Hon. JOHN J. BARRY, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit to you attached quarterly report of the work accomplished by prisoners in the several departments on this Island during the quarter ending June 30, 1909.

The census on March 31, 1909, was 257 male prisoners during the quarter; 172 prisoners were received and 264 returned to the Workhouse, Blackwells Island, leaving on June 30, 1909, a census of 165.

The prisoners have been constantly employed and their health has been excellent.

Quarterly Report, Branch Workhouse, Rikers Island, June 30, 1909.

By the prisoners employed at outdoor labor, 300 cubic yards of earth was removed from bank and used to back up sea wall in course of construction. In doing this work one-eighth of an acre of ground was added to the Island, 440 feet of road was built along the front of the Island, the measurement of same being twenty-one feet wide and two feet deep, large stone and cobblestones being laid at bottom, the voids filled with smaller stone and seventy-five yards of small stone which was broken was used to finish the top of the road. Eight acres of farm was weeded and planted, the grass cut and lawns attended to.

The following dispositions of garden seed were made:

One and one-half acres in potatoes, one-half in green peas, one-quarter in butter beans, one-quarter in string beans, one-quarter in lima beans, one-quarter in turnips, one-half in corn, one-quarter in celery, one-quarter in onions, three-quarters in cabbage, one-quarter in cauliflower, three-quarters in tomatoes, one-quarter in beets, one-quarter in asparagus, one-quarter in strawberries, one-quarter in rhubarb, one-quarter in leek, one-quarter in spinach, one-quarter in lettuce. Five ox carts were loaded with hard pan and sent to Blackwells Island; 257 tons of coal was unloaded from barge "Wm. B. Farrell;" a ways was built at the north end of the Island to haul out the launch when necessary to repair. During this quarter both the launches "Mohican" and "Sweep" have been taken up on these ways and their bottoms cleaned, painted and repaired.

Carpenters.

Made new oil shed, laid new floor in Keeper's kitchen, laid new floor through centre of mess hall, laid floor in tinshop using old lumber, put window frame in tinshop, put new platform in front of ice-house, repaired partitions in toilet Dormitory No. 1, put three shelves in Keeper's quarters, moved waiting rooms to dock, repaired floor and window frames and hung door in same, moved bell tower to south end of dock, put new locker in launch "Mohican," made closet for Warden's office, repaired toilet seats in Dormitories Nos. 1, 2, 3 and hospital, made bread box for mess hall, repaired stairs to store-house, repaired and put new rings in six ladders, repaired nine chairs, caned ten chairs, made four horses for oil barrels, made two door saddles for Officer's kitchen, made three sets of steps for launch, made frame and put wire netting on windows and doors of the following buildings: Warden's house, office, Keeper's quarters, hospital, mess hall. Repaired stone truck, put handles in 125 sledges, in 60 hammers, in 30 axes and in 40 picks, sharpened seven saws, fifteen axes and 50 chisels, put glass in Dormitories Nos. 1, 2 and 3, hospital and Keeper's quarters and waiting room on dock, using the following material: 3,150 feet of 4-inch flooring boards, one and one-half inches T. G. planed one side; 100 feet of 3-inch flooring boards, one and one-quarter inches T. G. planed one side; 150 feet of oak, 240 feet white pine, one inch; 376 feet, 3/4 by 9-inch boards, 85 feet, 3 by 12 inch boards; 100 feet ash, 5-foot moulding, three dozen lights, glass; one and one-half dozen hinges; 3 kegs of assorted nails, twenty-five pounds sash cord, one-half pound gross assorted screws, 1,800 feet of wire screen, six pounds tacks, ten pounds of putty, five licks, six pair door knobs, one dozen clothes hooks.

Painters.

