed in courts, public officers, etc., salaries not paid by Police Department, 409.

During the last quarter the gains and losses in the several ranks were as follows: Appointed Patrolmen, 115; appointed Probationary Patrolmen, 326; appointed Surgeon, 1; appointed Surgeon on Probation, 1; appointed Matron, 1; appointed Doorman, 1; appointed Doormen on Probation, 2.

Promotions—From Patrolman to Sergeant, 51; Sergeant to Lieutenant, 23; Lieutenant to Captain, 10; Captain to Inspector, 4.

Reduced—From Inspector to Captain, 2; Sergeant to Patrolman, 2.

Retired—Captains, 2; Lieutenants, 6; Sergeants, 14; Patrolmen, 58.

Died—Surgeon, 1; Lieutenants, 2; Sergeant, 1; Patrolmen, 14.

Dismissed—Patrolmen, 21; Doorman, 1; Patrolmen on Probation, 3.

Resigned—Patrolmen, 8; Patrolmen on Probation, 3.