Painted and trimmed fronts of Dormitories Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4; mess hall, store-house, ice-house, hospital and Keeper's quarters, painted skylights on above buildings; painted roof and smoke stack on mess hall, painted roof of Dormitory No. 1, varnished altar in chapel, painted fence and bell tower between dormitories, painted and varnished water closet and wash room in Dormitories Nos. 3 and 4, painted prisoner's kitchen, painted Keeper's kitchen and dining room, painted window and door screens for Warden's house, office and Keeper's quarters; painted launch "Sweep," cabin inside and outside, deck and hull; painted and lettered three fire buckets, scraped paper off and painting walls in hospital building, painted, trimmed and lettered seven carts; painted and trimmed waiting room on dock, painted roof, cabin, deck and hull of launch "Mohican;" painted eighteen chairs, painted roof and skylights of Keeper's quarters. Whitewashed masonry walls (outside) of Dormitories Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4, mess hall, storehouse, ice-house, hospital and Keeper's quarters; whitewashed inside of stable, painted twenty-five colored frames, using the following material: 1,000 pounds of white lead, seventy-five gallons of turpentine, fifty gallons of raw oil, fifteen gallons of dryer, five gallons of varnish, three pounds of red paint, one pound of green paint, twenty-four pounds of Indian red, two barrels of Princess metallic, five pounds of black, twenty-five gallons of black asphaltum, three pounds of chrome yellow, three gallons of copper paint.

Blacksmith.

Repaired bodies of 4 carts; repaired brooms of 3 carts; put new tire on 5 wheels; repaired axle of 7 carts. Made 10 nuts, 4 clasps, 20 chisels, 3 cutters, 50 bolts, 2 cross rods, 1 handle for jack, 2 plates and pins, 6 hawsps, 2 knives on cultivators, 4 key drifts, 1 shoe for boat. Repaired stable forks, 2 farm hoes, 2 plows, 2 sets harness, 132 cut frames, 10 sledges, 4 wedges, 9 bars, 12 drills. Sharpened 25 picks, 14 axes, 9 bars, 25 drills, 20 chisels, 16 saws, 3 lawn mowers. Put handles in 18 sledges, 7 axes, 20 picks, 20 horses. Using the following material: 35 pounds steel, 50 pounds flat iron, 40 pounds round iron, 10 pounds nails, 80 horseshoes, 1/2 ton soft coal.

Tinsmiths and Plumbers.

Repaired roofs of Dormitories Nos. 1, 2, 3, mess hall and Keeper's quarters. Put valley on roof of both houses, between Dormitories Nos. 1 and 2. Repaired roof and leaders on hospital building. Repaired leaders on Dormitory No. 1. Repaired gutter on storehouse roof. Put new gutter on mess hall roof. Put new leaders from mess hall roof. Made Sprinkler for roads. Repaired faucets and put new washers in wash rooms, Dormitories Nos. 1 and 2. Repaired toilets, Dormitories Nos. 1 and 2. Repaired toilets in hospital; repaired trap in same building. Repaired faucets and put new washers in bath room, Dormitories Nos. 3 and 4. Repaired toilets, Dormitories Nos. 3 and 4. Repaired roof of chapel. Repaired hot water connection in Keeper's quarters. Repaired hot water boiler and sink in Keeper's kitchen. Repairing toilet and shower in Doctor's quarters. Put new leaders, 1 at north, 1 at south side Warden's house. Repaired ice box, Keeper's kitchen. Repaired 14 pots, 11 pans, 6 coffee cans, 5 soup cans. Mended 3 small flat pans for Officers' kitchen, 3 tea pots, 40 pots, 20 pails, 10 milk cans. Using the following material: 340 sheets of tin, assorted sizes, 75 pounds solder, 7 bags charcoal, 35 pounds nails, 60 sheets galvanized iron, 16 feet 3/4 galvanized iron pipe, 3 feet 6 inches elbows, 4 pounds rosin, 6 sheets bright tin.

The daily average attendance during the quarter was 186 male prisoners. They were employed as follows:

Ten stablemen and drivers, 4 carpenters, 2 tinsmiths, 1 tailor, 15 kitchenmen, 1 shoemaker, 4 painters, 1 plumber, 18 utility men, 130 men, cleaning prisons, out door labor, building roads, etc.

Dear Sir—Following is a report of Branch Workhouse, Harts Island, for quarter ending June 30, 1909:

During the past three (3) months, the Branch Workhouse prisoners have broken 40 cubic yards of stone; made 720 feet running curbing; 6 feet by 720 feet sidewalk, and roadway 21 feet by 720 feet, from stable to hill; made roadway 30 feet by 75 feet at south end of island; made sidewalk along water-front 1,647 square feet; made 308 square feet gutter for same, south end; made 1,719 square feet sidewalk from office to ice house, and 293 square feet gutter along same; made 4,361 square feet sidewalk branching to C. C. dormitory; 348 square feet sidewalk and 87 square feet gutter along ice house and engine room and 27 square feet triangle in same.

Besides the above the prisoners have seeded grass and laid seeds on all bare spots around grounds; mowed down grass at hill and cemetery plots; been excavating for cellar of new building 116 feet by 130 feet, two wings and completely cemented one

wing of same 130 feet by 28 feet. The men have also been farming, burying at cemetery, unloading coal, loading and unloading ice, freight, etc.

Following is the work done by Mechanics:

Carpenter's Report.

Laid 14,000 square feet new flooring and overhauled basement of Building No. 4; made new forms or models, complete, for new building; new stairs for cement building; 30 new benches; 16 new tables; 2 meat benches; 115 sash cords; 85 hammer handles; 6 window frames; 2 clothes horses for laundry, and 16 mortar boxes; 120 feet moulding; 12 straight edges; 8 ladders; 10 stone barrows; 20 door saddles; 1 large bookcase for school; 8 desks and 4 frames; 30 wheelbarrows; 6 runs for steamboats; 40 blocks for Electrician; 1 large bookcase for Reformatory; 6 frames for steamboats; 6 wardrobes; 85 new stakes for new building; 22 sash fasteners for laundry; made 8 pairs crutches; 4 toilet seats; 2 switch boards; 6 rules and 4 shafts; 18 window screens and 1 screen door.

Repairs—Repairs to Steamer "Pelham," stables, all stoops, and made repairs to ice plant.

Painter's Report.

No. 1 Building—Painted outside, two Keepers rooms; toilet and bathrooms on first and second floors.

No. 3 Building—Painted outside.

No. 5 Building—Painted south end round house and toilet of same; south hall and kitchen; Keepers' toilet, and grained and varnished 10 closets.

Painted wainscoting and outside of boiler house, ice house and dynamo rooms, and grained and varnished engine room.

Painted ceilings and walls of kitchen and outside of laundry, dining room, storehouse and kitchen.

Painted Matron's rooms and Warden's cottage.

Painted 12 pairs of trusses; 4 stoops and floor of cottage; lettered and painted ice-cooler; lettered boat No. 5; painted inside and outside of launch "Mohican," and covers and 11 pails for Steamer "Pelham"; painted and lettered 2 letter boxes; 18 window screens, 4 screen doors; 3 wheelbarrows; 3 lawn chairs; fence for Overserr, and painted, grained and varnished 1 large closet.

Painted new cement building inside, throughout, 100 feet by 25 feet.

Tinsmith's Report.

Put on 800 square feet new roofing; 200 square feet on Branch Workhouse, and 25 feet new gutter.

Repaired 3,500 square feet roofing, boiler house.

Repaired 400 feet roofing, Branch Workhouse.

Repaired 1,040 feet roofing on stables.

Dear Sir—I most respectfully submit a report of the City Prison, Borough of Brooklyn, for the quarter commencing April 1, 1909, and ending June 30, 1909.

The alterations and improvements covering and including the new roof on male prison, iron grill work on all the tiers and painting the interior of the prison are rapidly nearing completion. A new storehouse has been erected in the prison yard, and is now in use. The new administration office has been opened for business, and is near completion. The new female prison is now in course of construction.

The female prisoners under sentence here are employed in cleaning and scrubbing in and about the female prison and administration building and working in the prison laundry.

The male prisoners under sentence here are employed in cleaning around the male prison and repairing and painting about the institution.

Appended herewith please find a statement showing the number of prisoners at commencement of quarter, number received, discharged and disposed of; the amount of fines received from the County Court, Special Sessions and ten City Magistrate's Courts, which have been paid to the City Chamberlain, as section 1550 of the Greater New York Charter requires.
